On the road, today's Broad Street, a man, a person on horseback, and a horse & buggy are moving toward the village. Off in the distance is the Glenwood, the Methodist & Presbyterian churches, and the Water Gap House. The artist is looking southward at the town.

Local History Spot

In the last edition of the Local History Spot we presented a poem that long-time Water Gap resident Bob Lehr wrote to celebrate the borough. In 1993 the poem was sealed in a time capsule at the Dutot and is slated to be opened in 2093. Bob and his wife, Faye, owned and operated the Deer Head Inn for many years. During their tenure the Deer Head became well known as a nightclub that featured jazz, a tradition that continues today. Bob died in 1996 at the age of 71. Ten years later, in 2006, I sat down with his widow, Faye Lehr, to ask her some questions about Bob and about the Deer Head. What follows is derived from that interview.

Bob and Faye met in Boston shortly after WW II when Bob was stationed there as a U.S. Marine. Faye wasn't favorably impressed with Bob when she first met him, but she eventually warmed up to him. They married and, after he was discharged, moved to Trenton, New Jersey, so Bob could study business at Rider College. While they were living in Trenton, in the early 1950s, Bob's father suggested that the young couple buy the Deer Head Inn. Bob had grown up in the Gap, living on Cherry Valley Road. He attended the Water Gap school. According to Faye, they bought the Deer Head from Norm Vaughn who somehow acquired the building from his mother-in-law who lived in New York City. The building was originally called the Central House, which was a good name for it in the nineteenth century because, at that point, it was centrally located in the village. But by the time the Lehrs bought it, its name had been changed to the Deer Head Inn.

In the early days of their ownership, Faye says, they got lucky. "Fred Waring opened the school across the street. And Shawnee Press opened over there. They were all musicians." And they all needed lunch. Supplementing the lunch trade were the workers who were building Rt. 80 and the toll bridge, many of whom stayed in the rooms upstairs.

When I asked her about how jazz started at the Deer Head Faye told me that Bob had always been a jazz fan. In fact, he played clarinet in the service but gave it up later. So when a local musician asked to play at the Deer Head one night, he agreed. John Dengler had been working on Friday nights at the Penn Stroud, a hotel in Stroudsburg. When his boss at the Penn Stroud said they were not going to have music on Good Friday to commemorate the holiday, Dengler asked Bob if he could play at the Deer Head. Bob agreed, thus beginning a long tradition of live music at the Deer Head.

Bob first hired Dixieland musicians but switched to jazz when it became more popular. Musicians who played with Fred Waring or at one of the Pocono resorts started playing the Deer Head. Many musicians would show up Saturdays at noon just to play for fun before going to their evening gig at Mount Airy Resort or elsewhere. Faye would feed them. As Faye put it, "May of them, good players, would come in and sit in. And they would go to their job at night and then return and sit in. That was how many moved to the area. John was the attraction. They all wanted to play with John."

Faye was referring to John Coates, a piano player and mainstay of the Deer Head music scene for years. John first played the Deer Head as a seventeen-year-old and was soon playing every Friday and Saturday night. Other musicians, many with national and international reputations, were drawn to the Deer Head. Faye mentioned Phil Woods, Urbie Green, Bob Dorough, and Keith Jarett. Fred Waring and his people would come over some nights to perform. According to Faye, "Those were wonderful nights."

Today the Deer Head continues to attract prominent musicians to its stage every weekend. According to its website, "It's the oldest continuously running jazz club in the country."
