



Message from Our Mayor

Merry Christmas, Hackensack!

I hope you have been able to stroll First Street and check out the snowflake and banner decorations. This can be a

stressful time of year; please reach out to family, friends, or your local church for help if you find things overwhelming.

Many things are happening in Hackensack. We were awarded 1.4 million dollars from the State of Minnesota for water main extension and looping that should start in 2024. We have applied for a grant of up to 1.5 million dollars for side street and alley improvements to support changes that will occur with the State Highway 371 roadwork in 2025.

We are working towards increased housing in Hackensack. (See rendering below.) Local developers are building a fourplex and working on a larger 30-unit apartment complex. We conducted a Hackensack area housing study that further supported the Cass County housing study. We need more housing to accommodate workers who already work in Hackensack but can't live closer. We also have older local citizens who want to stay in the Hackensack area but need a smaller place.

We want Hackensack to be a fun place to live and visit. We're fundraising for several amenities in Hackensack. One of those projects is a **disc golf course** (9 holes) called Lucette's Links utilizing the existing walking paths at Bonna Paulson Park. It's a rustic course that maintains the natural beauty of the area while introducing people to the sport and the nature housed there.

Another project is the resurfacing and redesign of the tennis courts to house both tennis and more pickleball courts. We're looking for interested partnerships to help make this happen. City funds alone aren't enough to make these projects a reality.

Another project of interest is the ice rink located behind the water tower. You may have heard that we are not going to flood and maintain the ice rink this year. While that is true, what is not true is that we have abandoned the idea of the ice rink. It is simply not safe to maintain this year. We need new lights and the hockey rink needs



new boards. The old Zamboni is no longer operational. This year, we will be plowing an area on Birch Lake for ice skating to occur. We are gathering estimates for the work to be done at the ice rink. We may need financial partners and hands-on community efforts to fix the rink up and get it ready for next year. Please bear with us and offer your assistance as we make this transition.

Hackensack has such great people. A small town like ours can't afford all the amenities that people living in and around Hackensack desire. We appreciate your help. Maybe that comes from local charitable organizations, private donations, and from the hands and feet of our neighbors. We are building Hackensack together. Please help us continue to make Hackensack the place we all want to live, learn, work, and play together.

Hackensack Lending Library Placed on the National Register of Historic Places



On October 26, 2023, Hackensack Lending Library was placed on the National Register of Historic Places. The log cabin was initially identified as the Hackensack Conservation Building when it was constructed in 1936 by the four Holmberg brothers working for WPA (Works **Progress** Administration). The Holmbergs were highly respected log cabin builders and stone masons as evidenced by the floor to ceiling split rock fireplace in the log cabin. Its initial construction was intended to serve the many visitors to the lakes area. Since then, the building has housed two

teachers, a dentist, the local American Red Cross during World War II and, for the last 21 years, a lending library where you don't need a library card to check out a book. Through grants from the Minnesota Historical Society, extensive historical research was conducted. The Cass County Historical Museum and interviews with one of the Holmbergs' daughters provided additional valuable information. The Lending Library is open 6 days a week from 10:00-2:00, June 1 through August 30 and on Saturdays in September. Stop by next summer for a walk through history and find a summer read from the library's extensive collection of books. - Maggie McGill

Resilient Housing Team - After four years of effort our Resilient Housing Game Changer Team has some really good news to report! We have a plan and a direction to construct a 30-unit apartment building here in Hackensack. Many people and organizations have been instrumental in helping to make this happen - to name a few: the Hackensack City Council, Region Five Development Commission, Minnesota Housing Partnership, Cass County Commissioners, Cass County Economic Development Corporation, Cass County HRA, Central MN Housing Partnership, Mann Lake Bee & Ag Supply and the neighboring Township Boards of Birch Lake, Hiram and Woodrow. Little did our Game Changer Team, made up of Larry Refsland, Kris Biessener, Steve Erickson and myself, realize the complexity of this project.


The housing project was in response to the need that was identified as a part of the Community Comprehensive Plan. Community and stakeholder meetings were held over the past year to further discussions. This past June, a market study report was presented by Maxfield Research. The cost was underwritten by Minnesota Housing Partnership and Mann Lake Bee & Ag Supply, with no cost to the City. This report helped determine more specifically the type of housing and the amount of housing demand. Over the past three months, Cass County Commissioners have agreed to set up a revolving loan fund for workforce housing in Cass County. Our community has been the first to apply for that funding and we are hopeful will be the first applicants to receive their loan funds. We are in contact with the State Agency Minnesota Housing and are well positioned for the Small City Workforce Housing Grant expected to be issued in December. We will be keeping people informed as this project continues to move forward.

