From Chief Matt Fennig

We are pleased to present the monthly report for May and June 2026. Lake Country Fire & Rescue responded to a total of **229 incidents** in May and **234 incidents** in June across our seven partner communities. The month of June was exceptionally busy for LCFR personnel. In addition to managing our normal emergency call volume, crews responded to several high-acuity dive rescue incidents throughout southeastern Wisconsin while continuing to meet the daily demands of fire suppression, emergency medical services, inspections, public education, and training.

Throughout these months, personnel also completed commercial fire inspections, participated in an intensive week-long rope rescue training program, and attended a state Driver/Operator-Aerial certification course. These efforts ensure LCFR personnel remain prepared for the increasingly complex incidents we encounter across our service area.

Notable Incidents and Activities

- **May 7:** LCFR units responded to Naga-Waukee Golf Course for a cardiac arrest while simultaneously being dispatched to a semi-tractor trailer fire on Interstate 94. Upon arrival, the semi was found fully involved. Crews quickly extinguished the fire; however, the interstate remained closed for several hours while cleanup and investigation operations were completed.
- **May 9:** LCFR personnel conducted a live fire training exercise at an acquired commercial occupancy in the City of Delafield. The training provided valuable hands-on experience in commercial fire attack, ventilation, search operations, and incident command.
- **May 14:** LCFR assisted Western Lakes Fire District with a structure fire, providing mutual aid resources and personnel in support of regional operations.
- **May 17:** LCFR managed four simultaneous emergency incidents across the district. Due to the volume of calls, one incident was handled by neighboring mutual aid agencies, demonstrating the importance of regional partnerships and automatic aid agreements.
- **May 20:** LCFR responded to the City of Milwaukee to assist the Milwaukee Fire Department at a four-alarm commercial fire, providing personnel and apparatus as part of the MABAS mutual aid system.
- **May 24:** LCFR units responded to a motor vehicle collision with injuries in the Town of Genesee.
- **May 25:** Station 37 crews responded on mutual aid to a structure fire in the Town of Ottawa.
- **May 26:** LCFR units responded to the Town of Delafield for a bicyclist experiencing a significant medical emergency, providing advanced life support care and transport.
- **May 29:** LCFR crews responded to a serious motor vehicle collision in the City of Delafield involving a vehicle that had struck a tree and caught fire. Four patients were transported to a regional trauma center for treatment.
- **June 2:** The LCFR Dive Team responded to Jefferson County to provide mutual aid assistance during a dive rescue operation.

Notable Incidents and Activities (cont.)

- **June 3:** Representatives from all seven LCFR partner communities formally signed the Third Amendment to the Intergovernmental Agreement. This milestone officially codified the department's long-term staffing plan, funding formula revisions, and governance updates, ensuring a sustainable path forward for Lake Country Fire and Rescue.
- **June 5:** The LCFR Dive Team deployed to the City of Watertown to assist with another regional dive rescue response.
- **June 12:** LCFR units responded to the Village of Wales for a significant residential natural gas leak. Crews secured the area, coordinated with utility representatives, and ensured the incident was safely mitigated.
- **June 13:** The LCFR Dive Team responded to a drowning incident on Nagawicka Lake. Working alongside regional public safety partners, divers located and recovered the victim approximately two hours after the initial 9-1-1 call.
- **Week of June 14:** LCFR personnel completed an intensive week-long Rope Rescue Technician training program focused on high- and low-angle rescue operations, including incidents involving steep embankments, confined spaces, and below-grade rescues. Concurrently, several members attended a week-long Driver/Operator-Aerial course. Upon successful completion, participants earned State of Wisconsin Driver/Operator-Aerial certification, expanding the department's operational capabilities.
- **June 15:** LCFR crews responded to Lapham Peak State Park for a traumatic injury on the trail system. Due to the remote location and difficult terrain, additional personnel and specialized rescue equipment were required to safely remove the patient from the park.
- **June 19:** The LCFR Dive Team responded to Okauchee Lake to assist with another regional dive rescue incident.
- **June 20:** LCFR units responded to a vehicle fire at a gas station in the City of Delafield. Due to the fire's proximity to the structure, nearby fuel dispensing equipment, and the potential for fire extension, additional resources were requested to ensure the incident was safely contained and brought under control.
- **June 22:** LCFR crews responded to a vehicle-versus-pedestrian crash on Highway 18, providing emergency medical care and coordinating scene operations with law enforcement.
- **June 28:** Off-duty LCFR personnel proudly represented the department by participating in the Hartland Hometown Celebration Parade, engaging with residents and supporting one of our area's longstanding community traditions.

