## Terry and Liz Smith star mare

# WINS THE WILLINGA PARK GOLD BUCKLE

When the pressure is at its peak and only 1.5 points separate you from the pinnacle of campdrafting, what do you do? If you're part of the team behind Vintage Whiskey Q-81337, you wait, and hold your breath for the perfect run. "We were just hoping a cow would come into the yard that would suit her and Hughie," they recall. "If she could finish in the top 10 of the Willinga Park Gold Buckle, we would've been over the moon." But what followed, was a moment they'll remember forever.



he moment Hugh Miles posted a 91-point round in the final at the 2025 Willinga Park Gold Buckle, everything changed.

"Terry was yelling 'Go little girl!' over and over at the screen," they laugh. "When that score came through, I started shaking. We suddenly realised—we were in with a chance of winning the Willinga Park Gold Buckle!"

With some elite horse-and-rider combinations still to come, they could barely sit still. Then came the flood of messages—texts, calls, congratulations. But they wouldn't believe it until the draft was done.

"When the final finished, I looked at Terry and said, 'Did we just win Willinga Park?' It was surreal. We got very emotional. We've never won anything this big before."

The outpouring of support from the campdrafting community was overwhelming. "It was the best feeling—an absolute dream come true."

The road to that dream began long before Willinga Park. Vintage Whiskey Q-81337—lovingly called "Vintage"—

is a mare with a backstory that blends high hopes, setbacks, and resilience. She was purchased at the 2015 NCHA Sale, and bred by Jason and Rachel Leitch. She was sired by RS Chisum, out of Winderadeen Whiskey Cat. The aim at the time was to take her through the NCHA Futurity, and later into the campdrafting world.

"She was bred for it," they say. "Plenty of cow sense, and athletic—what we thought would be ideal for both disciplines."

But fate had other plans. An injury as a three-year-old ended her cutting career before it began. Vintage was turned out for a long recovery period and didn't have her first campdraft start until 2020, at the age of seven—just before Covid put the brakes on the sport.

Despite the slow start, her natural instincts never dulled. And her temperament? "She's probably the sweetest horse we've ever owned," they say. "Kind, easy to be around. Her only vice is food—she loves it! She'll whinny and paw until she's fed."

Vintage's journey from paddock to podium was shaped by a small but meaningful circle. Jason Leitch started her in cutting, Terry gave her a start in the drafting world, and then their two daughters Kaitlin and Abbey took the reins. In 2023, when the girls stepped back due to work, they offered Vintage to family friend Brent Trotter, knowing Terry was too tall to ride her competitively.

Brent clicked with her instantly. He finalled her multiple times and secured her first draft win. But when Willinga Park 2025 came around, they turned again to Hugh Miles—a rider they'd always admired.

"We love the way Hughie rides—he's kind in the hands, he rates cattle well, and looks after his horses. He'd taken our stallion Treasured Acres to Willinga Park before and made the final. Vintage is a smaller mare—so Hughie really suited her."

In the lead-up to Willinga, the focus was on fitness and fine-tuning. Vintage worked regularly with their daughter Kaitlin and had a strong run with Hughie at the KPH Dash for Cash the weekend prior, finaling in the Open.

"She doesn't need anything fancy," they explain. "She gets trotted up a few times a week, works the mechanical cow, and occasionally sees live cattle. She loves it—it's what makes her so easy to prepare."

And it shows. What she lacks in size, she makes up for in heart. "She gives everything she's got, every time."

As the final round approached at Willinga Park, the field was stacked. "It was extremely tight—any of those combinations could've taken it. It would come down to the cows. We were lucky enough to draw 13th out and get fresh cows."

The run was sharp, fast, and full of feel. When the score came in, the celebration began—but the disbelief lingered until the very end. Adding to the pride was winning the AQHA Incentive Buckle, awarded to the top-placed registered Quarter Horse in the Willinga Park Gold Buckle.

"To be recognised by the AQHA Breed Association in such an elite field—it meant the world to us."

Programs like the AQHA Incentive, they believe, are vital for encouraging recognition and giving owners a sense of community. "It gives people a reason to stay involved—it creates belonging."


So, what's next for the little mare with the big heart?

After a well-deserved spell to freshen up, Vintage has just come back into work. She'll do a few local drafts in spring

before heading to the breeding barn later in the year. But don't worry—you'll see her again.

She will definitely be back to defend her title. Hughie's keen to take her again."

In the meantime, she'll be out and about with Brent Trotter, with an eye toward the ABCRA National Finals in September and hopefully the Big Three in Queensland—Condamine Bell, Chinchilla, and the Warwick Gold Cup.

From injury to iconic, from sweet paddock pony to Willinga Park Gold Buckle Champion, Vintage Whiskey is living proof that heart, timing, and a little bit of patience can take you to the very top.

"She's got the heart of a lion, the mind of a champion, and the sweetest nature you could ask for." say the Smith Family.

"We always knew she had something special. Now, thanks to the right timing, the right people, and a whole lot of heart, the rest of the world does too."

And honestly? We're still saying it: "Did we really just win the Willinga Park Gold Buckle?"

## Holly Skopp

#### 1. Tell us briefly about yourself.

I reside in Haigslea QLD with my husband Kane Skopp. We specialize in training AQHA Pleasure, Hunter, and All-Around horses alongside my mum, Carolyn Johnson at Rockin Horse Ranch.

