What a wonderful summer we have had in Hackensack. So many great events have happened like Spring Bike Fling, Sweetheart Days, Children's Fishing Contests, Flea Markets, Northwoods Arts

Council Art and Book Festival, and of course the Concert Series at the park. The concerts have seen up to 600 people come and listen to local and regional artists by the Birch Lake Beach amongst the setting sun. Upcoming events include Chainsaw Event and Mid-Winter Back to Hack.

There have been so many friends, family, and visitors in town. Compliments regarding the revitalized downtown have been flowing daily. Businesses have seen increased traffic. We welcome the re-opening of Sun and Fun and the recent return and re-opening of Stone Woman Herbals on First Street. We love our streets being full of activity.

The City of Hackensack applied for - and was granted - \$1.4 million dollars for water main infrastructure

improvements. The city plans to connect many of the dead-end lines together. This will improve water flow, allow for greater efficiency when needing to shut down certain sections for maintenance, and generally improve water quality for residents. The important part of this is that this allows Hackensack to do work that we otherwise could not afford. Part of this work should occur in 2024. The rest will happen in 2025.

The Highway 371 road project through town was postponed by the State of Minnesota until the summer of 2025. The reason cited for this was budget allocation, and is outside our control.

As we move towards fall, we look forward to the changing colors of the leaves, new flavors at the brewery, and your continued patronage downtown and in all our businesses. Thank you for being a part of Hackensack and its legacy.



New Ownership for Mark's Market - YES! New ownership but no change to the store name, and all employees will stay on board, said new owners, John and Mary Carrier of Nevis. Who are John and Mary? In sitting down with them, they shared that they both had a background in the printing industry, having served 25 years in the business and raising their two children in Ramsey, MN. Both were looking for career changes and collectively decided to dip their toes in the grocery and food industry. Fast forward to June 2017, when they took ownership of the Northwoods Grocery & Cafe in Nevis, MN. In June 2023, they then took ownership of Mark's Market. When asking John how the sale came about, he said that he had called previous owner Mark Biessener "out of the blue" and simply asked if he had any interest in selling. Biessener had owned the store

for over 35 years. Prior to that, Jerry and Janet Carpenter were owners, under the name of Jerry's Red Owl. Over the years the store has grown from a small-scale convenience store to the 1997 large remodel, expansion, and footprint it has today. Hackensack welcomes John and Mary! Game Changers

Resilient Housing Team - After a great deal of work, the Housing Team is making good progress on the first planned housing project. A housing developer has been identified, that being Central Minnesota Housing Partnership. This developer has a great deal of experience in building and managing housing projects in our region. As a nonprofit their company does not focus on profit, but on delivering quality services at an affordable price. We are fortunate to be working with their organization. Land has been identified for a potential build site, and site control is anticipated within the next 30-60 days. Once the land is secured the financial requirements and a more specific construction plan for the project will be developed. The current plan is to build a 30-35 unit apartment building with garage parking. The site identified will easily be connected to city water and sewer.

Child Care Team - Construction is well underway in renovating the lower level of the UCC Church to become a child care POD. This first year the facility will support up to twelve children. We are in the process of enlisting the services of a provider, If you know of anyone that would like to make application please contact Gary Dietrich 612-801-3345. The hope is that the new business will be able to start operation in the next 30-60 days.



Cycling Without Age:

Wind in Your Hair, A Laugh in the Air

Senior-living and differently-abled residents in Hackensack have access to a wonderful service providing free rides on a "trishaw," a 3-wheeled electric bike with a carriage in front for up to 2 passengers. A trained "pilot" provides a 30 -minute, exhilarating, but work-free, cycling experience to the client on the journey of their choice, while enjoying Hackensack's beautiful scenery.

"Cycling without Aging" originated in Denmark in 2017, and came to Cass County in the summer of 2020, through funding from various Walker organizations. The Hackensack Lions also recently contributed in support of the program. Simon Whitehead, Cass County Community Health Educator, spearheads the program and shares that about 60 rides are given each week to residents in the local area, amounting to approximately 300 kilometers traveled each season.

Because of the program's popularity, Simon's goal is to recruit additional pilots as well as donors to fund routine maintenance and repair of the trishaw and adding another trishaw to the fleet in the future. Free Water Testing Event

Several community groups are collaborating together in a free Water Testing Event in Hackensack! This will be held in a booth at the Chainsaw Event on Saturday, September 23rd, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. This clinic will be a free event staffed by volunteers. It is intended to help people determine if their drinking water is safe and if it is not, what to do next. We all know clean drinking water is vital for folks' health. During this clinic we can test ANY water for **ANYBODY** anonymously or, if desired, we can follow up with those who leave contact info. For the unfortunate souls that find their water is in trouble, we will provide vouchers for further laboratory testing, and will remediation options available. Nitrate and chloride are the two contaminants we normally evaluate water for, as they are the bellwethers for human impacts on drinking water. All that is necessary is to bring a pint jar of water to the clinic. Feel free to round up water from your neighbors and bring in multiple water samples for testing. Results are usually available within minutes using the high quality equipment that the Toxic Taters group has purchased specifically for these events. Please bring your water sample in on that day!

Rendon is an enrolled member of the White Earth Nation, author, playwright, poet, freelance writer and a community arts activist, Rendon supports other native artists / writers / creators to pursue their art, and is a speaker for colleges and community groups on Native issues, leadership, writing. Rendon is the author of the award winning Cash Blackbear crime novel series set in the Red River Valley and nearby reservations. Her latest book, Sinister Graves, was inspired by an isolated Idaho graveyard about 15 years ago. Sinister Graves, Girl Gone Missing, and Murder on the Red River all received prestigious recognition, published by Soho Press. She is working with Out of Hand Theater in Atlanta, Georgia to produce her script Say Their Names about missing and murdered Indian women. Rendon was listed in Oprah's 2020 list of 31 Native American Authors to read, She has received Minnesota's 2020 McKnight Distinguished Artist Award. Pow Wow Summer, a children's non-fiction was published by MN Historical Press, 2017. Stitches of Tradition, a children's picture book, will be published by Heartdrum 2024.
