

Candidate Name on Ballot – Summary Guide

(Utah Code § 20A-6-109)

Default Name Format

Legal First Name & Legal Last Name

Using Your Middle Name Instead of Your First Name

Allowed if all of the following are met:

- 1. You normally go by your middle name (or a common derivative).
- 2. By 5:00 p.m. on the last day of the declaration of candidacy period, you submit:
 - 1. A written request specifying the middle name or derivative.
 - 2. An affidavit by you, under penalty of perjury, affirming you are commonly known by that name.
 - 3. Affidavits, under penalty of perjury, from five non-family county residents stating you are commonly known by that name.

Using a Nickname

Allowed if all of the following are met:

- 1. The nickname may not:
 - 1. Imply you are someone else (living or dead).
 - 2. Be a slogan.
 - 3. Associate the candidate with an economic, religious, political, or other group, issue, or opinion.
 - 4. Be offensive, profane, or spurious.
 - 5. Be a title, rank, degree, certification, job description, or similar designation.
 - 2. By 5:00 p.m. on the last day of the declaration of candidacy period, you submit:
 - 1. A written request with the desired nickname and placement.
 - 2. An affidavit by you, under penalty of perjury, affirming common use and you are not using the nickname to gain an advantage on the ballot.
 - 3. Affidavits, under penalty of perjury, from five non-family county residents that you are generally known by that nickname.

Nickname Placement Options

You may place the nickname:

- 1. Before or after your legal first name
- 2. Before or after your legal middle name if on the ballot
- 3. In place of your legal first name

Simplified Nickname Use

If the nickname is a common short form of your legal first name (e.g., Mike for Michael), you may request it without affidavits—just a written request by 5 p.m. on the day the declaration of candidacy period ends. You may use your middle name initial between your first and last name, or use your first initial before your middle name.

Rejected or Ignored Requests

- 1. The Election Officer must respond within five (5) business days.
- 2. If rejected or no response, you may appeal to the court within five (5) days.

Name Conflicts

Election Officer may add a legal middle name or negotiate another differentiation if candidates have similar names.

Ballot Order Rules

- 1. Ballot order is based on a randomized alphabet list using your legal surname.
- 2. Legal name governs ballot placement, even if a nickname or middle name is used.