Administrative Update

May marked a historic milestone for Lake Country Fire & Rescue as the governing bodies of all seven partner communities formally approved the amended Intermunicipal Agreement (IMA). The amendment modernizes the framework that guides the organization by:

- Formally adopting the long-term staffing plan, providing for the addition of three full-time firefighter/paramedics annually through 2029.

- Updating the funding formula to better reflect current service demands and community growth.
- Modernizing the Fire Board voting structure to improve governance and decision-making.
- Refining administrative and operational provisions to align with industry best practices and position the organization for continued success.

The unanimous support demonstrated by the seven municipal partners reflects a shared commitment to regional collaboration and the continued delivery of high-quality fire and EMS services. This achievement was the result of years of cooperation and thoughtful discussion among elected officials, administrators, Fire Board members, and department staff.

Closing

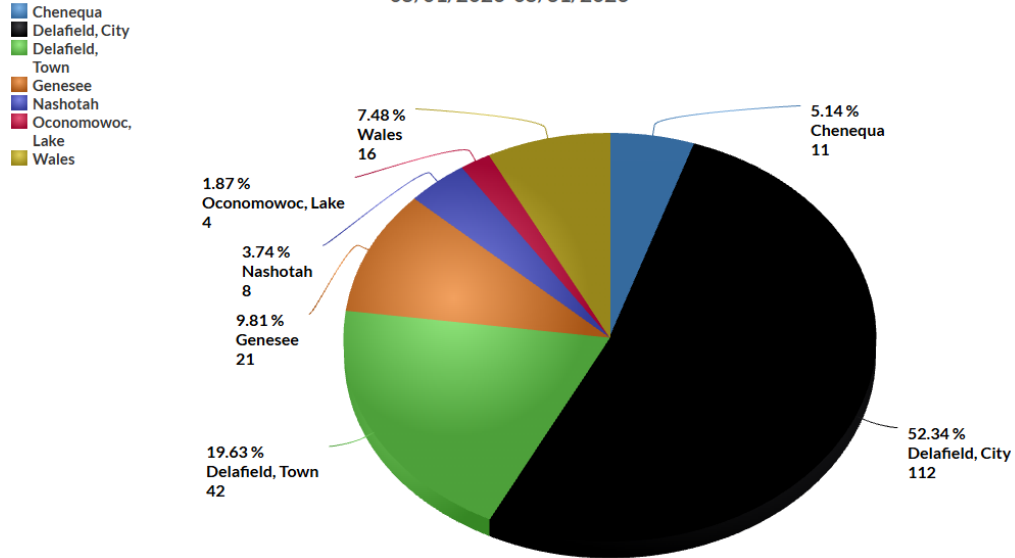

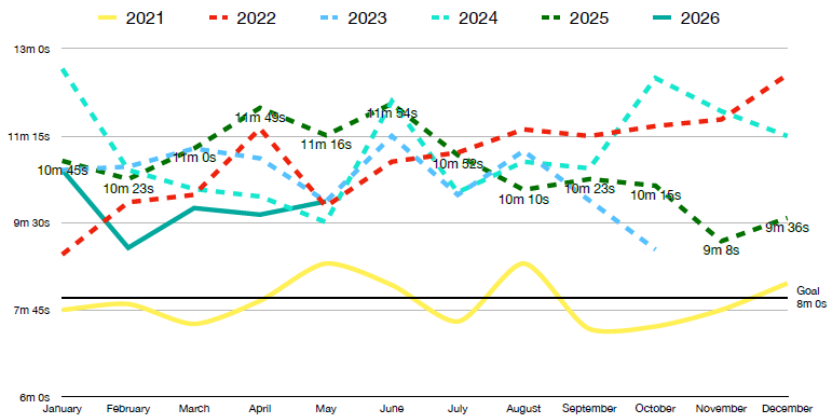

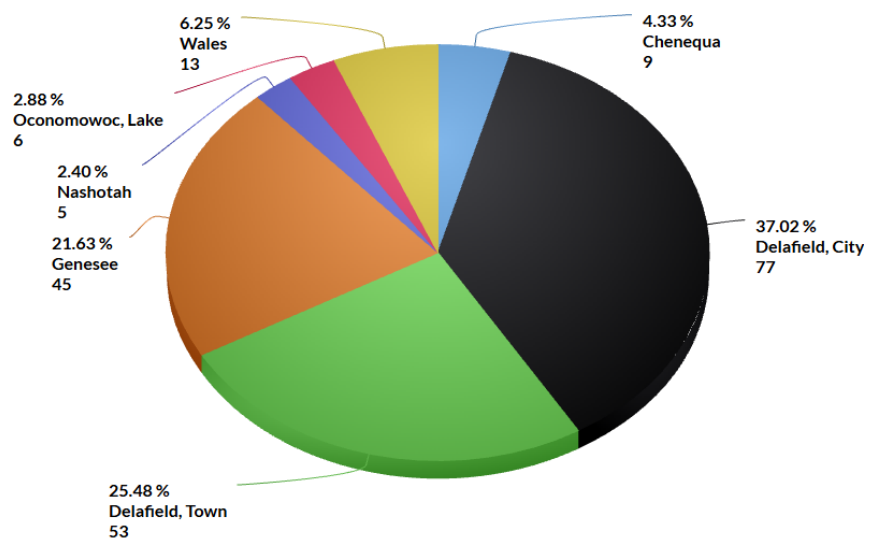

TRAINING REPORT

May and June were busy and productive months for training at Lake Country Fire Rescue. At the beginning of May, we concluded training at the donated structure, where our members, along with personnel from our mutual aid departments, successfully completed 12 interior live fire evolutions. These live fire training opportunities are invaluable, allowing us to meet our annual live fire training requirements while providing firefighters with realistic, hands-on experience that prepares them for emergency incidents.

