## REMEMBER TO VOTE!

Election Day
Tuesday, November 5th

Delaware Water Gap will have two days of leaf collecting. Leaves will be collected throughout the entire borough each day. Dates will be posted at the post office and borough hall. Leaves should be placed on the street no earlier than the weekend just prior to the scheduled pick up day.

Bad weather or mechanical problems can delay the pickup, but the collection will be made as soon as the leaf truck is available.

All leaves should be placed curbside along the streets of the borough in piles not to exceed four feet high and four feet wide. <u>Piles should be made in front of your property not on the opposite side of the street.</u> The collection truck will only collect on borough streets and not on private property.

Only leaves will be collected. Any pile containing foreign objects such as tree branches, shrubs or hedge clippings will not be picked up. These items clog and damage the vacuum. Please do not park on the leaves that are to be vacuumed. If piles contain any foreign objects and cannot be vacuumed up it will be the responsibility of the property owner to remove the piles from the street.


# Delaware Water Gap Fire Department Public Meeting

The car has arrived, and as I type this, it's being outfitted with the latest equipment available and may be out on patrol by the time you receive your newsletter. You are probably aware that the Smithfield Board of Supervisors unanimously passed the usage of the historic Wolf Hollow golf course to be developed into the Watergap Wellness rehabilitation center. Some of our residents have filed for an appeal and a stay which means the case will be heard by a judge at the County level. The Borough has applied for a grant to fix and pave Cherry Valley Road. The application includes adjusting the crown of the road and directing drainage and water runoff away from residential properties. Thank you to Councilman Jack Shoemaker for spearheading the effort to get us this much needed grant.

Lastly I'd like to take this opportunity to thank our Borough secretary Ileana Hernandez for her years of service to our Borough. Her prior expertise in local government was a great asset to our community and it is unfortunate that she has decided pursue other paths. Thank you, Ileana, for all you've done for our little town. Good luck in your future endeavors.

#### Local History Spot By Marty Wilson

At a recent panel discussion of local history at Northampton Community College in Tannersville I was joined by Dr. Lawrence Squeri and Water Gap's own Jennifer Palmer to talk about Monroe County's past. One of the questions asked of the panel was what excited us about local history. I mentioned a document that I recently found by accident in an old Methodist hymnal given to me by my Uncle John. There I found a four-page poem written in cursive and dated 1928. A Mr. M. G. OHaire, a guest at Croasdale Manor, must have been sitting on the porch when he was inspired by the beauty that lay in front of him. (Croasdale Manor burned down in 1939, but was reconstructed and most recently served as the home of word-famous trombonist Urbie Green. It can be seen on the left as one drives onto the brand new onramp going west on Rt. 80.) I've copied the poem below. As you read it, picture yourself sitting on the porch with the Water Gap in front of you. The road described is the current road that connects the borough with Rt. 80. However, there was no Rt. 80 in 1928, so the road veered toward Shawnee. There were no stores or bridges to block the view from the Croasdale Manor porch. Instead, there were acres of corn. And, of course, there was the river. This poem reminds us that it was the beauty of the area that drew urbanites here. And, for them, nature confirmed their belief in God.

#### Croasdale Manor

In a gentle knoll the manor stands; Its rough-hewn stone is gray and old, And porches wide in vine clad grace The subtle charm of welcome hold

The widening lawns, adown they stretch To a Highway broad that cut the farm, And motors speed in joyous throngs, All heedless of the valley's charms.

The ancient trees their glory lend To the peaceful joys of this beauteous home, And from their shade on summer day Nor youth nor age may willing roam.

Beyond the highway's curving line Lie fields of grain in lustrous waves, While fragrant corn in silken rows The gorgeous sunlight deeply loves.

And oft as I gaze in calm delight, Through the low lying mist I seem to see The form of the Master in the gleam Of golden corn in Galilee.

As he in pity plucked the fruit, And knowing they hungered, gave to eat, While the Sabbath sun shone fiercely down On the multitude hast'ning with gladsome feet. And far beyond, the Blue Ridge line Lies high against the pearl gray sky, In gorgeous purple's royal hue Is blent with violet, tender, shy.

A Delaware, grave and stately stream! What grace thou lendest to the scene! A bright-eyed nymphs, plunge gayly in And float on the rippling tide serene!

While in and out ply tiny craft Through the winding Gap, where the mountains tow'r And the sunlight falls in fitful gleams As the glinting shadows softly low'r,

Then upward gazing through the mist, The donjon grim, I seem to see, As in olden tales I loved so well, When Time was young and life was free.

But no donjon tower is there to tell Of the ruthless hand of humankind Only the sunlit shadows fall In gorge and ravine, in beauty lined.

And the Mistress of this manor old? Low-voiced, of gentle mien is she, And every day each hour she spends Herself in gracious courtesy.

And so, the dear old manor-farm To me is just a world apart, Where youth and age alike may find The deepest joys of mind and heart.
