Did You Know?

Georgia junior QB **David Greene** has gone 139 pass attempts without an interception. This streak dates back to the fourth quarter of the 2002 Auburn game which Georgia ultimately won 24-21 for the SEC Eastern Division title. In fact, Greene is on pace to set the Bulldog record for Lowest Interception Percentage. He has 17 in 775 attempts which gives him a 2.19 percentage. **Eric Zeier** (1991-94) holds the record at 2.64 as he had 37 interceptions in 1,402 attempts. Zeier holds the consecutive attempts without an INT mark at 176.

Georgia-LSU Storylines

*Georgia's Scoring Defense, ranked 1st in the SEC and 3rd nationally, has allowed just 17 points in the first 3 games (5.7 avg.). The 17 points are the fewest since 1998 when that squad surrendered just 15 through the first three. Meanwhile, LSU ranks 2nd in the SEC and 4th nationally in Scoring Offense at 47.7 points a game and 2nd in Scoring Defense at 9.0 points a game.

*Georgia has not lost on an opponent's home field in the Mark Richt era. The Bulldogs are 9-0 including wins at #6 Tennessee (2001), #21 Ga. Tech (2001), #22 Alabama (2002) and #24 Auburn (2002).

*Saturday's game will be only the 3rd time that both teams are ranked in the AP Top 25. The road team has won each time. In 1987, #7 LSU beat #16 Georgia 26-23 in Athens while in 1998, the #12 Bulldogs edged the #6 Tigers 28-27 in Baton Rouge.

*LSU's coaching staff features two former Bulldog captains in Will Muschamp (defensive coordinator) and Travis Jones (defensive line) while special teams coordinator/running backs coach Derek Dooley is the son of Georgia athletic director Vince Dooley. Jones and Dooley were graduate assistants on Jim Donnan's staff. Also, Dooley, a 1991 Virginia alum, earned a law degree from Georgia.

Georgia-LSU Series

LSU leads the series 12-9-1 but the series is locked at 4-4-1 in Baton Rouge and Tiger Stadium. **The margin of victory in the last two meetings has been one point** as then #12 Georgia posted a 28-27 win over #6 LSU in Baton Rouge in 1998 and the following year hung on for a 23-22 victory in Athens.

Last Meeting: Oct. 2, 1999 in Athens: Linebacker Will Witherspoon batted down a potential game-winning pass on a two-point conversion by Josh Booty with 18 seconds left as #10 Georgia held on to defeat LSU 23-22 in front of a sellout Sanford Stadium crowd of 86,117. LSU held a 16-13 lead at the half and carried that advantage to the fourth quarter. Georgia went on top after a 12-yard TD pass from Quincy Carter to Randy McMichael and then extended the lead to 23-16 on a 33-yard field goal by Hap Hines with 3:59 remaining in the game. However, Booty connected with Reggie Robinson for a 33-yard TD with 18 seconds left and then coach Gerry DiNardo opted to go for two. Georgia's defense held LSU to 11 rushing yards on 21 attempts while Bulldog running back Jasper Sanks enjoyed a big day with 156 yards on 27 carries. It was an emotional win for the Bulldogs who wore stickers with the initials "PW" on their helmets and caps in memory of assistant coach Pat Watson who died of a heart attack a week earlier following a 24-23 win over Central Florida.

Last Visit to Baton Rouge: Oct. 3, 1998: Offensive fireworks were on display in the first half followed by staunch defense in the second half by both squads in this night-time thriller before 80,792 fans (the 2nd largest crowd at the time for Tiger Stadium). The 12th-ranked Bulldogs held #6 LSU to a pair of field goals in the second half for a 28-27 win. The game was tied at 21 at the half. Bulldog freshman QB Quincy Carter (27-for-34, 318 yards, 2 TDs) tied a school record by completing his first 15 passes of the game while Champ Bailey was everywhere. The All-American and eventual first-round pick was in on 96 plays (34 offense, 47 defense, 15 special teams), posting a career-high seven catches for 114 yards and one TD plus three kickoff returns for 66 yards and 15 rushing yards. LSU got within one after a 41-yard field goal by Chris Chauvin at the 5:08 mark in the final quarter. Georgia managed a pair of first downs to run out the clock including a huge 21-yard completion from Carter to Bailey on a 3rd and 6 from the Georgia 24 to preserve the win.