#### 2. When did you begin training and what made you want to be a trainer?

After my youth, I spent seven years training under the guidance of my mum, 'Carolyn Johnson Show Horses', which laid a strong foundation for my career. Horses have always been my focus, and I was fortunate from a young age to gain experience riding a wide range of horses across various ages and stages of development. This exposure ultimately inspired me to pursue the goal of running my own business. I've always preferred working outdoors and enjoy the process of teaching a horse to progress and reach its potential.

#### 3. Which horse riding discipline do you enjoy?

My favourite is possibly the Western Riding, it's a challenge and when it's executed correctly it's a beautiful event to watch. I believe finding the event that your horse is most suited to your horse always makes it more enjoyable.

#### **4.** How long have you been involved in Quarter horses? My entire life, my parents Carolyn and Fred Johnson are both Quarter Horse trainers and breeders.

#### 5. What and who has inspired you the most as a trainer/rider?

My mum, Carolyn, and my husband, Kane. My mum began training horses in the early 80s when western horses were truly allrounders, some showing in the cutting and the pleasure in the same day. With her extensive knowledge, she continues to train today with the same dedication and commitment to her clients in making their dreams come true. She's constantly inspiring me to grow not only in the show pen but also in the care we provide for our horses and the pride we take in our business. Kane, my biggest supporter, is always pushing toward the next goal. His determination to become a better horseman and evolving have played a huge role in our success. He challenges me to continually improve my training and is constantly forward thinking in our breeding program.

#### 6. How long have you been competing/training?

I began showing Cutting Horses when I was 7. I showed NCHA Hall of Fame horse 'Freckles Fancy Oak' and later moved on to showing AQHA all round horses when I was

#### 7. Best advice you could give to someone starting out?

Find some show buddies and learn all you can. As you progress, find what events are best suited to your horse and build on those strengths. Many frustrations can come from asking your horse to do something it's not capable of doing. Try sourcing out a local respected trainer and invest in some lessons.

#### 8. Who are the people who have helped you the most and influenced you?

Aside from my Kane and my parents, Mary and Bill Gale. The most generous and caring people who did everything to help us, not just in the horse world but everyday life. They treated us like we were family and Mary in particular, had a deep passion for spreading her love of the Quarter Horse and the Western industry. She welcomed so many AQHA members into the community, often gifting horses and tack to help them get started. This past Q Nationals she was there to watch her Son and great grandchild compete.

#### 9. What is your proudest moment showing Quarter Horses so far?



# THREE MARES One Passion

After time away from the show ring, Donna Grech has returned to the Quarter Horse Western Pleasure industry—not as a beginner, but as someone with a deep-rooted love for the sport and a refined eye for excellence. Her journey is one of rediscovery, resilience, and reignited passion for the partnership between horse and rider.

#### FROM THE BEGINNING-AGAIN

"In 2012, after a long break, I found myself drawn back to horses," Donna recalls. "I had shown Appaloosas for a few years before deciding it was time to switch over to Quarter Horses."

That decision would become the foundation for a whole new chapter. What started as a return to a familiar love quickly became a mission: to once again be part of a world that she had missed dearly.

"I just love watching a good pleasure horse," she explains. "The softness, the cadence—it's like watching a graceful ballerina. It may not be as easy as it looks, but when you get it right, the feeling is amazing."

#### THE HORSES THAT FOUND HER

As Donna settled back into the industry, she began building her dream team of horses—each with a story, a personality, and a unique connection to her.

She first spotted Last Of The Classics Q-103323, affectionately known as Clara, as a weanling. "I wasn't ready to buy at the time," she says. But in 2023, while attending NSBA in Tulsa, Donna decided the timing was right to inspect a few yearlings in person. Clara was on her shortlist—but it was love at first sight.

"She was better in person than in the videos—lovely top line, great legs, and such a sweet, people-friendly nature. I was lucky to have Kane, Holly, and Caroline there for guidance, and I'm so thankful Jay and Kristy Starnes agreed to sell her to me before the sale."

Her second addition, Holey Cow Batt Man Q-98130—or Bailey—was a serendipitous find. Donna had nearly given up on finding a weanling when she saw Bailey's newborn photo on Machine Made's Facebook page. "I contacted her breeder, Jean, and when I saw a video of her loping through the paddock with her dam, I knew instantly—she was the one."

The third, Southern Whispers IMP Q-95946, known as Caroline, was imported in 2020 after a friend suggested she reach out to Jennifer Stiens. "I was looking for a going mare, and she turned out to be exactly what I needed."

#### **MORE THAN RIBBONS**

With all three horses, Donna has focused not just on results, but on progress. "With Clara, I don't show her yet, but I love watching her improve at every event, it has been so rewarding. She's getting stronger, softer, and more solid in her work—she genuinely loves her job."

Bailey, on the other hand, has proven to be the easiest ride. "It comes naturally to her. She gives me confidence that I can do it."

Then there's Caroline—powerful, sensitive, and intelligent. "She's made me a better rider. I have to

be more aware of my hands, legs, and pressure—but I think I've finally got it right... at least some of the time"

All three mares have had standout wins at Nationals, Sizzler, and NPHA, but for Donna, it's not about the ribbons. "What I'm most proud of is when I improve on my last run—when I go out there and feel like I did my personal best."

#### THE BONDS THAT MATTER

Behind every show ring success is a team—and Donna is quick to recognize hers.

