Halloween Safety Tips


The Motley Police Department looks forward to Halloween and seeing all of the local kids dressing up and having a good time. We want to make sure that kids enjoy going from house to house and everyone stays safe, so here are some safety tips for everyone to remember:

- 1. Cross streets at the corners and never dart out between parked vehicles along a street, making sure to look both ways before crossing.
- 2. Always walk on a sidewalk when you can, but if there is no sidewalk, walk facing traffic as far to the left as possible.
- 3. Put electronic devices down such as your phone and keep your head up.
- 4. Watch for cars that are turning or backing up. They may have a hard time seeing you.
- 5. Carry glow sticks or flashlights to help you see and help drivers see you better.
- 6. Select a correctly sized costume to prevent trips and falls
- 7. Wear face paint or makeup, when possible, rather than a mask which may obstruct vision.
- 8. Drivers, slow down and watch carefully for younger children who may unexpectedly run out in front of you and always drive with your headlights on.

Garbage/Recycling Containers

Every Wednesday (may differ during a Holiday week) is garbage pickup day, and every other week includes recycling. The City has been having some issues with residents and their garbage containers where residents are not placing them out to the curb correctly, or not removing them from the curb in a timely manner. With winter fast approaching, it causes even more issues for the City crew plowing snow if everyone doesn't follow the City ordinance which states, that all garbage and recycling containers must be placed behind the curb line, cannot be placed out until after 6pm the day before pickup, and have to be removed and stored in or by a building by 6am the day following pickup. This helps us prevent the snow removal trucks from having to plow around containers or hitting them with their trucks which causes damage. Please help the drivers out by following these rules.

Place carts behind the curb, with the lid opening facing the street.







Winter Travel Safety

Winter will soon be upon us and with that comes snow- and ice-covered roads. Below are a few tips to make your winter traveling a little safer for everyone.

- 1. Make sure that your vehicle is ready for the season. Have it serviced by a reputable company and make sure to have the battery tested. Check to make sure all of the lights work, the windshield wipers are in good condition, the cooling system is full and never let your gas tank get below ¼ tank (1/2 tank minimum is suggested).
- 2. Make sure that your tires have good tread on them. It is very important for all 4 tires to have good tread to assist with proper steering and stopping, and make sure they are properly filled with air. Snow and ice tires work the best, but a good set of all-season tires will work well if properly taken care of.
- 3. Make sure to keep winter survival items in the vehicle. You should carry a small snow shovel, broom and ice scraper, kitty litter for traction in case you get stuck in the snow, warning devices or flares, jumper cables, blankets, flashlight, water and food, and a fully charged cell phone.
- 4. Give yourself plenty of EXTRA TIME. The worst thing you can do on roads with poor conditions is rush. SLOW DOWN and watch out for emergency vehicles, tow trucks, and snow removal trucks. Give them plenty of space to keep everyone safe. NEVER use cruise control if the roads may be wet, slippery, or covered with ice, as it will cause you to lose control of the vehicle.
- 5. If you are involved in an accident, move your vehicle to a safe location out of the traffic lane, onto a shoulder, a nearby cross street, or into a nearby parking lot if mechanically possible. Do not remain in the roadway as you become a safety hazard to everyone else on the roadway, and pose a danger of being struck by another passing vehicle. Moving a short distance to a safe location is not fleeing the scene of an accident. After moving to a safe location, call 911 and report the accident and tell them where you are.
- 6. Call 511 or visit www.511mn.org before leaving on a trip to get current road conditions.

Hunting Safety Tips

Hunting seasons are here, and deer hunting is fast approaching. The police department wants to remind everyone to be safe while hunting and transporting weapons with these tips:

- 1. Treat every firearm (gun, bow, crossbow, etc.) as it is loaded at all times and ALWAYS point it in a safe direction.
- 2. Make sure all guns and bows are unloaded and properly cased while transporting in a vehicle.
- 3. Always know what you are shooting at and what is behind your target as well.
- 4. Wear blaze orange clothing, including a hat.
- 5. Follow all State and Federal hunting rules.

**Also, just a reminder, it is illegal to hunt or fire any kind of weapon in the city limits of Motley even for target practice. This includes all archery (bow and arrow, crossbows, etc.), and all firearms including BB and pellet guns. Violators will be cited and possibly arrested.

Compost Site

Just a reminder to all residents using the compost site. Please be respectful of the site, this is not to be used as a dump for garbage, only compostable items. Please make note of the signage at the site directing you to the correct spots. The finished compost is available for anyone in the city limits free of charge but there is a lot of garbage ending up in it that makes it undesirable. Remember, concrete and tar are **not** acceptable items -these items are accepted at Hengel's in Pillager for free. There are also piles for larger trees & branches over 4" and branches and brush, these items are available for city residents to take if they wish so, please separate those items into the correct piles, your friends or neighbor may be the person needing that wood to help stay warm this winter.

Depending on the weather, fall hydrant flushing will likely begin later on in October, so you may notice reduced water pressure and colored water while that is being done.



Winter Parking

It becomes very difficult for the plow truck to zig-zag through areas where cars are parked on both sides of the street.

From the Motley Fire Department

As the leaves turn from green to orange, the weather cools, and you start preparing for the cold season ahead. You're excited for Halloween and can't wait to start decorating your home. But have you thought about the fire safety risks that arise during the fall? Here are a few important fire safety tips to keep in mind:

Change smoke/carbon detector batteries and test the alarms. When Daylight Savings Time begins and ends, it's a good idea to change your smoke and carbon monoxide detector batteries. This ensures the alarms don't fail when you turn the heat on in your home. Don't forget to also test the smoke alarms after changing the batteries. Check that all fire extinguishers are in working order when you adjust the clocks each season.

Fully check and service your heating devices before cranking up the heat:


- Have your HVAC system inspected, cleaned, and serviced by a certified HVAC contractor. Check and replace furnace filters with high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filters.
- If you use space heaters, ensure there's at least three feet of space around them. Don't place fabrics on space heaters to dry, and turn heaters off when going to bed.

If you've got a fireplace, hire a professional chimney sweep to inspect and clean your chimney. Keep flammable objects at least three feet away from the fireplace and install a mesh metal screen around it.

Halloween safety – Can't wait to decorate your home and mastermind scary costumes for Halloween? Remember that Halloween safety comes first. Keep decorations away from open flames and other heat sources, and use battery-operated lights instead of candles in jack-o-lanterns. We strongly advise you not to use real candles for decorating your home.

Outdoor fire risks – As leaves and other flammable debris build up around your home, make it a habit to remove them periodically. Prune trees and rake up leaves and twigs. Don't store fuel in your home or garage. Keep your roof, gutters, and downspouts clear of debris and remove fuel from lawn mowers before storing them for winter.

Create a fire escape plan and practice it regularly. Say a fire breaks out at 2 AM and your smoke alarms wake you and your family up – what do you do? This is when the fire escape plan comes into play. Designate an escape route for each area of your home and establish a meeting place outside. Practice escaping your home while staying low to avoid breathing in smoke. Also practice escaping through windows using emergency ladders.




Community Events
