**From Chief Matt Fennig**

Board members, community leaders, and department staff: We are pleased to present the monthly report for April 2026. During the month, the department responded to a total of 229 incidents. A breakdown of these incidents can be found at the end of this report.

**April Notable Incidents and Activities**

- April 11: LCFR crews responded to a hazardous materials incident at a department store in the City of Delafield.
- April 11: LCFR crews responded to a cardiac arrest in the Town of Delafield.
- April 14: Severe thunderstorms and tornado activity impacted Waukesha County. LCFR responded to multiple storm-related incidents throughout the evening and into the following day. The Village of Chenequa experienced significant damage from straight-line winds.
- April 14: LCFR staff participated in leadership development training facilitated by Partner 2 Learn.
- April 18: LCFR responded to a bicycle accident on the Lake Country Trail near the Nagawaukee Golf Course.
- April 20: LCFR placed a new breathing air compressor into service. The compressor was purchased as part of the department's 2026 Capital Improvement Plan.
- April 23: LCFR units responded to the Palmyra Egg Farm fire as part of a MABAS request, providing an engine company and chief officer to support operations for approximately six hours.
- April 26: LCFR responded to a motor vehicle accident in the City of Delafield involving six patients.

Fire training during the month of April focused on the use of an acquired commercial structure in the City of Delafield. Crews conducted multiple hands-on training evolutions including vertical ventilation, ladder deployment, large-area search and rescue, and hose line advancement. At the property owner's request, the structure was later utilized for a live burn training exercise in early May.

Administratively, LCFR staff and the seven municipal partners finalized work on the amended Intermunicipal Agreement (IMA), culminating in a final leadership meeting in late April. The updated agreement was subsequently approved by all governing bodies in May and formally executed in June. This represented a significant milestone for the organization and reflected the collaborative efforts of all partner communities.

In closing, April was an active month operationally and organizationally, highlighted by severe weather response, regional mutual aid support, ongoing training initiatives, and the successful completion of the amended Intermunicipal Agreement process. LCFR remains committed to providing professional, high-quality emergency services to the communities we serve.

