CHAIRMAN'S CHATTER:

As I'm sitting here writing this article the wind is blowing outside like November but the temperature is not "Novemberish"... it's 56 degrees! But wait...its Wisconsin and the weather is sure to change within 24 hours.

Speaking of change...we have had a number of positive accomplishments and changes this past year. This April we welcomed a new Town Supervisor to the Town Board, Brooke Cardoza. Brooke also serves as our Town Board liaison to the Parks and Trails committee and is a member of our Communications Committee.

The goal of the new Communications Committee is to be the information conduit of town activities and issues, and present them to you in new and fresh formats.

As I wrote in an earlier newsletter, we are going to be more aggressive in enforcing nuisance ordinances. We have successfully addressed numerous junked vehicle issues in the Town and will continue to do so.

Our Planning Commission has completed it's review of our Town Comprehensive Plan. They recommended a few minor changes to the Town Board who in turn approved the changes and sent the new Comprehensive Plan in to Winnebago County Planning and Zoning.

South Park Avenue and Muttart Road reconstruction and repair is completed. Also, 21 town roads have been chip sealed.

Some have questioned how the town arrives at our decisions to repair or reconstruct roads in our township. We have a three step process. First our Town Road Supervisor, who is an employee of the town, not an elected official, annually evaluates each and every road within our town boundaries. He then submits a detailed report to the Town Board on a scaled evaluation. Then, during our annual budget deliberation, we determine what we can "afford" to do in the following fiscal year regarding road repair and/or replacement. We just recently finished that step and held an advertised public hearing on our decision making. Each year road management requirements garner an

average of about 47% of our entire town budget. That's a lot. So we have to do our best in prioritizing what roads get repaired, by recommended BMP (best maintenance practice) methods. What is affordable? What roads have to be put on hold to perhaps the next construction season? It's a challenge because although everyone wants good roads, unfortunately we have just so much money to budget for road work. Just like a family has to budget for their family living expenses, we have to budget for what is feasible for the Town. Then the annual budget is, and was, approved by the Town Electors.

All of these issues and many others are discussed at our Town Board meetings which are open to the public. Some issues are more engaging than others but all are important. I encourage all citizens, young and old, who live in the Town of Neenah to attend these scheduled meetings. By attending any of the scheduled meetings, be that of the Town Board or Plan Commission, Parks and Trails Committee, Sanitary District(s), or Stormwater Utility District meetings, all Town of Neenah citizens have the opportunity to observe and be informed about issues and the process of decision making. Our Town Clerk posts the dates and times of these meetings on our website and at three separate locations throughout the Town.

And now ...my parting " Fun Facts": Although you no doubt are receiving this newsletter well after Thanksgiving, here are some interesting fun facts about...Turkeys.

To debunk a popular turkey tale, Benjamin Franklin did not advocate for the turkey as the National Bird. However, according to The Franklin Institute, he was against the bald eagle, stating in a letter to his daughter that it was a "bird of bad moral character" whereas the turkey was a "much more respectable bird... a bird of courage."

Wild Turkeys can fly at up to 60 miles per hour. And they have excellent vision, seeing three times more clearly than 20/20. Turkeys can also see in color and have a 270 degree field of vision.

The first official presidential turkey pardon wasn't given until George H.W. Bush's in 1989, although reports credit many presidents with the tradition including Abraham Lincoln, whose son took a liking to the turkey destined for Christmas dinner, and Harry Truman, who was the first to appear in a photo op with a turkey that would later be served.

The Good Ol' Days

December 3, 1876, Board Meeting

Board of Supervisors met, full board present. Business transacted as follows: The school money voted to be raised at the last annual town meeting was deemed unnecessary, as the county raised the amount necessary to comply with the law. A motion was made and carried to omit the said school money from the tax roll. The board agreed to get legal advice on the matter of the cancelled taxes which were returned to the town by the county.

June 30, 1878, Board of Review

Town Board of Review met at Town Clerk, C. A. Tullar office. Business transacted as follows: Assessment roll and Personal Property roll place before the board and properly examined. No changes were made in the roll. It was moved that the 16 acres owned by Leo Onas be valued at \$23.00 per acre. Motion lost. Motion made and carried to adjourn.

April 20, 1878

Board of Supervisors met at clerk's office. John Baum was appointed supervisor to fill the vacancy in place of the supervisor who failed to file his oath of office in ten days as required by law.

June 24, 1878

Town Board of Review met at Town clerk's office pursuant to posted notices in three public places in the Town. The board proceeded to examine the roll as required by law. It was moved and carried to assess:

- 1) H. Brown's 40 acres at \$1200 = \$30.00/acre
- 2) A. Schelen's 80 acres at \$1800 = \$22.50/acre
- 3) M. Forest's 80 acres at \$1500 = \$18.75/acre

It was moved and carried to pay the Assessor's bill of \$50.00 for 18 days' work. Board of Review adjourned.