"I'm so lucky to have my horses with Kane and Holly Skopp. They train and prepare them to perfection, and Holly is an amazing, patient teacher. We're a great fit. The way they train the horses makes it easier for them to adjust to me, and their support gives me real confidence."

That support is vital, especially on show days. "My body doesn't always cooperate, and I get nervous and put pressure on myself—but my team, both human and horse, gets me through. I love this, so it's worth it."

She also credits her husband, who's "not so horsey," for his constant support. "He gives me the opportunity to do what I love, and that means everything."

#### FINDING JOY IN THE JOURNEY

So what defines a good pleasure horse, in Donna's eyes?

"It's that natural top line, the lift, the cadence, the softness in their legs—it's effortless for them. And of course, a good mind is essential."

Asked what advice she'd give to newcomers, Donna offers simple but powerful wisdom: "Find a trainer or mentor you feel comfortable with. Trust their guidance, and be patient."

And finally, what matters most? "The friendships I've made along the way. My barn family is so supportive. Nothing is ever too hard for them."

#### **LOOKING AHEAD**

As Donna continues to grow with her horses, her goals remain grounded and heartfelt.

"I just want to keep improving, to be more consistent. My girls are all special in their own way—I just want them to go out, do their best, and enjoy it. And I can't wait for their future babies."

For Donna Grech, the ride isn't just about competition—it's about connection, passion, and purpose. Her return to the Quarter Horse Western Pleasure industry is a reminder that it's never too late to follow your heart, trust your gut, and let the horses lead the way.

# A Mother-Daughter Journey with HOIHO AT TO TABLE

Nancy and her family's introduction to the Quarter Horse world began not in an arena, but on a cattle property. After marrying her husband and joining life on the land, she quickly saw the value of incorporating Quarter Horses with strong working bloodlines into their daily operations. "It didn't take me long to convince him," she laughs.

heir journey began with the purchase of a young colt and several well-bred mares. But it was during one of those early purchases that fate stepped in. Among the mares stood a rising three-year-old unbroken gelding—Sandman. "We definitely weren't there to buy a gelding," Nancy recalls, "but there was just something special about him." Both Nancy and Alicia were captivated by his presence, they brought him home and started him under saddle—unwittingly beginning a journey that "something special" would eventually turn Sandman into not just a working partner, but a family legend.

Alicia's passion for show jumping was born in the bush, long before she ever set foot in a competition ring. Riding independently from the age of four, she was already mustering cattle on her family's property. Alongside her three older brothers, Alicia spent her childhood turning natural obstacles into makeshift jump courses—logs, gullies, and anything they could find to challenge one another. "It became a game to see who could jump the highest," she recalls. That competitive spark led Alicia and her brother Jacob to their local Pony Club, where she got her first taste of structured show jumping. The thrill was instant. Recognizing their enthusiasm, her parents bought a seasoned show jumping mare to help her learn the ropes.






With the basics under her belt, Alicia brought in Sandman, stepping up a level and never looking back. Today, it's still the adrenaline, the challenge, and the precision of cutting a smart, shortened course that fuels her love for the sport.

For Nancy, watching her daughter Alicia grow as a rider with Sandman by her side has been nothing short of inspiring. From a young age, Alicia showed a natural devotion to horsemanship—working with her first breaker at just 12 and committing herself fully to training and caring for multiple horses. But it's the partnership between her and Sandman that has truly captured Nancy's heart. "They've shared miles together," she says—whether mustering cattle, navigating mountain country, or leaping logs and gullies with no room for error. Out there, there are no safety nets—just instinct, trust, and finely tuned communication. Every shift in balance, every cue, is deeply ingrained between them. It's this unspoken connection and their shared "no turning back" mindset that translates so powerfully into the show jumping ring. "They have each other's backs," Nancy says with pride. "They're a finely tuned team—and I love watching the magic."

Asking Nancy and Alicia what makes Sandman such a standout, and their admiration is instant and heartfelt. For Alicia, it's his laidback, cool-headed nature—no matter where he goes, Sandman remains calm and composed, yet ready to give everything when it's time to perform. "You can point him at a cow or a one-metre jump and say go, and he'll give you his all," Alicia says. It's this reliability, paired with his agility and willingness, that makes him her perfect partner-especially for those tight, technical shortened courses Alicia loves to ride. Nancy sees in him the kind of horse you dream about: trainable, responsive, athletic, and genuinely kind. "Sometimes I wonder if he's even awake," she laughs. "But the second Alicia says 'let's go,' it's game on. He puts his heart into every run, then walks out like, 'Job done." A horse with exceptional talent and an even bigger heart, Sandman, they both agree, would have excelled at any discipline. He's more than a competition horse—he's a once-in-a-lifetime partner. Sandman is a treasure.

After an unforeseen break from Showjumping in 2023 Alicia was keen to get to 2024 Pony Club Queensland State Championships. Their consistency and finesse saw them take home the Champion title for Jumping Equitation. But the real test began on day three. In the first Show Jumping class, a single rail down cost them, but Alicia regrouped and came back strong in the Power and







Speed round, riding a technically daring shortened course that no other rider attempted—and winning it. In the third Class, Grand Prix, they made it to the final round but knocked one rail, giving them a 6th place and a 5th overall for 2024 Show Jumping Championships. Alicia came away confident with a new goal for 2025.

