# Tigers Travel to North Louisiana to Face UL-Monroe

No. 1 LSU (12-2) travels to north Louisiana on Tuesday as the Tigers face UL-Monroe (8-6) at Indian Field. First pitch is scheduled for 6:30 p.m.

The game will be televised statewide on the Jumbo Sports Network, and it can be heard on the LSU Sports Radio Network, including flagship WDGL-FM 98.1 in Baton Rouge. The radio broadcast may be also be accessed at www.LSUsports.net.

LSU's 12-2 mark through 14 games is the Tigers' best since the 2001 club also posted a 12-2 record through its first 14 contests. LSU's loss to Houston last Saturday ended its win streak at nine games, the longest for the Tigers since the '01 squad won 10 straight from Feb. 17-March 3.

The Tigers (#1 Collegiate Baseball, #5 Baseball America, #5 ESPN/Sports Weekly) defeated Houston -- an NCAA Super Regional team in each of the past two seasons -- in two of three games last weekend in Alex Box Stadium.

LSU is hitting .347 (182-for-524) as a team entering the ULM game with 31 doubles, four triples and 15 homers, and the Tigers average nearly nine runs per game.

The Tigers' staff ERA is 2.15, as LSU has allowed just 30 earned runs in 125.1 innings.

UL-Monroe took two of three games from Jacksonville State last weekend at Indian Field. After a 2-3 start this season, the Indians have won six of their last nine games.

# The LSU-ULM Series

LSU leads the all-time series with ULM, 34-8, and the Tigers have won the last seven meetings between the schools, including a 7-1 victory earlier this season (Feb. 17) in Alex Box Stadium. The Indians' last victory over LSU came on February 14, 2001, a 7-6, 11-inning victory in Baton Rouge in Skip Bertman's final season as the Tigers' coach.

Tuesday's game marks LSU's first visit to Monroe since April 23, 2002, when the Tigers recorded a 10-3 victory. LSU has a 6-2 mark in its eight trips to Monroe since 1984.

Laval has a 6-0 mark against the Indians as LSU's coach; ULM coach Brad Holland has a 1-7 mark in his career versus the Tigers.

Laval served as the ULM coach for seven seasons (1994-2000), and he led the Indians to three NCAA Regional appearances and two Southland Conference championships.

Holland, Laval's top assistant at ULM, is in his fourth season as the Indians' coach.

LSU pitching coach Brady Wiederhold worked as an assistant coach under both Laval and Holland at ULM, and LSU admin. asst. Ted White is a former ULM catcher (1998-2002).

### Smoke Gets LSU Win No. 100

**Smoke Laval**, in his third season as the Tigers' head coach, earned his 100th LSU victory last Friday when the Tigers defeated Houston, 9-3. The 2003 SEC Coach of the Year, Laval has a 101-46-1 (.686) mark at LSU and a 342-205-1 (.625) record in 10 seasons as a collegiate head coach. He served as the head coach at Louisiana-Monroe for seven seasons (1994-2000) prior to taking the reins of the LSU program as head coach. Laval was an LSU assistant coach for 10 seasons (1984-93), helping to lead the Tigers to two national championships (1991, 1993), six College World Series appearances and five SEC titles.

# **Dirks Named SEC Pitcher of the Week**

Freshman left-hander **Clay Dirks** fired a four-hit shutout on March 2 to lead the Tigers to a 6-0 win over eighth-ranked Tulane at Zephyr Field in Metairie, La. Dirks allowed just two Green Wave runners to reach second base, and he retired 20 of the final 22 batters he faced. For that effort, Dirks was named Monday the SEC Pitcher of the Week by the league office.

Dirks, a redshirt freshman from Hernando, Miss., allowed just one double and three singles, and recorded one walk and seven strikeouts. Dirks, who was making just the third start of his collegiate career, missed the 2003 season after undergoing surgery on his elbow in the summer of 2002.

Dirks' gem marked the first complete-game shutout for an LSU pitcher since Brian Wilson blanked Florida on five hits on March 14, 2003. The game was LSU's first shutout as a team since April 15, 2003, when the Tigers blanked Tulane, 8-0, in Alex Box Stadium.

# **Tigers Continue Hit Parade**

The Tigers hit .378 (42-for-111) in last weekend's Houston series with eight doubles, one triple and one homer. Junior right fielder **Jon Zeringue** paced LSU's offensive effort by hitting .538 (7-for-13) in the series with three doubles, one triple, one homer, six RBI and three runs scored. Zeringue is LSU's leading hitter on the year, batting .434 (23-for-53) with 10 doubles, one triple, three homers and 14 RBI.

