Dear Rabbi Lamm,

I want to let you know how much I enjoyed your article in the May 3 Sh'ma. As one who protested the "prayer" designating the State of Israel ~~NU'RUD SIN'AH~~ and was told "ninety-nine percent of all Torah scholars disagree with you"; it is encouraging to find one of your stature and learning among the one percent. The type of thinking expounded by Rabbi Spero is indeed frightening and all too prevalent, as I have observed. Faith is cheap for those who believe the ambiguities of history are in the process of resolution and who fail to see that ^{(SH) JU-1c 81 82101 710-1c 81 "2"-p1 2cN}, in some sense for ourselves and not just for our opponents.

My only quibble with your finely reasoned and documented article is what I view as still a certain ~~as~~ Diaspora self-deprecation. You may yet lead your congregation out of the NSIC, but you cannot lead them out of SISD. In ^{NCNA SIN'} we will stand resurrected in Israel; in the meantime it is best to acknowledge unashamedly our American citizenship & our devotion to the cause of Torah here. Just as returning to the Land is not equivalent to redemption, staying in America as a practicing Jew is not equivalent to sin. If Zionist messianism declines, I am hopeful that we shall see the emergence of a self-respecting (but not self-centered or complacent!) Diaspora.

There are indeed tiny complaints against what I regard as the finest statement of a much-needed theology. I hope you continue to publish & speak out along these lines. If so, you will not be without detractors nor without appreciative supporters.