2025 Pony Club Queensland State Championships, Alicia put a lot of time into Sandman and mentally had a goal to reach. Then it poured rain for a week and flooded, "we were lucky to get out in time to compete". Over four days, Nancy witnessed Alicia's total commitment to her training and goals. The first two days were devoted to Jumping Equitation, which Alicia used strategically as calm, low-pressure rounds to prepare both herself and Sandman for what truly mattered—Show Jumping.

In the first class, Alicia and Sandman took it careful coming in with a close 2nd place. Class two, Power and Speed, pulling off a smooth and seamless run saw them to 1st place. The title was almost in her grasp, then came the Grand Prix: three rounds, increasing difficulty. Alicia and Sandman rode clear in the first two. In round three, with jumps sitting at 1 metre, Alicia had a bold, high-risk short course in mind. Sandman, sensing the gravity of the moment, was all in. As they entered the arena, their team motto echoed: "Leave it all on the course." What followed was a performance so sharp and seamless it drew gasps from the crowd. When they cleared the final fence, they had not only sealed the lead but set a new standard. "That was the best short course I've seen," the judge later told her. Against a field of tough competition, no other rider could match their precision and pace. That day, Alicia and Sandman didn't just win the Pony Club Queensland State Show Jumping Championship they made a statement about heart, partnership, and the power of belief. "Sandman did justice to all Quarter Horses that day," Nancy said proudly. "Alicia had a goal, and together, they gave it everything."

As horse owners and competitors it's not just measured in ribbons or titles—it's found in the deep bond they've built with their horse, especially Sandman. Alicia reflects on the, pure partnership that's been forged over years of working together across the pony club, showgrounds, and the rugged terrain of their family property. "That feeling of complete trust," she says, "is rewarding enough." It's during the boldest shortened courses that Sandman truly shines. Navigating tight corners with barely a stride between the turn and the jump, where most horses might

hesitate or clip a rail, Sandman locks in—finding his footing, reading the moment, and giving everything he has. "To pull off those tight courses, we both have to be totally in the zone," Alicia explains. "If I don't ask, he won't just do it on his own. We have to commit—completely." It's in those seconds of mutual focus and trust, when horse and rider are pushing the edge of possibility, that Alicia feels most proud of the team they've become.

Over the past four years since Sandman began competing in jumping, the duo have overcome their share of challenges and learned countless lessons—efforts that have paid off in the past two seasons. In 2024, Sandman was crowned State Jumping Equitation Champion for the 13 & Under 26 Years 70cm class, and in 2025, they reached another milestone, claiming the State Show Jumping Champion title for the 80cm class in the same age division. For Nancy, the rewards come from a broader perspective. "Our horses are more than competitors—they're our mates, our work partners, our team," she explains. From breeding and raising them to watching them give their all in the ring, it's the quiet, loyal effort of these horses that brings the greatest sense of pride. "That moment when you know your horse gave their best—that's the most rewarding part of all."

For Alicia and Nancy, their shared passion for horses has become more than a hobby-it's a defining thread in their motherdaughter bond. Horse competitions have affectionately earned the title of their "girl trips," the only time of year when they step away from the demands of life on the property. While these events may not offer the relaxation of a traditional holiday filled instead with prep, pressure, and plenty of nerves—they offer something more meaningful: time together, shared goals, and mutual support. "We definitely get to see each other at our highs and our lows," Alicia says. "It would be a lot harder without Mum." Back home, Alicia has grown into an independent and capable horsewoman, managing Sandman's care—from feeding and exercise to barefoot trimming—with a maturity beyond her years. Nancy steps in as a mentor and sounding board, always ready to guide or learn alongside her daughter. But at competitions, the roles shift slightly. Nancy takes on the allimportant role of support crew-strapper, scheduler, feeder, and steady presence—so Alicia can stay focused. "I've learned to only suggest short courses and let her commit," Nancy laughs. "Sometimes I'll ask what turns are you going to try, she'll just say, 'all of them,' and that's my cue to step back and let her do her thing." Their seamless teamwork is built not just on logistics but on deep respect, shared experience, and the unspoken

understanding only years of riding—and growing—together can bring.

Sandman's competition preparation is as varied as it is purposeful, designed to keep both his body and mind in peak condition. Alicia ensures his training regime stays fresh by rotating between sand work, boundary riding, free jumping, and mustering—activities that build strength, cardio fitness, and responsiveness. Mustering across rugged terrain and navigating natural obstacles like gullies and logs keeps him agile and sure-footed, while flatwork and jumping combinations fine-tune his focus for the arena. Nancy adds that their goal is always to keep Sandman "fit and mentally fresh," believing that a horse needs to love what he does just as much as the rider does. It's a philosophy that clearly fuels their success.

In the early stages of their jumping career, Alicia and Sandman faced a common yet challenging hurdle—excitement. Once Sandman discovered his love for jumping, he became overly eager in the ring, rushing through courses, resisting Alicia's cues to steady. Despite her efforts to communicate through her seat and voice, the gelding was becoming increasingly hot to handle with precision. The breakthrough came when they returned to the fundamentals, stripping back their training to focus solely on flatwork and control. Through patience and consistency, Sandman began to listen and respond to Alicia's leg and rein aids, eventually regaining the composure and partnership needed for success in the jumping ring.

Reflecting on their journey, Alicia is quick to acknowledge the emotional rewards of horse ownership and competition. While the pressure and stress are very real, the true fulfillment comes from knowing she and Sandman gave their best. "I never ride to be the winner," Alicia shares.

