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gave Ontological Argument (so named by Kant) in 2 forms:

A) Anselm's original form: even if one can understand that God = a Being greater than which nothing greater can be conceived. Such a being can exist in mind only, & also in reality. Now real existence > something only in mind. Then, if this Being - than... which is greater than it - which is an inner contradiction. Hence, it exists in reality.

B) Anselm's second form: all that exists is either necessary (can't be thought of as not existing) or contingent (can be...). Now necessary > contingent. If then the Being-necessary is in contingent class, we can conceive of greater being, namely the same being in necessity. But that is contradiction. Hence - is necessary existence.
