New Face in Clerk-Treasurer Office: On Feb 28, 2019 Bobbi Jo Day started as an Assistant Clerk in the Clerk-Treasurer Office. She is working on a part-time basis.

Building Identification Number: The owner of every principal structure on each lot in the village shall have displayed on the side of the structure facing the adjoining public right of way numbers not less than four inches (4") in height showing the street number assigned to that property by the village. Numbers in script shall not meet the requirements of this section. The owner of such structure shall keep the numbers clear and unobstructed so that they can be readily seen by a person of ordinary eyesight from the adjoining public right of way.

Cat & Dog Licenses: The late fee of \$20.00 will be assessed per dog or cat for failure to obtain a license by April 1st. Unspayed females and unneutered males are \$30.00 each. Spayed females and neutered males are \$25.00 each. You must show proof of a valid rabies shot.

Bicycle Registration: All bicycles must be registered. To obtain the license, flag down a Village Police Officer. A \$2.00 fee covers a one-time registration.

Open Book: The Village of Reedsville Assessment Roll will be available for examination on May 6, 2019 3:30 pm to 5:30 pm in the hall of the Reedsville Municipal Building, located at 217 Menasha Street. To schedule a time to discuss an assessment with the Village Assessor, please contact the Village Clerk-Treasurer at 920-754-4371 during normal business hours.

Board of Review: The Village of Reedsville will hold its Board of Review on May 22, 2019 from 3:30 pm to 5:30 pm in the hall at the Reedsville Municipal Building located at 217 Menasha Street. Please contact the Clerk-Treasurer at 754-4371 for the procedural requirements if you would like to appear before the Board.

Curfew: Any person under the age of 18 unaccompanied by a parent or legal guardian may not be out and about between 11:00 PM - 6:00 AM Sunday through Thursday and 12:00 PM - 6:00 AM Friday and Saturday.

Vehicle Nuisance: It is illegal for any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, unregistered or discarded vehicles to be placed or stored on any public or private property within the Village limits for a period of longer than five (5) days, unless said vehicles are stored within an enclosed building. This ordinance does not apply to property zoned for the sale or repair of vehicles. Having a vehicle behind your garage or under a tarp does not meet the requirement of an enclosed building.

Open Burning/Fire Pits: Controlled burning must be located off the public street pavement or street gutter, must be at least fifteen (15') from any lot line and may not be less than fifteen feet (15') from any building. Only clean wood may be used in fire pits and flames cannot extend more than two feet (2') above the pit. All fires must be monitored by a responsible person until the fire has extinguished itself completely. Persons utilizing and maintaining outdoor fires shall be responsible for any liability resulting from any damage caused by their fire.

Pool Owners: You must fill out the **Swimming Pool Discount Application** to qualify for the swimming pool discount. No other form of submittal will be accepted. This form can be found on the Reedsville website www.reedsville.org or picked up at the Reedsville Municipal Building Lobby.

Dogs or Cats: It shall be unlawful to own, harbor, shelter, or keep any dog or cat which runs at large within the limits of the Village. A dog or cat shall be deemed to be running at large when it is on any public street, alley, parks, or other grounds of the Village or any other premises in the Village other than the premises of its owner, his servant, agent or a member of his family of suitable age and discretion unless it is on a durable leash no longer than eight feet (8') or the dog or cat must be under control and within eight feet (8') of its owner, his servant, agent or a member of his family of suitable age and discretion at all times when off the premises of its owner.

It shall be unlawful for any person owning or in control of a dog or cat to allow or permit such animal to defecate on any private or public property owned by another unless such person shall remove all feces so deposited by such animal. Violation shall be punishable by a forfeiture of not less than twenty dollars (\$20.00) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00).

Littering Streets Prohibited: No person shall place, throw, deposit, dump, scatter, leave or permit to remain any rubbish, paper, stone, wire, manure, snow, ice, dirt, grass, leaves, construction or yard waste, dirt or filthy substance upon the street, gutter, sidewalk, alley or public ground in the village. Each owner or occupant of any building, dwelling house, store, shop, tenement or structure of any kind and description fronting or abutting on any street, sidewalk, gutter, alley or public ground shall clean the same by sweeping, scraping or shoveling such rubbish, dirt or filth from the sidewalk by or before twelve o'clock (12:00) noon of each day, and shall cooperate with the street commissioner in keeping the streets, alleys, gutters and public grounds in a clean, tidy and orderly manner.

Signs and Awnings: No signs, posters or other advertising material shall be placed in or on any village owned property without permission from the Village Clerk-Treasurer or Department of Public Works Director.

LEGION NEWS—American Legion Auxiliary members of the Gosz/ Novak Unit 199 of Reedsville understand the sacrifice our Armed Forces have made to preserve freedom and to honor past and current service members. Members of the Gosz/Novak Unit # 199 auxiliary will be wearing a red Memorial Poppy, as a symbol of the price of war and the sacrifice of millions, as a sign of their appreciation this month of May and the Memorial Day weekend. This year, Friday, May 24th has been designated as POPPY DAY by the National American Legion Auxiliary organization. The 600,000 members of the American Legion Auxiliary, the world's largest women's patriotic service organization, are asking everyone to wear a Poppy on Memorial Day weekend. "Wear it in honor of the millions of Americans who have willingly served our nation, all too many of whom made the ultimate sacrifice", said Jane Kalies, Auxiliary President, of the Gosz/Novak Unit #199 Reedsville.

The Poppy also honors Wisconsin's disabled veterans at the Zablocki VA Medical Center in Milwaukee who make the red crepe paper Poppy. Wisconsin's Red Poppies provide financial and therapeutic benefits to these veterans, as well as the thousands of veterans and their families who benefit from the donations collected from the distribution of the Auxiliary Poppy.

In the battlefields of Belgium during World War I, poppies grew wild amid the ravages of war. The overturned soils of battle enabled the poppy seeds to be covered, allowing them to grow and forever serve as a reminder of the bloodshed of war.

This is the 100th Anniversary of the National American Legion Organization, which was chartered by congress directly after the ending of World War 1. The Reedsville Post of the Gosz American Legion had it's beginning in 1921 and the Reedsville Auxiliary was formed shortly after. In 1946, after the death of Charles Novak of Reedsville, who was serving his country, and was killed in an airplane crash in Texas, the name of the Post was changed to Gosz/Novak American Legion Post #199.

Each year the Gosz/Novak Auxiliary Unit chooses a Poppy Princess from their Junior Members.

This year the Poppy Princess is, Noel Rataichek, daughter of Cheryl Rataichek of Milwaukee.

She is the granddaughter of Cletus & Emily Rataichek of Brillion. Noel is in the 4th grade at a Milwaukee Public Elementary School. Please join Reedsville's American Legion Auxiliary on Saturday, May 4th, and Friday & Saturday, May 10th and 11th, as members distribute Poppies at the Town Mart in Reedsville, and various other businesses in the community throughout the month of May. They will also be a distribution of poppies at Holy Family Church in Brillion on May 4th and May 5th following the Masses.
