CHAIRMAN KARCHESKI: It's that

time of year again when local farmers head to fields with large equipment. The Town of Plover is very unique in having not only diverse agriculture but significant residential interests – especially when it comes to roads. The town board recently invited several farms in to a town board meeting to discuss large equipment use of roads.

Communications is a key to help maintain roads which could be damaged by large equipment. Some of the ideas from this very productive meeting: communications is a good maintenance policy, use of one-way roads during certain farming seasons and the willingness of farms to help maintain and repair roads used by their equipment.

This can be a win-win situation which will aid in the longevity of the town's road system.

THANK YOU to area farmers for helping control vegetation along roadways. To widen and to raise the south portion of Jackson Avenue for better draining, Hamerski Farms provided labor, fill and equipment.

With 1715 residents in the Town of Plover, there are 16,211 agricultural acres of which 12,794 acres irrigated.

2013 HIGHWAY PROJECTS:

A portion of Cardinal Drive was repaved as well as part of River Heights Drive; to help drain water from the roadway and prevent the edge of the road from breaking off – shoulders were reconstructed on Hoover Avenue, sections of Birch Drive and Prairie Drive.

Town employees cut brush, mowed ditches and crack filled, repaired potholes and, on gravel roads, pulled gravel out from the ditches to reclaim the ditch and restore a crown to roads – again to increase drainage and preserve our roads.

Town of Plover covers 40.6 square miles; 70.66 road miles are certified for state aid of which 59.77 miles are blacktop or chip seal leaving 10.89 miles as gravel or dirt.

ENCROACHMENT OF ROAD

RIGHT-OF-WAY: An encroachment is any unauthorized object located partially or wholly within the highway right-of-way. This includes, but is not limited to buildings, signs, fences, or other objects and unpermitted uses such as parking lots and driveways. The state does not allow encroachment within the state highway right-of-way. Statutes direct the Town of Plover to maintain the highway right-of-way free and clear of encroachments – this includes rural areas. *Please reference Wisconsin State Statute 82 regarding road right-of-way*.

SUPERVISOR DUSTIN CHECK:

TIS THE SEASON - spring planting will be underway by the time you receive this newsletter. If you meet large farm tractors and equipment on the road, PLEASE slow down or pull over. Even tho driving down the road may look easy, to the operator, it is not! You need to give that operator as much room as possible – he is concerned about your safety as well as the need to navigate around signs, dodge mail boxes and pot holes all while keeping his equipment on the road. Remember – this little bit of consideration is for safety's sake!

SUPERVISOR ROGER BENTLEY:

SO HOW WIDE IS A ROAD RIGHT-OF-WAY?

The Town of Plover maintains that a road is the width of 66 feet – that is, 33 feet from the center of the road. Within the right-of-way of typical roads, one can find public facilities, driving surface, shoulders, road drainage systems, aerial and underground public utilities and traffic signs. Property owners are allowed to install a mail box meeting the guidelines of the USPS.

Town employees trim and cut brush to improve safety; traffic is impeded whenever trees, brush or vegetation come in contact with a vehicle traveling in the lane of traffic or on road shoulders; trees or brush which pose a risk of falling onto the road may also be removed.

Feel free to call members of the town board about questions or concerns relating to right-of-way maintenance; we need your input.

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SUPERVISOR JOE FIRKUS:

A GEM RIGHT IN THE TOWN OF PLOYER!

The Wisconsin River runs about 11.4 miles from the spillway below the Whiting dam to the Biron Dam in Wood County with at least 26 islands of which the largest island - privately owned - exceeds 275 acres in size.

Popular for boating, waterskiing, fishing and lounging on sand bars, and access to explore the backwaters of Rocky Run, Mill Creek, Love Creek and Halladay Creek feeder streams.

Access points in the Town of Plover:

<u>Galecke Park</u>, located at the end of Park Drive; with two concrete ramps and a floating dock for boat launches, ample parking and picnic grounds with limited facilities.

Forest Lake Subdivision, just off Highway 54 about 4 miles west of the village; unimproved public access with launching for canoes, kayaks and small boats by a carry of about 100 yards with access to upper portion of Love Creek.

Pierce Avenue, intersects with Highway 54 about 5 miles west of the village; unimproved access point with gravel launching ramp and some parking, located where the mouth of Love Creek intersects with the Wisconsin River – directly across the river from the confluence of Mill Creek and Rocky Run.

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DOG LICENSING - 2014: As of

April 15, 108 dogs were licensed this year as compared to 117 thru the same date in 2013.

Keep in mind – the Portage County Sheriff's citation to an owner for an unlicensed dog will range between \$169 and \$263.50 – so being able to prove a current rabies vaccination and buying that license is really a good deal – even after April 1 with the late charge of \$5.

If your dog is spayed or neutered, the license will now cost \$13; if male or female, the cost is now \$23 – and **you will need proof of the pet's most current rabies vaccination.**

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YARD MATERIAL BRUSH DROP-OFF

Recycle leaves, grass and garden debris at home by composting, mulching or grass recycling. Grass clippings are best left on the lawn. However, if you have more yard materials than you can recycle, then you can take excess yard materials, pine needles and cones to the WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY (WWTF), 4496 Coolidge Avenue. A load should not exceed a pickup truck box in size. STUMPS, TREE TRUNKS, LOGS OF ANY SIZE, SOD, DIRT, TIMBERS, ROCKS, CONCRETE, BOARDS OR FOREIGN MATERIALS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. VIOLATORS WILL BE FINED. The schedule is as follows (excluding holidays):

Mondays: Noon to 6:00 PM
Thursdays: Noon to 6:00 PM
Saturdays: 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM

BRUSH AND BRANCHES WILL BE ACCEPTED DURING THE SAME DAYS AND HOURS AS YARD MATERIALS DROPOFF

Town of Plover residents are allowed to drop off **ONE** load of brush, no larger than 10' long, 6' wide, and 4' high per household per date (see above). Residents who drop off brush in excess of the allowed limit will be charged a minimum \$25 tipping fee per load, payable at the time of drop off. A load is considered to be 10' long, 6' wide and 4' high or less.