Death Valley...Part II

Georgia opened its season at Clemson's Death Valley and posted a 30-0 shutout over the Tigers. Now, the Bulldogs head to Baton Rouge and Tiger Stadium, also referred to as "Death Valley." Georgia has made these trips in the same season just once before. In 1990 under Ray Goff, the Bulldogs opened the season with an 18-13 road loss to LSU and then in week five, they lost 34-3 at Clemson.

Cooper Makes His Case For Starting Role

With the departure of junior running back *Musa Smith* (260 att., 1,324 yards, 8 TDs) to the NFL, one preseason question for the Bulldogs centered around production from the running game. While sophomore **Tony Milton** started the first two games, the next two to make their case for an increased role have been junior **Ronnie Powell** and redshirt freshman **Michael Cooper**. They took turns as the number two back. Powell was the backup against Clemson while Cooper saw more action against MTSU. The trio combined for 152 yards on 36 carries versus the Tigers. Powell led the group against Clemson with a career-high 17 carries for 54 yards while Milton had 14 attempts for 53 yards. Prior to the Clemson game, Powell had just 11 carries for 28 yards and 1 TD in his career.



Meanwhile, Cooper turned heads when he made his debut in the fourth quarter against Clemson. On his first carry, he dashed 25 yards. On the very next play, he scampered 37 yards for a TD only to have it nullified by a holding penalty. He finished with five carries for 45 yards. Against MTSU, Milton left early due to a thigh bruise and Cooper was the team's leading rusher with 12 carries for 90 yards and 2 TDs. With Milton sidelined due to a leg injury, Cooper made his first start against South Carolina and gained 82 yards on 14 carries with 2 TDs. On his first carry versus USC, he broke open for a 46-yard gain. Cooper has become a fan favorite at Sanford Stadium as the crowd chants "Cooop" after his carries. For the season, Cooper is averaging 7.0 yards a carry (31 att., 217 yards, 3 TDs).

Milton saw the most action in 2002, appearing in all 14 games including a start against Kentucky when Smith was sidelined with a thumb injury. Against the Wildcats, the 5-10, 198-pound Milton had a career-high 18 carries for 78 yards. A solid blocker, he also had nine receptions for 27 yards last year. Freshman **Kregg Lumpkin**, a 6-1, 211-pound Parade All-American out of Stephenson HS, made his debut against USC with 7 carries for 32 yards. A hamstring injury from preseason camp kept him on the sidelines for the first two games.

LET'S PLAY TWO: Bulldog QBs Greene and Shockley

Georgia began the 2002 season with a two-quarterback system of then sophomore **David Greene** and redshirt freshman **D.J. Shockley** but that was halted when Shockley broke a bone in his left foot against South Carolina in game two. He missed the next four games and returned to action versus Vanderbilt. Greene saw a majority of action the rest of the season. In 2003, Georgia coach Mark Richt has employed a two-quarterback rotation of Greene and Shockley.

In his 29 games as the starting QB, David Greene's mistakes rarely occur in the second half. Of the 25 turnovers (19 INTs, 6 Fumbles) in his career, only six have come in the 2nd half and those six have been turned into just 14 points. He has had four turnovers in the fourth quarter (2 INTs, 2 Fumbles) and Georgia lost just one of those games, the 2001 Music City Bowl versus Boston College. A fumble led to a touchdown as BC posted a 20-16 win. The other points came against Alabama last season on an interception return for a TD with 8:24 left to give the Tide a brief 25-24 advantage. Greene would rally the Bulldogs and Billy Bennett's 32-yard field goal with 38 second proved to be the difference.

FIND 47: Pollack Keys Bulldog Defensive Line

All-American David Pollack, a 6-3, 276-pound junior native of Snellville, Ga., headlines the returning starters on the defensive line. He has fought more double teams this year but is still making an impact to go with 20 tackles. For example versus Clemson, Pollack's fourth quarter interception all but ended the contest and sent Tiger fans heading for the exits while MTSU and South Carolina had multiple penalties trying to contain Pollack and the line's pressure.

