In 2023 residents and team members at The Chesapeake, The Culpeper, The Glebe, Lakewood, The Summit, Lakewood at Home, the Virginia Baptist Homes Foundation and the home office team provided more than *\$1.4 million in monetary donations, goods and services to public charities and organizations.*

Across all of LifeSpire, team members gave over 300 hours and residents and members gave over 11,000 hours of time to volunteer service.