"I ride to the best of my horse's ability." Alicia's advice to other aspiring riders is simple but powerful: ignore the pressure, focus on your own journey, and be proud of what you achieve as a team. Nancy echoes this sentiment, emphasising the importance of finding the right horse. "It won't be perfect at the start," she says, "but if you commit to that horse, the bond will grow, and so will the results—just in small steps." Time, trust, and dedication, they both agree, are non-negotiable.

Looking ahead, Alicia is keen to see just how far her partnership with Sandman can go. With plans to return to another State Championship, provided Sandman remains fit and able, but she is also preparing a young horse to step up into higher classes. He is taller—above 14.3hh. But Alicia says "I'll be putting everything I've learned from Sandman into this horse, my heart remains with the Quarter Horse breed, whose calm temperament and quick thinking nature, has rivaled 17hh jumping bred horses in the ring." Sandman has gone up against a horse that we believe would have been 17hh, and won, that was for his 1.30m personal best. And he has had many wins against 16hh horses, Sandman is about 14.2 and a half on a good day.

Sandman may have started out as an unexpected purchase, but he's become much more—a steady partner, a fierce competitor, and the heart of a family's riding journey.

For Nancy and Alicia, the story isn't just about winning. It's about learning, trusting, and growing—together. "Every ride," Alicia says, "he shows me how much he's willing to give. That's all I could ever ask."









## - REINING AUSTRALIA -

BEHIND THE BUCKLES
THE HEART AND SOUL OF THE 2025 REINING AUSTRALIA NATIONALS

Nationals week at Tamworth's AELEC isn't just a horse show.

It's a pilgrimage — a gathering of old friends, new faces, and the horses we've spent countless hours preparing to show on the sport's biggest Australian stage.











his year's Reining Australia National Championships and Gold Buckle Futurity didn't just meet expectations; it surpassed them. From the smell of fresh coffee drifting through the barns at sunrise to the floodlit glory of late-night finals, it was a week where everything came together: world-class competition, deep-rooted camaraderie, and moments that will live in memory long after the last truck leaves.

#### THE EARLY MORNING RITUALS

Before a single run was called, the mornings were already humming with life. Riders and supporters gathered at the free competitor breakfasts — plates piled with bacon, eggs, and toast, hands wrapped around steaming mugs of coffee. Conversations flowed easily: seasoned campaigners swapping last-minute pattern advice, first-timers listening intently, and trainers quietly running through mental checklists for the day ahead.

Out in the warm-up arenas, the sound of loping hoofbeats and the rhythmic swoosh of spins mixed with laughter and goodnatured teasing. Every so often a cheer would rise when a horse nailed a stop or a spin. Meanwhile, the volunteers worked quietly in the background, dragging the arenas, checking the draws, running errands, and solving problems before anyone else even noticed them — the invisible backbone of the event.

#### A NIGHT FOR LEGENDS

Midway through the week, competition paused for something special: the Hall of Fame inductions and High Point presentations. The room was full, hats in hands, as stories of past champions and industry trailblazers unfolded. There were bursts of laughter at show ring antics from years gone by, moments of silence for those we've lost, and tears for achievements decades in the making.

For newcomers, it was a crash course in the rich history of Australian reining. For long-time competitors, it was a reminder that the Nationals are not just about this year's winners — they're about honouring the people, horses, and moments that have shaped the sport.

#### THE FUTURITY - WHERE STARS ARE BORN

The Gold Buckle Futurity has always been the heartbeat of the Nationals — the place where the next generation of stars emerges. This year, it delivered two unforgettable stories and a full lineup of champions across all levels.

When Ashleigh Backhouse and Mondure Oh What A Nite entered the arena for the Level 4 Open Futurity, sponsored by Gold Buckle Trainers & Owners, the crowd leaned forward. Their run was pure electricity — stops buried deep into the dirt, spins that blurred into perfect pivots, and circles so precise they looked like they'd been drawn with a compass. By the time they slid to a halt on their final maneuver, the roar from the stands left no doubt: the buckle was theirs.

The other Open Futurity champions earned their titles in equally











commanding fashion. Shane Sainsbury and Reddy Set Showtime powered to the Level 3 win with an athletic, high-energy run that combined control with flair. In Level 2, Kailie Mudge and Einstrins Dunit Downunder laid down a smooth, correct pattern that showcased the kind of consistency every rider dreams of.

On the Non Pro side, Corey Smith and HPH Whizkey At The Bar pulled off one of the most impressive performances of the week. Sweeping Levels 4 (Equilume), 3 (SD Hydraulics & Hoses), and 2 (Natures Farmacy), Corey's polished, confident runs had the crowd behind them every step of the way. Their ability to also step into the Open competition and hold their own against the pros was a testament to the hours of preparation behind the scenes.

The Futurity, as always, gave us more than just winners — it gave us the first glimpse of future Derby contenders, the horses that will shape reining's next chapter in Australia.

#### **DERBY DRAMA AND HISTORY**

If the Futurity gave us goosebumps, the Derby delivered pure, history-making magic.

In the Open Derby Level 4, sponsored by AQHA, Lana Kelderman and Nu Too Much delivered the run of a lifetime — huge, fast circles, crisp rollbacks, and sliding stops that sent waves of dust rolling into the crowd. When the score came in, the arena erupted — they had not only won the title but matched the highest score ever run in Australia.

