July 7, 1944. Special meeting 7:30

Board met at Town Hall. All three members and clerk present.

Mr. Stanley Field appeared in regard to a highway to his farm in Section 14. Mr. Mullen stated that it was the policy of the board to not accept a petition to lay out a highway unless they had an easement for three rods of road. *Stanley Field Sec 14*

Mr. Field stated that it was impossible for him to get it.

It was mutually agreed that the board deny the petition (under 80.05) without a hearing.

Mr. Field then filed a petition under Section 80.13 of the statutes.

The board agreed to hold a hearing and fixed the time of such hearing as July 18th, at 8:00 P. M. at the Town Hall.

The board then heard Oscar Jack Simon's application for Com. "B" license. *Simon*

Attorney Harold Wilkie appeared for Mr. Simon.

Mr. Mullen called attention to court record of Jack or John Simon.

Mr. Simon denied some of the charges stating that they were against another John Simon.

There was some discussion as to the court record.

Each supervisor stated their opinion. (on the application).

Mr. Wilkie stated that they had appealed the case and his confidence in their position. His assistant read some of the statutes and opinions in support of his case.

Mr. Wilkie then offered to agree to a revocation of the license if the supreme court confirmed the lower court, if the board would grant the license now.

Mr. Simon protested his innocence.

Mr. Mullen stated that he wanted to check up on the court record, so as to not ~~mislead~~ accuse Mr. Simon of charges of which he was not guilty.

The board agreed to give their decision very soon.

Mr. O. C. Harris and his office man appeared in regard to the garbage and rubbish collection contract. *Garbage*

Mr. Carpenter stated that he had offered the O. C. Harris Co. \$2400.00. Mr. Mullen offered \$2500.00. Mr. Harris said that it was worth \$3500.00.

After discussion it was agreed to collect the garbage and

rubbish for one year for \$3000.00 which was agreed to by the board.

Slight cut was made in his assessment which he agreed should be raised again when he could use his marsh land.

The assessment roll was not completed.

Mr. Nasiopolus appeared and discussed his assessment and new tract acquired with the assessor.

Mr. Knox appeared for the Hinkson Advertising Company claiming an overassessment on signboards.

The board agreed to eliminate his signboards from the 1944 assessment roll in lieu of refund for overassessment which was mutually agreed to by Mr. Knox.

Mr. and Mrs Ivan Meyer appeared claiming his assessment high considering the conditions - his dry well being flooded and the condition of the street.

Compared valuations with adjoining property. No adjustment made, but board agreed to correct conditions on the street and proving drainage on street.

Mr. Charles Pix appeared claiming his vacant lots

were assessed for more than he could sell them for. Also claimed that there were no weeds but a heavy assessment.

Assessor was to adjust the assessment. Mr. Fisher to see Mr. Wm Voges, weed commissioner (1943) about assessment for weeds. And decide at next meeting.

Assessor mentioned some erroneous assessments (1943).

Section 2. AFFIDAVIT OF GOOD HEALTH.

No person shall handle drinks or prepare, dispense, serve or sell food, including kitchen help, in any hotel, restaurant, tavern, or roadside stand unless such person has previously filed with the board of health of the Town of Blooming Grove a sworn statement to the effect that he or she is not afflicted with a venereal or communicable disease. Such sworn statement to be of a standard form to be prescribed by the town board of health. Said sworn statement to be renewed annually.

