



MESSAGE FROM OUR MAYOR

HELLO NEIGHBORS!

Happy New Year! I hope everyone enjoyed the holidays and is off to a great start in 2026!

This year, our budget includes funding for long-term financial strategies that set aside money for future expenses — costs that, if not planned for, could otherwise create major spending spikes and tax increases in the years ahead. With this proactive approach, we can continue keeping annual tax increases low while being prepared for known future projects and protected from unplanned cost situations.

Here is a summary of what we have implemented:

- **Fire Truck Reserve:** Plan to replace one of our used fire trucks every 10–12 years (~\$100K). We are depositing \$9K per year and have \$47K saved, positioning the City to replace a truck in about six years.
- **Sewer Jetting Reserve:** Sewer jet-washing (~\$20K) is needed every 4–5 years. We are depositing \$5K per year and have \$15K saved, preparing for jet-washing in 2027.
- **City & Fire Hall Reserve:** Plan for upkeep and remodeling updates (~\$250K) every 12–15 years. We are depositing \$20K per year and have \$107K saved, preparing for a building improvement project in 7–8 years.
- **Parks Reserve:** Plan for park enhancements (in ~\$50K increments) every 3–4 years. We are depositing \$15K per year, for park improvements in 4–5 years.
- **Legacy “Borrow-Only” Reserve:** We have set aside one full year of the City’s budget as an emergency backstop. If the City ever faces an extraordinary expense, it may borrow from this reserve under a Council-approved five-year repayment plan. This creates an evergreen financial safety net for our community.

With these planned reserves in place, we are ensuring long-term financial stability for Medicine Lake for decades to come.

EVENTS

Proceeds from the annual pizza delivery fundraiser and our open house (~\$1500) were formally accepted and dispositioned by city council in January--thank you so much for all your support! These funds are being used to refurbish B11, our rescue boat, to address some electrical demons, repair some battle wounds, and improve capability with some new equipment. Thank you all for your support!

Also, thank you to everyone who came out on New Year's Day to participate in the Cold Plunge! In addition to being good for you, it's a great way to learn how to manage your breathing and emotions when your body gets hit with a shocking dose of stress! We've been co-hosting this informal event with Minnetonka Fire since 2020, but we've been getting increasing interest from neighbors--many who join in with their entire families!

January 31st and February 1st is earmarked for our Medicine Lake Winter Festival. Activities and event locations need to be a bit flexible until we know what weather will be like, so there will be updates announced via on the city Facebook page and the Community Club group email. Potential events include: adult and kids hockey games, ice carousel, lake golf, chili/soup gathering at Jevne, group XC ski, and kid's ice fishing party.

HYDRANTS

We now have 25 hydrants in our city providing ample water supply for use in fire suppression--take note of the hydrants nearest your home that might be needed in an emergency! To keep hydrants accessible throughout the winter, please consider "adopting a hydrant" by keeping snow cleared from around it. MLFD needs to be able to find and work around hydrants to connect hoses and manipulate caps/valves. If you have the time, we would appreciate if you help remove significant snow and ice in a 3-foot radius around the fire hydrant within 24 hours of a snow event.

Adopting a Hydrant can be as informal as grabbing a shovel when it snows, but you can also sign up for hydrant responsibility via [this web tool](#)—check it out!

PUBLIC SAFETY

We are in the coldest part of the year and would like to help you all stay safe amidst the chill. From treacherous roads to the risks of heating equipment and extreme cold, taking precautions can prevent accidents and ensure a safer season. Key areas of concern include winter travel, house heating fires, and cold exposure.

Winter travel demands heightened awareness. Drive "winter ready" by keeping your gas tank full and packing an emergency kit including extra clothing (hats, boots, gloves and jackets). While driving, increase your following distance to ensure you have plenty of time to stop on icy roads. For pedestrians, wear high-traction footwear and brightly colored clothing to avoid slips and improve visibility.

At home, heating systems and alternative heat sources can pose fire hazards if not handled properly. Space heaters should always be kept at least three feet away from flammable materials and never left unattended. Regularly inspect and clean chimneys, vents, and heating appliances to reduce fire risks. Additionally, installing and maintaining smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors can be lifesaving.

Lastly, prolonged exposure to cold can lead to frostbite or hypothermia. Dress in layers and cover exposed skin when outside!

WEST METRO WATER ALLIANCE NEWS (WMWA): BEAVERS

Beavers are one of nature's busiest engineers. They are a keystone species, which means that they have a significant impact on the ecosystem relative to their population. Their work offers a cascade of positive benefits for water quality and the environment.

Beavers create and maintain wetlands, which help to filter water and recharge aquifers, restore eroded streambanks, and boost biodiversity. Their dams improve water quality by trapping and filtering out sediment and pollutants like phosphorous and nitrogen. Additionally, beavers expand water storage by slowing down water and increasing infiltration of that water into soil. This can restore the natural hydrology to areas that have lost it.

Scientists understand that these furry allies can support climate resilience efforts and are using beavers' environment-altering powers to help restore ecosystems, reduce the strains of drought, and even create firebreaks in regions affected by wildfire.

Beavers build critical wetland habitat that supports a host of fish, amphibian, mammal, and insect species. Despite wetlands only accounting for six to nine percent of land cover, they sequester more carbon than forests and support half of North America's threatened or endangered species. Wetlands are essential components to environmental, animal, and human health.