Sharing in that exact moment of history, Tyler Smith and Q Vista Step It Up laid down a single, flawless run that did double duty — counting for both the Open Derby Level 4 and the Non Pro Derby Level 4, sponsored by Howden. That one ride not only secured Tyler the Non Pro championship but also matched the all-time highest score ever recorded in the country. Two riders, two horses, two record scores — all in the same class, all on the same night. It was Nationals magic at its best.









In the other Derby divisions, Michael Toohey and Funtime Chic put on a masterclass of consistency, winning both the Open Derby Level 3 (Scoot Boots) and Level 2 (Beta Vet). Each ride showcased the combination of precision and poise that defines great Derby performances.

#### **BEYOND THE ARENA**

While the big runs made the headlines, the heartbeat of the Nationals could be found in every corner of the grounds.

Youth riders like Tomi Rose Elliott and Isabella Bailey inspired with their courage and skill, showing that the future of Australian reining is bright. Green Rider competitors, led by Shootout champion Teresa Toohey, reminded us that every champion starts somewhere — and that passion is as important as experience.

Specialty classes brought their own flavour. Brooke Du Plessis' Freestyle win on JA Shiney Nu Dunnit was as entertaining as it was technically sound, combining personality and precision. In Masters, Donna Sadler demonstrated that age is no barrier to excellence, while Karen Lowe's Prime Time win brought the crowd to their feet.

Between runs, the barns were alive with moments of friendship and teamwork: someone offering a hand with saddling, a quick pep talk before the gate, or a group gathered around a phone replaying a run they'd just cheered for. Kids darted between trade stands with showbags, stopping to pat a horse or watch a warm-up spin. The soundtrack was a mix of music, laughter, and the rhythmic sound of hooves on dirt.

#### THE UNSUNG HEROES

No event of this scale happens without a small army behind the scenes. The arena crew kept the ground perfect, ensuring safe, fair footing for every competitor. Office staff worked long hours to keep draws, scores, and announcements flowing without a hitch. Gate marshals, announcers, scribes, and judges all played their part in delivering a smooth, professional show.

Sponsors were once again the cornerstone of success, stepping up to support everything from major championship divisions to youth prizes. Their commitment not only makes events like the Nationals possible but ensures the continued growth of reining across the country.

#### THE FINAL BUCKLE

As the last class wrapped up and the final buckle was presented, there was a shared feeling that went beyond trophies. The Nationals had delivered it all: fierce competition, personal milestones, record-breaking performances, and the joy of being part of something bigger than ourselves.

Trucks began to roll out, horses settled for the trip home, and conversations turned to the year ahead.

If you were there, you'll carry the sound of the crowd and the feel of the arena dirt under your boots for months to come. And while we don't yet know where the Nationals will call home in 2026, one thing's certain — wherever it is, the passion, talent, and camaraderie that define this event will be there waiting for you.

# TROPICANA CLASSIC

he 5th Annual Tropicana Classic was held at the Queensland State Equestrian Centre from the 3rd to the 13th of July. The Tropicana Classic is comprised of four shows over the two weeks of competition, the ARCHA Hackamore Classic, the Johnson's Natural Formula Versatility Ranch Show, a Western Performance Show and Barrel Race. The Tropicana Classic events again saw huge numbers of horses competing, with 400 horses and over 350 competitors competing over the four shows, with payout of over \$65,000 in prize money, plus products, buckles and vouchers.

This year we had 4 International judges and 3 Australian judges present, with competitors travelling from across QLD, NSW and VIC.

Australian Reined Cow Horse Association Hackamore Classic & Johnsons Natural Formula Versatility Ranch Show: Mr Morgan Lybert (USA), Mr David Young (NZ), and Mr Andrew Shields (AUS) judged the first week of competition. The first week of competition saw 100 horses and 90 competitors, competing in the cow horse, boxing and versatility ranch events. This year was also our 2nd year hosting a team roping invitational, and we had 16 teams competing over two go-rounds.

This year we teamed up with the Central Queensland Quarter Horse Association to host the Sun State Series, offering cash incentives and buckles to promote the cow horse sport in Queensland. Congratulations to Jordyn Bentley and Rhondhu Cracker Duck (Open Bridle Champions) and Patrick Hoppgood and Oaks Stylish Windstorm (Open Two-Handed Champions).

We offered a Super Ranch Horse Incentive for the highest scoring working ranch horse competing over the ranch cutting, ranch cow work and ranch roping. Congratulations to Stephen Kelly & Hell Reysn Spin for their success in these events.























































## FEEDING FERTILITY

Of all the domesticated animals, horses have the lowest fertility rate. This may be because horses are selectively bred for their performance and conformation characteristics rather than their fertility.

of influencing environmental and management issues and the animals themselves.





FIGURE 1, Diagram representing a stallion spermatozoon (Image obtained from Amann & Pickett, 1987)

What makes a fertile sperm? Like all cells, sperm need oxygen and, as a consequence, are faced with the oxygen paradox; oxygen is necessary for sustained life, but the waste products of using oxygen endanger the cell's survival. Both before and after ejaculation, sperm are exposed to the waste products of metabolism which limit the fertilization capacity of transported semen. These waste products, called reactive oxygen species or oxidants damage the delicate outer plasma membranes of the sperm (Figure 1,), reducing sperm motility, longevity and viability. Supplementing the diet with antioxidants helps prevent damage to the sperm and improves fertility.

