




5. If you would like to share more information about how content you are about the growth of Etna, please be specific here.

- 1. Not enough small industry
- 2. I love this place and would like to see it remain small.
- 3. I enjoy the rural aspect of living in Etna. Although it would be nice if there was more options and opportunities for children, toddler through adolescent years. I struggle to find a play group for my toddler, there is only the story time at the library and it's not necessarily a play group. Also, it would be refreshing to see more diversity in the area.
- 4. I think etna has room for some growth... but not too much. We wouldn't want to loose it's charm by outgrowing itself, or modernizing too much. Keep it local. Keep the chains away. But if possible make more entry level work opportunities for local people that are more than restaurants/bars.
- 5. Maybe in the future the city could do things to make some money for itself we really on the government a lot and donations
- 6. We don't need low income housing and no homeless shelters or camping opportunity for homeless people. We don't have the services they need and don't need to add that type of service to our community. We need to have people contribute (having jobs, retirement, no wealfare income) to our community not come in and take from our community. We do not want homeless camps.
- 7. I am happy that there is growth happening in our community. I think it's incredibly important that this city is a welcoming space for small Business owners as well as residents. I would like to see the infrastructure of the town be developed in the way that makes the town more accessible to those who are walking and on bikes. I strongly believe we should have more and better side walks throughout the town, but specifically Main Street. It would also be wonderful to see a more decorative street light situation throughout the town, especially in areas near the edge of town that have yet to offer any street lighting at all.
- 8. I am content that we don't have "big box" stores. That most of the economy is locally driven, but we need farms that produce food for the local area, for the schools/kids. We need compost programs and we need a greater level of self sustainably.
- 9. It seems like it's growing slowly. I am happy with that.
- 10. I believe it's very important for the community to grow in a way that is culturally meaningful to its history. But also allows for important economic opportunities for the next generation. The area is renowned for the Scott river, and the Scott is critically important for coho salmon in the larger Klamath. Honoring the watershed's role for salmon, the ecotourism, and outdoor recreation industry is an important part of the future.

I think the way the community is growing may be a challenge for the community that will be hard to reverse. 
- 21. Bad air quality due to summer forest fires.

Shasta people have been severed from their very home. A whole vibe of "get over it" is perpetuated here, and permeates into every corner of this area.

If folks from big cities move here and expect that, then they should stay where they came from. Etna is a historic town with a rich history in mining, ranching, and farming. 


- 1. Not until the infrastructure can handle it






18. Do you feel the City's parks and recreation opportunities are adequate for the needs of the community?





- 31. Etna still seems safe, but I feel that theft has been a problem