Sophomore catcher **Matt Liuzza** extended his hitting streak last weekend to 13 games, the longest of his career. Liuzza hit .462 (6-for-13) in the Houston series with one double and four RBI. He also launched a two-run homer in the Tigers' win over Tulane on Tuesday. On the year, Liuzza is hitting .396 (21-for-53) with four doubles, two homers and 13 RBI.

Junior center fielder **J.C. Holt** was LSU's top hitter for the four-game week (vs. Tulane and Houston), batting .500 (9-for-18) with two doubles, five RBI, five runs and a .550 on-base percentage. Holt raised his cumulative average to .426 (26-for-61) with three doubles, 11 RBI, 17 runs and a .470 on-base percentage.

# Liuzza Extends Hitting Streak to 13 Games

Sophomore catcher **Matt Liuzza** enters the ULM game riding a 13-game hitting streak, the longest of his career. During the streak, Liuzza is hitting .420 (21-for-50) with four doubles, two homers, 13 RBI, nine runs, a .620 slugging percentage and a . 444 on-base percentage. Liuzza's previous best streak came in 2003, when he hit safely in 12 straight games.

# **Bumstead Impressive Versus Houston**

Senior right-hander Nate Bumstead defeated Houston on Sunday with his best outing of the season, limiting the Cougars to two runs on nine hits in 8.1 innings with two walks and seven strike-outs. The Las Vegas, Nev., native carried a shutout into the ninth inning before surrendering a pair of runs in Houston's final at-bat.

Bumstead, who is working his way back from a pre-season shoulder injury, is now 2-0 on the year with a 3.18 ERA. He earned second-team all-SEC honors in 2003 after leading LSU in victories with 11.

# Tigers' Non-Conference Home Win Streak Finally Halted

LSU's streak of non-conference, regular-season home victories ended at 18 last Saturday when the Tigers dropped a 10-5 decision to Houston. Prior to Saturday, LSU's last loss in a non-conference regular-season game in Alex Box Stadium came on Feb. 22, 2003, when Houston, ironically, posted a 7-2 win.

## The LSU Injury Report

**INF Bryan Harris** -- Harris, a transfer from Santa Ana (Calif.) College, was projected to be the Tigers' starter at third base; however, a hernia operation limited his participation during fall practice, and he underwent arthroscopic surgery in January to remove bone chips from his right knee. He is still several weeks away from being able to contribute to the Tigers lineup.

**INF Matt Horwath** -- Horwath, a medical redshirt in 2003 after undergoing right shoulder surgery, started LSU's first seven games at shortstop this season before experiencing soreness in the shoulder. An MRI was performed on the shoulder on March 2, and doctors were scheduled to evaluate Horwath's condition after reading the MRI reports.

**RHP Brandon Nall** -- LSU's closer at the beginning of 2003, he pitched in just six games last season before suffering a torn labrum in his shoulder, which required surgery. He could return to the mound at some point this season, depending upon the progress of his rehabilitation.

### **SEC Coaches Select LSU to Repeat as League Champion**

The LSU Tigers are the favorite to win the Southeastern Conference Baseball Championship, as voted by the league's 12 baseball coaches in the 13th annual preseason SEC poll. The Tigers seek to capture their 14th SEC Championship, having won or shared the title three times in the past eight seasons (1996, 1997 & 2003) and seven times since 1990. LSU won the both the overall SEC Championship and Western Division titles in 2003. In the overall SEC Champion vote, LSU received 11 of the 12 championship votes in the poll, the most possible by one team. South Carolina received the other vote.

In addition to picking a preseason SEC champion, the league's head coaches voted a predicted order of finish in the SEC Eastern and Western Divisions. In the Eastern Division, South Carolina was the favorite with 63 points. Florida came in second with 58 points and Vanderbilt third with 42 points. LSU was the predicted winner in the Western Division with a total of 66, again collecting the maximum points for a team. Auburn was second with 51, while Ole Miss finished third with 41.

# Patterson, Harris Earn Collegiate Baseball Pre-Season Recognition

LSU outfielder **Ryan Patterson** and first baseman **Clay Harris** were named to the 2004 Collegiate Baseball pre-season all-America team. Patterson, a junior from Rowlett, Texas, was voted to the first team. Harris, a junior from Slidell, La., was a third-team selection.

Patterson earned first-team all-SEC honors last season as the Tigers' primary designated hitter, batting .350 (92-for-263) with 20 doubles, one triple, 16 homers and 51 RBI. He was voted to the NCAA Baton Rouge Regional all-tournament team, and he was named the state's Newcomer of the Year by the Louisiana Sportswriters Association.

Zeringue earned second-team all-SEC honors last season as the Tigers' right fielder, batting .339 (77-for-227) with 15 doubles, 13 homers and 45 RBI. He was LSU's leading hitter during the second half of the season (34 games) with a .382 average.

