A sincere Thank you to Jan DeKeyser for her dedication and service to the Town of Neenah. Jan is a 56-year Town resident and has served on the Town Board for 23 years.

She started working with Town government at elections and helping count paper ballots during the 1970's. She attended many meetings and was appointed to the Park Board in 1980 serving as Chairman of the Parks Board from 1985-2015.

In 1990, she was hired as the Secretary of the Town's Sanitary Districts #2 and #3.

Jan was elected to the Town Board in 1995. Jan also served on the Executive Board of Wisconsin Towns Association's Town Advocacy Council and is secretary of the Wisconsin Utility Tax Association.

Just when you thought the Election season was over ... the Spring 2019 Election is right around the corner and planning has already begun.

The Town Board Chairman and two Town Board Supervisor positions are up for election. Incumbents are Chairman Bob Schmeichel and Supervisor Brooke Cardoza. The second Supervisor position is currently vacant due to the resignation of Jan DeKeyser. These positions are held for two-year terms beginning on April 16, 2019.

The Chairman is paid an annual salary of \$14,760 and Supervisors are paid \$7,380 annually.

Sanitary District #2 and #3 each have a Commissioner position on the ballot. Sanitary District #2 Commissioner Steve Coburn and Sanitary District #3 Commissioner Bryan Von Deylen are the incumbents.

If you are interested in serving on the Town Board or one of the Sanitary Districts, you must declare your candidacy and file nomination papers to have your name appear on the ballot. The forms are available in the Clerk's Office or at Wisconsin Elections Commission website: elections.wi.gov.

The first day to circulate nomination papers is December 1, 2018 and completed forms including Nomination Papers must be delivered to the Clerk's office by 5:00 pm on Wednesday January 2, 2018.

If a Primary Election is necessary it will be held on Tuesday, February 19, 2019.

The Spring Election will be held on Tuesday April 2, 2019.

Information on Absentee/Early in-person voting will be available on the Town of Neenah website as the elections draw closer.

CHAIRMAN'S CHATTER

Greetings to one and all. Here we are at yet another year's end and saying "Wow" where did this year go... and/or, "Man" am I glad that's over! Whatever your point of view, now is the time to take a breath and move forward to 2019 and beyond. We all need to work together. The word that

comes to mind, and perhaps over used, is "synergy". By definition the word means: the interaction or cooperation of two or more organizations, substances, or other agents to produce a combined effect greater than the sum of their separate effects.

The Town of Neenah has a number of important issues coming up in the coming year. Aside from the perennial budgetary needs of more monies to fix our roads, fire department equipment updates, stormwater requirements, etc., we need to address two important issues: completing a boundary agreement with the Village of Fox Crossing and addressing the impending incorporation of the Town of Clayton. The Town of Neenah presently has a very good working boundary agreement with the City of Neenah and it is my hope and desire to accomplish an agreement with Fox Crossings and the Town of Clayton. The position that I and your Town Board are taking is that the Town of Neenah will stay intact within our area of jurisdiction and tax base. Both the Town of Clayton and the Village of Fox Crossing have communicated to me that they are not interested in anything in our jurisdiction. They want to hold on to what is theirs respectively. But that does not mean that The Town of Neenah will stand pat and not address the possibility of the future demise of our town. We need to come to a binding agreement with both. In others words, a cooperative interaction...."synergy".

There are numerous legal uncertainties in annexation law presently. But with the help of

our consulting law firm and the Wisconsin Towns Association Town Advocacy Council, I firmly believe the process will cumulate in a positive end goal. Although there no doubt will be meetings with a minutiae of information from lawyers and the like, I will make sure you are be fully informed with the progress going forward. And of course you are always welcome to attend any of our scheduled open meetings.

The end of the year also means...Auugh... Tax Time. The unavoidable event in with which we all have to complete. However there are existing tax laws that are head scratchers. So here is my "Fun Facts" on tax trivia:

Did you know that residents of New Mexico who are over the age of 100 do not have to pay New Mexico personal income tax? Yes!... Hmmm.

Motion made that the salary of the Town Board and Election officials be left at it's present rate of \$3.00 per day.
Motion carried.

Motion made that the Town Board use their influence to stop the use of high powered riflearms on rifle ranges.
Motion carried.

