Dates to Remember

December 31st, 2018 – 2018 Dog Licenses Expire.

January 31st – The first installment of the Portage County Real Estate Taxes are due. The Town of Stockton does NOT accept property tax payments. Please remit to the County Treasurer as instructed on the tax bill.

January 1st to May 31st – Burning Permits are required unless the ground is completely snow-covered. Call 1-888-WISBURN or get further information or obtain your annual permit at www.dnr.wi.gov/wisburn. Clerk Lauri Novotny can also issue burning permits.

February 19th – If a Primary is necessary, a Primary Election for State offices including Justice of the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals Judge. Town of Stockton residents are encouraged to vote at the Town Hall, 7252 6th Street, Custer. Polls are open from 7:00 am – 8:00 pm. Photo ID is required.

March 1st – Plan ahead and haul your heavy loads prior to the Temporary Class B Weight Limit restrictions being imposed. Contact Chairman Mike Bronk or Town Clerk for exemption requests.

April 2nd – Spring Election for State offices including Justice of the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals Judge as well as Municipal Elected Officials. Town of Stockton residents are encouraged to vote at the Town Hall, 7252 6th Street, Custer. Photo ID is required. Polls are open from 7:00 am – 8:00 pm.

Attention Dog Owners

Upon reaching five months of age, all dogs must be licensed and have an active rabies vaccination certificate from a licensed veterinarian. Dog licenses are to be purchased annually, and expire on December 31st of each year. Licensees for the following year are available for purchase or renewal beginning in mid-December of each year at the Town of Stockton Town Hall during regular office hours. Licenses may also be purchased by mailing proper payment and documentation to the Town Hall. Dog License fees are as follows:

Neutered Male or Spayed Female \$10.00

Un-neutered or Un-spayed dog \$20.00

The license renewal date is January 1st of each year. It is not the expiration date of the rabies vaccination. If you purchase your license after March 31st, the license fee is increased by \$5.00 per dog. Failure to obtain a dog license, failure to have a dog vaccinated against rabies, or allowing a dog to run at large could result in fines of \$169.00 or more for each offense.

As picturesque as a new snow fall can be, it can also be traitorous for drivers in Wisconsin as many of us are aware. Here are some things to consider as it relates to the plow trucks and drivers that work diligently to help maintain the safety of our roads.

Not only are the snow plow trucks large and heavy (in excess of 60,000 lbs without salt/sand) but when you add the 12-foot front blade and 9-foot side blade, the plow is a massive machine! There are flashing lights, a rear camera, controls for the various blades, controls for the sand and salt mixture, interior temperature controls, engine gauges, and so much more – add that to the windy conditions which cause drifting of snow and minimal visibility – these guys have a lot of responsibility when behind the wheel of these big trucks!

We often take for granted that the plow is going to keep our streets clean for our daily commute. What we may not realize the depth of their job. For example, as the plow driver is pulling up to an intersection, he needs to consider the length of the plow in addition to the truck as he nears the stop sign or intersection. There is much less visibility when pulling out to an intersection that has trees and/or other obstacles within the line of vision. A great example of this is pulling on to County Highway J from one of the intersecting streets. As the driver visually inspects the lanes of traffic, he then has to pull on to the road but as he does, he has to constantly be aware of the length of plow in front of him. He isn't just pulling in to his lane as the length of the truck/plow doesn't allow for that. He is essentially utilizing both lanes for his turns in order to turn adequately. In addition, as the plow makes a right hand turn with both the center blade and right plow wing down, they have to back track and make multiple passes in order to clean up the intersection to allow for safe travel. It's not just turning the corner as it might appear.