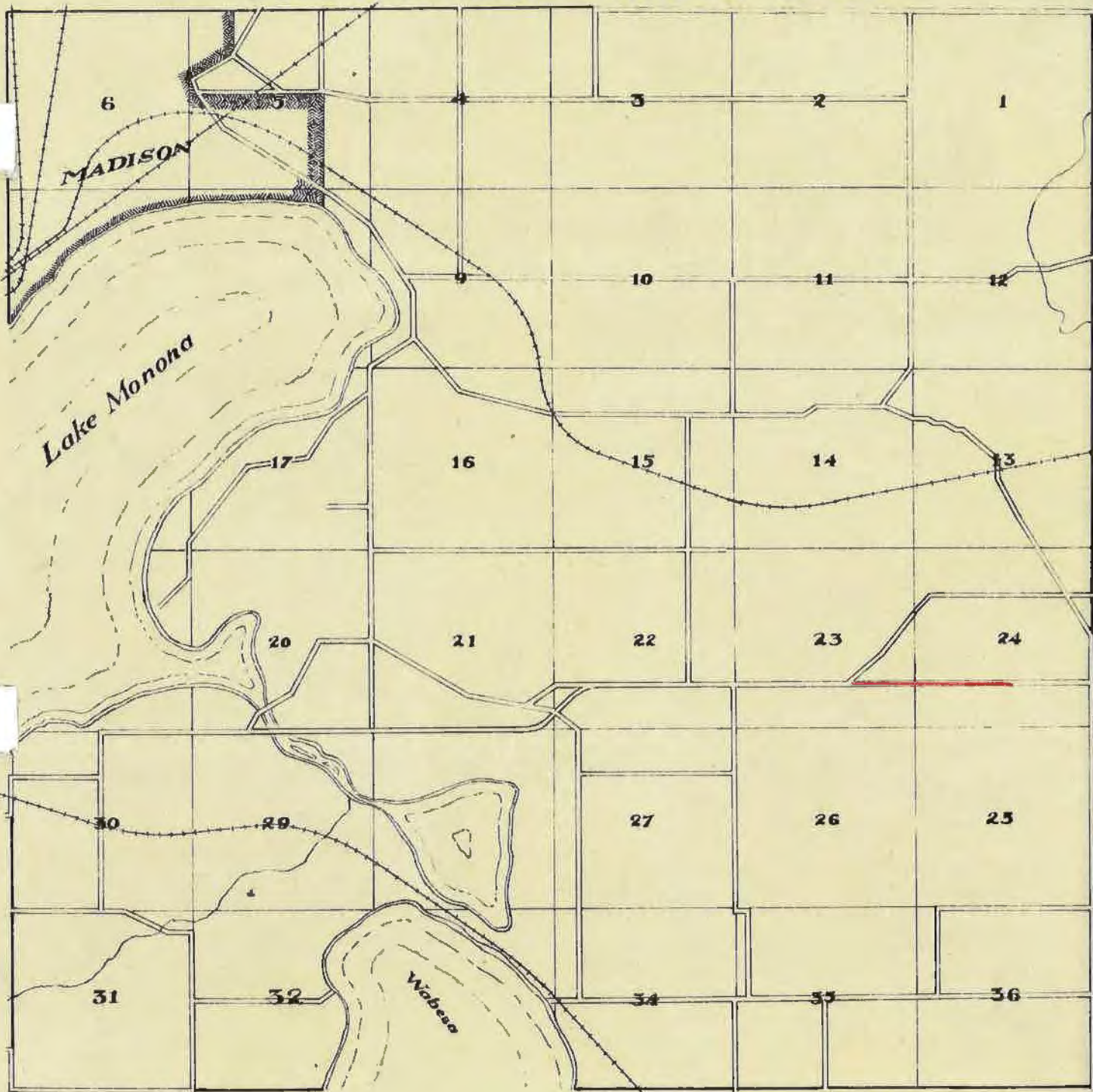

Each such minor attending such registered function shall carry on his person a means of identification in such form as shall be approved by the police and the governing body of the school.

2. It shall be unlawful for a parent or guardian to permit any person under his or her control, if such person is under the age of seventeen years, to be upon the streets, highways or alleys or other public places in the Town of B Blooming Grove between the hours of 10:00 o'clock P. M. and the following 4:00 o'clock A. M., unless accompanied by his or her parents or guardian, or unless such minor is returning from an approved school function as provided in subsection (1) of this ordinance.

3. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than one or more than twenty - five dollars or by imprisonment for not more than ten days.

4. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and posting.

All poles used in the construction of such lines shall be set in such a manner as not to interfere with the use of such highway by the public nor with the use of the adjoining land by the owner thereof; and all wires shall be not less than eighteen feet above the ground at all crossings, and not less than fourteen feet above the ground at all other places. Said power line shall be so constructed as to conform to the rules prescribed in the Safety Code of the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin.