The vaunted line is missing several components from a year ago. *Jonathan Sullivan* is gone from the middle after the junior was the sixth player taken in the NFL draft (New Orleans). His replacement, senior **Ken Veal** missed the 1st 2 games with an ankle injury while junior DE **Will Thompson** was lost for the year after a dislocated ankle during fall camp. Junior **Robert Geathers**, who began last season as a starter at DE, takes over for Thompson. Also, RS-freshman **Quentin Moses** and **Ray Gant** have done well. Moses had a huge game against MTSU, recording a career-high 8 tackles and 1 sack.

Secondary Impact: Davis and Jones Making Stops

A year ago, Georgia's secondary was a question mark with only one returning player. However in 2003, the Bulldogs feature a veteran group including seniors **Bruce Thornton**, **Decory Bryant**, **Kentrell Curry** along with junior safety **Sean Jones** and sophomores **Thomas Davis** and **Tim Jennings**. The secondary for the first two games was dangerously thin on experience due to a slew of injuries and players serving game suspensions. Curry has a stress fracture in right leg and his replacement sophomore **Greg Blue** injured the posterior cruciate ligament in his right knee during fall camp so neither have played yet.



Davis, who was projected to start at OLB was moved back to the secondary at safety where he started two games last year. **Davis leads the team with 31 tackles including 22 solo stops while Jones ranks third with 25 tackles. Against Clemson, Davis led all tacklers with a career-high 11 and earned SEC Defensive Player of the Week honors.** Meanwhile, Jones had a big game in the win

over USC, snagging two interceptions (2 vs. Auburn in 2002) and making 11 tackles, one off his career-high of 12 against Tennessee last season. The Bulldogs returned sophomores DBs **Jennings** and **DeMario Minter** for the USC game after they served out two-game suspensions. While they were out, freshmen walk-on safety **Tra Battle**, former RBs turned DBs **Kenny Bailey** and **Mike Gilliam** plus redshirt freshman safety **Olaolu Sanni-Osomo** gained some experience.

Taylor Leads New Faces in the Middle

With the graduation of **Boss Bailey** and **Tony Gilbert**, and the early departure of junior **Chris Clemons**, all now in the National Football League, the Bulldogs were forced to replace their starting linebacker trio. The last time Georgia had three new starting linebackers in one season was 1979, the year after Steve Dennis and Ricky McBride graduated and junior Danny Rogers was forced to miss most of his senior campaign with an ankle injury. Freshman Nate Taylor and junior Frank Ros took over the reigns as Georgia's starting linebackers in 1979-80. Taylor was eventually a four-year starter for the Bulldogs and Ros was the team captain for the 1980 national championship team (From 1979-87 Georgia's defense played under a two-linebacker system).

Georgia's starters for the season opener vs. Clemson were junior **Arnold Harrison** (SLB), sophomore **Derrick White** (MLB) and sophomore **Tony Taylor** (WLB), Nate's son. **Taylor was the only one of the group to have started a game for the Bulldogs.** He played in all 14 games last year and started versus Georgia Tech. He earned the team's Most Improved Linebacker Award after spring practice. **Taylor ranks 2nd on the team with 30 tackles including 18 solo stops.** Against MTSU, he had a career-high 17 tackles and he followed that up with 8 tackles and his first interception in the win over USC.

Harrison moved into a starting role when **Thomas Davis** had to go back to safety during fall camp after injuries to Kentrell Curry and Greg Blue. Harrison has been a key performer on special teams and served as a reserve linebacker in his first two seasons. Sophomore **Odell Thurman**, a junior college transfer from Georgia Military College, has started the last two games at MLB. He began his career at Georgia in 2001 and sat out as a partial-qualifier. On Aug. 22 this year, Odell's 40-year-old father Otis passed away, and he returned home to Monticello to be with his family for a few days. Thurman's mother died in 1993. Against Clemson, White started and recorded a career-high six stops while Thurman saw a lot of action too and tallied four tackles. Thurman posted his biggest day in the win over USC, making a career-high and team-best 13 tackles.

Bulldog Defense: The Bite to Go With The Bark...Again

Despite losing six players to the NFL in 2001, the Georgia defense under **Brian VanGorder** played a huge role in the success of the SEC and Nokia Sugar Bowl champion Bulldogs in 2002. The defense finished third nationally with Oklahoma with 29 scoreless quarters. Kansas State and Maryland finished 1-2 with 34 and 30 scoreless quarters.

