In the Nevember 2, 1973 issue of Sh'ma, Rabbi Norman Lamn attempts to bring Talmudic and various other Hewish historical sourcess to bear on the situation of Watergate and the new famour White House Tapes and satisfactorily proves his point that a ruler is not above the law. He, however, overlooked at least one substantial argument which the President has used and which Rabbi Lamn, as a congregational rabbi has or may in the future be required to use. I am speaking of the problem of privilaged information or national security on the governmental level. As a future rabbi, I expect to speak with my congregants concerning such problems as love affairs or subversive organizations to which they may have belonged and the like which could conceiveably destroy them, their future, and their families should such information not remain confidential. I believe that it would be my obligation to refuse to disclose such information

On the national level, disclosure of national security matters is of even greater consequence as it may cause treaties to be broken, relations to become strained, and possibly even wars. The President, as the head of the country and the one person on whose sholders rests the security and destiny of the nation, would in my opinion be acting extreamly irresponsible should be permit such information to be made public or even semi-public. Disclosure to even Senators and Representatives, enen assuming that they are all well intentioned, an assumption which I doubt is a valid one after watching the "Erwin Circus" this summer, increases the possibility of leaks and must likewise be shunned. I believe that all Americians,

regardless of the penalty.

especially congregational rabbis, and other professional who are generally taken into one's confidence, must realize that not all information is meant for all ears. While the President is not above the law there is a thin line between what constitutes information that will jepodize national securty and that which will not. On such matters only the President, as the person in sole possession of such information, can determine. I suggest that the Americian people, especially the "liberal intellectuals", stop requesting that the President justify every move and disclose information which he considers damaging to the national interest and let him concentrat on the job to which he was over-whelmingly elected..