No tree shall be cut, trimmed or the branches thereof cut or broken in the construction or maintenance of such line without the consent of the owner of the tree. In each case care shall be taken to avoid the undue and unnecessary cutting of trees along the roadside.

That there be created a new section of the (county zoning) ordinance, to be designated Section IV A, and reading as follows:

SECTION IV A, RESIDENCE DISTRICT "C" REGULATIONS

Use.

In Residence District "C" no building or premises shall be used and no buildings shall hereafter be erected, structurally altered or changed in use, except for one or more of the following uses:

1. All uses permitted in Residence District "A".
2. Multiple family dwellings, not to exceed four family units per building.

Height.

In Residence District "C" no building shall exceed two and one-half stories of thirty-five feet in height.

Lot area, Frontage and population density.

Lots and parcels in Residence District "C" shall provide a frontage of not less than sixty (60) feet and an area of not less than seven thousand, two hundred (7,200) square feet; provided, however, that any lot in a plat recorded prior to the adoption of this ordinance, or any parcel covered by a separate deed recorded prior to the adoption of this ordinance may be used as a building site. It is further provided that no multiple family dwelling may be constructed on any lot which provides less than three thousand (3,000) square feet per family, and that no such multiple family dwelling may be built on a lot or parcel having a frontage of less than fifty (50) feet; and provided further, that no ~~xxxx~~ existing building, located on a lot or parcel having a frontage or area less than that prescribed herein may be converted for use as a multiple family dwelling.

Side Yards.

There shall be a side yard on each side of the main building of not less than ten ~~xx~~ (10) feet; provided that on lots fifty (50) feet or more in width but less than sixty (60) feet, there shall be aggregate side yards of not less than fifteen

015) feet and no single side yard shall be less than five (5) feet; and on lots less than fifty (50) feet in width there shall be a side yard on each side of the building of not less than five (5) feet.

Detached accessory buildings in the rear yards shall be located as follows: on ~~sixty~~ lots sixty (60) feet or more in width no such accessory building shall be nearer than four (4) feet to the nearest side lot line; on lots less than sixty (60) feet in width no such accessory building shall be nearer than two and one-half ($2\frac{1}{2}$) feet to the nearest side lot line or rear lot line.

That this amendment shall be effective upon passage and publication.

AN ORDINANCE.

To repeal and recreate section 6.01 of the town ordinances relating to speed limits and unlawful operation of motor vehicles and providing a penalty.

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove does ordain as follows:

Section 6.01 of the town ordinances is repealed and recreated to read:

6.01 Speed Limits and Unlawful Operation of Vehicles.

(1) Unlawful operation of vehicles. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any vehicle upon any street, highway or alley in the Town of Blooming Grove carelessly and heedlessly, in a wilful or wanton disregard of the rights or safety of others, or without due caution and circumspection or at speeds greater than those specified in this section or in a manner so as to endanger or be likely to endanger the property, life, or limb of any person, or without due regard to the traffic, surface, width of the highway, and any other condition of whatever nature then existing.

(2) Schoolhouses. The speed of any vehicle shall not be greater than fifteen miles per hour while passing a schoolhouse at those times when children are going to or from school or are playing at or about the school.

(3) School children. The operator of any vehicle operating upon a highway shall pass school children upon the highway with due care and caution.

(4) Traversing intersections. In traversing intersections

where the operator does not have clear view of approaching traffic on the intersecting highway or highways, the speed of such vehicle shall not be greater than that which will permit the operator to stop within one-half of the distance within which he is able to see approaching traffic. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to operators of vehicles on arterial highways where the operators of vehicles on the highways intersecting such arterial are compelled to stop before entering the intersection.

(5) Village of Waunona. The speed limit within the platted areas of the unincorporated village of Waunona, an unincorporated village lying within the Town of Blooming Grove, shall be 25 miles per hour, except that in the outlying districts of said unincorporated village where on each of both sides of the highway there is an average distance of not less than 500 feet between buildings fronting thereon the speed limit shall be 35 miles per hour.

(6) Penalty. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this section shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$50.00 or, in the event said fine is not paid, by imprisonment in the Dane county jail for not more than fifteen days.

(7) This ordinance shall supercede all other ordinances heretofore adopted by the town board regulating speed in the Town of Blooming Grove.