Like all cells, sperm use oxygen and, as a consequence, are faced with the oxygen paradox - oxygen is necessary for sustained life, but waste products from oxidative processes can endanger the cell's survival. Stallion semen is damaged by oxidative stress during cooling and transport. The principle antioxidants are omega 3, vitamin E, selenium, vitamin C, zinc, copper, and manganese. Apart from vitamin C, the body cannot manufacture these and they must be supplied in the diet. Omega-3 oils are high in fresh grass and flaxseed, however grains and vegetable oils, including rice bran oil, are too low in omega 3 and too high in omega-6. Omega-3 increases sperm motility and concentration and decreases the number of abnormal sperm. Abnormal sperm are incapable of fertilising the egg. Some abnormalities are shown in **Figure 2**.

Dietary supplementation with natural antioxidants helps prevent oxidative damage. Lepidium meyenii (Maca) - a traditional Andean crop enhances fertility due to it's anti-oxidant activity. A 2018 study found that daily feeding of 20g maca powder for 60 days, improved motility and integrity and reduced oxidant damage to sperm. Vitamin E deficiency in stallions has been linked to the development of a higher number of abnormal sperm with poorer motility and supplementation improves both the total and progressive sperm motility of cooled semen. Vitamin A is also required for healthy spermatogenesis, protect against the development of abnormal sperm and assists motility. Zinc and selenium in combination with vitamin E enhance progressive motility, viability and morphology.

It takes about 60 days to make a sperm and to achieve the benefits of correct omega 3 intake, studies have found that the oil must be fed for at least 126 days.

While no differences in sperm were found in trials feeding omega 3 oils for 84 days, after 126 days the sperm motility and velocity were higher. There was also a reduction in the number of abnormal sperm. Taking part in competitions has been shown to have no negative effect on semen quality – in fact, semen motility and total sperm count at most times during the breeding season were higher in stallions taking part in equestrian competitions than in stallions used for breeding only.

Just like mares, stallions exhibit seasonal variations in sexual behaviour, hormones and fertility. Sex hormones, semen volume, sperm count, motility and quality increase in spring/summer. Nutrition plays a critical role by supporting both general wellbeing and long-term health and supports the balance of hormones. There is a solid body of research investigating nutritional supplements to improve sperm quality and fertility. Key nutrients essential for healthy formation and function of equine sperm omega 3 fatty acids are incorporated into the plasma membrane (Figure 1.), enabling them to be flexible, compressible, deformable and elastic, as well as increasing viability and velocity. Linseed oil supplementation improves sperm acrosome integrity, while selenium and vitamin E given with omega 3 DHA increase total sperm count, longevity during storage and progressive motility. However if the diet omega 3 enrichment was done with whole foods, rather than with oils, no improvement was seen in sperm motility or morphology. Other nutritional supplements found to impact upon stallion sperm quality and function include L-carnitine which supports spermatogenesis and maturation, especially in sub-fertile stallions. Carnitine is formed from lysine and methionine, but this capacity is limited in some horses and dietary L-carnitine supplementation is beneficial.

Age has much less effect on stallions' than on mares' fertility. Although signs of aging may appear around 15 years of age, stallion fertility is not usually decreased until 20 - 25 years of age. Mare fertility decreases and the risk of pregnancy loss increases from 10 - 15 years of age.

As for other mammals, mares are born with a set number of primordial follicles, that varies between mares and the number of available follicles declines with aging Ovarian activity is reduced after 15 years of age and is not observed anymore in around 17% of mares over 20 years – and by 25 years it is thought the mare has exhausted her oocyte stocks. Fertilization however isn't affected by age as the number of embryos collected via oviductal flushing at Day 2 post ovulation is similar between young, fertile mares and old, sub-fertile mares. And, when looking at embryo recipient mares, age does not affect initial pregnancy rates until 15 -18 years but embryo loss is higher at day 50: 20.5% in mares over 10 years compared to 13.3% in younger mares. This is thought to be due to endometrial aging.

Fertilization and early embryo development take place in the oviducts, which have a higher incidence of fibrosis in older mares. After 5-6 days in the oviduct, the embryo induces its own movement down into the uterus. Cysts in the uterus - more common in older mares - could prevent embryo movements, fixation and implantation which are essential for the uterus to recognise and respond to the pregnancy. Uterine clearance of fluid is impaired in older mares and age-related lengthening of the vulva allows a larger entrance for bacteria. Endometritis is more common in old mares, partly due to poorer conformation and delayed uterine clearance of fluid and debris after foaling. However, the placenta is smaller and less efficient in maiden mares and the foals are smaller. Foals from young and maiden mares also have a more immature regulation of glucose - making it even more important that the mare's are not overfed and that the diet is low in starch and sugar.

Obesity and insulin dysregulation (ID) have been associated with subfertility in the mare. There has been a substantial increase in the prevalence of overweight and obese horses in recent years (45 - 50% now, up from 4.5% in 1998). Some of these mares, with a history of good sport performance, enter breeding programs with high expectations of embryo production or pregnancy. Without losing perspective of the reproductive problems associated with

ageing and obesity, it is very important to consider metabolic problems (e.g., equine metabolic syndrome (EMS) and pituitary pars intermedia dysfunction (PPID; i.e., equine Cushing's disease]) that may directly impact fertility. A large proportion of ID and obese mares continue to cycle over winter, have a longer period between ovulations and less ovulations. Once identified it's imperative that dietary errors are avoided. These mares should be managed with a low calorie (ie sugar and starch) diet, appropriate exercise and, if necessary, medication.

