Stories From the Past

Back in 1991, I sat down with three long-time residents of Delaware Water Gap to ask them what life was like in the borough when they were young. Fortunately for all of us, Rick Chamberlain, who had a video company called "Eleventh Hour Productions," agreed to videotape the session. The oldest of the three, at 82, was Francis R. "Casey" Drake. Fred S. Shoemaker, Sr. was 79, and Robert Kaiser was 72. The interview lasted about an hour. During that time the three men talked about what they experienced growing up in the Gap. They didn't need much prodding, as they seemed to be enjoying themselves talking about their youth. Casey did most of the talking, as he was wont to do. Casey had been born in New York City in 1909, but his parents moved back to the Gap while he was still an infant. I've quoted a few of their words below so that the reader can get a sense of the immediacy of their memories. Casey begins the story when he was still quite young, in the early 19-teens:

Casey Drake (CD): I remember how things were here early in my life.... One of the most important, exciting, things was we had lights all over this busy comer down here at the Castle Inn. And it was so lit up that it seemed like, well, people called it the "Great White Way." People would walk up the streets and sometimes the streets were so crowded you couldn't get through. The light, electricity, was manufactured by Dimmick Drake who had a plant in back of the Castle Inn [the building still stands]. And he produced electricity. The plant produced enough electricity to give light to the Deer Head Inn, which was the Central House then, and Lamb's souvenir store.... And all of the Castle Inn buildings... the Castle Inn Music Hall--it was all lit up. It was beautiful, all this light. I remember [before electricity was produced] we used to have... maybe nothing but a street light, a lamp. Light was produced by kerosene.

CD: When I got a little older [my dad] took me around in his bread wagon. He worked for Rapp's Bakery [located across the street from today's Sycamore] and he drove a team of two horses pulling his bread wagon. It had a big chest of drawers inside where he had all the cookies and donuts and things like that.

Fred Shoemaker (FS): I remember that. They used to come up to the house every day. Howard Drake.

CD: Everybody got their bread that way. That's how I got to know about the hotels because I used to go into the kitchens with him and talk with the chefs. I got to know all of them. And that was so interesting to me because being so small and going out probably for the first time in my young life into this big metropolis with all the lights lit (laughs).

But then later on I think the town got busier as we got into the '20s. And the hotels thrived and were in competition with each other. The hotels had to make some money at the end of the season so they could make improvements to keep up with the next guy.

FS: That's right. That's why the golf links were built. About '21 or '22. [Fred is talking about a nine-hole course that later became the back nine at the country club.]

CD: You mention the golf links. That was built for Brodhead who ran the Kittatinny by C. C. Worthington of Shawnee.

I will share more of their conversation in future columns.
