Curbside recycling- What goes into your cart matters

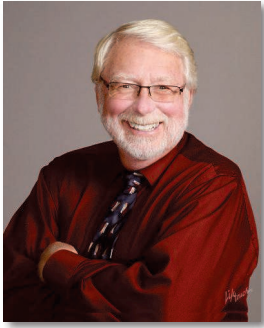
Town of Neenah residents love to recycle but are they recycling right? Tri-County Recycling (owned and operated through a partnership between Brown, Outagamie and Winnebago Counties) wants to remind everyone that what we put in our carts matter. Why? The recyclables accepted in our curbside carts are wide-ranging, but does not include everything with a recycling symbol on it. When included in the cart, unaccepted items make it difficult for equipment and sorters to get to the accepted, truly recyclable materials that manufacturers use to make new products. The good news is that all of us can help make the best of our local recycling program in three easy steps. First, brush up on what should really go in the cart. Second, share this information with family, friends, neighbors, and co-workers. Third, monitor what ends up in the recycling at home, school, and work.

Accepted and Unaccepted Materials

1. Plastic bottles, cups, and containers are accepted. Think kitchen, bathroom, and laundry room plastic containers. Empty, rinse and...new in 2018, replace caps!
2. Newspaper, office paper, mail, catalogs, and books are accepted. Cardboard, food boxes, and freezer boxes are also accepted. Flatten boxes and try to keep the size to no larger than 2 feet x 2 feet to maximize sorting efficiency. Milk, juice, wine and soup cartons were added to the program 5 years ago, so go ahead and empty, rinse and add those to the cart.
3. Metal food cans, aluminum bottles, aluminum cans, and "tin cans" are accepted. Empty aerosol cans (non-pesticide) are also accepted – remove and dispose of the plastic caps and nozzles. Empty and rinse metal containers. Large metal caps (jelly jar lid, pickle jar lid) can be recycled loose in the cart but take bulky metal and aluminum pie pans to a scrap metal yard for recycling.

“Time keeps sliding...slip sliding...away” Here we are, already in the month of September. Baseball pennant races, football games at all levels, talks of the upcoming basketball season, summer fun turning into fall frolics and outdoors cleanup chores, and...next year’s operating budget (Here I was painting a

nostalgic picture of “Fun in the Fall” and I had to throw that not so fun term of budget into the mix. Sorry.) Like it or not, your Town Board of Supervisors has to complete the arduous duty of putting together a doable budget. The scheduled dates for these workshops are: September 27th at 2:30 pm, October 18th at 7:00pm, and October 25 at 2:30pm. The public hearing for electoral approval is November 12th at 7:00pm prior to the Town Board meeting. All of these workshops are open to the public and I would encourage anyone to attend to realize the challenges of putting together a workable budget.

Here are some interesting demographics that play into our budget making decisions-

The 2018 preliminary population estimate for our town, as prepared by the Wisconsin Demographic Service Center, is 3,572 residents of which approximately 2,738 of the estimated population for the town are of voting age. The Town has a total of 2,097 parceled properties of which 1,660 are residential, 71 are business, 163 are industrial, and 203 are agriculture. Of the 203 agriculture parcels 47 are with a residence and 156 are without a residence

When looking at these numbers what immediately comes to mind is that we will have spent more on Public Works in 2018 than any other category (for the full accounting please refer to our Annual report dated December 31, 2017). And, there in lays the perennial challenge of “Roads vs. Public Health, Safety, and Welfare” budget categories. We all want better roads. And some years we need to spend a higher expenditure for a given planned result. However, I would offer that we also need to “support our Volunteer Fire and EMS Department” to the best of our ability. Roads are expensive to maintain and/or replace. We obviously prioritize the need. But what is the cost of a life if only one is lost. By looking at the before mentioned population number and residential lots. The Town of Neenah has evolved into an urban more than a rural town. We as town residents need to embrace that fact and move forward in our evaluations of where we now live and to work out our town operating budgets accordingly.

In that thought, “Thank You” to all that attended the Annual Firemen/EMS picnic this past August 19th. The weather was great and so too was the wonderful turn out of towns people. To the firemen and women and EMS personnel, once again you did a great job!

Now for my “Fun Fact”: Fall is for football. American football grew out of English sports such as rugby and soccer and became popular on American college campuses in the late 1800’s. It takes about 600 cows to make one full season’s worth of NFL footballs. The Wilson Sporting Goods Company in Ada, Ohio, has been the official football supplier for the NFL since 1941. They make more than 2 million footballs of all sorts every year. And...a cow has only a 1 in 17,420,000 chance of becoming an NFL football that is used in the Super Bowl. Now, who and why does anyone take the time to come up with these “Demographics”?

