This Week's Game

The Razorbacks and Tigers tangle in their annual day-after-Thanksgiving clash. The teams are meeting in Little Rock for the 13th time in the series history. LSU owns 7-5 edge in games played in Little Rock.

Arkansas faces a must-win situation in order to become bowl eligible for a school-record seventh consecutive year.

Noting the Razorbacks

- Marcus Monk needs eight more receptions to move into the top 10 for receptions by a freshmen in SEC history. Monk has 34 catches this season and trails Jermale Kelley of South Carolina who had 43 catches as a freshman in 1993.

- De'Arrius Howard's 125-yard rushing performance marked the third straight game with a 100-yard rusher for Arkansas.

- Pierre Brown was named SEC Special Teams Player of the Week. Brown became the first Razorback ever to return a blocked field goal for a score, doing so against Mississippi State last weekend. Brown returned the block 76 yards for the TD.

- The Razorbacks are first in the SEC in red zone offense, scoring 89.2 percent of the time. Arkansas leads the league in percentage of TDs scored with an 81 percent (30-of-37) mark.

- Matt Jones is averaging 8.8 yards per carry this season. That is tops in the NCAA and is more than one full yard ahead of the next rusher, Drew Stanton of Michigan St. at 7.2 yards per carry.

- The Razorbacks are 11-15 against nationally ranked teams under Houston Nutt, including an 0-4 mark this season.

- Matt Jones currently ranks second in SEC history in yards per play with a 7.52 average. Jones is second behind former Florida quarterback Danny Wuerffel who averaged 7.75 yards per play from 1993-96. The average is based on a minimum of 900 plays.

- The Hogs have outscored teams 67-24 in fourth quarter this season. Only Florida (TD), Georgia (FG), South Carolina (TD) and Mississippi State (TD) have scored on the Razorbacks in the fourth quarter this season.

- The Razorbacks are allowing only 162.3 yards of offense in the second half of games this season, including 57.7 yards of total offense in the fourth quarter.

- Arkansas has scored in 109 consecutive games, the second longest streak in school history. The last time the Razorbacks were shutout came on Nov. 18, 1995, in a 28-0 loss to LSU.

HIGHLIGHTING THE 2004 SEASON

The New Mexico State Game

- Defensive tackle Marcus Harrison became the first true freshman position player to start a season opener since safety Greg Lasker in 1982.
- Marcus Monk's first career reception was a 38-yard touchdown catch from Matt Jones in the second quarter.

The Texas Game

- The 22-20 loss snapped Arkansas' string of consecutive non-conference regular-season wins under Houston Nutt at 21.
- The attendance of 75,671 set a new Donald W. Reynolds Razorback Stadium record. It surpassed the previous best of 74,026 set against Auburn on Oct. 12, 2003.

The Louisiana-Monroe Game

- Arkansas improved to 17-0 in Little Rock under Houston Nutt.
- Matt Jones became the first Razorback QB to record consecutive 200-yard passing performances since Robby Hampton in 2000.
- Steven Harris recorded his first career 100-yard receiving game with 133 yards on six catches with two scores (also a career best).

The Alabama Game

- Matt Jones accounted for two TDs to become the Arkansas career leader in touchdown responsibility.
- The win gave Arkansas consecutive victories over Alabama for just the second time in the series history.

The Florida Game

- Steven Harris recorded his second career 100-yard receiving effort with six receptions for 114 yards.
- Matt Jones became the Arkansas career leader in total offense, surpassing former QB Clint Stoerner.

The Auburn Game

- Senior DeCori Birmingham's became the UA career record holder for combined return yardage.
- Matt Jones tied the Southeastern Conference's career rushing yardage record for a quarterback.

The Georgia Game

- Senior defensive end Jeb Huckeba was named the Crip Hall award winner for his performance. Huckeba recorded 12 tackles, 10 solo and two assisted, with four tackles for loss, one forced fumble, three sacks and two quarterback hurries.
- The loss was the second consecutive Homecoming defeat for the Razorbacks. The last time that happened was in the 1992-93 seasons.

The South Carolina Game

- Matt Jones moved into a tie for ninth on the SEC career touchdown responsibility
- Freshman Marcus Monk set a career high for catches and receiving yards Monk had seven catches for 95 yards.

The Ole Miss Game

- Jared Hicks had two TD receptions, the first of his career.
- Matt Jones' 72 yard TD run was the longest run of his career.