April 13, 1886, Town Board Meeting

The Town Board met at the office of W.P. Pickton's store in the City of Neenah. They proceeded to appoint a weed commissioner for the destruction of noxious weeds. Not being able to find one that would serve it was decided to leave it with Chairman H.E. Huxley.

May 7, 1986

It was moved and carried that all persons outside the Town using the road scraper pay \$2.50 per day for all the time they have the same and that they keep the same in repair.

Outdoor Recreation Plan To Be Updated

With the assistance of the East Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission, the Parks & Trails Committee will be updating the Town's Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan. A Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan, or CORP, is a document that helps guide planning for our town's outdoor and recreational space. The current CORP can be found on the Town's website and was adopted in 2009. It is recommended that it be reviewed and revised, if needed, every 5 years.

Having an updated CORP allows the Town to apply for state funding such as Stewardship Grants, federal grants and Alternative Program Grants. It also helps provide a look to the future planning of our parks and outdoor space and allows for a better understanding of what improvements are needed and how much should be budgeted for each area. The overall goal of the CORP is to ensure that residents have suitable outdoor recreation spaces and facilities that are useful and enjoyable.

East Central helps to review current facilities and with the input of residents, prepare new or update existing goals in the current plan. It's important to revise the plan using the input provided by those who use the Town's parks and outdoor spaces.

Renew Our Waters

Every choice counts.

Ice and Snow Control

We can have safe walkways in the winter and cleaner water all year round.

Winter in Northeast Wisconsin is a great time for outdoor fun, like ice fishing, ice skating, sledding and skiing. Here, winter also means mountains of snow to shovel and layers of ice to remove from driveways and sidewalks.

We often try to make ice removal easier by using products like salt and sand to melt the snow and ice. Many people do not realize that these products are harming local waters and the animals that rely on them. When the ice and snow melt, the salt and chemicals flow into street drains that lead directly to rivers and lakes.

SHOVEL OFTEN AND EARLY

Shoveling often during and immediately following the storm removes the snow from walkways and driveways before it gets packed down by tires and feet. The most important part of deicing is removing as much snow as possible before applying salt or sand - it's also great exercise!

Use only the recommended amount. Throwing down more salt will not speed up the melting process.

MAKE THE MOST OF THE SALT YOU USE

It is not always necessary to see bare pavement to have a safe winter surface. Ask yourself if it is necessary that the snow or ice be removed. For salt to be effective, air temperature needs to be warmer than the surface temperature of the area you want to treat. A little goes a long way. Use only the recommended amount. Throwing down more salt will not speed up the melting process. Use only enough deicer to break the bond between the ice and the pavement, then remove the remaining slush by shoveling.

LIMIT THE AMOUNT OF SAND YOU USE

Sand provides traction. It does not melt ice. Sand, although not chemical, contributes to polluting our local waters. It adds to the excess sediment that is entering waterways, eliminating important habitat for aquatic plants and animals. Sand does play a role in winter road management. It is often used by municipalities on roads to help maintain traction. Since ice removal is typically the concern of homeowners, sand may not be necessary.

Stormwater is rain or snowmelt and water from things people do, like overwatering the lawn or washing the car on the driveway. This water runs off our properties, into the street and down the storm drain - picking up pollutants on its way. Once it reaches the storm drain the water and the pollutants it carries is discharged into local waterways.

Untreated runoff is the biggest threat to our nation's water quality, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Let's make the small, important changes that will reduce that threat and improve water quality and our lives!

WISCONSIN TOWNS SPEND LESS THAN CITIES AND VILLAGES

Do you know that Wisconsin Towns have 95% of the state's land, have close to one-third of the state's residents, and are responsible for caring for 50% of the State's roads?

Towns often go unnoticed, even though the Town meeting is one of the last remaining examples of direct democracy in the U.S. Towns tend to provide fewer services than other municipalities and, as a result, town finances differ from those of cities and villages.

The feature of towns providing limited services affects what we must fund. Towns spent \$479 per capita from general funds in 2013 (data is available on the Wisconsin State website and is the most current available.) This \$479 per person pays for basic services. By comparison, villages spent \$1,204 per capita in general funds and cities spent the most, at \$1,604 per capita.

A significant reason for the difference between the town, village and city finances is that most towns do not provide services such as leaf collection, yard waste pickup, street sweeping, sidewalks, etc.

