

Local History Spot

Leroy (Cappy) Kaiser

In April of this year the Water Gap community gathered at the Dutot Museum to celebrate the 95th birthday of Leroy Kaiser. "Cappy" was born on April 4, 1930, in his parents' home here in Delaware Water Gap. He lived in the borough all his life, except for the few years that his family moved to Route 611 just outside the borough limits. In June, 2022, I sat down with Cappy in his home on Kimberly Drive and talked with him about his life in the village.

Cappy has a lot of fond memories of his childhood. He remembers walking to the Water Gap school from his house on Broad Street. Some days he'd take old milk cans and stomp on them, causing the cans to curl up around his shoes. He'd walk to school with those cans on his feet.

There were a lot of children in Water Gap in those days. Cappy remembers baseball games at various locations in town. He remembers playing basketball in the Castle Inn Music Hall. Sometimes he and a friend would ride their bikes to the railroad station and place pennies on the rails so the trains would flatten them. The kids would skate on Lake Lenape in the winter and fish there in the summer. He remembers seeing big bass in the lake. A man once told him that he'd fish the Delaware and then he'd put the bass he caught in Lake Lenape where they grew to into large fish.

The lake used to be nice and clear. I remember there was a guy, he had a nickname—they called him 'Chops." Newhart. Coming up Shepard Avenue he lived in the first house on the right. That's going back years when the hotels were busy. His job was to keep that lake clean. He used to work for the hotels. He told me one time how he used to drain that lake, clean it, and then fill it back up again. I remember that there used to be wooden boxes and a drain under the road. He would open [a valve] and drain the lake. It never got drained when I was a kid, but it always stayed nice and clear. One of the Hauser brothers [they owned the Mountain House] told me how he used to help drain the lake and keep it clean. The lake was used for ice by the hotels there. Back in those days it got cold enough that they could get blocks of ice out of it.

Cappy dropped out of school in the 9th grade and worked with his father as a plumber. He also worked on the railroad for a while maintaining the tracks. He quit that job because he didn't like driving to Port Morris, NJ, every day. After leaving the railroad he worked as a plumber and at Ronson's for eighteen years. His wife, Joan, was the Post Master in Water Gap.

You don't call them "Post Mistresses." You called them "Post Masters." One time someone made a plaque out of walnut, and across the top in brass letters it had her name on there as Post Mistress.' And someone saw that and said, "Oh, they got that spelled wrong. It's supposed to be Post Master whether they are male or female."

When he married Joan, he lived on 611. Then he bought a house on Broad Street. He lived there for several years and then rented the Methodist church parsonage while his current house was being built. When he built his house (near the top of Kimberly Road) Kimberly Road didn't exist. A builder was constructing some houses on Shepard Avenue just passed the intersection with Cherokee. Cappy borrowed the builder's bulldozer and extended Shepard Avenue to his property. Then he used the builder's dump truck to haul in shale to create the base for the road. That's where the road ended for years until Kimberly Road connected his house with Cherry Valley Road. In short, he graded and laid the foundation for what is today the top of Kimberly Road.

We used to get a lot of snow back then in the winter. Our first Christmas my two daughters (Roxanne and Gwendolyn) were out caroling, and the last place they were going to stop was here. It was a large group. I think we had about fifteen inches of snow. And they all came down here through that snow and stood outside and sang a couple of carols. Then they all came inside. I had the fireplace going and they all stepped inside here and went "Ooo." Everybody got in front of that fireplace. Yeah, the good old days.

People like Cappy are treasure troves of information about what life used to be like here in our village. Cappy remembers when Water Gap had its own bakery (owned by Charlie Rapp) and meat market (George Hauser's). There was a barber across from the Castle Inn who used too much fragrant water on his customers.

Leroy is still going strong at the age of 95. Let's hope he's with us for years to come.