The Mississippi State Game

- De'Arrius Howard set career-bests in rushing yards, 125, and carries, 29.
- Pierre Brown became the first Razorback ever to return a blocked field goal for a touchdown. Brown returned Elliott Harris' block 73 yards for the Hogs' final score of the day.

Last Time vs. LSU

The LSU offense put up 55 points, including 34 in the first half, as the Tigers cruised to a 55-24 victory over the Razorbacks last season in Baton Rouge. LSU quarterback Matt Mauck completed 12-of-19 passes with four touchdowns as the Tigers amassed 436 yards of total offense on the day.

Last Time vs. LSU in Little Rock

"The Miracle on Markham" propelled the Hogs to the SEC Championship game that last time Arkansas and LSU met in "The Rock". DeCori Birmingham hauled in a 31-yard touchdown pass from Matt Jones with nine seconds left in the game to tie the game at 20-20. After a 15-yard penalty for excessive celebration, David Carlton kicked a 35-yard PAT to give the Hogs a 21-20 win.

Series History

LSU has outscored Arkansas 698-650 in the series. . . .The teams first met in 1907 in Baton Rouge. . . .Between 1913 and 1936 the teams played 23 times with all of those games played in Shreveport. . . .There has been 17 shutouts in the series including a scoreless tie in 1947. . . .The last true shutout came in 1995 when LSU posted a 28-0 victory in Baton Rouge. . . .There have been 16 games decided by a touchdown or less, with LSU holding a 13-3 advantage in those games. . . .The largest margin of victory in the series was 51 points by Arkansas in a 51-0 win in 1910.

Upset Alert

A national ranking has not been a favorable sign in the UA-LSU series history. There have been 11 meetings when one team holds a national ranking and one team is unranked. Of those 11 games, the unranked team holds a 6-5 edge, including winning four of the last five. The last time a ranked team won in the series was 2003 when No. 3 LSU posted a 55-24 victory in Baton Rouge. That snapped a string of four straight wins by the unranked team.

Battle for the Boot

For the ninth time since its inception, Arkansas and LSU will be playing for "The Golden Boot," a trophy shaped like the two states combined. The trophy was introduced into the series prior to the 1996 game. It is believed to be the heaviest trophy awarded in a college football rivalry. It weighs approximately 175 pounds.

In each of the last six meetings, the trophy has changed hands. LSU is the only school to defend the trophy. LSU won the trophy in its first two years (1996, 1997) before Arkansas reclaimed it in 1998. LSU won the trophy in 1999. The Razorbacks won the trophy in 2000 with a 14-3 win in Little Rock before the Tigers earned it back last season with a 41-38 victory at Baton Rouge. The Hogs took the trophy back in 2002 with a 21-20 win over LSU in Little Rock, but the Tigers reclaimed it in 2003 with a 55-24 win.

Nutt In the Month of November

Arkansas is 20-9 (.679) in the month of November under Houston Nutt. The Razorbacks are 11-2 during the month in the last two seasons with the only losses coming to LSU last season and South Carolina this season.

OTHER FACTS ABOUT THE BATTLE FOR THE BOOT

- * Houston Nutt is 3-3 in BOOT games. Nick Saban is 2-2 in BOOT games
- * Last 3 BOOT games have decided who represents the Western Division in the SEC championship game
- * Until this year, since the first BOOT game in 1996, the winner has won or shared the SEC western division title 50% of the time (4 of 8 years).
- * The last 3 years has seen a combined 199 total points scored
- * Only one year, the inaugural year, has seen the visiting team win the BOOT.
- * On Nov 27, 1996 at the initial press conference at the Arkansas State Capital announcing the Battle for the Boot, Governor Mike Huckabee represented Arkansas and since Louisiana Governor Mike Foster(R) could not attend, Lt Gov Kathleen Blanco(D) represented LSU. Blanco is now the current Governor of Louisiana (D).
- * The two most popular youth video football games in the country are produced by EAS. They are the Madden NFL game and the NCAA Football game. The Battle of the Golden Boot has been a featured game on NCAA Football for the past 3 years allowing for young video players to have an actual Arkansas vs LSU matchup with the winner receiving a digital version of the big trophy. There were only 23 trophy games featured in 2003, now there are 36.

1) Why the "Battle of the Boot"?