Most towns rely on the county sheriff's department for police services. Although the Town of Neenah has its own Fire Department, for many towns fire protection is part of joint departments with a neighboring town, village, or city. Towns spent \$80 per capita on law enforcement, fire protection and first responder service. By comparison, villages were \$299 and cities were \$495.

Public works accounted for nearly half of all town spending, more

than any other category: towns, \$222; villages \$175, cities \$197.

On general government, culture, recreation, parks, and education towns spent another \$82 per capita. Villages spent \$186 and cities were \$211.

On the other side of the ledger, general fund revenues from property taxes in all towns combined totaled \$754.7 million, or \$457 per capita. Revenues totaled \$898 million in villages and \$3,936.8 million in cities. Per capita, town revenues from property taxes were less than half of those in villages (\$1,005), and cities (\$1,241). The second largest source of revenue for towns is state aid (\$135 per capita), villages (\$156) and cities (\$276).

As we have just completed our 2016 budgeting process, this is a good time to talk about financial issues supporting our Town. Your property tax bill will arrive about the time you receive this newsletter. If you make comparisons with our neighboring city, remember that we all pay the same amount per \$1,000 valuation for state, county, Neenah School District, and vocational college. The difference is in the dollars property owners contribute to run the Town (\$ 1.12 per \$1000 of assessed value) versus the amount it costs to run the City (\$9.21 per \$1,000 of assessed value). Please keep in mind, the City provides many more services than you get from the Town. It is often disappointing for our residents to hear that we do not provide something they are asking for, such as curb and gutters, sidewalks, yard waste, discarded Christmas trees, multiple street lights, street sweeping, etc.

A copy of the total 2016 Budget presented at our public hearing on November 9, and the tax levy set by the people immediately following the public hearing, is available from the Town Clerk at 725-0916.

Tidbits from the Treasurer

The 2016 Budget was adopted on November 9, 2015 following a Public Hearing and Town Meeting of the Electors. The budget summary can be found on the website, full details are available in the Clerk's Office.

Property Tax bills are scheduled to be mailed approximately December 15, 2015. Payments are due no later than January 31, 2016. If paying by installments, the first payment is due no later than January 31, 2016. Second payments are to be paid directly to **WINNEBAGO COUNTY TREASURER** by July 31, 2016.

Payment may be made in person during office hours, via U.S. mail, or for your convenience, an **"After-Hours Lock Box"** is available at the front door of the Town Hall. If you pay by mail and would like a receipt, you must enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope with your tax payment.

DOG LICENSES: All dogs must be licensed in the Town of Neenah. Licenses are issued by the Treasurer and can be purchased when you pay your taxes in person or by mail. Winter is not yet here but our Town Road Supervisor is already looking forward to the spring of 2016 when the following roads are budgeted to have repairs or maintenance work performed.

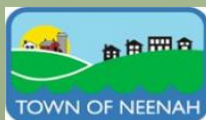

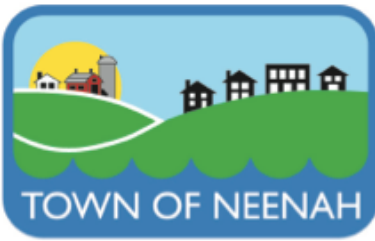

- **BURNING:** Burning is permitted in the Town of Neenah, but the Fire Department requests that you use common sense (dryness and wind are always factors to consider) and that you call the Winnebago County Sheriff's office non-emergency number (236-7300#0) before and after burning to avoid false alarms. Please be considerate of your neighbors when burning, making sure that smoke isn't blowing in their direction. Burning garbage is prohibited as well as any petroleum-based products.
- **MINUTES AND AGENDAS:** Town minutes and agendas are posted on the Town website, three posting locations and are also available at the Town Hall during regular business hours.
- **ADDRESS SIGNS:** Homeowners are responsible for maintaining the emergency address signs placed in front of their homes by the Town. Assure that the sign remains visible by keeping brush and snow away from the sign. Also, do not remove or relocate the sign.
- **BUILDING PERMITS:** All building permits are issued by Building Inspector Gary Klinka (727-9200). Permits are needed to construct a fence or to build a deck. If you aren't sure you need a permit, check with Gary.
- **DEER/WILDLIFE/STRAYS:** The Town has no authority to handle wildlife problems. If you see a dead animal on the road, or have lost or found a pet, call the County Sheriff at 236-7300#0. If you have wildlife problems, call a pest/wildlife service.
- **RECYCLING/TRASH:** Advanced Disposal will not pick up bagged or boxed items, or recyclables in other containers. Please do not wrap with string or place anything inside plastic bags. Electronics, waste oil, and other materials may not be placed with your recyclables or trash.