Great Start Family Child Care - We are delighted to announce the opening of the Hackensack Great Start Family Child Care. Director Ashley Hunter is in the final stages of having her services licensed by Cass County. It is expected that the child care will be open in January. When Ashley receives licensure she will begin to advertise availability. This project began as a Hackensack Game Changers Team and has now advanced to become it's own 501C3. Ashley will operate the Great Start Family Child Care as an independent business. We are very excited to support her as a new important business in our community. The child care will operate under a special "POD" licensure and will be able to have 10-12 children enrolled. Renovation of the lower level of the UCC Church on East Lake Avenue will be the home for the business. Extensive renovation was conducted to accommodate the repurposed area through the gracious support of the Cass County Commissioners. Special thanks to Jeff Peterson our local District Commissioner for his efforts to make this happen. Child care is such a critical need in our community. Thanks go out to all of the people and organizations that have helped to make this happen.

Business & Community

Water Is Life - The big news currently is the Minnesota Center for Environmental Advocacy has helped a coalition of groups successfully petition the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to reprimand state agencies on their failure to protect drinking water in the karst region of Minnesota. The karst region waters are very susceptible to pollution from farm chemicals and there have been huge problems with lack of appropriate regulation. The state's Departments of Agriculture, Health, and Pollution Control Agency were directly called to task by the EPA. This development will have bearing on the same farm chemical problems in the sensitive waters of the Pineland Sands area in our neighborhood west



of Hackensack, as well as the Central Sands area of middle Minnesota. One has to wonder why similar action hasn't happened in the neighboring state of Iowa, which is very heavily affected by farm chemical contamination.

In other action, State of Minnesota v. Enbridge Energy (Case No. 15-CR-22-532) has seen testimony for significant impacts of Line 3 on public waters. Many of the impact reports came after White Earth-sponsored thermal imaging of Line 3 which was done by aerial drone. This imaging showed that previously undisclosed aquifer breaches in 40-50 different sites are creating destabilizing situations for both the pipeline corridor and the surrounding aquifers. Both the karst area and Line 3 histories are examples that ongoing "regulatory capture" (i.e. regulators being influenced by the groups they are supposed to regulate). This conflict of interest must be addressed if public assets such as groundwater, lakes, and streams are to be preserved. - *Mike Tauber*

Essentia Health Hackensack Clinic is right at our fingertips! The clinic is located next to Birchview Gardens Senior Living at 110 3rd St. S. The phone number is 218-675-5044. Essentia Health provides Family Medicine. You can establish care and receive urgent care. Jennifer Dalgarno, PA is the main clinician. The hours are Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday - 8:00-4:30 pm. Jennifer is also able to do Department of Transportation physicals. Immunizations can be administered. If further care or referrals are needed, you can get referrals to the many networks



within Essentia Health, for example, Brainerd, Pine River, Fargo, or Duluth. Orthopedic appointments can be made and set up with the orthopedic specialist who comes twice a month. The clinic is able to do X-rays, and has a lab and pharmacy for filling prescriptions onsite. So when you're seeking a physical or medical care - such as primary care for all ages - or to discuss new or ongoing health concerns, remember Essentia Health is right here in Hackensack able to meet your needs! - *Jeannie Blomme*

Hacksgiving Fundraiser Silent Auction Update - We at Hackensack Lakes Area Community Foundation want to thank everyone who donated to our silent auction. We had over 100 donations which raised over \$7,000 to help make the Hackensack Lakes Area an even better place to call home. We also want to thank everyone who bid online and helped make the auction a success. Since our founding in 2019, we have given out over \$15,000 in Community Impact Grants

to 18 nonprofits that service the 9 townships surrounding Hackensack and Backus. These include Game Changers, Faith in Action, Birch Lake Association, Leech Lake Legacy, Northwoods Arts Council, Lakeside Concert Series, Foothills Christian Academy, WHA School District, SNIP, Spay and Neuter, Paws and Claws, Pine Mountain Senior Center, Hackensack Community Garden, & Neighbor Helping Neighbor cleanup event. During the height of the pandemic, we also had an Emergency Relief Fund that raised over \$12,000 which was directly

distributed to 7 business owners and 6 nonprofits in the community. These donations touched the lives of many during a difficult time. - Susan Kostka, Board Chair

Proceeds are divided between the carvers and the non-profits who put on the event: Hackensack Lions, Hackensack American Legion, the City of Hackensack, and the Hackensack Chamber of Commerce. Other shows throughout the weekend were well attended, and the crowds were entertained.