Motion made to prohibit use of firearms from April 1st to November 1st.
Motion carried.

Motion made that the Town Board put up signs prohibiting us of firearms along highways.
Motion carried.

Motion made that the Town Board take the matter of road drainage on Limekiln Road in the City limits up with the City of Neenah.
Motion carried.

Winter home fire safety

As the outdoor temperatures begin to drop, it is never too late to be sure your home heating system and other safety systems are ready for the added usage that winter weather will bring. Fire Safety organizations and your utility provider(s) recommend that you have your heating system checked, tested and properly adjusted to handle the added demand colder temperatures bring. Furnace filters should be changed at least annually (the low cost of furnace filters may make changing them twice a year a prudent investment), and especially before winter heating season to avoid restricting warm air flow and forcing your furnace to work harder. In addition to your furnace, check your hot water heating system as well. With older models, soot and corrosion can build up in the exhaust flue(s) and lead to possible venting and potential carbon monoxide back-ups or leaks. The burners should also be checked to sure they are producing the proper flame pattern for even heating of your hot water. A good quality carbon monoxide detector should be placed in areas where your heating equipment is located and on every floor of your home, especially close enough to the bedroom areas to warn you, if a problem is detected. Carbon Monoxide is colorless and odorless and can overcome you if the concentrations are high enough. If your CO detector goes off and will not clear and you are unsure what the issue is, please do not hesitate to call 911 to report the CO problem and the Communications Center at the Winnebago County Sheriff's office will dispatch the Town of Neenah Fire Department. A unit will

respond with metering equipment to help identify the problem or determine that you may have an issue with your detector. Please remember, Carbon Monoxide is deadly and alarms should not be taken lightly. CALL 911 in order to be sure.

Both Smoke Detectors and Carbon Monoxide detectors have a useful life of 10 years and should be replaced once they reach that age. Low/dead batteries may also cause issues and again the Fire Department can help you and determine the exact issue with your devices and recommend the proper next steps.

If you know your smoke detectors are approaching or past the 10 year mark the Fire Department is still assisting home owners and installing new 10 year maintenance free smoke detectors. Please call the Town Hall at 920/725-0916 and provide your contact information and the Fire Department will follow-up with you. Lastly, with the Christmas holidays fast approaching please be especially careful with candles and any open flames in your home. Candles that are left unattended are the leading cause of residential home fires. Leaving home with a candle or candles burning may have catastrophic results with a fire seriously damaging or destroying your home. All natural Christmas trees also pose a fire threat as the tree begins to dry out after being brought inside. The lower humidity in your home during heating season will quickly pull moisture from the tree. Be sure to check the water level in the tree stand each day and add water as needed. An

average size tree will use several gallons of water each week. In addition, be sure your lighting decorations are in good repair. Newer LED lighting uses very little energy and do not create the heat that older incandescent lights can.

Should you have any questions or concerns, please contact the Town Hall office at 920/725-0916 and the staff there will pass on your message to members of the Fire Department who can follow-up on your request and hopefully be able to assist you and your family to have a safe winter season.

Renew Our Waters

Every choice counts.

Ice and Snow Control

We can have safe walkways in the winter and cleaner water all year round.

Winter in Northeast Wisconsin is a great time for outdoor fun, like ice fishing, ice skating, sledding and skiing. Here, winter also means mountains of snow to shovel and layers of ice to remove from driveways and sidewalks.

We often try to make ice removal easier by using products like salt and sand to melt the snow and ice. Many people do not realize that these products are harming local waters and the animals that rely on them. When the ice and snow melt, the salt and chemicals flow into street drains that lead directly to rivers and lakes.

SHOVEL OFTEN AND EARLY

Shoveling often during and immediately following the storm removes the snow from walkways and driveways before it gets packed down by tires and feet. The most important part of deicing is removing as much snow as possible before applying salt or sand - it's also great exercise!

Use only the recommended amount. Throwing down more salt will not speed up the melting process.

MAKE THE MOST OF THE SALT YOU USE

It is not always necessary to see bare pavement to have a safe winter surface. Ask yourself if it is necessary that the snow or ice be removed. For salt to be effective, air temperature needs to be warmer than the surface temperature of the area you want to treat. A little goes a long way. Use only the recommended amount. Throwing down more salt will not speed up the melting process. Use only enough deicer to break the bond between the ice and the pavement, then remove the remaining slush by shoveling.