Holt, the 2003 NCAA Baton Rouge Regional Most Outstanding Player, hit .299 last season with 11 doubles, two triples, five homers, 36 RBI, 51 runs and 16 stolen bases. The Tigers' center fielder was also voted in August the MVP of the Cape Cod League, the wooden-bat summer league for the nation's top collegiate players. Holt batted a league-high .388 (52-for-134) in the CCBL with six doubles, one triple, one homer, 19 RBI, 25 runs and 13 steals.

### Wally Pontiff Jr. Baseball Classic Set for April 14 at Zephyr Field

LSU and Southeastern Louisiana will meet in the first Wally Pontiff Jr. Baseball Classic on Wednesday, April 14 at 7 p.m. at Zephyr Field in Metairie, La. The game was originally scheduled for Feb. 25, but was postponed due to inclement weather.

Tickets for the game are \$15, and all seating is reserved. Tickets are on sale at the SLU athletic ticket office(985.549.5466), located at Gate 3 of the University Center. Tickets are also on sale at the Zephyr Field box office (504.734.5155) and at any Ticketmaster locations (800.488.5252).

Pontiff, who was a two-time all-SEC selection at LSU, died unexpectedly on July 24, 2002 at 21. Pontiff started for the Tigers from 2000 through 2002 and was the Most Valuable Player of the 2000 SEC Tournament and helped the Tigers win the 2000 national championship.

Pontiff was also a two-time selection to the SEC Academic Honor Roll and was a member of the 2002 District VI all-academic baseball team with a 3.25 GPA in biological sciences.

The game will mark SLU's first visit to Zephyr Field since winning three games at the park to open the 1998 season. LSU has played at least one game in the park each season since 1998, posting a 9-7 overall mark. Southeastern and LSU have tentative plans to play again at Zephyr Field in 2005. The Lions and the Tigers will also meet in a three-game series this season at Alex Box Stadium March 12-14.

# **Smoke Laval**

**HEAD COACH • THIRD YEAR** 

Raymond "Smoke" Laval enhanced his reputation as one of the country's top college baseball coaches, as, in just his second season at the helm of the LSU program, he guided the 2003 Tigers to the Southeastern Conference title -- LSU's first since 1997 -- and a berth in the College World Series.

Laval, the 2003 SEC Coach of the Year, directed LSU to a 45-22-1 overall record and a 20-9-1 conference mark, as the Tigers finished No. 5 in the final Baseball America rankings.

The magnificent '03 campaign augmented the success Laval enjoyed in his inaugural season as LSU's coach, as he led the 2002 Tigers to a 44-22 overall mark, an appearance in the NCAA Super Regional and a No. 11 final national ranking.

Laval, who served seven seasons (1994-2000) as the head coach at the University of Louisiana-Monroe, assumed control of the LSU program from Bertman, who led the Tigers to five NCAA championships and 11 College World Series appearances during an 18-year (1984-2001) tenure. Laval worked as Bertman's top assistant coach for 10 seasons (1984-93), helping lead LSU to its first two NCAA titles in 1991 and 1993. During Laval's 10 years as assistant coach, LSU posted a 483-182-1 record, won five SEC titles, appeared in six College World Series and captured two national championships.

Laval was known at LSU as one of the nation's best recruiters and brightest assistant coaches, as the Tigers reached the College World Series in only the third season (1986) of the Bertman-Laval regime. LSU followed the '86 CWS appearance with Omaha berths in 1987, 1989 and 1990 before the Tigers claimed the school's first baseball national title in 1991. After LSU captured its second NCAA crown in 1993, Laval departed Baton Rouge to become the head coach at Northeast Louisiana (now Louisiana-Monroe).

During his assistant coaching tenure at LSU, Laval -- who worked as the Tigers' primary recruiter - tutored 24 players who would eventually reach the major leagues. Some of the major leaguers with whom Laval worked include all-stars Albert Belle and Paul Byrd and first-round pick Todd Walker.

Laval compiled a 241-159 (.603) mark as the head coach at ULM, guiding the Indians to NCAA Regional appearances in 1995, 1999 and 2000.

Laval began his coaching career in 1977 as an assistant at Jacksonville University before moving to Wolfson High School in Jacksonville as a baseball and football coach. He served as a graduate assistant at LSU in 1979 under former Tiger head coach Jack Lamabe before working two years as an assistant at Gulf Coast Community College in Panama City, Fla.

Laval served as an assistant coach at Florida for two seasons (1982-83) before returning to LSU to work under Bertman.

Laval holds a bachelor's degree (1977) from Jacksonville in physical education and a master's degree (1979) from LSU in administration. The McDonald, Pa., native played two seasons at Gulf Coast Community College, where he lettered as a catcher. He completed his playing career at Jacksonville, where he led the ninth-ranked Dolphins in hitting at the 1976 NCAA South Regional.