The 2003 defense has looked equally impressive through the first three games with 9 scoreless quarters and allowing just 17 points. First, the Bulldogs posted a 30-0 shutout at Clemson despite missing four starters due to injury. It marked Georgia's first shutout in the Mark Richt Era and first since 2000 (New Mexico State). **The first team defense has allowed just a 41-yard field goal (MTSU) this season.**

Now Who's Looking Out for #1

Junior FLK **Fred Gibson**, Georgia's top kick-off returner and big-play receiver, injured his left hamstring on a kickoff late in the win over MTSU. Then, he reinjured the hamstring after his first catch in the first quarter of the South Carolina game. Enter **Reggie Brown**, the junior from Carrollton, has posted his best two games of his Bulldog career to help fill the void with Gibson out.

He served as the special teams captain against MTSU and recorded a career-high 7 catches for 88 yards. Then in the win over USC, Brown topped that performance with 7 catches for 104 yards and 2 TDs and was named the CBS-TV MVP. It was his first 100-yard receiving game of his career.



Brown has provided a spark to the offense usually reserved for Gibson. In

fact, the last two seasons the first time Gibson has touched the ball he has scored a TD. Against Clemson this year, he caught a 56-yard TD pass from David Greene while in 2001, he scored on his first touch when he took a kickoff back 91 yards versus the Tigers.

Gibson posted his 8th career game with 100+ yards receiving when he collected 104 yards on four catches in the 30-3 win over Clemson in this year's season opener. Former Bulldog Terrence Edwards (1999-2002), now with the Atlanta Falcons, holds the school record with 10. Against MTSU, Gibson had 5 rec. for 81 yards.

From Walk-On to Starter: Part III



Junior **Jeremy Thomas** is the third starting fullback in as many years to go from walk-on to scholarship starter for the Bulldogs. Thomas, a 5-11, 238-pounder from Loganville, Ga., has followed the same path as Verron Haynes and J.T. Wall. All three started out at smaller schools then opted to shoot for the big time and enroll at UGA, joining the Bulldogs first as a walk-on for the scout team. Haynes (5th Rd./2001) and Wall (7th Rd./2002) now are playing for the Pittsburgh Steelers after getting drafted. Against Clemson, Thomas started and had 2 rushes for 5 yards.

Haynes started at Western Kentucky, Wall began at Southwest Baptist University and Thomas was at the Air Force Academy. After a year of playing fullback for the junior varsity and making the Dean's List in 2000, Thomas returned home and headed to Georgia in 2001 where the LB/FB made his mark as a member of the scout team and on special teams. In 2002, he missed the first part of the season with a shoulder injury and ended up playing in six games including one start at FB in the SEC Championship Game victory over Arkansas.

Georgia's other fullbacks are sophomore **Jamario Smith** (also a walk-on and former LB), redshirt freshman **Chris Hickman** and senior walk-on **Jeff Lyons**. Smith started his career at Gordon College in Barnesville, Ga., which doesn't have football. He walked on in 2002 and played in six games at linebacker

including the entire second half against Ole Miss last year. Lyons, who was moved from TE three weeks before the opener, began his career at Guilford College in Greensboro, N.C. He was Thomas' backup for the Clemson game.

Bennett Owns Nation's Second Longest Extra Point Streak

Senior kicker Billy Bennett, a Lou Groza Award candidate for the second consecutive season, has made 97 consecutive extra point attempts, a streak that ranks as the second longest in the nation.

Dusty Mangum (Texas) currently leads the nation with 105 consecutive extra points made while senior Nicholas Setta of Notre Dame is third at 89. Bennett has not missed an extra point since Nov. 8, 2000 against Ole Miss. He finished 2nd nationally last season with 52 consecutive extra points made, trailing Mangum (54).

Gary Closing In On Bulldog Punt Return Records

Senior FLK Damien Gary, an Athens native, is on pace to own the Bulldog punt return records as he ranks 2nd in school history in Punt Return Yards (1,029) and 2nd in Punt Returns (88). Last season, Gary saw action in 11 of Georgia's 14 games but was not listed in the final NCAA or



SEC rankings because he did not meet the minimum requirement of playing in 75% of the team's games. Gary had 34 returns for 458 yards and 1 TD (a 71-yarder vs. New Mexico State) along with 27 receptions for 254 yards and 4 TDs.