LIMIT THE AMOUNT OF SAND YOU USE

Sand provides traction. It does not melt ice. Sand, although not chemical, contributes to polluting our local waters. It adds to the excess sediment that is entering waterways, eliminating important habitat for aquatic plants and animals. Sand does play a role in winter road management. It is often used by municipalities on roads to help maintain traction. Since ice removal is typically the concern of homeowners, sand may not be necessary.

Stormwater is rain or snowmelt and water from things people do, like overwatering the lawn or washing the car on the driveway. This water runs off our properties, into the street and down the storm drain - picking up pollutants on its way. Once it reaches the storm drain the water and the pollutants it carries is discharged into local waterways.

Untreated runoff is the biggest threat to our nation's water quality, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Let's make the small, important changes that will reduce that threat and improve water quality and our lives!

Property Revaluation

Bowmar Appraisal will begin the process of revaluation in 2019 and completed in 2020. Spreading the job out over two years allows the Town to manage the cost. Although some properties will be reviewed in 2019, the revaluation will not be recorded until the 2020 assessment period. This ensures that all properties are assessed on an equal basis and does not penalize those properties that are reviewed in 2019.

Why is the Town doing a Revaluation?

A revaluation is required to keep pace with changes in the market, as directed by Wisconsin State Statute Chapter 70. The Town must maintain its assessed values within 10% of full value and we are approaching that 90% threshold.

What is a Revaluation?

A Revaluation is a complete and thorough review of all residential property in the Town. Both lot and improvements are reviewed. Adjustments are made where necessary to assure that taxes are distributed equitably and uniformly.

What happens next?

Bowmar Appraisal will begin field work with an external review of half of the Town properties in 2019. If Bowmar Assessors wish to perform an internal review, they will contact you directly to request permission.

Welcome Deputy Clerk-Treasurer Elizabeth Peterman

Although her hands will be filled learning many new things, stop in some time to say Hi and introduce yourself. Elizabeth Peterman was appointed by the Town Board on November 12, 2018 to serve as Deputy Clerk-Treasurer for the Town of Neenah.

Elizabeth comes to the Town with a background in accounting and business with a focus in government and non-profit. You will find Elizabeth in the Town Hall office during regular office hours.

PET LICENSES

All dogs over 5 months of age are **required** to be licensed annually in the Town of Neenah. A valid current rabies certificate is required to issue a license.

FEE: \$5 for altered dogs

\$10 for unaltered dogs.

A \$5 late fee is imposed if the license is purchased after March 31, 2019.



The Commissioners recently adopted the 2019 Operations and Debt Service Budgets for Sanitary District #2. Budgets are always challenging to manage the ever-increasing costs of operations but have managed to keep the user fee the same for the last three years at \$42 per month per residential household. In

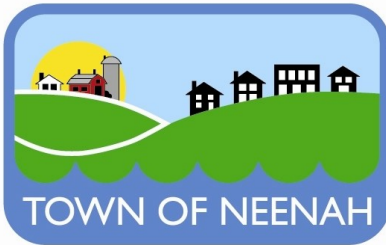
the 2019 Budget, revenues equal \$757,046 and expenses equal \$756,907. The budget can be found on the Town website under the Sanitary District page.

Your user fee goes toward monitoring, repairing and upgrading the sanitary sewer infrastructure. The District hires Midwest Contractors Operations (MCO) to monitor the system on a continuous basis. MCO receives alerts when something is not quite operating as it should in any of the lift stations so the issue can be given immediate attention.

In 2019, the District plans on moving forward with the collector pipe project with the City of Neenah to relieve the capacity issues at lift station 7 and provide for future growth to both communities. The District will also improve and upgrade the facility at Lift Station #2 at Rainbow Beach Road.

A Reminder to please be aware of the household products that you use. Be sure you dispose of these in the trash rather than flushing them down the drain. Although many of these items may be advertised as "Flushable", the best practice is to put them in the trash. Your help will reduce the problems experienced with our Lift Station pumps and save on maintenance and repair costs.