One often over-looked aspect is the necessity for specific essential amino-acids for the production of reproductive hormones. Regardless of the percent protein of the feed and the amount of protein in the diet, if essential amino acids are not present in the correct amount, hormone synthesis in the ovaries is impaired. The risk of amino acid deficiencies is much greater in mares fed teff, cereal and pasture hays and in those on bran/pollard/wheat/ barley and corn-based manufactured feeds. Foal growth during lactation is heavily influenced by the amino acid quality of the mare's diet. The dietary protein intake of the lactating brood-mare should therefore contain sufficient high-quality protein to prevent depletion of her body reserves and consequently a loss in body mass - which is a risk factor for early embryonic loss. In addition, the growth of their foals can be impaired by up to 25%. Foals that are weaned with a low body mass are more likely to have periods of catch-up growth after weaning and are highly susceptible to epiphysitis and other developmental bone diseases.

Advancing maternal age as the single most significant factor to consider with the rate of fertility. Similar to stallions, the extent to which diet can affect mare fertility depends on the amino acid, anti-oxidant and mineral levels in the feed and the duration of feeding. Certainly improvements in reproductive efficiency have been demonstrated when a correctly balanced feed is fed for a minimum of 2 months before breeding. Grain-based feeds and diets have alter oocyte metabolism and functions in ways that are only just being understood, but that are detrimental to fertility 2.

Stress Based on studies in other species, effects of stress on the oestrous cycle in mares have been suggested. It is common practise to transport mares during the periovulatory period and owners often question whether transport shortly before and after ovulation, repeated gynaecological examination and exposure of the mares to a novel environment in the new stable may have negative effects on ovulation and conception. Although these events cause elevations in the stress hormone (cortisol) which last for several hours, no differences in duration of oestrus, time of ovulation, pregnancy rate or early embryonic loss between transported mares and non-transported mares. Stress may affect progesterone (a hormone necessary to maintain the pregnancy) levels in mares with marginal levels and your treating veterinarian is best-placed to discuss whether your mare requires progesterone.

Puberty can occur as soon 14-15 months of age and peak fertility in mares is from 4 to 6 years of agedecreaing gradually to become almost zero at 25years of age. Many mares in show jumping, dressage and other disciplines commonly compete past 15 years of age - only then beginning their reproductive career. Thanks to ultrasonography, the newly available hormones and our increased knowledge of reproductive physiology, semen handling and pathology, foaling rates have improved over recent decades. In many breeds, the use of the artificial insemination has also been a major contribution.


Apart from breeding excellent horses himself (The Equalizer, Hoodoo Voodoo – both out of the leading dam he also bred, Doc's Lyric) his advice to breeders, often sought, is always given with the benefit of the breed as his top criteria. His refusal to make recommendations to flatter or to further any other consideration has not always won him friends – but it has led to the production of horses which excel at the job for which they were bred.

Ian is a fine horseman and a great Australian, has proved you can start life with little and still make it to the top with hard work, high standards and a positive attitude.

Ian was born at Maryborough, Queensland on 28th June, 1945, the only son of a Maryborough carpenter, the late Snow Francis and his wife, Ella. He was educated at the local State Schools. He did not start riding until he was 11 years old when he got a part-time job helping out on a dairy farm. As a teenager he watched and worked with Barry Whitaker of Maryborough, whose style and feel for horses caught his imagination and made him aware that "there was more to horsemanship than basic transportation".

Ian graduated to Rodeo where, for 12 years, he made a name for himself riding bareback, saddle broncs and bulls.

While working on various Central Queensland cattle properties he moved on to Campdrafting. When the beef industry was in recession, he took the opportunity to manage John and Jenny Kingston's Kolora Quarter Horse Stud. There his knowledge and appreciation of the



Quarter Horse breed was fine tuned. Ian credits much of his philosophy and attitude to life to John's influence at that time.

In 1980 he set up the Ian Francis Training Stables in a picturesque valley at Widgee outside Gympie, Queensland where, with Lexi Plath, he built and has maintained a reputation for presenting consistently well-trained horses in top condition for competition or for sale. Ian never fails to acknowledge the important role Lexi has played in the success of the outfit.

Among many others who have figured in his rise to fame, Ian lists four key men. Along with Barry Whitaker and John Kingston, there was Lee Reborse, a Nevadan who moved to Rockhampton ("an excellent competitor specially in Reining and Working Cowhorse, a mild-mannered and very giving man") and top Australian horseman, John Stanton ("his advice and attitudes to competition and life in general greatly affected my thinking").

Ian Francis has made some several trips to the USA and Canada. Highlights were representing Australia at World Cups in both countries and winning the Open division of the International Reining Council's World Cup in Toronto in 1992.

Among great horses trained and campaigned by Ian over the years have been King's Gaiety, King's Charge, Gold Astral, NBD King Poco Bar, Kings Gold, Dans Lady Cylip, Kolora Lunar Lady, D-Bar Paint Your Wagon, Kolora Classic, Murrumbo Fiona, BS Mingo's Lucero, Vogue O'Lena, The Equalizer, Spindle, Doc's Desert Rose, Doc's Wild Orchid, Amaroo Rock n Return, Pillamindi Roc, Doc's Kylie Anne, Riverholme Royal Oak, Doc's Gold Dude, Nonda Tall Poppy, Donrice Conchite, Yarrango Reggae, Nonda Nightbird, Havenville Crackshot, Jaylo Bushman, Whisp O'Lena and Star Carousel.