Note from Glenn: The meetings and actions taken here occurred during the height of the Great Depression.

April 9, 1932 – Motion

made to get the county grader to grade the Swamp Road, as the ground will work.

Motion made to pay Henry Nelson 50 cents per hour as Road Superintendent, motion carried.

May 9, 1932 – Motion made to cut road workers to 30 cents per hour and man and team of horses to 60 cents per hour, motion carried.

Motion made that unemployment wages be cut to 15 cents per hour and ten hours per day, motion carried.

May 12, 1932 – Special Board meeting was held to consider the unemployment situation of poor people of town. The Board listened to all that was said for more money, but made no change to the motion of the previous meeting.

June 1, 1932 – Special meeting to consider the crushed stone bids. Motion made to give the job to William A. Hanson at \$1.30 per yard, delivered to any part of the Town, his being the lowest bid. Motion carried.

October 27, 1932 – Motion made to pay 20 cents per hour for eight hours work for the unemployed starting October 17th.

December 6, 1932 – Meeting of Town Board Audit. Motion made to allow bill of Dr. Williamson at \$6.00 and Theda Clark Hospital for \$4.72. Motion carried.

Motion made to raise \$1000.00 as Poor People Fund. Motion carried.

Motion made to raise \$500.00 for snowplowing. Motion carried.

March 2, 1933 – Special meeting of Town Board. Motion made that the Town of Neenah does not assume responsibility for the repairing of the automobile of Willis Erdman. Motion carried.

Motion made to employ D. K. Allen as our attorney to defend the Town of Neenah in the case of a lawsuit with Willis Erdman. Motion carried.

May 5, 1933 – Special meeting of Town Board. Motion made to work the unemployed ten hours per day at 15 cents per

Each year our annual picnic grows in size and popularity and this year was no different. The department was able to share valuable fire prevention information geared towards the children of the community with a tour of the Life Safety House, using water filled fire extinguishers to improve their aim while “knocking down flames” in a tiny home prop, and receiving a Junior Firefighter badge when their

“training” was complete. We also want to give a big shout out and thank you to the other agencies who participated, most notably the Theda Star medical helicopter and crew based here in Neenah at Theda Care Hospital and Regional Trauma Center. Our friends in law enforcement were also well represented with tactical vehicles from the Winnebago County Sheriff’s department and the City of Neenah Police Department. Our partner in providing emergency medical services to the community, Gold Cross Ambulance Service, displayed one of their modern, well-equipped ambulances. Gold Cross along with

Fire Department First Responders respond to over 100 calls each year for medical emergencies within the Town.

The TNFD apparatus fleet was also on display with Engine 39, Engine 239 and Tender 39. The department members utilized rescue equipment from the trucks to demonstrate the capabilities of the Jaws of Life in a real time scenario.

Again, we deeply appreciate the support we have received over the years and hope when we are needed we can make a difference and address you or your neighbor’s emergency.

Every choice counts.

Good Dog, Good Owner

You can be a responsible pet owner and protect our waters.

Your dog brings a lot of joy to your life. Enjoying your four legged friend doesn't need to come at the price of clean water. We can have both. But to make it happen, we all need to think a little differently.

MORE TO WASTE THAN MEETS THE EYE

Pet waste is not only an unpleasant find on a yard or sidewalk, it carries bacteria that causes beach closings in the summer.

Pet waste is not only an unpleasant find on yard or sidewalk, it carries bacteria that make beach closing necessary in the summer.

Campylobacteriosis and salmonellosis are often the cause of the "24-hour bug". They're transferred through fecal material from an infected person or animal.

Toxoplasmosis is carried by a single-cell parasite that lives in infected animal feces (typically cats). In pregnant women, it can pass through the umbilical cord to the unborn fetus, causing serious abnormalities.

WASTE DISPOSAL

Prevent bacteria in our streams by carrying small plastic bags when walking your dog. Collect droppings, tie a knot in the bag, and dispose of it properly. Do not throw pet waste down the sewer.

At home, pick up pet waste often. Even waste in your backyard can pollute local waterways. You can flush the waste down the toilet, put it in your trash can (be sure to check your local ordinances first!) or bury it in your yard.

Stormwater is rain or snowmelt and water from things people do, like overwatering the lawn. As water makes its way to the storm drain it picks up pollutants like oil from car leaks and bacteria from pet waste. When we choose products carefully and dispose of products properly, we can greatly reduce the amount of pollution that enters our local waters through runoff.

Untreated runoff is the biggest threat to our nation's water quality, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Let's make the small, important changes that will reduce that threat and improve water quality and our lives!

