The rand is trading at R18.21 against the dollar 18 cents weaker in the last week. The rand remains skittish at this stage as the market awaits the appointment of the cabinet ministers. Should the beforementioned lead to conflict and the deterioration of the Government of National Unity (GNU) then we will likely see the rand bear the brunt of it. Alternatively perceived positive appointments in key cabinet positions will lead to further rand strength.

# <u>Soya bean meal:</u>

Soya bean meal for Jul 2024 is currently trading at 364.6 dollars per short ton up 7.8 dollars which is 2% higher from last week, with forward contracts trading higher by 1.34% and 0.03% respectively. Soya beans are up 0.19% on the nearby, with forward contracts lower by 0.94% and 1.24% respectively. Oil is down sharply by more than 3% on all the months. Fob premiums are little changed from last week, but bean and meal spreads found support as heavy rains and flood damage in Minnesota and the northern parts of the upper Mid-West provided support. As a result of beforementioned the slower crush and logistical issues is likely to support nearby prices, with deferred months not that effected at this stage unless we see significant acreage losses.



### Midwest:

Flooding continues to be an issue along the Minnesota-Iowa border through southern Wisconsin. Storms that developed Monday night made that worse in Wisconsin. Several more storm systems will move through the region going into next week, providing some better shower chances for those in the south and east that have been very hot and dry for the last week or two. The rain should help with flash drought conditions that are developing in some areas. The pattern stays active well into July, a favourable look to the forecast. Northwestern areas would like to see a break and dry conditions but will not find it.

### Southern Plains:

Temperatures will remain hot in the Central and Southern Plains for the next few days, especially south. A front will move through with chances for thunderstorms Tuesday and Wednesday and another will move through Thursday through the weekend with more and some cooler air, especially north. The active storm track is favouring northern and western areas with rain while southeastern areas are getting drier after flooding rains in May and early June. The heat will be stressful to crops when it exists, but those across the north are seeing better precipitation and mostly good conditions for developing corn and soybeans.

### Northern Plains:


Flooding continues to be an issue for southeastern South Dakota. A system is still producing showers in South Dakota on Tuesday and another will bring scattered showers through the region later this week and weekend. Another moves through early next week, keeping the region active. Temperatures will waffle around as systems come and go but much colder temperatures are forecast for the weekend. There is a slight risk of frost in some areas.

### Delta:

It was quiet in the Delta over the weekend with increasing heat. A front will move through on Wednesday and Thursday with widespread showers and thunderstorms forecast and a slight drop in temperatures. But the break from the heat is brief, with temperatures rising again to end the week. Models are forecasting occasional fronts to drift into the region going into July, but not with heavy precipitation, which may be stressful with the higher temperatures.

### **Canadian Prairies:**

Scattered showers went through the Canadian Prairies over the weekend and multiple systems that will move through over the next couple of weeks will continue that trend. Some areas of heavy rain and severe weather will be possible with each system that passes through. Overall, good soil moisture is likely to be maintained, though eastern areas could still use some drier conditions as soggy soils are more widespread there. Temperatures will be variable, but trend cooler late this week and weekend. Some limited frost will be possible, but unlikely to be widespread.


### Brazil:

A front moved back into southern Brazil over the weekend, but the forecast for heavy rain has diminished. Some rain will get into southern safrinha corn areas, but the lack of heavy rain will allow harvest to continue. Another front will move in Friday and Saturday with more scattered showers but also a burst of colder air. Though some frosts will be possible, it will be unlikely to have an effect on either mature corn or

germinating winter wheat. Heavy rain from last month and last week continue to limit wheat planting, however.

### Argentina:

Isolated showers went through Argentina over the weekend but were light and spotty. Rainfall deficits continue to build up and soil moisture is low for winter wheat establishment. Some more isolated showers will go through this week and a front later this week will bring in a burst of colder temperatures that will produce some frosts for a couple of days.

### South Africa:

The rest of this week, mainly dry conditions are forecasted in the sub-continent. However, there are some activities in the far eastern parts of Mpumalanga and southern Mozambique expected today and tomorrow with light rain in store, note images above. Next southern frontal event is expected the weekend in the Cape region with rain expected along the southern coastal areas and possibly in the southern and eastern interior early next week. Next southern frontal event expected midweek next week in the Cape regions. No snow forecasted during the next week. The interior is in the process of heating up a bit with much less frost in store.