(8) This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and publication.

If any provision of this resolution is declared invalid, it shall not invalidate the balance of the resolution.

Resolution No. 7. Relating to Town Park Commission.

Offered by Mr. Reynold Seeliger in behalf of the Lake Edge Park Club.

Be it resolved, that the Town Board be authorized to create a Town Park Commission in accordance with Wisconsin Statutes Section 60.181.

Mr. Seeliger moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. Roy W. Bohnsack and carried.

Weed Eradication
The clerk read read the item on Weed Control from the annual report of the Town of Burke, that town having gone into the chemical weed control with remarkable success the previous (1946) year.

The chairman explained the work of the Town of Burke and the weed control law and stated that ~~the~~ our board had placed a tentative order for the chemical.

There was a general discussion.

Mr. Voit moved that the board be authorized to investigate the feasibility of providing equipment.

Seconded and carried without a dissenting vote.

There being nothing further to come before the meeting Mr. Edwin Voges moved adjournment. Seconded and carried.

In this case the liability of Blooming Grove rested upon the question of whether or not the attendance of Charlotte Schumacher at St. John's Unstitute for the Deaf, a Catholic diocesan school at St. Francis, Wisconsin, constituted pauper support to the family so as to preclude them from establishing residence in Blooming Grove. In the light of a supreme court decision and an opinion of the attorney general to the effect that such care was not pauper support, handed down after after liability was first denied in this case, we deemed it advisable to permit judgment to be entered against the town in the sum of \$41.84, the same to be collected as a state special charge against the town.

Donald King case. This case is still pending. It is an action against Blooming Grove for relief granted Donald King and is based on the contention that King had legal settlement in Blooming Grove at the time relief was granted. The amount claimed is in the sum of \$185.56. We have made a rather thorough investigation of this case and have come to the conclusion that King never had a legal settlement in Blooming Grove and that he was a resident either of the City of Madison or of Green county at the time relief was granted. When confronted with the facts which we ~~unearthed~~ unearthed, the county welfare department agreed that we were right and is now offering to settle for \$59.18, the amount of relief supplied before Blooming Grove denied liability. Because of this late denial, Blooming Grove is responsible by the statute for this amount and we are advising that it be paid.

Unlawful Operation

An Ordinance.

To repeal and recreate sections 6.01 to 6.18 of the town ordinances relating to speed limits and unlawful operation of motor vehicles and providing a penalty.

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove does ordain as Follows:

Sections 6.01 to 6.18 of the town ordinances are repealed and recreated to read:

6.01 Speed limits and unlawful operation.

(1) Unlawful operation of vehicles. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any vehicle upon any street, highway or alley in the Town of Blooming Grove carelessly or heedlessly, in wilful or wanton disregard of the rights or safety of others, or without due caution and circumspection at speeds greater than those specified in this section or in a manner so as to endanger or be likely to endanger property, life or limb of any person, or without due regard to the traffic, surface, width of the high⁹

way, and other condition or whatever nature then existing.

(2) Schoolhouses. The speed of any vehicle shall not be greater than fifteen miles per hour while passing a schoolhouse at those times when children are going to or coming from school or are playing at or about the school.

(3) School Children, The operator of any vehicle operating ~~and~~ upon the highway shall pass school children upon the highway with due care and caution.

(4) Traversing intersections. In traversing intersections where the operator does not have clear view of approaching traffic on the intersecting highway or highways, the speed of such vehicle shall not be greater than that which will permit the operator to stop within one-half of the distance within which he is able to see approaching traffic. The provisions of this ^{sub-}section shall not apply to operators of vehicles on arterial highways where the operators of vehicles on the highways intersecting such arterial are compelled to stop before entering the intersection.

(5) Village of Waunona. The speed limit within the platted areas of the unincorporated village of Waunona, an unincorporated village lying within the Town of Blooming Grove, shall be 25 miles per hour, except that in the outlying districts of said unincorporated village where on each side of both sides of the highway there is an average distance of not less than 500 feet between buildings fronting thereon the speed limit shall be 35 miles per hour.

6.02 Traversing Curves and grades. In traversing curves and grades where the operator does not have a view of approaching traffic upon the highway, the speed of such vehicle shall not be greater than that which will permit him to stop his vehicle within one-half the

range of his vision.