There are obstacles to be aware of as well including but not limited to:

- Garbage and/or recycling cans remaining on non-pick up days – Going around a garbage can once may not seem like much but when the snow and ice harden or more garbage cans are present, this creates a zig-zag appearance. It's much more efficient when they can plow a straight path and maneuver around less obstacles.
- Low hanging trees – During the winter months as well as over the course of the year, our Stockton Road Crew works to maintain trees and brush in the road right-of-way as well as maintaining the roads year round whether it be snow, ice, wind or whatever Mother Nature decides to throw at us. Low hanging trees can reduce visibility and pose hazards to vehicle travel whether it is plow trucks, emergency vehicles or other travel in the vicinity.
- Snow and other ice build up from residents plowing across the road and in to the road (which is prohibited) – Although it is the resident's responsibility to clear snow from the front of the mailbox area, please be aware that leaving rows or piles of snow in the roadway is dangerous. If a problem arises, you will be notified that you are breaking the law according to Wis. Statutes 86.01. A 2nd warning will include a fine of **\$50.00** from the Town of Stockton as stated in the Town Snow Removal Ordinance O-08-01.
- Narrow roadways – Some of our roads are narrower than others making it more difficult to maneuver the large plow truck especially when meeting a passing vehicle.
- Small children – Allowing small children to watch the snow plow truck as it goes by is great but when the children are playing near the road, that's dangerous. Should the truck slide on ice or the child quickly dart out in the road, this could cause a serious accident.

Not only are the drivers constantly monitoring the weather but they're also deciding the amount of salt/sand mixture to use, when to use it and how to maintain the best roads possible for travel. Although their maximum rate of speed is typically 25-35 mph, depending on conditions, they cannot control the snow. The faster they drive, the further they're able to push the snow as the plow has more momentum but, the weight of the snow tends to cause damage to items like mailboxes and surrounding trees. Light, fluffy snow will blow off the plow much easier than the heavy, wet snow.

Our drivers use their best judgment. Safety is a priority. The more we can be aware of their job, the safer we can make our Town not only for our plow drivers but our residents as well. Things to remember: 1) If you're meeting a plow truck, realize that the driver is trying to move over as far as he can but the road may be narrow or there may be another obstacle in the way that prohibits the truck from being able to move over more. 2) When pulling out in front of a plow truck, it may appear safe to you but the stopping distance is greater with the sheer weight of the truck, added to the salt/sand – that's a lot of truck to stop quickly if need be. 3) Drivers are people too. They have families and enjoy the beauty of our Town just as you do. They put in long hours whether it be evening, weekend or extended day, enduring numerous obstacles and battling whatever Mother Nature has provided whether it be snow or ice, wind or freezing rain. These guys are dedicated to keeping our roads as clean as possible. It's often a thankless job but certainly one that we can all attest is an important one!

Keep the Wreath Green Campaign

Once again, our Town of Stockton Fire Department is participating in the "Keep the Wreath Green" campaign. The program runs from Thanksgiving Day until the end of New Year's Day. The program is designed to raise the general public's awareness of preventing fires during the holiday season by alerting them to the loss (red bulb) each time a fire occurs. A white bulb is prominently displayed to pay homage to all of the fallen firefighters during the past year.

According to the latest statistics available, there are over 25,000 Chimney Fires per year in the US that are responsible for over 125 million dollars in property damage. The most sobering statistics relate to deaths and injuries that can result from chimney fires that spread into house fires.

Please do your part to "Help Keep the Wreath Green" this holiday season!

The Portage County Treasurer's Office is open Monday thru Friday from 7:30 am until 4:30 pm.

Below are a few of our surrounding municipalities and their 2017 mill rates. The mill rate is the amount of tax payable per dollar of the assessed value of a property. The mill rate is based on "mills"; as each mill is one-thousandth of a currency unit; one mill is equivalent to one-tenth of a cent or \$0.001.

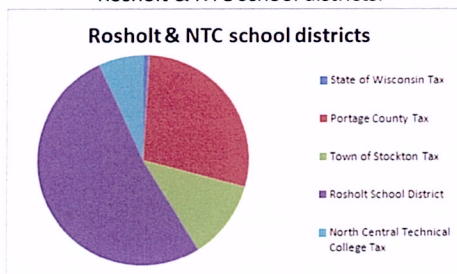
The overall mill rate is comprised of mill rates associated with the state, county, local, school district, and vocational school district mill rates. The mill rate also takes in to consideration whether or not the school district has a referenda in place.

The portion of your property taxes that actually ends up in our local Town of Stockton is a very small amount of the overall portion of your tax bill.