Already with two punt returns for TDs in his career, Gary added a kickoff return for a TD this season. When South Carolina tried an onside kick, Gary scooped it up on one hop and dashed 44 yards to the endzone.

During the 2002 season, he was ranked as high as 8th nationally in punt return average at 15.2 before getting injured. He returned to action in the SEC Championship game Dec. 7 after missing four games due to acute compartment syndrome in his left leg. Team doctor Robert Hancock performed emergency surgery on Gary at St. Mary's Hospital in Athens on Oct. 27, the day after the Kentucky game. He had two more surgeries after that, the third one by a plastic surgeon involving a skin graft to close the wound.

Gary has battled to overcome injuries since his prep career at Clarke Central. He played in only five games as a junior in 1997 due to a broken arm and missed his senior year with a torn ACL. He got a medical redshirt as a freshman at Georgia in 1999 after playing in the first two games before injuring his thumb. As a sophomore, a strained back and sprained knee limited his effectiveness and then there was the leg injury in 2002.

Special Teams Impact

Georgia has a new punter for the first time in four seasons after Jonathan Kilgo graduated. Redshirt freshman **Gordon Ely-Kelso**, a 6-2, 227-pound native of Athens, made his debut against Clemson. Senior PK **Billy Bennett** now handles kickoff duties after Brett Kirouac graduated. Ely-Kelso has put 55% of his punts inside the 20, two have been for 50+ yards and only two have been returned for a total of 12 yards.

Overall, Georgia's special teams play has made a dramatic impact in the success of the program under Mark Richt. In fact, **Georgia set a school record by blocking five punts and four field goals in 2002.** The 1999 squad was the last to have such a huge year when they blocked four punts and two field goals. **The nine blocks led to 40 points** (5 TDs, 1 FG, 1 Safety, 1 Missed Field Goal and 1 Punt). Five different Bulldogs blocked a punt last season and they all return in 2003. **Sean Jones** (Northwestern State), **Thomas Davis** (New Mexico State), **Reggie Brown** (Tennessee), **David Pollack** (Vanderbilt) and **Decory Bryant** (Arkansas in the SEC Championship) all blocked a punt in helping Georgia post victories in 2002.

Also, Pollack blocked a field goal (Alabama). The other three blocked field goals were the result of the high-flying feats of linebacker Boss Bailey (Tennessee, Ole Miss and Georgia Tech). He now suits up for the Detroit Lions after being selected in the 2nd round of the 2003 NFL draft.

Serving It Up Family Style, For a Party of Four

There are some familiar names around the Georgia program again this year, as has been the case for several years. The Bulldogs have successfully recruited players whose brothers or fathers have taken the field for the red and black. This year, the four families include:

BAILEY: Senior CB Kenny Bailey is a cousin of the Bailey trio of Ronald, Champ and Boss. Ronald, was a CB for the Bulldogs from 1995-97; Champ was a CB from 1996-98 who earned All-America honors and was the No. 1 draft choice of the Washington Redskins in 1999 and made All-Pro by 2000; Boss was a LB from 1998-99, 01-02 who earned All-America honors, led the Bulldogs to the 2002 SEC title and 2nd round draft pick of the Detroit Lions.

Kenny appeared in all 14 games last season and tallied 11 tackles.

McCLENDON: Sophomore WR Bryan McClendon is the son of former Georgia standout RB Willie McClendon (1976-78), who was captain of the 1978 squad and the SEC Player-of-the-Year that season. He went on to play professionally with the Chicago Bears.

Bryan saw action in 11 games last season with five receptions for 90 yards including a career-long 37-yarder versus Vanderbilt.

TAYLOR: Sophomore LB Tony Taylor is the son of former Georgia standout linebacker Nate Taylor (1979-82) who was a member of the 1980 national championship squad and part of three SEC Championship teams.

Tony played in all 14 games last season including one start against Ga. Tech. He registered 38 tackles (20 solo, 18 assist) for the year. He is a starter in 2003. He had a career-high 17 tackles including 12 solo stops in the 29-10 win over MTSU this season.

