The College's Federal Government's ICSEA (Index of Community Socio-Educational Advantage) rating in 2020 was 1148, though this was replaced by the Direct Measure of Income (DMI) model, which calculated Heathdale's capacity to contribute (CTC) score as 100.

Parent Reflections

Each year the College seeks feedback from our Heathdale families on various aspects of the College's operations. In the 2020 Parent Satisfaction survey, there was both a strong participation and a significant level of positive feedback. It was once again pleasing to note the significant level of positive feedback and satisfaction for the College in general. To know that 94% of parents are happy with their decision to send their child to HCC and recommend the College to others is a very encouraging result. Here were some of the other findings from our survey:

- 93% agreed that students learning improved during remote learning
- 90% found the College provided a safe environment across the four dimensions of physical safety, learning safety, feeling safe and emotional safety
- 90% identified a distinctive style of Christian Education
- 93% felt the College equipped students for the future
- 86% agreed that teachers provided impact and support

As a feature of our parent partnerships, this survey allows parents/guardians to provide additional constructive feedback on our programs and operations. This is an important aspect for us as a College as we pursue a continuous improvement mindset enabling us to create a College where every student can 'Belong, Believe & Become'.

Staff Reflections

Our teaching and general staff work together to create an environment geared for learning that positively impacts the lives of our students. This culture is built through a deep desire to show initiative, to build capacity, to learn and grow so we make things better. Ultimately fulfilling God's call upon our life as we serve in our career.

Despite the challenges 2020 brought to us all through the COVID pandemic, staff indicated a greater satisfaction and positive response than in previous years, which was incredibly pleasing.

- 93% were satisfied with their job
- 94% understand their role and role clarity
- 89% felt overall support from leadership
- 91% felt supported and strongly equipped while working remotely
- 88% of teachers felt they were able to makes significant difference with students and their learning
- 95% felt there was a development of effective teams that was able to provide support and build individual capacity

Heathdale has a culture of continuous learning that extends to staff. This year taught us many lessons and identified many areas we can improve at the College. Our staff will continue to learn and pursue excellence in their roles beyond 2020.

She had her work cut out for her constantly adapting to moving on and off-campus and delivering community events mostly online.

Why did you get into event planning?

Life is constantly associated with the word 'busy'. I love that through event planning I can organise something small or big to help bring light to the busy-ness for a while and allow opportunities for people to have a little fun, create new memories and engage with others.

What drew you to working at Heathdale?

I had heard for years how supportive and enriching the Heathdale staff community culture was. When I was made aware of this role that I am now in, all I knew back then was I wanted to be a part of this community too!

What were the main highlights of 2020 as a staff member at Heathdale?

My main highlights of 2020 were the many supportive staff and leaders who were around me as I started this new role in remote learning. I was amazed to witness such support, respect and faith during such a difficult season. It was a joy to be around others that continued to push on and have a little fun along the way.

Teaching Staff Eliza Roache



Why did you get into teaching?

I became a teacher as I felt called to make a positive difference in the lives of children and help them reach their full God-given potential.

What drew you to working at Heathdale?

I was drawn to Heathdale by hearing about the ethos of the school and the standout reputation for providing meaningful Christian education. I also have friends who attended Heathdale and can testify to a positive and nurturing school culture.

What were the main highlights of 2020 as a teacher at Heathdale?

Most of my highlights happened in little moments within my classroom. For example, when a student has an 'ah-ha' moment, or when students tell me their favourite part of the day was reading a story with you, or even when a student is drawn out of their shell and is enjoying the company of their new friends. I find it is the little ordinary things that spark these meaningful highlights.

Reflecting on beginning a teaching role largely in Remote Learning, what were the biggest challenges in 2020?

As a graduate, the two main challenges of last year were juggling my VIT registration portfolio and learning the dynamics of remote learning. Although a degree in education is meant to empower you to teach in the tech-savvy 21st century, I don't believe anything could have fully prepared me for online teaching. The way in which my degree helped me the most was knowing the importance of adapting to new changes and challenges and to continually collaborate with your colleagues; through each challenge there was a community of support helping me along the way.