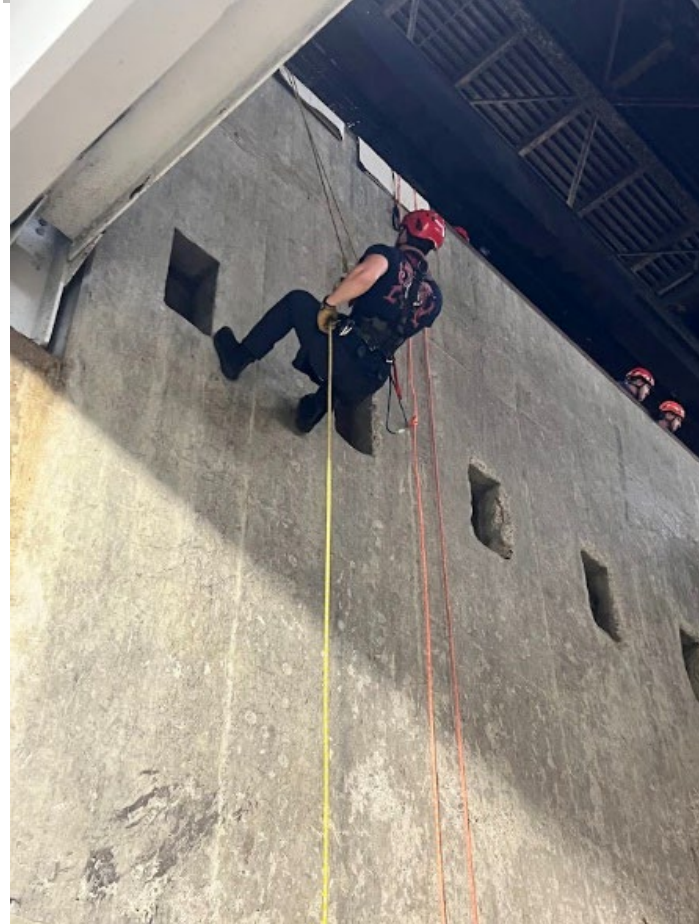
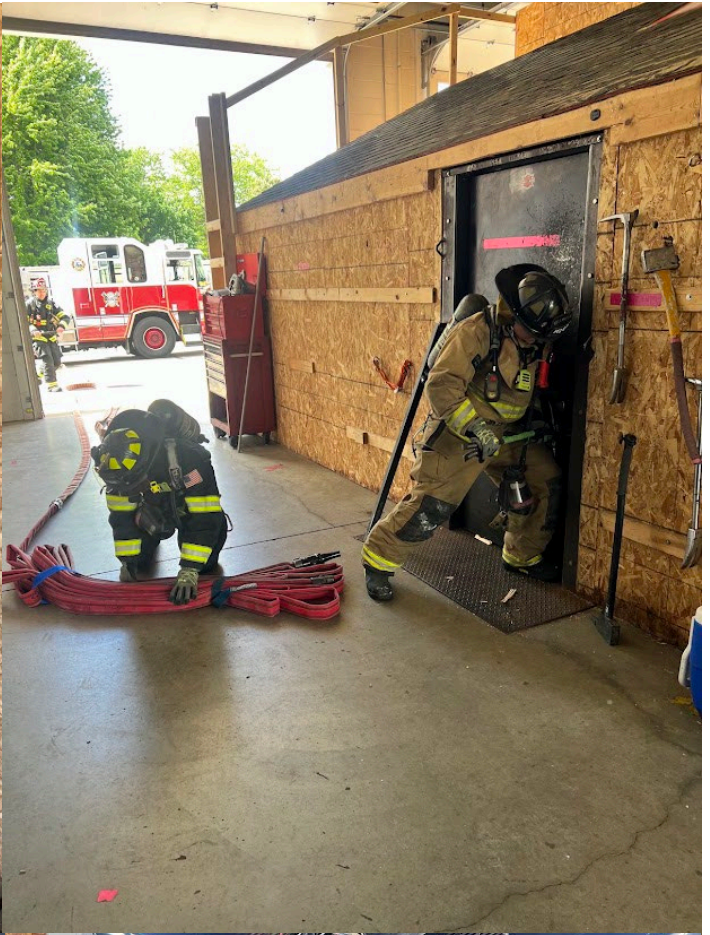
Throughout May and June, crews continued their regularly scheduled company training, covering topics such as SCBA bottle breath-down drills, multi-company fireground scenarios, confidence course evolutions, forcible entry, and vehicle extrication. Crews also began utilizing new computer-based simulation software that allows instructors to create realistic emergency scenarios specific to our response area. This technology enables members to train while remaining in service at their stations, providing valuable decision-making practice without impacting emergency response capabilities.

Members also maintained proficiency in their EMS skills. During this period, personnel completed the continuing education requirements necessary to renew their Wisconsin EMS licenses, which must be renewed every three years. Training sessions were designed to ensure members met all required hours and topic requirements for licensure renewal. LCFR also welcomed our Medical Director, Dr. Schultz, who conducted interactive question-and-answer sessions reviewing recent calls, discussing patient care, and answering questions from our providers. These sessions were recorded and assigned to all crews to ensure every member had the opportunity to benefit from the discussions.

Special Teams training was another major focus over the past two months. LCFR sent eight members to Rope Rescue Technician I/II training, a 40-hour course hosted by CMC at the City of Waukesha Fire Department Training Grounds. The course provided members with the foundational skills necessary to perform technical rope rescue operations. These members are now bringing that knowledge back to the department, helping expand LCFR's technical rescue capabilities through future department training.

Crews also completed boat operations training in preparation for the busy summer boating season on our surrounding lakes, along with dive rescue training to maintain proficiency in water rescue operations. These specialized training opportunities ensure our members remain prepared to safely and effectively respond to the wide variety of emergencies encountered throughout our communities.

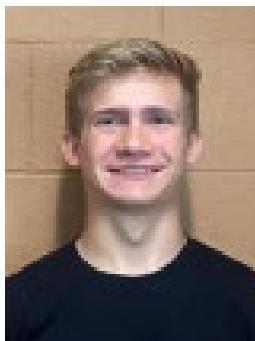