TERESHINSKI: RS-Freshman QB Joe Tereshinski III is a third generation Bulldog. His father, Joe Jr. (1974-76), was the starting center on Georgia's 1976 SEC champion Sugar Bowl team while his father, Joe Tereshinski Sr. (1942, '45, '46) was a member of Georgia's 1942 Rose Bowl championship squad as well as the 1946 SEC and Sugar Bowl championships teams.

Joe was a valuable member of the scout team last season as a redshirt. He saw his first action in the opener against Clemson. He just might be the first Bulldog in history to ever snap and play quarterback in the same game. He made his debut as a snapper on a punt in the 2nd quarter and then played quarterback in the 4th quarter.

Uga VI, now in his fifth season after being thrust into the role following his father's retirement during the 1999 season. In a memorable pregame "passing of the bone" ceremony at the 1999 South Carolina contest, Uga VI officially took the reins as Georgia's mascot. At the time of his coronation, the one-year-old pure white English Bulldog outweighed his father by 11 pounds, tipping the scales at 55 pounds. He is registered with the American Kennel Club as **Uga V's Whatcha Got Lorán**.

In 2002, UGA VI stayed busy. He made a trip to Washington D.C. on a private jet with athletic director Vince Dooley and Coach Mark Richt as UGA VI was the guest of honor at a UGA reception for Georgia congressmen. Also in 2002, a video on the history of all the UGA mascots was released and a book chronicling the home life and travels of all the UGA mascots titled "Damn Good Dogs."

Sanford Stadium Increases Capacity to 92,058

Georgia's average home football attendance of 86,520 ranked sixth best in the country for the 2002 season according to the NCAA. All 2002 games were sold out and all in 2003 will be too.

*The Bulldogs latest addition this season has brought Sanford Stadium's capacity to 92,058, the fifth largest on campus stadium in the country.

*The new seats added are in one location above the existing North side upper deck.

*Estimated cost of the expansion was \$21 million and was part of an overall project approved by the Athletic Board for facility construction and improvements.

*The overall project includes a \$2 million renovation of the football locker room area at the Butts-Mehre

Building; \$750,000 for construction of a football "Hall of Fame" on the second level of the Butts-Mehre Building; and \$4.2 million for a new women's softball field/complex.

TOUGH TICKET IN 2002

Facing the greatest football season ticket demand in the history of the program, the University of Georgia Athletic Association refunded approximately 3,700 people. All 2002 home games were sellouts.

Georgia's season ticket priority system is broken down into three categories: (1) Contributors, (2) Alumni who did not contribute and (3) the General Public. The contributors are filled according to their cumulative contributions while the alumni and general public orders are filled according to the date they are received by the ticket office.

Bulldogs Team Up for Second Habitat Project

The Georgia football team again traded in its helmets and shoulder pads for hammers and nails this summer to build a Habitat for Humanity home for a needy family. The Georgia players and coaches, in conjunction with HomeBanc Mortgage Corporation and Habitat for Humanity, worked on the home each Saturday throughout the summer, beginning the first week of May. The new home for April Lumpkin and her family was dedicated on Friday, Aug. 8 in Athens.

"This was a winning experience for everyone," Georgia coach Mark Richt said. "It was a great team building experience for our players and coaches. They got to see first hand the value of giving back to their community and we provided a home for someone who may not have achieved that dream on her own."

Former Georgia linebacker John Brantley, now a branch manager at HomeBanc's Athens office, has worked on Habitat for Humanity projects in the past. His discussions with Richt last year resulted in HomeBanc's first partnership building a Habitat home with the team in 2002.

"As a former Georgia football player, I am honored that Coach Richt and the team chose to partner with HomeBanc again this year," Brantley said. "This commitment represents the character that Coach Richt possesses and is establishing among the staff, players and all involved in the UGA football program. And that character and team work obviously pay off on game day."

In the spring and summer of 2002, the Bulldogs completed a home for Athens resident Dixie McCoy. It was the first time in Habitat for Humanity history that an entire college football program had partnered on the construction of a Habitat home.

Cash Option

After a two-year mark of 21-5 including Georgia's first SEC title in 20 years, Bulldog coach **Mark Richt** and UGA locked each other up this past summer with annual \$1.5 million contract through 2010. The contract is the longest and richest in Georgia history. The eight-year deal for Richt includes a \$1.5 million buyout for each year left on the contract through 2007 plus an \$800,000 buyout for each of the years from 2008-10.