How did the College leadership and staff around you help you succeed in that remote learning time?

The College was very supportive in helping graduates, like myself, succeed in remote teaching. The success of remote learning for my year level can be easily summarised by these four things: servant-hearted leadership, positive team culture, continual collaboration and adapting to change to enrich students' learning.

What do you like about Heathdale's culture and how did being part of a Christian work environment help you through 2020?

Heathdale's teaching culture is marked by positive collaboration, teamwork and having a good work ethic. Being a part of a Christian work environment helped me have the freedom and flexibility to embed Christian principles into my teaching in a safe and nurturing environment.

Reflecting on beginning an events role largely in Remote Learning, what were the biggest challenges in 2020?

It would be the challenge of getting to know everyone through online meetings and chats, as opposed to in-person, this was easier some days than others. Since a lot of events require you to foster some sort of connection with others in order to run things successfully, this was challenging for me during remote learning. And of course, not being able to run events physically was difficult!

How did the College leadership and staff around you help you succeed in that remote learning time?

The leadership and staff culture at Heathdale is like no other. The positive feedback, encouragement and trust that I was given although I couldn't physically showcase what I could do, empowered me to believe in myself more, which helped me succeed during that season.

What do you like about Heathdale's culture and how did being part of a Christian work environment help you through 2020?

I love the authenticity of the community. It all stems from the Senior Leadership Team, the heart that they carry and the way they approach situations. Being amongst and working with other believers during 2020 was not only a blessing to be around during a year of many ups and downs, but this also challenged my own spiritual walk with God, which encouraged me to approach situations in my own personal life in a whole new way.

Wherever we are, we're learning

2020 was a year with two completely different views. One looked 'normal'. Heathdale as we'd always known it; both campuses full of students moving from class to class, rubbing shoulders as they went about their day-to-day learning. The other view – from home - became the 'new-normal', where teachers and students taught, learnt and interacted through screens. At first, this shift seemed temporary, but all of us had to quickly come to terms with the fact that we would be flip-flopping between the two views at a moment's notice.

We had to work out how learning was going to continue no matter where we were, and that's what we did.

In light of 2020's long lockdowns, we were blessed to still share in-person learning opportunities, including deep and rich experiences like the Geography excursions to Point Addis Beach and Queenscliff where students conducted investigations and Field Reports. To lively celebrations on campus such as our beloved Annual Book Week Dress Up Day where Primary students paraded in their costumes as champions, princesses and villains, then spent time telling and writing stories about their characters.

When learning suddenly became remote, both students and teachers faced challenges and a quick learning curves. Learning from home took on a different shape altogether, and whole families went on the learning journey as students cooked up slimey and oozing science experiments during Science Week, built innovative STEM projects like towering aluminium foil structures, and took part in the Primary Reading Challenge from home, where even Prep students read over 50 books during Term 2.

Even though we were isolated, it didn't stop visitors stopping by virtually to expand students' learning opportunities. Best-selling authors Tim Harris and Mark Wilson dropped by to run workshops with students, dishing out tips and tricks about writing historical fiction and how to give short stories a big plot twist.

While it would seem that in-person learning is the height of learning participation, in fact, the online environment required students to become far greater agents in their own learning.

Students navigated new ways they could contribute to their work, unpacked what questions to ask when tasks didn't make sense the first time, grew their ability to problem solve their way through a task, and learned the true value of communication.

Some students took agency to a whole new level, even expanding beyond the College curriculum of their own volition. While in

remote learning, Year 10 student Rithica Srinivasan completed a Neuroscience course called 'Big Ideas in Neuroscience', run by Emerging Sciences Victoria (ESV) in partnership with the John Monash Science School, the Victorian Department of Education and Monash University. The College is pleased to facilitate students like Rithica as they explore subjects they might want to pursue in the future.