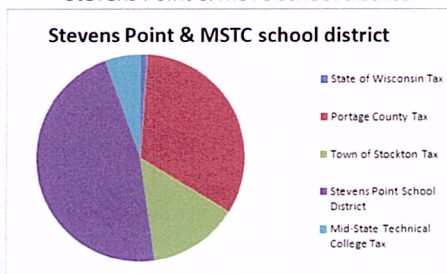

In the examples below, this is what you would had for a 2017 mill rate, depending on which school and technical college districts you live in:

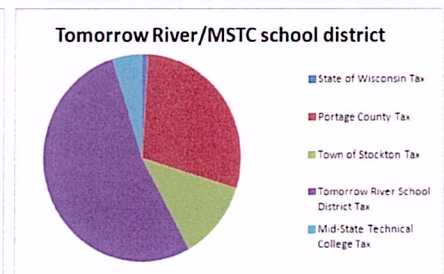
Rosholt & NTC school districts:

To All Dog Owners in Portage County,

State law and Portage County ordinances, **require all dogs to be licensed**, and that rabies vaccinations be current. The owner of any dog more than 5 months of age on January 1st, or 5 months of age within the license year, must annually, or on or before the date the dog becomes 5 months of age, obtain a license for that dog. A dog license is valid from January 1st to December 31st of each year.


Dog licenses can be easily obtained from your municipal treasurer, and are reasonably priced. There is also an option to obtain a multiple dog license for owners of kennels or for those with a large number of dogs.

There is a mandatory late fee if you fail to obtain a license by April 1st, or after 30 days of ownership of a new eligible dog. Licenses can also be obtained from the Humane Society of Portage County – and they even are open on Saturdays if you can't get to your municipal clerk during normal business hours.

The Sheriff's Office takes dog licensing seriously because of the potential impact on public health and safety. We have teamed up with the Humane Society to enforce licensing and vaccination laws. **A citation to the owner of an unlicensed dog can cost between \$169.00 and \$263.50.**




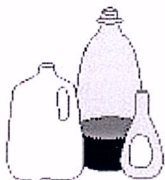


GUIDE TO RECYCLING



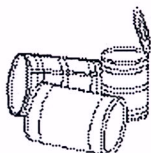
ALUMINUM CANS - Includes used beverage cans only. No foil or food containers.

CONTAINER GLASS – Includes clear, brown, green and blue container glass only. Glass should be clean. Glass **DOES NOT INCLUDE** ceramic cups, dishes, ovenware, plate glass, safety and window glass, heat-resistant glass such as Pyrex, light bulbs, mirrors, lead-based glass such as crystal.



PLASTIC CONTAINERS – Includes only food and beverage bottles and containers marked with the #1 through #7 recycling emblem. Includes aseptic packaging such as juice boxes and soup broth containers.

DOES NOT INCLUDE motor oil bottles, plastic bags, styrofoam cups or containers and packaging peanuts.

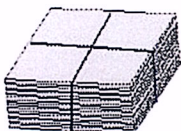


TIN CANS – Includes metal cans, bi-metal cans and steel containers which must be clean. Cut out end can be secured inside can.



MIXED PAPER PRODUCTS – Includes all grades of papers including: white, colored, ledger, shiny, coated, carbonless, envelopes – including windowed, labeled and kraft; newspapers, magazines, phone books, computer print out paper, glued pads and tablets, file folders, post-it notes, spiral notebooks, cereal boxes, shoe boxes, paper grocery bags, beverage cartons. Can include paper clips and staples.

DOES NOT INCLUDE waxed paper, hand towels, napkins or paper plates.



CORRUGATED CARDBOARD – Includes clean corrugated cardboard only. Cardboard must be flattened and bundled in bundles not more than twelve (12) inches high by twenty-four (24) inches wide and thirty-six (36) inches long.

DOES NOT INCLUDE waxed cardboard or soiled cardboard.

ALL paper products may be placed in a paper bag or bundled



Not Acceptable Items (place in trash)

- ♦Plastic Bags
- ♦Pesticide or Herbicide Containers
- ♦Styrofoam or Microwave Containers
- ♦Aluminum Foil
- ♦Empty Paint Cans
- ♦Aerosol Cans