"This is where I want to be," said Richt. "It (the buyout terms) didn't bother me one bit. I didn't blink and eye. It just says Georgia wants me and I want Georgia. I know I wanted Georgia from Day One. We like it here a lot."

DT Sullivan And OL Foster Headline Seven Bulldog Selections in the 2003 NFL Draft

Georgia was the only school in the Southeastern Conference to have a pair of first round selections in the 2003 NFL draft. The first Bulldog drafted was DT **Johnathan Sullivan** who the New Orleans tabbed with the sixth pick. Then, OT **George Foster** went to the Denver Broncos with the 20th pick. In the second round, the Detroit Lions selected OLB **Boss Bailey** (34th) while the Saints picked another Bulldog in OL **Jon Stinchcomb** (37th). In the third round, the Baltimore Ravens picked RB **Musa Smith** (77th). LB **Tony Gilbert** went in the 6th round to the Arizona Cardinals while FB **J.T. Wall** was taken in the 7th round by the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Florida and Tennessee led the SEC with eight players drafted followed by the Bulldogs with seven. The SEC led all conferences with 43 players taken followed by the Big Ten and Big 12 with 35 apiece.

Also, five former Bulldogs signed free agent contracts with NFL squads: OL **Kevin Breedlove** (San Diego), LB **Chris Clemons** (Washington), DE **Nic Clemons** (Washington), SE **Terrence Edwards** (Atlanta) and OL **Kareem Marshall** (Philadelphia). However, Edwards was the lone Bulldog in this group to make a team's 53-man roster.

Good as Golston Now

Sophomore nose tackle **Kedric Golston** started against Clemson, marking the second year in a row he started the season opener. That's great news for the 6-4, 295-pounder out of Tyrone, Ga who came close to never playing football again after a horrible car accident in September of 2001.

In less than a year's time, Golston went from a hospital bed with a severe leg injury to a big contributor for the Bulldogs. About two years ago, he broke his right femur in an automobile accident. Post-operative complications followed, and he was in intensive care for almost two weeks. Then on Aug. 20, 2002, Coach Richt informed Golston he had been promoted to first team nose-tackle. Last year, Golston was the first true freshman nose tackle to start since 1994 when *Travis Stroud* lined up against Northeast Louisiana in game three.

Golston, who played the entire season with a rod and pin in his leg, collected four tackles (3 solo) and one for a loss of two yards in that first start versus the Tigers. One of Golston's best games came in the win over #10 Tennessee when he registered a career-high six tackles and recovered a fumble.

Golston had the rod and pin removed in January and said he feels much quicker now because at times last season he felt like he was dragging his leg around.

Golston along with **Darius Swain**, and CB **Tim Jennings** were named to *The Sporting News* Freshman All-America team and All-SEC Freshmen squads last season. Also, Swain and Jennings were selected to the SEC Coaches All-SEC Freshmen Team. Swain made four starts, Jennings had three starts while Golston started the first three games at NT.

For the year, LB **Tony Taylor** led all freshmen in tackles with 38 while Swain had 37, Golston 34 and Jennings 32. They played in all 14 games last season.

Frequent Foes On the Docket

With Clemson and Alabama on the schedule for the second year in a row, the Bulldogs will face nine of their top 10 most frequent rivals in 2003. Georgia has played more games against Auburn than any other team. The only school missing in Georgia's top 10 will be Ole Miss (#9) as the Rebels have rotated off the SEC schedule until 2007.

DTs **Marcus Stroud** (Jacksonville) and **Richard Seymour** (New England) started the streak in 2000, then came DE **Charles Grant** (New Orleans) in 2001 and most recently DT **Jonathan Sullivan** (New Orleans) in 2002.

"It's The Shoes"

For the first time since the 1996 season, Georgia is wearing black cleats. Actually, this will be the sixth straight game for the Bulldogs in black shoes after trading in their white cleats for black turf shoes for the SEC Championship and Nokia Sugar Bowl matchups in domed stadiums. Currently, Georgia is 5-0. As Bike-messenger **Mars Blackmon** once said, "it's the shoes."
