

A spectrum of materials can be spotted here: From the more basic, Indian patent stones (that have been used through the property), to oyster shells, that have been applied onto the headboard in one of the bedrooms, there's a distinct marriage of rustic textures with luxurious finishings.

t's magic! Our first step inside Villa Branco transports us to a faraway tropical haven — a Mediterranean island maybe, or somewhere in Santorini perhaps. Villa Branco, in Goa, has already spoilt us. The property is surrounded by beaches, top-class restaurants in the vicinity and a buzzing cosmopolitan neighbourhood. But, there's more to this villa than meets the eye. Isprava — the company behind the conceptualisation of Villa Branco and also known for their exclusive luxury real-estate work — wanted something more, something exclusive.

This recently-completed luxury project by Isprava is part of a series of stand-alone villas that the company is planning and designing in Goa. Villa Branco houses five bedrooms with en-suite bathrooms, walk-in closets, bespoke furnishings, a private pool with a deck and a gazebo. As if these amenities weren't enough, what really grabs our attention is the style and the interiors. Truly, shabby-chic has never looked this good. The intentional imperfections — the way the hand-made tiles refuse to follow a set pattern on the floor; or how the smooth textures on the wall feel against

Villa Branco is magic. There is this precious feeling of getting lost in a calm, tropical haven. And as Nibhrant puts it, "The fresh sea breeze could be from the Arabian Sea or the Mediterranean. There's no telling where you are."

Every piece of furniture, door and window has been painstakingly sourced. The design team procured items from old mansions, darbars and palaces in Rajasthan, Gujarat and France. Although they sport different styles and textures, the look is very cohesive.