LSU and Arkansas don't have the longtime rivalry or trophy game that other SEC teams have, ie Alabama-Auburn, Miss-Miss st, Fla-FSU/Tenn, Tenn-Fla/Ala/Kentucky, South Carolina-Clemson, Georgia-Georgia Tech/Fla. The lack of an annual rival or trophy game for Ark/LSU, the fact they play each other at the end of the season on national television, their location geographically, the intensity of each team's zealous fans and the expectation that both will hopefully be challenging for the SEC West annually, make this game a good spot for a trophy matchup regardless of records or standing.

2) Was the Boot designed to create a true rivalry game?

Not necessarily. You can't create a rivalry that isn't really there. The "Battle for the Boot" simply creates a Trophy Game. If a rivalry develops from it that would be great. If not, at least it gives Arkansas and LSU players a little added motivation to win the game. Most competitive players like to play to win anything. A true competitor would lay it on the line for an empty coke can. There are currently several Trophy games per year around the country that are played between teams that have not been equally competitive for decades. Some teams actually have two "Trophy" games per year. These games are not considered rivalry games because they haven't been competitive, but the two teams can still have something to play for.

3) Why Arkansas and LSU?

Beside the fact mentioned above, LSU and Arkansas do you have some similar football background. Both the Tigers and Razorbacks have had a rich and storied football history over the past 100 years. From National Championships for the Tigers in 1958 and the Razorbacks in 1964, to "The Great Runs" of Billy Cannon against Ole Miss and Ken Hatfield vs Texas, both schools have great gridiron legacies. Since their first matchup in 1901, some of those legacies were created when the two teams played each other. The 1946 Cotton Bowl that ended in a 0-0 tie and is remembered by many as the "Ice Bowl", featured such great players as Y.A. Tittle for LSU and Clyde "Smackover" Scott for Arkansas. The 1966 Cotton Bowl was the scene of a stunning upset as the 7-3 Tigers defeated the second ranked and 10-0 Hogs 14-7. Besides the great game history between LSU and Arkansas, both states even have a football connection off the field as LSU's first Bengal Tiger mascot, Mike 1, was purchased by the student body from the Little Rock Zoo in 1937.

4) What's behind the heavy and expensive trophy?

Some trophy games have been around for many decades and their trophy value is founded in a long history and sometimes the oddness of the trophy itself. Since the Arkansas/LSU trophy game was going to be a new one, the best way to create value and significance is to make it more unique than any other trophy. The "Boot" is the most expensive trophy in all of college football and is one of the heaviest (weighs between 150-200 pounds). It requires teamwork to carry it off the field.

Stuffed

Arkansas had its SEC-best 56-game streak without a blocked field goal snapped against the Ole Miss Rebels. Ole Miss blocked Chris Balseiro's attempt in the fourth quarter to end the streak. The previous last block came in 2000 against Mississippi State. The Bulldogs blocked a Matt Swartz kick in that game. The streak included a span of 67 field goal attempts by the Razorbacks.

Tough Schedule

The NCAA has ranked the Hogs' schedule the eighth-toughest in the nation. Arkansas' opponents have a combined 61-39 (.610) record this season. The Razorbacks have the toughest rated schedule of any team in the SEC.

Monk Top SEC Freshman

Nine games into his career Marcus Monk finds himself leading the 2004 SEC freshmen class in productivity. Monk has 34 catches for 512 yards and six touchdowns. Monk is also averaging 51.2 receiving yards per game and 15.1 yards per catch. Monks tops all league freshmen in receptions per game, 3.4, and receiving yards per game. Back-To-Back

Matt Jones' 126 yards rushing against Ole Miss marked the first time this season the Razorbacks recorded consecutive 100-yard rushing performances this season. Jones accounted for 111 yards against South Carolina in the previous game. Prior to Jones' performance against the Gamecocks, the Razorbacks had only two other 100-yard rushers with both of those coming against Louisiana-Monroe. DeCori Birmingham had 127 yards rushing and De'Arrius Howard had 109 against the Indians. Last season, the Razorbacks had two four-game streaks of 100-yard rushers.

Roper Earns Lineman of the Week Honors

Arkansas junior Kyle Roper was named Southeastern Conference Offensive Lineman of the Week for his performance against Ole Miss. He is the first Razorback offensive lineman to win the award since its inception this season by the SEC. Roper earned a 95.5 percent grade, including a perfect 100 percent mark on passing plays, in the Razorbacks' 35-3 win over Ole Miss. He played 68 snaps and tallied a career high 11 knockdown blocks against the Rebels. His 11 knockdowns were the most by a UA offensive lineman since All-America offensive tackle Shawn Andrews racked up a school

record 21 knockdowns last season against Alabama. Roper helped clear the way for 452 yards of total offense including 297 yards rushing.