In many ways, 2020 was a catalyst for our students to grow in their independent thinking, assume greater responsibility, and explore their God-given gifts in order to flourish.

Through all of these challenges, just as the students were challenged, our staff were constantly asking the question of ourselves, "How can we improve?"

Thrust into a digital space in 2020 alongside students, staff also needed to be devoted learners. We've constantly asked the questions, 'What worked today? Was it better than yesterday? What's the next new thing that we can try? How do I know that I'm reaching all of my students? How can I determine what they have learnt?' And with so much hard-won experience, why would we want to go back to our previous practices?

As we travelled through 2020, there were some planned and some unexpected steps forward in digital technology at Heathdale, which propelled us over the course of the year into a much deeper integration of technology into our learning and teaching.

Over the coming years, we will see a steady increase in the use of technology as part and parcel of the way students learn and demonstrate their learning. This will give our staff increased flexibility in the modes of curriculum delivery and enable them to create more dynamic learning experiences, including the ability to work more collaboratively, as well as provide immediate access to digital resources and better differentiation for learners needing extension or more help.

We are also committed to functioning from a posture of teachability ourselves as staff, modelling for our students lifelong learning as we grow in our capacity to teach in a 21st-century digital environment.

Throughout 2020, whether we were running virtually or onsite, students embraced the diverse and engaging opportunities on offer at the College to develop their God-given talents and enhance their studies. No student can reach the end of 2020 and say that 'education is that thing that only happens in the classroom,' and we're going to leverage this experience in our community next year and onwards. Before this year, I never imagined I would be able to... Get my work done at home. I usually cannot do any kind of work out of school, tutoring, etc, but while doing remote learning I realised that it was possible if you set your mind on it. Once I got used to doing the same routine, it did become easier and really helped me to start focusing on my tasks.

With universities offering such a varied range of further study opportunities, we're always excited to see the number of Early Entry offers universities extend to our students. This year, well over half of our students were offered an early entry position, and some great scholarship opportunities; our Dux of 2020, Eric Havyrluk, attained an ATAR of 97.75 and was offered scholarships at Melbourne University and ANU, Sarkis Chedhade was accepted into the RMIT Elite Athletes Program to study a Bachelor of Graphic Design, and Joel Abraham, Hayden Liefting, Phoebe Del Pilar, and Alex Richardson received ACU Community Achiever Program guarantees.

While these students may choose to study elsewhere or change their direction, it is still a credit to their hard work and dedication to be recognised in this way. Congratulations to our graduating class, we are excited to see where God takes them as He continues to lead and guide them in their future!

An overcast morning greeted Heathdale's Melton campus for its inaugural swimming carnival, however, this did not dampen the enthusiasm of our Year 3 - 7 students who were in full voice! The sun eventually did come out but by that time the competition was well and truly blistering! Congratulations to Taylor House who started strong and kept a healthy lead right throughout the meet to win the competition and gain four valuable points for the House Shield, followed by Carey, Stanway and Judson.

In Remote Learning, the focus changed to competitions we could hold online. Rocket League is an E-Sports soccer game that has spread to every gaming platform and has seen over 1 million concurrent players. The game itself requires players to form a team and compete in a game of soccer that uses cars instead of people. At the top level, teams compete for a \$1 million prize pool, but at Heathdale Christian College we decided it was all about house pride. Over two nights of auditions, students from years 7-12 fought hard for the coveted six positions each house had to offer and displayed their skills in front of a live online HCC audience. On the night of the HCC World Championship Rocket League Event, we went live to a large crowd of supporters. Mr Deroon and Mr Folkes provided expert analysis and commentary. After knockout stages, time goals and matches going overtime, a hard-fought final resulted in the first ever HCC World Championship team being Taylor, aptly represented by Daniel B, Matthew B and Lachlan M. Congratulations to the boys on an historic win!