- 4. Glass food jars and beverage bottles are accepted. Empty and rinse glass containers. Window glass, mirrors and ceramics should go in the trash.
- 5. All items should be loose in your collection cart. Absolutely no plastic bags – take them back to the grocery store for recycling!
- 6. No trash, cords, hazardous materials, batteries, or needles.

When you think curbside recycling, bottles, jars, cups, cans, paper, and cardboard should come to mind as appropriate items.

Absentee Voting in the Clerk's office will begin September 24th during regular office hours and end on November 2, 2018 at 5:00 pm. Additional hours for absentee voting will be posted on the website and at the Town Hall.

Offices to be Elected

REGISTER TO VOTE

If you need to register to vote, changed your name and/or changed your address there are several options to register or re-register:

BY MAIL: Complete the Voter Registration Application Online at myvote.wi.gov. Print the form, **BE SURE TO SIGN AND DATE THE FORM** and mail to the Town Clerks Office at 1600 Breezewood Lane, Neenah, WI 54956 along with a copy of acceptable proof of residence. You may register to vote by mail until the 3rd Wednesday preceding the election.

IN PERSON: Register in the municipal clerk's office up to the Friday before the election. Proof of residency is required when registering.

AT THE POLLING PLACE ON ELECTION DAY: If you wish to register to vote at your polling place, you must provide proof that you have lived at your present location for 10 days preceding the election. For purposes of voter registration, a form of identification constitutes acceptable proof of residence if it includes your current name and **current Town of Neenah address.**

ABSENTEE VOTING

Absentee voting in the Clerk's office will begin on September 24, 2018 and end on November 2, 2018 at 5:00 pm. Photo ID is required.

Absentee Ballot Request

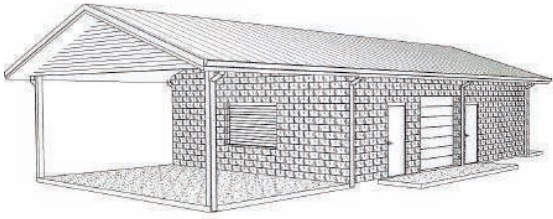
Any qualified elector may request to vote an absentee ballot by mail, photo ID is required. To obtain an absentee ballot, you may choose one of the following:

You may make a request in writing, via email or on-line at myvote.wi.gov. You will be mailed an absentee ballot. The written request must include your voting address within the Town of Neenah, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature.

FRANZOI PARK IMPROVEMENTS

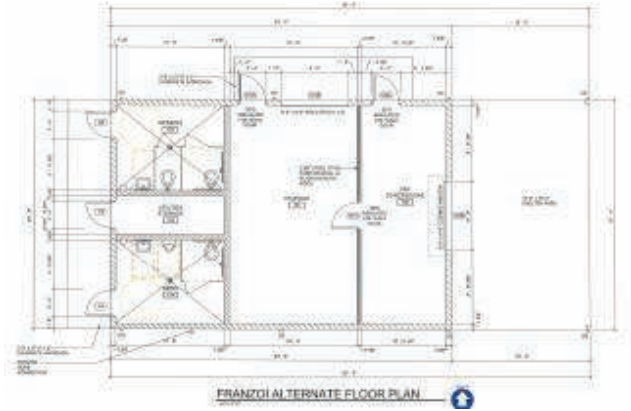


FRANZOI ALTERNATE PERSPECTIVE

The Parks and Trails Committee has been dreaming of constructing a pavilion with restrooms at Franzoi Park for many years, eliminating the need of the portable outhouse. On September 10, 2018, the Town of Neenah held a Special Meeting of the Electors to discuss and ask for approval to construct the shelter for an estimated cost of \$311,000. The Electors present voted in favor of the construction

with anticipated construction to be completed in the spring of 2019. The Shelter will be partially funded through Impact Fees which have been collected over the past several years for Park Improvements. The Town Board will discuss options to reduce the estimated cost and fund the remaining balance during the 2019 Budget Workshops this fall.

Perhaps more exciting and a wonderful surprise for the Parks and Trails Committee and Town of Neenah is a very generous anonymous donation made by a resident of the Town of Neenah for the construction of a half-court basketball court at Franzoi Park. The goal is to have the construction completed this fall pending the contractor's schedule and the weather. *A very heartfelt thank you to this generous donor for making this possible!*

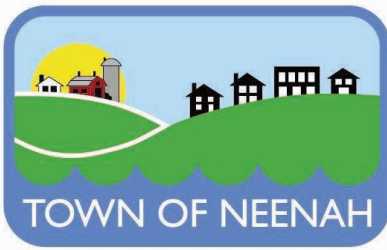