6.03 One-Arm Driving. No person while operating a motor vehicle shall be so engaged as to interfere with the safe operation of such vehicle.

6.04 Overcrowding Motor Vehicle. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to operate the same when it is so loaded or when there are in the front seat such a number of persons, or any person so situated, as to obstruct the view of the operator to the front or the sides, or to interfere with the operator having a free use of both hands and feet to the operating mechanism or control of the vehicle.

6.05 Passing other Vehicles. The operator of an overtaking motor vehicle shall give audible warning with his warning device before passing or attempting to pass a vehicle proceeding in the same direction, and such operator shall not pass another vehicle without first ascertaining that such movement can be made with safety. At times when not passing another vehicle, the operator of a motor vehicle must keep said vehicle in the right hand lane of said roadway.

6.06 Passing on Curves and Grades. It shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to operate on the left side of the highway upon any part of a grade or upon a curve in the highway where the Operator's view is obstructed with a distance of one thousand feet.

6.07 Passing on Bridges and Viaducts. It shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to pass another vehicle on any bridge or viaduct or on the approach to a bridge.

6.08 Muffler Cut-Out Illegal. It shall be unlawful to use a muffler cut-out or to drive with such muffler cut-out open, on any motor vehicle upon any of the streets or highways in said town.

6.09 Illegal Riding. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to operate the same when any person is upon any portion thereof not designed to or intended for the use of passengers when such vehicle is in motion, and it shall be unlawful for any person to ride on any portion of a motor vehicle not designed for or intended for the use of passengers.

6.10 Parking. It shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to park such vehicle in any of the following places:

- a. Within ten feet of any fire hydrant.
- b. In front of a private highway or alley.
- c. Upon the highway in front of any school house during the hours of 7:30 A.M. to 4:30 P. M. during school days.
- d. In any area which has been designated as a "No Parking" area by the Town Board and has been properly marked with signs to that effect.
- e. On any bridge or within 100 feet of any bridge or viaduct.
- f. On the main travelled portion of highways.

6.11 Lighting Equipment. a. Every motor vehicle except motor cycles when in use upon the public highway of the town from one-half hour after sunset till one-half hour before sunrise shall be equipped with two headlights in good working order. Motor cycles must be

Equipped with one headlight.

b. Every motor vehicle while in use on the highways in the town or when parked adjacent to the highway from one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise, shall be equipped with at least one rear red light.

c. Lights on bicycles. Every bicycle operated upon the ~~highway~~ public highway in the town during the time between one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise, shall be equipped with a lamp on the front and a red light or reflector on the rear.

6.12 Intoxicated Persons Forbidden to Operate Vehicle. It shall be unlawful for any person who is an Habitual user of narcotic drugs, or who is subject to epilepsy, or any person who is under the influence of intoxicat~~ing~~ ing liquor or narcotic drugs, to operate any vehicle upon the highway in the Town of Blooming Grove.

6.13 Vehicles to Stop at Arterial Highways. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to fail to come to a full ~~stop~~ and complete stop within thirty feet of the near limits of any intersection in the town at which has been erected an official stop sign or traffic signal designating an artery for through traffic.

6.14 Windshield Wipers and Warning Devices. It shall be unlawful to operate any motor vehicle upon a highway in the Town of Blooming Grove without a proper warning device or without a windshield wiper or other device for cleaning rain, snow or other moisture from the windshield.

6.15 Weight Limitations. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to operate a motor vehicle on any town road protected by weight limit signs, when the weight of said vehicle is in excess of the limit specified on said weight limit signs. Nothing in this section shall be construed, however, as prohibiting the ordinary use of said posted highways for the delivery of or moving necessary supplies or commodities to or from any place of business or residence fronting on said highway.

6.16 General Weight Restrictions. If, at any time any person is operating upon any highway any vehicle which is causing or is likely to cause injury to such highway or is visibly thereof or the public ~~interest~~ investment therein, the town constable may summarily suspend the operation of any such vehicle on such, and the owner or operator thereof shall forthwith comply with such suspension or be subject to penalty as set out in Section 6.17 hereof.

