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Groups in Canvas

- Canvas is designed to accommodate the learning activities that you would like your students to complete in groups, including
 - Group assignments
 - Group discussions
 - Group announcements
 - Group file sharing
 - Group meetings
 - Group appointments

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Creating Groups

- Can put students into groups yourself, or have them sign up.
- People, +Group Set
- You can assign a group leader if you like. This person can manage the members of the group and edit the group name.



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Group Homepages

- Student Groups have dedicated homepages, which are semiprivate working spaces that include Announcements, Pages, People, Discussions, Files, Conferences and Collaborations for the group.
- Here, group members can participate in group discussions assigned to them, create their own group discussions, post announcements to group members, participate in group discussions, share files, organize Big Blue Button online conferences and Collaborate using Google Drive.
- Students can access group homepages from their dashboard.

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Group Assignments

- Once you have created groups, you can assign assignments and discussions to them.
- Create a new assignment, check the "This is a Group Assignment" box.
- Choose the group set for the discussion, or create a new group set.
- Choose whether you would like to grade only one submission per group, or if you would like to grade all group members separately. This cannot be changed after submissions have been made. Grading can be completed via Speedgrader.
- You can set differentiated due dates so that each group has its own due date.

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Group Discussions

- When using Group Discussions, the discussion topics and instructions will display the same way for all students, however they will only interact within their group environment.
- Create a new discussion, check the "This is a Group Discussion" box.
- Choose the group set for the discussion, or create a new group set. *again, you cannot assign a discussion to a group set until users have been added to them.
- Each student is graded individually, even for group discussions. These can be graded via Speedgrader.
- You can set differentiated due dates so that each group has its own due date.
