
HOW TO ANTIQUE—Apply Tandy Leather's Antique Leather Stain liberally over entire project with wool dauber or damp sponge (Fig. 1). Allow to set a few minutes and then wipe off excess Stain with a clean, damp sponge, leaving the stain down in the cuts and impressions (Fig. 2). When dry, apply Super Shene with a damp sponge to seal the leather.





HOW TO RESIST—To add another dimension to antiquing resist part of the design by carefully applying two coats of Super Shene to a part of the design you wish to remain natural (Fig. 3). The Super Shene seals the leather and

won't allow the stain to penetrate (Fig. 4). Allow Super Shene to dry and then antique as in instructions above.








HOW TO BLOCK DYE—Block dyeing gives just the opposite effect of antiquing. The tool impressions are left light and the raised areas are darkened. Any spirit dyeing should be done before block dyeing your project. Any Cova dyeing should be done after block dyeing. Wrap a length of cloth around a sponge or wooden block several times. Apply Pro Dye to cloth and blot on a paper towel until cloth has enough dye remaining to color only the surface of the leather. If too much dye remains it may run into the impressions. With cloth, apply the dye to the surface of the leather, rubbing briskly so a burnished effect is achieved. Apply more dye to cloth as needed, always blotting before applying to leather. When dry you can further enhance your design with Cova dye. Apply Super Shene as a final finish