6.17 Penalties. a. Any person violating any of the provisions of sections 6.04, 6.09, 6.10, 6.11, 6.13, 6.14 or 6.16 of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$10.00 for the first offense and for the second and each subsequent conviction within one year thereafter, by a fine not to exceed \$25.00.

b. Any person violating any of the provisions of sections

6.01(5), 6.02, 6.03, 6.05, 6.06 or 6.08 of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$25.00 for the first offense and for the second and each subsequent conviction within one year thereafter, by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or in the event the fine is not paid by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than thirty days.

c. Any person violating any of the provisions of sections 6.01 (1) to (4) or 6.12 of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or in the event the fine is not paid by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days.

6.18 Effective Date, Severability. This ordinance shall be affective from and after its passage and posting as required by law and shall supercede and repeal all previous town ordinances relating to traffic regulations, speed of motor vehicles, and reckless driving of the same. This section shall not apply to hotels, grocery stores and bowling alleys nor to premises operated by the same person under both a class "B" License and a Restaurant permit where

the principal business conducted therein is that of restaurant.

5.015 (2) It shall be unlawful for any licensee hereunder, or any other person in charge of any premises licensed hereunder, to permit any person under the age of eighteen years unaccompanied by parent or guardian, to be or remain in or about the premises in which fermented malt drinks are sold, unless such person is a bona fide resident, employee, lodger or boarder on such premises. This section shall not apply to hotels, grocery stores and ~~bowling~~ bowling alleys nor to premises operated by the same person under both a class "B" License and a Restaurant permit where the principal business conducted therein is that of a restaurant.

5.015 (3) It shall be presumed that where premises are operated under both a class "B" License and a restaurant permit that the principal business conducted therein is that of the sale of the sale of fermented malt beverages until such presumption is rebutted by competent evidence.

This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and publication.



Offensive Industries Nuisance
The clerk read the ordinance on Offensive Industries and Conditions Declared a Public Nuisance prepared by Town Attorney Albert Brandt.

Mr. Nelson and Mr E. J. Schmidt discussed the provisions.

Mr. Jorgenson moved that it be laid over to our next regular meeting. Seconded by Mr. Fisher and carried.

The clerk read the ordinance prepared by Attorney Brandt licensing Amusement devices.

An Ordinance.

To create section 5.03 of the town ordinances relating to

the licensing and registration of amusement devices and providing a penalty,

Whereas, at the town meeting held on April 6, 1948 a resolution was adopted directing the town board to enact an ordinance providing for the licensing and registration of amusement devices, now, therefore,

The Town Board of the Town of Blooming Grove does ordain as follows:

5.03 Licensing and regulation of Amusement Devices.

(1) Definitions. The following terms shall have the following meaning when used in this ordinance:

- (a) An "amusement device". as used in this ordinance is hereby defined as a machine, which, upon the insertion of a coin or slug operates, or may be operated for use as a game, contest, or amusement of any description, or which may be used for any such game, contest, or amusement, and which contains no automatic pay-off device for the return of slugs, money, coins, checks, tokens, or merchandise, or which provides for no such pay-offs by any other means or ~~xxxxxx~~ manner, and which machine is not readily convertible into a gambling device; and shall include coin operated musical instruments.
- (b) An "operator" shall mean any person, firm or corporation owning and /or operating one or more amusement devices installed, or set-up for use in the Town of Blooming Grove.
- (c) A "possessor" shall mean any person, firm or corporation in whose premises an amusement device is set up for operation.

(2) License Requires. On and after July 1st, 1948 no person, firm or corporation shall operate or keep for operation in the Town of Blooming Grove any amusement device without having applied for and received a license therefor from the town clerk as herein provided. Applications for such license shall be made upon a form to be supplied by the town clerk, and shall give the name and address of the applicant, the place where such amusement device is to be operated, the nature of the business conducted at that place, the name, number and description of the particular amusement device to be licensed and such other information as the town board may require. A separate application shall be made for each amusement device to be licensed and every such application shall be accompanied by an annual license fee of \$10.00. The application shall be considered by the town board at its next regular meeting following the receipt thereof and shall be granted or rejected. License shall be for ~~xxx~~ a term of one year and shall expire on June 30th next following the date of their issuance.