We all needed a little encouragement during lockdown to know we weren't in it alone. Our Prep students really embraced this in their Letters to our Year 12s. It was a precious moment watching our youngest generation wishing our oldest generation well, and our Year 12s give their final piece of advice and mentorship before finishing the year.

In a year when meeting people in person was tough, the chance to meet new people and work with them in a team was worthwhile, as students like Charlize Wood found her group to be a catalyst for a developing friendship. "Once we were back at school, we felt comfortable talking to each other and have a small friendship waiting to grow." Isn't that what camp is all about?

We also had visitors join our community online for some special presentations.

We partnered with **Colin Buchanan** for a special online Father's Day concert. The ARIA and Golden Guitar-winning singer, comedian and past Play School presenter put on a special hour-long remote concert from his home, just for our Heathdale students and their dads. It was a super special event and Colin sang all his classics like '10, 9, 8, God is Great', 'King of the Jungle' and even donned his blow-up chef outfit for an outrageous version of 'Super Chef'. It was such a great celebration and came at a time when our community could really use a laugh over breakfast; one of our family reviews put it like this:

In a first-of-its kind event, the entire extended Heathdale family - both past and present students - were invited to join for a special online event with guest speaker Rachael Robertson. Rachael shared her insights into life in extreme circumstances as she recounted her experience as the leader of a scientific expedition to Davis Station in Antarctica. Hers was a pertinent message, as she reflected on life in complete isolation in the Antarctic winter when a bare bones team would be left to man the station for months on end – no daylight, no way in or out, and only themselves for entertainment. The psychology of the experience helped her formulate her ideas on how respect trumps harmony in shaping team dynamics. She also shared her thoughts on coming out of isolation, which was a welcome tutorial for our community. Rachael also spoke with just our Year 12 students in a follow-up session the next day, where they were able to ask some personal questions about dealing with challenges and developing resilience in tough times. A great opportunity for our aspiring leaders of tomorrow!

Inspiring our Community

In 2020, we got to see our students step up as leaders not only within the College, but within our local and global community.

College Vice Captain, Alex Richardson, has been at the forefront of several student fundraising events over the course of his time at Heathdale, which is a significant part of the reason he was an easy choice for the ADF Long Tan Award. In 2020, the College saw a range of fundraising activities, but among these worthy causes, Alex's deepest connection ran with the people of **Payatas**. Until its closure by the government in 2017, Payatas was the largest open dumpsite in the Philippines with over 30,000 people calling it home and relying on it for their livelihood. Alex and the team arranged to sell products made by the people of Payatas, including handmade roses at the school production of Beauty and the Beast in 2019. Alex also struck a landmark deal with Heathdale's book supplier, Campion; in 2021, each Primary student had a Payatas Pencil Case on their booklist, creating jobs for six people in Payatas.

Stand Up for Little Lives is our annual student-run event to benefit Rehoboth Children's Home in the Philippines. The 2020 event ran online for the first time, featuring interviews and stories in morning homerooms as well as the Little Lives Radio Show during a Friday lunchtime. Over 150 donations were received,

and the team were able to considerably surpass their \$8,000 goal with the final tally being \$10,617! An amazing effort from the Heathdale community.

In support of **World Bicycle Relief**, a charity that puts bikes in the hands of kids around the globe so they can get to school, the College sported their best silly socks and rallied to fundraise. Our student leaders are incredibly passionate about helping kids just like them get an education, so it became a joint effort amongst all the school's captains to try and raise enough for at least 10 bikes. On the day we had a great turnout, and the team exceeded their goal, raising over \$2000.

One of our Year 10 students, Asha Surujpal, recognised the need for a food drive during lockdown after witnessing the empty shelves and lack of toilet paper, which marked the beginning of an initiative in partnership with Foodbank Victoria. Working alongside other students, Asha led the charge in collecting non-perishable and essential items from members of the school community, which also involved spreading awareness through advertising using posters, email, reminders in the daily notices and school social media pages. It was an excellent display of compassion paired with self-management skills, as students like Asha took initiative to help.




Financial Activities
