Notes from the Clerk-Treasurer's Office

A lot of changes are happening in the office! There will be a new Administrative/Accounting Assistant and Clerk-Treasurer in the coming weeks. Please bear with us during this transition period. We apologize in advance for the irregular hours and any inconvenience you may encounter, and thank you for your patience. If you **need** to speak with someone at City Hall, please call to ensure the office is open before a trip is wasted.

At the Council's December 9th meeting, budgets were approved for the General Fund and the Fire Fund. The overall levy increase for the City is came in at 0.71% for 2020. Although there is a small increase in the annual levy, the city's tax rate was actually *reduced* by 8.43%. The Motley Fire Department is seeking applicants for volunteer firefighters. Applicants must be a minimum of 18 years of age, have a valid Minnesota driver's license, live within an acceptable response time area and be able to pass a physical examination. Firefighters receive \$9.00 for each call/meeting/training attended. Fully vested members of the FD Relief Association receive \$2,000/year of active service upon retirement. Notes from the Fire Department: Space Heater safety tips!

Heating equipment is the second leading cause of home fires in the United States. More than 65,000 home fires are attributed to heating equipment each year. These fire result in hundreds of deaths, thousands of injuries and millions of dollars in property damage. Portable electric space heaters can be a convenient source of supplemental heat for your home in cold weather. Unfortunately, they can pose significant fire and electric shock hazards if not used properly. Fire and electrical hazards can be caused by space heaters without adequate safety features, space heaters placed near combustibles, or space heaters that are improperly plugged in. Safety should always be a top consideration when using space heaters. Here are some tips for keeping your home safe and warm when it's cold outside:

- Make sure your space heater has the label showing that it is listed by a recognized testing laboratory.
- Before using any space heater, read the manufacturer's instructions and warning labels carefully.
- Inspect heaters for cracked or broken plugs or loose connections before each use. If frayed, worn or damaged, do not use the heater.
- Never leave a space heater unattended. Turn it off when you're leaving a room or going to sleep, and don't let pets or children play too close to a space heater.
- Space heaters are only meant to provide supplemental heat and should never be used to warm bedding, cook food, dry clothing or thaw pipes.
- Install smoke alarms on every floor of your home and outside all sleeping areas and test them once a month.
- Proper placement of space heaters is critical. Heaters must be kept at least three feet away from anything that can burn, including papers, clothing and rugs.
- Locate space heaters out of high traffic areas and doorways where they may pose a tripping hazard.
- Plug space heaters directly into a wall outlet. Do not use an extension cord or power strip, which could overheat and result in a fire. Do not plug any other electrical devices into the same outlet as the heater.
- Place space heaters on level, flat surfaces. Never place heaters on cabinets, tables, furniture, or carpet, which can overheat and start a fire.
- Always unplug and safely store the heater when it is not in use.

Notes from the Police Department

The Police Department has received a number of scam complaints where residents have fallen victim and lost large amounts of money. In order to avoid this from happening, here are some helpful suggestions on how to handle these types of calls:

- 1. If anyone calls you and claims to be a representative of your bank, credit card, loan advisor, utility company, etc., <u>DO NOT</u> give them any personal information such as your driver's license number, full name and date of birth, social security number, bank account numbers, PIN numbers, phone numbers, or names of relatives or family members. If they need this information, they will already have it in their system if they are legitimate. If you feel you need to find out what they are inquiring about, hang up and call your bank, credit card company, utility company, etc., personally from the phone number on your monthly statement and not a phone number that they give you over the phone.
- 2. If anyone calls you claiming that you have won a prize, or are eligible for a loan, or other "Free Money", again, <u>DO NOT</u> give them any personal information, and <u>DO NOT</u> purchase any pre-paid cards, gift cards, Amazon cards, cashier checks, personal checks, money orders, etc., and <u>DO NOT</u> give them the security numbers on them. If you have truly won a prize, there is no reason for you to give them money to receive the prize. If they state that it is for tax purposes, it is a scam as the IRS does not work in that manner and will collect the taxes due through your annual income tax filing.
- 3. If anyone calls claiming to be the IRS, a law enforcement agency, or a jail from another state or country, <u>DO NOT</u> send them any money. Law enforcement and the IRS do not operate in this manner and will never call you requesting money. People have lost thousands of dollars by transferring money to out of country "law enforcement jails" who state their loved one is in jail and won't be released until they receive payment, only to find out their loved one has not left the country and is at work or at home. When in doubt, please call our office and we can assist you in verifying whether the call is legitimate or not.
- 4. If anyone calls and states that they need to work on your computer, such as HP Customer Support, or another computer company, <u>DO NOT</u> let them. They are scammers and will be going through all your files in order to find out all of your personal information including your banking information. If your computer needs repair, take it to a reputable local computer repair company.

If you receive any phone calls that appear to be a scam, please hang up your phone. If you feel law enforcement should be aware of the possible scam, please call our office and report it. Many times the caller ID on your phone shows that it is a local number or seems to be the number to a legitimate business, but do not trust it. Many scammers use numbers and piggy back off of legit numbers to get you to trust them and give your money to them. On August 1st, 2019 the new Hands Free Law went into effect. This law states that a driver cannot hold a cell phone in their hands while driving or in the flow of traffic, and must use a voice command hands free device or answer the phone with only one touch. Our department has seen numerous violations to this new law and has written numerous citations. The fine for a first offense is \$135 and a second or subsequent violation is \$360. Please put the phone down or use a hands free device to talk on the phone if you must. **If our officers see you violating this law, you will be cited.** Distracted driving is a leading cause of crashes and injuries, and our department wants to see everyone make it to their destination safely. The City of Motley has a drop box to dispose of unwanted prescriptions located in the entryway at City Hall. Medication must be kept in their original container and personal information should be removed or covered up with black marker. Residents can drop off their unused or expired medications so that they can be disposed of safely and properly. The box is accessible during normal business hours at City Hall.

Notes from the Public Works Department

Please note that City Ordinance indicates carts are supposed to be placed for pickup no earlier than 6:00 p.m. of the evening preceding the collection day and no later than 6:00 a.m. on collection day to ensure your pickup is not missed. Remember to face the lid opening toward the street or alley (handle toward house) and place carts approximately 3 feet apart to allow for mechanical pickup. Please remove carts after collection on the same day unless otherwise directed by City Hall. Carts should be removed from curbside during all other times. *This is especially important now that the plows are out!* Also, please remember to only place RECYCLABLES (not trash) in your recycling cart! IF YOU HAVE MORE TRASH THAN FITS IN YOUR CART, please contact Long Prairie Sanitation directly to arrange pick-up of additional bags.

The ICE SKATING RINK located at the Pet Stop and Recreation Area behind the BP station is iced



and ready to go! There are a limited number of skates in the warming house available for public use; remember to return the skates when you are done so others may enjoy them as well.
