# Rededication Scheduled for Cheshire's Leland Park & the Cheese Press Monument

The cheese press monument was originally dedicated as described in this 1940 Eagle article. It was restored in 1975 and then again just recently. This time the entire park has now been up-graded with landscaping, plantings, new stone work, a walkway, a bench, and several trees were removed whose roots and dead branches were threatening the mon-

Made Famous Cheshire Cheese to be Unveiled at Ceremony.

At exercises which will start tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock, the new Elder John Leiand memorial monument erected by the Berkshire county chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, will be dedicated in Cheshire at the corner of Church and School streets. The monument is a stone replica of the large cider press which was used by the residents of Cheshire to make the 1235-pound cheese presented to President Thomas Jefferson in 1802. Up until this time, only a small obscure stone marker with a brief inscription had marked the spot where the early residents of Cheshire manufactured the huge, cheese which was sent by ox-cart to Hudson, N. Y. where it was placed on a boat, eventually to reach the White House.

The project was partially financed by two very generous gifts, one from Ray Perault before he passed away, and another from the Lion's Club. A rededication ceremony is scheduled for 3pm on July 12.

It was on a Monday July 20, 1801 when dairy farmers in town brought their cows' curds to be molded into what became known as the Mammoth Cheese weighing 1235 pounds. The event was proposed by

Cheshire's then Baptist minister, Rev John Leland, as a way to celebrate the election of President Jefferson. After four months of curing, the mammoth cheese was transported to Washington, DC by Leland and Darius Brown and presented to the president at the White House on January 1, 1802. The entire process enthralled the nation and was covered by newspapers throughout the country.

# Octopus Garden Come Together For A Concert At The COA

Octopus Garden plays an outdoor concert at the Cheshire Senior Center/COA located at 119 School St. The concert is sponsored by the Friends of the Cheshire COA and will be free of charge.

Octopus Garden is a group of six musicians who formed in December 2024 to perform locally and pay homage to the music of the Fab Four. These tunes will be familiar to most of us, young or old.

Octopus Garden, is named for a Beatles hit found on the Abbey Road album from 1969. It is one of two songs written by drummer Ringo Starr.

The members of Octopus Garden are all well known Berkshire residents and longtime musicians. They have played in various bands together or separately over the years.

Three of the members had done Beatles music in a band called Berkshire Beatlesque. That group disbanded for a while, ultimately transforming themselves into the current version with three additional members signing on.

Bob Balawender, a lifelong Cheshire native and a board member of the Cheshire COA is the group spokesman.

Bob plays the drums. His love for percussion began nearly 60 years ago as a young teen when he started playing on a borrowed set of drums and he has never lost the beat. He has performed with several groups in the years since. You may remember Bob in a popular band called Paraffin, touring the local scene, and playing in a number of other groups in the intervening years.

In addition, there is Jay Fruet of Pittsfield, lead guitar, Wayne Tremblay of North Adams playing bass, Jim Stankiewicz of Dalton on keyboard, Dan Hamilton of Dalton on guitar, and Mark Parsons of Cheshire also on guitar. All the band members sing lead harmony and backing vocals.

Octopus Garden will appear at the Bounty Fare Restaurant in Adams on August 2 for a benefit fundraiser in support of the charity group AYJ Fund of North Adams.

**Sky Full of Dippers** will also open the event for them that night.

AYJ raises funds to benefit childhood sufferers of cancer and supports childhood cancer research.

Dan Hamilton performs as a solo artist outside the Octopus Garden, and Mark Parsons, with his wife Bonnie, form a duo, called Sky Full of



# Dean Street; Down History Lane

"Dean Street in Cheshire MA is likely named after Zebedee Dean, a blacksmith and farmer who came to the town in 1798. While not explicitly stated in the provided information, it's a strong possibility that a street would be named after a prominent early resident like Zebedee Dean." This quote was found on Roots Web when I went on to Google and typed in my request to learn more about the street where I reside presently. As much as I love learning and thinking about the history of Dean Street, I also have such an appreciation for these past 19 years.

From day one I have been so happy to call Dean Street our home. As we were bringing our belongings and furniture into the house two neighbors, husband and wife knocked on our door, introduced themselves and asked if they could be of help. And help they did. Part of our conversation led to their perspective of the transformation the house had undertaken recently. We knew we had discovered just the right dwelling from the first time we saw it. From the inside out a great renovation had happened with new roofing, siding, landscaping, interior design with new flooring and fresh paint in every room. They called it a "miracle house". I was pleased to hear the description and even happier to feel that we were the ones moving in.

The next neighbors we met were just as pleasant but admitted their disappointment to learn how quickly the house sold because they were considering the thoughts of one of their grown children and family moving in. I guess it wasn't meant to be because eventually they moved to where their children and grandkids were instead. Living there now is someone else. Seemingly just as content as we to be on Dean Street. Last summer they called us out to join others looking up into our huge tree to witness the rare occasion of several cubs climbing around up in "Ms. Maple". Very aware momma bear was likely close, we all got our pictures and went back inside for safety.

I've heard some town people say Dean Street Extension when speaking of our address. My tax bill only says Dean Street. When I hear it, I remind myself they must have been here longer than me. We do have a sign on the intersection of Dean and Richmond Street that says "Dead End". Actually it was one of the things that appealed to us when we were house hunting. We are the last house at the end of the street. We have less traffic and more privacy. A few tidbits I've learned just by chatting with neighbors is that many of the houses were built in the 1800's and a trolley likely traveled down Dean Street back in the day. I will continue my education in our Cheshire Ladies Reading Club as we often read from Barry Emery's books of town history.

This past winter on a cold windy day someone knocked on the door. By the time we checked to see who it might be there was no one outside. But looking down we saw a post card sized painting was left for us. The artwork was a winterberry tree with a few hearty birds and their nest held by the arms of the tree and also a bunny hiding in the grass beneath. It was more than the beautiful artwork of the design. It was more than the messages written on the front and the back that said, "In the bleak midwinter a bit of winterberry to cheer you in 2025. Our best wishes for a happy and healthy year." It was the realization that we lived on Dean Street and one of our neighbors cared enough to hand create this message of cheer and take the time to tell us in a very special way.

Since moving here the people have changed in several of the houses. We love that we can see and hear little ones playing outside in the snow now, shuffling autumn leaves, and swimming in their backyard pools. Even with their busy schedules one of those moms found the time for many years now to make the most delicious cinnamon buns and

and bring them warm from the oven to us on a Christmas morning. Does she really even know how they warm our hearts as well?

We might not speak with each other every day but we have taken care of each others pets, watched over grandma who was turning 100 years old while some went on vacation, offered meals when sick, laughed a bit when we saw a dad wheeling his grill in a wheel barrow down the street to share a meal with his son. There has been meals given when sickness hits, flowers given when loved ones died, snow blowing driveways early on Berkshire County frosty days, shared garden veggies, enjoyed backyard fire pits, and birthday wishes. We watch for UPS packages and we watch out for each other.

Over the 19 years we have experienced so many things living here that make us so thankful to be part of our community. Writing this reminds me of a song my daughters learned in elementary school long ago. A good song with words and true meaning to think about these days. "We live in a house in a neighborhood. The neighborhood is a part of the town. The town is in the county and the county is in the state. A part of the USA. And we all live together!"

I only can hope in this sometimes unsettling world today, others in Cheshire and everywhere in our world appreciate and feel blessed with the same gift of "neighboring " we have known here on Dean Street. I'm pretty sure Zebedee can be pleased he moved here too.