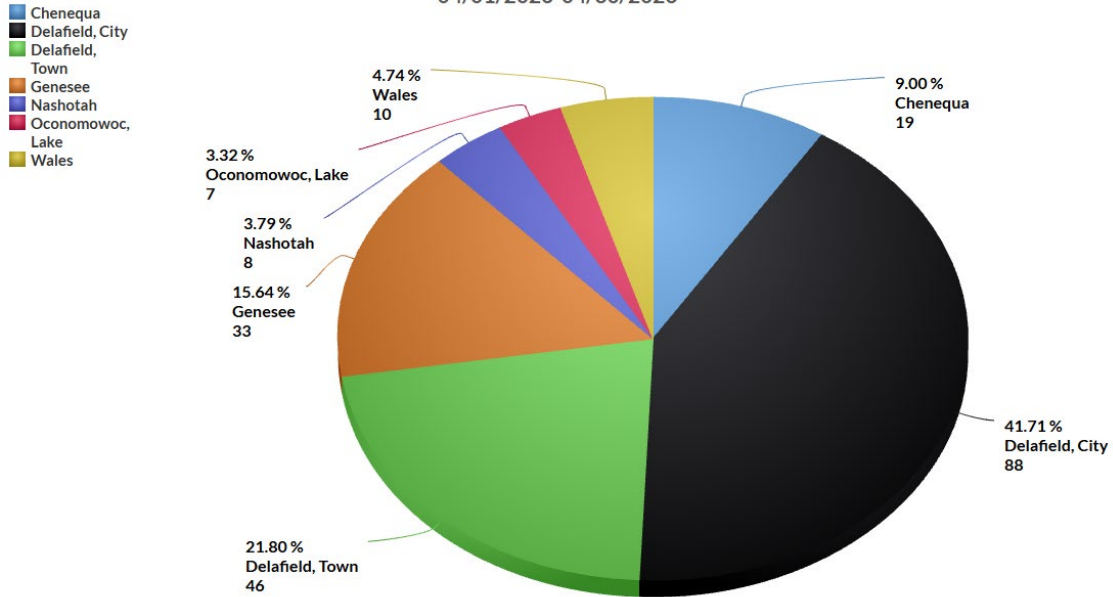

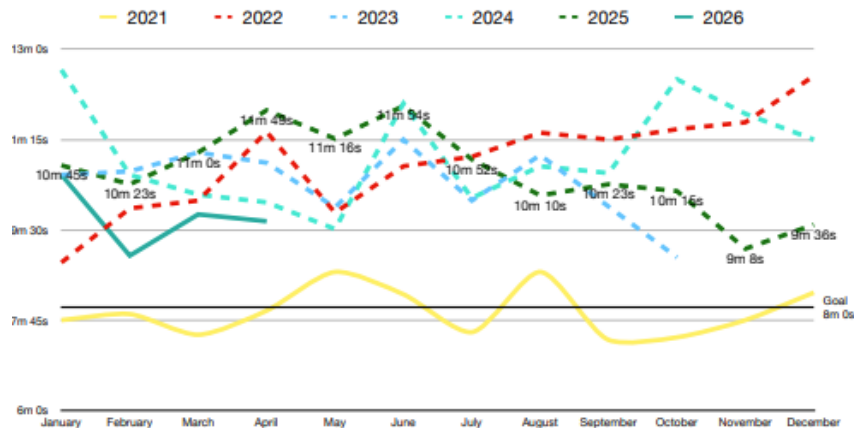

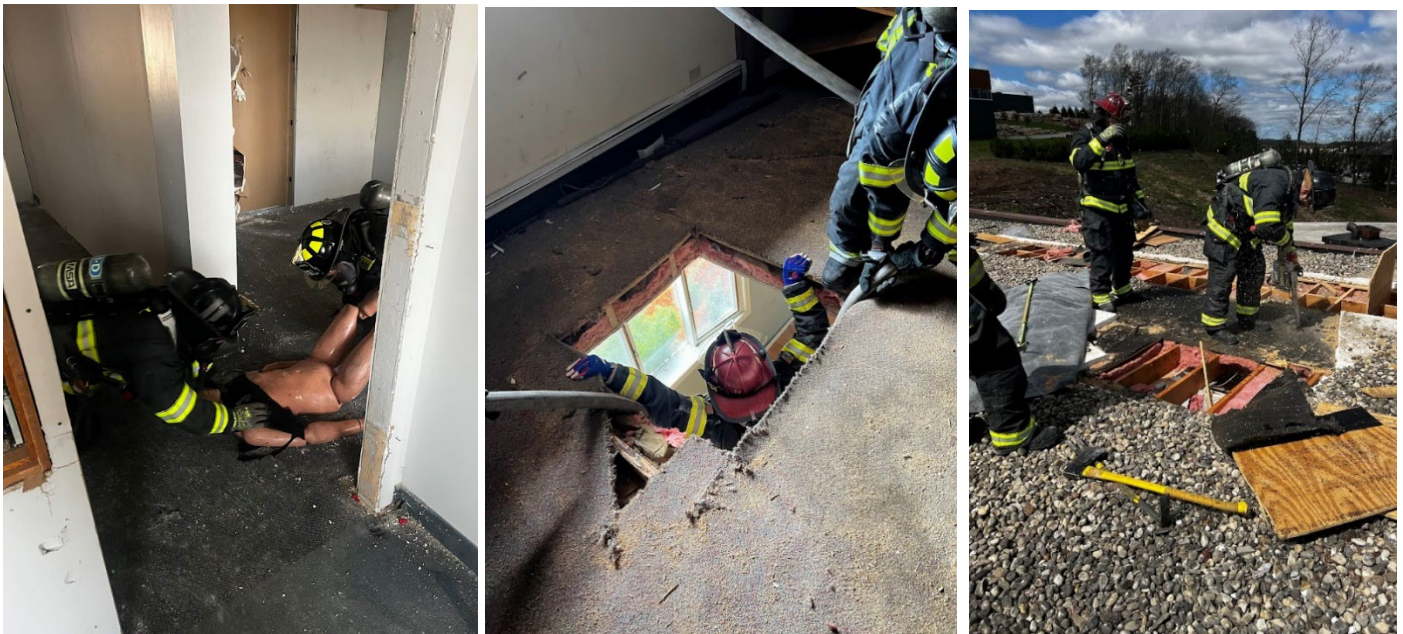
# TRAINING REPORT

Every three years in June, members are required to renew their EMS licenses with the State of Wisconsin. During April, crews trained on topics needed to complete the required refresher hours and category requirements for license renewal. Crews also had the opportunity to sit down with our new Medical Director, Dr. Schultz. This gave licensed providers the opportunity to get to know the physician providing medical direction during critical incidents and emergency calls.

For fire training in April, crews continued utilizing the donated property off Maple Ave in the City of Delafield. The unique layout of the structure allowed crews to take full advantage of realistic training opportunities, including hose deployments, search scenarios, and vertical ventilation operations. Crews also had the opportunity to utilize another donated structure in the City of Delafield to practice RIT (Rapid Intervention Team) drills. These drills were designed to simulate rescuing a downed firefighter from a basement during a MAYDAY situation.

Lake Country Fire Rescue would like to thank the owners of these donated properties for allowing crews to train in real-life environments. These opportunities allow personnel to become proficient in critical skills within realistic building layouts, helping prepare crews to perform at peak efficiency during emergencies.

# INTERN REPORT

LCFR currently has 6 Interns that are working shifts at the Intern 2 Level: Anton Temple, Jackson Pouchert, Tyler Gress, Max Stephens, Ricardo Jaramillo Plata, and Ridley Newman. In addition, Mathieu Pelchat is an Intern 1 that is assigned to Green shift during the daytime hours. All interns are currently enrolled, or will soon be enrolled in the Fire Protection Technician program through WCTC. Interns Plata and Pouchert are also currently enrolled in Paramedic class while the others will be attending in the future.

Intern Pouchert is our first intern to attend the brand-new hybrid paramedic program through WCTC. This program includes one day/week of lecture followed by skill check-offs and labs to occur while on shift. While this process is new, the rationale is that the critical skills and knowledge needed for a paramedic can be taught by a consistent mentor who is able to watch the student progress through the class and focus on the individual needs of the student to facilitate success.

We are very happy to congratulate Anton Temple and Tyler Gress as they have both received full-time job offers with LCFR as Firefighter/EMT/Inspectors. Congratulations to these individuals on their accomplishments and to a long career with LCFR!

We anticipate adding two new Intern 2's that will be attending the June fire and EMS academy to keep the current roster of 7 interns. LCFR will also be advertising for a joint hiring process with Western Lakes Fire Department with the goal of hiring 2 additional interns to reach our maximum roster of 9 interns.