(3) License to be Displayed. Every license granted hereunder shall be posted in a conspicuous place on or near

the amusemnet device so licensed and shall identify the same, by number or description.

(4) Transfer Permitted. The town clerk is authorized to permit the transfer of the license issued for one amusement device to another amusement device upon a good and proper showing that the amusement device from which such license is transferred has been taken out of use in the Town of Blooming Grove and the payment of a transfer fee of One Dollar (\$1.00), and no such amusement device so taken out of use in the Town of Blooming Grove shall be pla ced back in use until a license has been secured for the same. The town clerk shall keep an appropriate record of the registration of each amusement device showing the name and number and such other information as he shall deem necessary concerning each machine registered, and also keep ~~xxxxxxx~~ a similar record of all amusement devices for which transfers have been issued or authorized.

(5) Wagering Prohibited. No possessor or operator shall permitthe wagering of money, goods, or merchandise upon the result of the game, or machine played, or upon the test of skill, nor shall any possessor, for himself, or for an operator pay any moneys, goods, merchandise or token to any person playing the amusement device.

(6) Certain Installations Prohibitted. No amusement device, except coin operated musical instruments, shall be installed or operated within any premises located within six hundred (600) feet of any elementary or high school grounds.

(7) Devices not to be operated during certain hours. No amusement device, including coin operated musical instruments, shall be operated between the hours of 1:00 A. M. and 8:00 A. M. daily.

(8) Liability to Possessor. The possessor of any amusement device shall be held responsible for the full compliance of the requirements of this ordinance, and for any violation of the ordinance which may occur on his premises whether he participated in such violation or not.

(9) Penalty, Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00. In default of Paymentof such penalty the violator shall be imprisoned in the county jail not to exceed ninety (90) days.

(10) Effective Date. This ordinance shall be effective July 1, 1948.

Mr. Fisher moved the adoption of the ordinance, seconded by Mr. Jorgenson and carried unanimously.

(1) Any gas plant, factory, yard, store house, building or structure of any kind, Chandler's shop, soap factory, tannery, distillery, livery stable, cattle yard, shed, barn, packing house, slaughter house, fertilizer manufactory, rendering establishment, coal pile, rubbish accumulation, stagnant pool, sink hole, or other thing within the Town of ~~Blooming~~ Blooming Grove which shall become noxious, foul or offensive, or which shall emit foul or offensive odors, dust, gases, ~~effluvia~~ effluvia or stench, or which shall be dangerous or prejudicial to public health or to property is hereby declared to be a public nuisance.

(2) Any person, firm or corporation owning, occupying, in charge or control of, or maintaining or permitting any premises described in subsection (1) herein wherein a public nuisance shall exist, shall be fined in a sum ~~of~~ not less than \$50.00 or more than \$200.00, or in the event the fine is not paid by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 60 days.

Without further discussion Mr. Jorgenson moved the adoption of the ordinance. Seconded by Mr. Fisher.

All three members voted "Aye".

Madison General Hospital. *Hospitals*

Agreement by and between the Town of Blooming Grove, and the Madison General Hospital, St. Mary's Hospital and Methodist Hospital, all of Madison, Wisconsin.

This agreement is made for a trial period of one year, beginning May 1st, 1948, and may be changed by either party upon thirty days notice after that date.

The Town of Blooming Grove will pay to the above named hospitals a flat rate of six dollars (\$6.00) a day for all services rendered to authorized Town of Blooming Grove clients.

The following exceptions will be considered on an individual basis and proper notification of such cases being in the hospital shall be sent to the Town of Blooming Grove:

(1) Cases requiring blood transfusions. The hospital shall not be required to incur any expense or any legal liability in providing donors for patients authorized to receive blood transfusions;

(2) Cases requiring penicillin for a period longer than two days;

(3) Cases requiring Streptomycin; and

(4) Cases which have been diagnosed as having Addison Disease and therefore require an unusual amount of drugs.

This agreement is to cover in-patients cases only, and out-patient cases will be considered separately and the charges based on actual cost for services rendered.

This agreement does not include services rendered by physicians and surgeons in the hospital.

The agreement was accepted by the board.