Scoring 20

The Hogs have scored 20 points or more in 64 of Houston Nutt's 85 games (75 percent) as head coach. Arkansas is 48-16 when scoring 20 points or more under Houston Nutt, including a 22-7 mark in the last three seasons.

Jones Passes Bond

Quarterback Matt Jones owns the record for the most yards rushing by a QB in SEC history. Jones broke the old record of 2,280 yards held by former Mississippi State quarterback John Bond (1980-83). Jones broke the record with 21 yards rushing against Georgia on Oct. 23.

Arkansas in Fayetteville, Little Rock

With two home stadiums, the Razorbacks have proven to be tough to beat on both home fronts. Arkansas holds a 138-68-2 (.668) mark at Donald W. Reynolds Razorback Stadium including a 20-8 (.714) record under Houston Nutt. At War Memorial Stadium in Little Rock, the Hogs are 135-50-2 (.727) and are unbeaten at 17-0 under Nutt.

Hillis Returns

Freshman tailback Peyton Hillis returned to action against Georgia after breaking the L1, L2 and L3 transverse processes in his back against Florida. The injury was originally thought to keep Hillis out at least six to eight weeks. Hillis sustained the injury in the first half against the Gators and did not return. Hillis started and had one catch for 10 yards against the Bulldogs.

Birmingham Takes The Lead

Senior DeCori Birmingham's became the UA career record holder for combined return yardage with a 17-yard kickoff return in the first quarter against Auburn. Birmingham eclipsed the mark held by Ken Hatfield (1,604) who played from 1962-64. Birmingham entered the game with 1,603 yards on punt and kickoff returns.

Tubbs, Moore Sidelined

Junior offensive tackle Zac Tubbs and redshirt freshman defensive end Derek Moore both suffered left fibula fractures with associated ankle ligament tears in practice during the Hogs' off week. Tubbs and Moore will undergo surgery and will not play again this season. Recovery time for the injury is approximately six months.

Tubbs had started all five of the Razorbacks' games this season at right tackle. Redshirt freshmen Matt Gilbow and Nate Garner will vie for time as Tubbs' replacement. Moore appeared in the first three games of the 2004 campaign as a defensive reserve for the Hogs.

Jones Takes The Lead

With a touchdown run and pass against Alabama, senior Matt Jones took over first place in career touchdown responsibility at Arkansas. Jones surpassed the previous record of 62 held by former QB Clint Stoerner.

Harrell Named SEC D-Lineman of the Week

Nose guard Jeremy Harrell was named the SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week following his nine-tackle performance against Alabama. The nine tackles were a career high. Harrell also recorded six solo tackles in Arkansas' 27-10 victory over the Crimson Tide.

Airing It Out

Matt Jones became the first Razorback QB to record consecutive 200-yard passing games since Robby Hampton during the 2000 season. Jones threw for 249 yards against Texas and then followed that with 272 yards against Louisiana-Monroe. Hampton did the trick against SMS (227 yards) and Boise State (249 yards) in the first two games of the 2000 season.

Out Rushed

The Razorbacks were out-gained on the ground against the Texas Longhorns by 84 yards (259-175). That is the largest margin for an opponent since Alabama out ran the Hogs by 95 yards in 2002. The Crimson Tide racked up 267 yards, while Arkansas ran for 172 in a 30-12 loss to the Crimson Tide. The last non-conference team to rush for more yardage than the Hogs was the Minnesota Golden Gophers in the 2002 Music City Bowl. Minnesota held a 77 yard advantage (176-99) over the Hogs in their 29-14

victory. The Razorbacks are 1-6 since 2002 when not out-rushing their opponent.

Hogs-Wildcats Voted Greatest Game

Arkansas' NCAA record-tying, seven-overtime win over Kentucky last season was voted the greatest game ever televised by ESPN. The Razorbacks won 71-63 in Lexington. Fans selected the game the best ever shown by the network. The Hogs' seven-overtime win against Ole Miss in 2001, which set the NCAA record for longest game, was voted as the 11th greatest game ever shown by the network. Arkansas beat the Rebels 58-56 in Oxford.

