In terms of Council News, this past spring was productive for your borough council.

We started receiving responses to our borough survey and are processing them. Local History Spot By Marty Wilson

Haitian Reparations

Thanks to the Antoine Dutot School and Museum and local history buffs, especially Luke Broadhead who published *Delaware Water Gap: Its Scenery, Its Legends, and Its Early History* in 1867, we Water Gapians are familiar with the founding history of our village. Its basic outline is that what is now the borough of Delaware Water Gap was founded as Dutotsburg in 1793 by a Frenchman named Antoine Dutot, who had been a plantation owner in the French colony of Saint Dominque in the Caribbean. When a slave insurrection broke out there he fled to Philadelphia and from there up the Delaware River until he settled on the site of his future town. He built some houses, established a Post Office, a saw mill, a toll road, and designated land to be used for a public square. When the railroad came through the town in 1856 (after Dutot's death in 1841) town fathers changed the name of the village to Delaware Water Gap in order to capitalize on the name of the famous nearby geological formation hoping, thereby, to induce city folk to travel to the village and patronize its hotels.

This is an interesting story, but, as does any historical narrative, it raises questions. For example, why did Dutot, born in France, come to Philadelphia and then to this remote area when he fled the island? Why did he not go back to France, or to New York or Boston? Once in Philadelphia, the largest, most dynamic city in the country at the time, why didn't he stay there? That France was experiencing its own revolution then, that Philadelphia merchants had extensive trading relationships with the Caribbean island, and that Yellow Fever broke out in Philadelphia in 1793 offer plausible answers to these questions. But there is no way of knowing for sure because Dutot never tells us. After all, he was the only person who knew the answers.

A more intriguing question is this: how much of the story is true? The problem for historians is that primary evidence, the very essence of history, is lacking when it comes to this story. When primary evidence is lacking, historians do their best to make sense of the evidence that does exist, offering "plausible" explanations like the ones in the previous paragraph. What about Luke Brodhead's 1867 book? Was that a primary source? How about the even earlier account by Maximilian, Prince of Weids, who visited Dutotsburg in 1832, and who, after meeting Dutot wrote in his journal that Dutot "was formerly a wealthy planter in St. Domingo, and possessed 150 slaves"?

While both sources seem to confirm the basic narrative of Dutot's life, the discerning reader will recognize that, in this context, neither source is primary. The ultimate source for both Brodhead and Maximilian was Dutot himself. Chances are that Dutot would not have lied about his background, but "chances" are not good enough for historians. Historians want to see primary sources such as marriage and death records, ship manifests, tax records, letters, and other evidence to confirm their understanding of the past.

Recently, evidence that corroborates the generally-accepted account of Dutot's life has come to light. The evidence involves reparation payments made to former plantation owners by the French government. In 1825, a fleet of French warships entered the harbor of Haiti's capital city and demanded a huge sum be paid to France as compensation for lost property. Failure to pay would mean war between the fledgling country and France. Thus began a century-long pillaging of the Haitian treasury by foreign powers. On November 26, 1832, the Royal Indemnity Commission approved payment to Antoine Dutot the former owner of a coffee plantation in Haiti. Payment was made on January 1, 1833. Interestingly, the Commission was not sure who the last owner of the plantation was as the widow of a previous owner also claimed the payment. To resolve the issue, both the widow and Antoine Dutot were awarded a payment.

Maximilians's 1832 account of Dutot suggests that the former plantation owner had fallen into hard financial times: "... he is reduced to a state of great poverty, and his situation excites the compassion of travellers [sic] who pass that way." Did Dutot ever get his money from the Commission? Did reparations paid to France by Haiti help fund the founding of Dutotsburg? These and other questions await further revelations.
