May 9, 2019

The monthly meeting of the Reedsville Village Board was called to order on May 9, 2019, at 6:30 PM by Village President Jesse Walt. A motion was made by Schreiber and seconded by Siebert to approve the agenda as presented. Motion carried 6-0.

At 6:37 pm a motion was made by Siebert and seconded by Be Busse to convene into closed session pursuant to Section 19:85(1) (g) to confer with legal counsel on the proposal from AT&T. Motion carried 6-0. At 7:23 pm a motion was made by Siebert and seconded by Be Busse to reconvene into open session. Motion carried 6-0.

Wenzel spoke on the need to have the Village employees cut the lawn at the Softball Field.

A motion was made by Siebert and seconded by Schreiber to approve the minutes of the April 11, 2019 meeting as presented. Motion carried 6-0

A motion was made by Siebert and seconded by Rataichek to pay the accounts payable in the amount of \$218,625.9. Motion carried 5-0.

Correspondence was presented by Valdels Ambulance. Schreiber gave an update on the previous meeting with the Ambulance consortium. A motion was made by Be Busse and seconded by Siebert to approve the Street Closure Application from Mud Creek Tap. Motion carried 5-0 (Schreiber abstained). A motion was made by Rataichek and seconded by Siebert to approve the Operator License Applications from Laura Busse and Jennifer Posvic. Motion carried 5-0 (Schreiber abstained). A motion was made by Siebert and seconded by Schreiber to approve the Holding Tank Waste Discharge Application from Christianson Liquid Waste LLC. Motion carried 6-0. A motion was made by Schreiber and seconded by Rataichek to approve the Temporary Class B License Application from the Reedsville Flames Football. Motion carried 6-0. A motion was made by Siebert and seconded by Schreiber to approve the Soda Licnese Application from the Reedsville Flames Football. Motion carried 6-0. A motion was made by Siebert and seconded by Schreiber to approve the Fire Protection Agreement with the Town of Rockland. Motion carried 6-0. Correspondence was presented from the Manitowoc County Highway Commissioner regarding future work plans.

The Police Dept. monthly written report was presented by Tisler. The Department was awarded a \$4,000 Law Enforcement Grant. A motion was made by Rataichek and seconded by Schreiber to purchase flashing signs for the streets around the schools. Motion carried 6-0.

The Fire Dept. monthly written report was presented by Br Busse. The Utility Departments monthly written report was presented by Meyer. A motion was made by Siebert and seconded by Maertz to purchase a M2 Pump from Hawkins Chemicals Inc. in the amount of \$2,450.00. Motion carried 6-0. Meyer gave an update on the 2018 DNR Sanitary Survey. The discussions on the Well #5 pump repair, 2018 CCR and 2018 CMAR were postponed until the next regular scheduled Village Board meeting.

The Public Works Dept monthly written report was presented by J Schuh. Following a discussion a motion was made by Be Busse and seconded by Siebert to have the Village post an ad for summer help to assist with the lawn cutting. The individual must be 18 years old and willing to work flexible hours during the day

time. Would be for 10-20 hours a week. Motion carried 6-0. It is understood that the RAA would make their mower available for that individual to use. The need will be reviewed again in 10 months and a lease will be developed to address any future needs/concerns at that time. The televising has been completed on the Mill Street project. J Schuh will use silicone caulk at Bubolz Memorial Park Concession Stand and the crack situation will be reevaluated next year. Walt will contact businesses to see if they would be willing to donate to the Score Board at Bubolz Memorial Park. A motion was made by Be Busse and seconded by Schreiber to approve the proposal from Bill Lorrigan Construction to replace a door at the Reedsville Municipal Building in the amount of \$2,900.00. Motion carried 6-0. The proposal for the concrete repairs was postponed until the next regular scheduled Village Board meeting.

The First Responders monthly written report was presented by Foytik.

A motion was made by Busse and seconded by Siebert to table updating of the Clerk-Treasurer office until budget time. Motion carried 6-0. Prices for the mechanical keyless combination was postponed until the number needed was decided. New proposals will be obtained for 4 security cameras, panic buttons and an entry door button. Resolution 2019-3 supporting the closing of the Dark Store & Walgreen Property Loopholes was introduced by Siebert. A motion was made by Schreiber and seconded by Be Busse to approve the Resolution as presented. Motion carried 6-0. Resolution 2019-4 supporting the increase to levy limit flexibility was introduced by Siebert. A motion was made by Schreiber and seconded by Rataichek to approve the Resolution as presented. Motion carried 6-0. Resolution 2019-5 supporting the increase to shared revenue funding was introduced by Siebert. A motion was made by Schreiber and seconded by Be Busse to approve the Resolution as presented. Motion carried 6-0. Resolution 2019-6 to fix the State's transportation funding shortfall and to increase local transportation aids was presented by Siebert. A motion was made by Schreiber and seconded by Maertz to approve the Resolution as presented. Motion carried 6-0. Schreiber will be the additional signer on bank drafts. The Resolution will be drafted for the next regular scheduled Village Board meeting.

The discussion on the Purchase Policy was postponed until the next regular scheduled Village Board meeting. The discussion on the DPW pick-up was tabled until budget time.

At 9:37 pm a motion was made by Siebert and seconded by Schreiber to convene into closed session pursuant to section 19.85 (1) (c) to consider employment and compensation of a public employee over which the governmental body has jurisdiction. Motion carried 4-0. At 9:45 pm a motion was made by Schreiber and seconded by Siebert to reconvene into open session. Motion carried 6-0.

At 9:45 pm a motion was made by Schreiber and seconded by Be Busse to convene in closed session pursuant to session 19.85 (1)(i) to discuss matters related to acts by businesses which if discussed in public, could adversely affect the business and their employees.

At 8:47 pm a motion was made by Schreiber and seconded by Siebert to reconvene into open session. Motion carried 6-0. The next regular monthly meeting will be held on Thursday, June 13, 2019 at 6:30 PM. A motion was made by Siebert and seconded by Schreiber to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried 6-0. Meeting adjourned at 9:49 PM.