Houston Nutt vs. AP Ranked Teams

Since becoming the Razorbacks head coach in 1998, Houston Nutt has posted an 11-15 mark against nationally ranked teams. Nutt is 2-3 against non-conference ranked foes. The Razorbacks lost to No. 15 Michigan, 45-31, in the 1999 Citrus Bowl, beat No. 14 Texas, 27-6, in the 2000 Cotton Bowl, lost to No. 10 Oklahoma, 10-3, in the 2002 Cotton Bowl and beat No. 6 Texas, 38-28, in Austin in 2003.

Dixon Takes SEC D-Lineman POW

Senior defensive tackle Arrion Dixon was named the inaugural SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week following his performance against New Mexico State. The Wynne, Ark., native recorded five tackles including four solo stops. Dixon also forced and recovered a fumble, had one sack (-9 yards) and picked up three tackles for loss (-17 yards). Dixon was the first player to earn the award that was introduced this season.

In The NCAA Record Books

Senior QB Matt Jones is one of three players in NCAA Division I history to throw a touchdown pass on his first career pass attempt. Southern Cal Junior QB Matt Leinart and former Georgia QB Cory Phillips are the other signal callers to accomplish the feat. Oddly, both Jones and Leinart did the trick against the Auburn Tigers. Jones threw his on Oct. 27, 2001 (21-yard completion to Richard Smith), while Leinart did it on Aug. 30, 2003 (5-yard completion to Mike Williams). Phillips accomplished the feat against Utah State in 1999.

Walk-ons Rewarded

A trio of Razorback walk-ons were awarded scholarships during preseason workouts. Fifth-year senior QB Dowell Loggains, sophomore offensive guard Stephen Parker and junior linebacker Darren Rogers were each given scholarships after their hard work and commitment. Parker, a native of Mandeville, La., holds the top spot on the depth chart at left guard and earned his first career start against New Mexico State.

Lucky Seven

Last year's 27-14 win over Missouri in the Mainstay Independence Bowl gave Arkansas a bowl appearance for the sixth straight year. The Hogs are going for seven straight this season. The Razorbacks have put together six straight bowl seasons on three separate occasions, but UA has not earned a bowl bid seven consecutive years. Since Houston Nutt became head coach in 1998, Arkansas has played twice in the Cotton Bowl (2000, 2002), once in the Citrus Bowl (1998), once in the Las Vegas Bowl (2000), once in the Music Bowl (2002) and once in the Independence Bowl (2003). Arkansas also advanced to six straight bowl games from 1977-82 under Lou Holtz and from 1984-89 under Ken Hatfield.

Scoring Streak

Arkansas has scored in 109 consecutive games, the second-longest streak in team history. Arkansas has not been shut out since a 28-0 loss to LSU in Baton Rouge, La., on Nov. 18, 1995. The longest scoring streak in Razorback history is 125 games set from 1973-83. The Hogs were shutout by Southern Cal, 17-0, in the season opener on Sept. 15, 1973, and went 125 games before being blanked by SMU, 17-0, on Nov. 19, 1983. Arkansas ranks fourth among league schools in the longest active scoring streak. Florida ranks first in the SEC and eighth nationally by earning points in 193 consecutive contests.

Anniversary Season

The 2004 season marks the 40th and 50th-anniversary of two of the most significant seasons in Razorback football history. Arkansas won its only national championship in school history in 1964 when Frank Broyles led the Razorbacks to a perfect 11-0 season. The Hogs defeated Nebraska, 10-7, in the Cotton Bowl to win the national title and the Grantland Rice Trophy. In the midst of that historic run, the Razorback defense posted a school-record five consecutive shutouts. A decade earlier in 1954, Bowden Wyatt guided Arkansas to an 8-3 record and a Southwest Conference Championship. The "25 Little Pigs," as they were affectionately named, upset Johnny Vaught's nationally ranked and heavily favored Ole Miss Rebels, 6-0, in Little Rock. The only touchdown of the contest came in arguably the most famous single play (The Powder River Play - see page 228) in Razorback football history.

Rewriting the Record Books

Senior quarterback Matt Jones has set a new standard when it comes to rushing yards by a signal caller. In each of his first three years, Jones has set school records for quarterback rushing yardage in a season. In 2003, Jones was second only to SEC rushing leader and team rushing leader Cedric Cobbs with 707 yards on 96 carries. The number is even more impressive when you consider that Jones suffered 138 yards of lost yardage, primarily on sacks. Not surprisingly, Jones is closing in on the SEC record for rushing by a quarterback. His career total of 2,226 yards is second only to Mississippi State's John Bond (2,280).

2004: He completed 13 of 16 passes for 195 yards and a touchdown in a season-opening win over New Mexico State. He connected with Marcus Monk for a 38-yard score in the second quarter. He also rushed eight times for 38 yards and a touchdown (2). Against No. 7 Texas, he completed 13 of 27 passes for 249 yards. He did suffer two interceptions against the Longhorns. He rushed 11 times for 93 yards in the game including a 28-yard gain. He tied a school record with four touchdown passes in Arkansas' 49-20 win over Louisiana-Monroe. He passed for scores of 11, 21, 25 and 11 against the Indians. He also rushed five times for 54 yards. He completed seven of 12 passes for 122 yards and a touchdown in leading the Hogs' to a 27-10 win over Alabama. He found Peyton Hillis on an 18-yard TD reception to give the Hogs' the lead for good near the end of the first half. He also rushed nine times for 60 yards and a score. He crossed the goal line on a six-yard scamper in the first quarter. He also iced the game with a 50-yard run in the fourth quarter. With his two touchdowns, he passed Clint Stoerner (62) for the school career record for touchdown responsibility. He passed Clint Stoerner on the UA career total offense list with 320 yards of total offense in a road loss at No. 16 Florida. He completed 23 of 39 passes for 252 yards and a touchdown. He also was intercepted three times against the Gators. He set career highs in attempts, completions and interceptions in the loss. He hit Marcus Monk for a seven-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter against the Gators. He also covered on a pair of two-point conversion pass plays (DeCori Birmingham, Marcus Monk) in a furious Razorback comeback. He was the Hogs' leading rusher at Florida earning 68 yards and a touchdown (25 yards). Against No. 4 Auburn, he completed 12 of 27 passes for a pair of touchdowns in a 38-20 loss. He connected with Chris Baker for a 19-yard score and Steven Harris for a 61-yard scoring pass. He also rushed four times for 54 yards to pull into a tie with Mississippi State's John Bond (2,280) for the SEC career quarterback rushing mark. He actually eclipsed the record on a 54-yard run in the second quarter, but a sack later in the game moved him back into a tie. He earned a season long pass completion (61 yards to Steven Harris) and a season long rush (54 yards) against the Tigers. He completed 12 of 19 passes for 181 yards and a touchdown in the Razorbacks' 20-14 loss to No. 6 Georgia. His

touchdown pass came on a 17-yard strike to Marcus Monk in the first quarter. He rushed six times for 21 yards against the Bulldogs to pass John Bond of Mississippi State for the SEC quarterback rushing record. He broke the record on a 36-yard run in the second quarter. He earned the first 100-yard rushing game of the season with 111 yards and a touchdown on 10 carries against South Carolina. He recorded a long run of 36 yards and scored his 22nd career rushing touchdown on a seven-yard scamper in the first quarter. He completed 12 of 24 passes for 138 yards and a touchdown against the Gamecocks. He also suffered two interceptions. His touchdown pass was a 13-yard strike to Marcus Monk. He also found DeCori Birmingham for a two-point conversion in the game. He scored on a 72-yard run the longest rush of his career. He dunked the ball over the cross bar after he crossed the goal line. He also recorded runs of 23, 23 and 7 yards against the Rebels. He completed 11 of 16 passes for 108 yards and two touchdowns before giving way to backup quarterback Robert Johnson midway through the third quarter. He hit tight end Jared Hicks for a two-yard and a 23-yard score in the victory. His 23-yard touchdown pass came on his final pass attempt in Razorback Stadium. He also tossed a touchdown pass on his first career pass attempt in Razorback Stadium as a freshman in 2001 against Auburn. Although hobbled by a hamstring injury, he led Arkansas to a 24-21 win at Mississippi State. He completed 18 of 27 passes for 215 yards against the Bulldogs. He threw one interception. He rushed only four times for seven yards, but scored on a one-yard run in the second quarter.

PERSONAL: Born April 22, 1983, he is the son of Steve and Paula Jones. His father played football at Ouachita Baptist University. He was a member of the 2002 and 2003 SEC Academic Honor Rolls. He was a member of the 2001-02 and 2002-03 Lon Farrell Academic Honor Rolls. He is enrolled in the College of Education and Health Professions and is majoring in middle school education.
