LSU READY TO OPEN 108TH SEASON

On their 108th season, as they host the 99th Peach Bowl (No. 14 AP poll/No. 17 ESPN/USA Today) will take on their interstate rivals for the first time in three years following their 28-14 victory over Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl in Atlanta, Ga. LSU enters the season with a 70-35 loss at BYU last week-time in their season-opener, which includes a 35-28 loss to Utah State in the season opener. The LSU schedule includes a 10-game home slate, including the SEC Championship game in Atlanta, Ga. on Dec. 1.

NOTES ON THE 2000 LSU TIGERS

- The Tigers went from 3-8 to 8-4, punctuating their remarkable turnaround with a 28-14 victory over Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl in Atlanta, Ga.
- Josh Reed posted the second most productive season ever for an LSU receiver, amassing 1,127 yards and 10 touchdowns.
- Robert Royal broke the LSU record for most touchdown receptions in a single season by a tight end with five, passing Brian Kinchen (1986) and current LSU color analyst Doug Moreau (1964) who both posted four.
- LSU set a single season record for attendance, averaging 87,115 fans per home contest, ranking fifth in the nation in 2000.

TIGERS LOOK FOR SIXTH STRAIGHT SEASON OPENING WIN

The LSU Tigers enter Saturday night's game looking to extend their streak of season-opening victories to six. Since falling to Texas A&M at College Station to open the 1995 season, the Tigers have rattled off five straight season opening victories, including a 58-0 decision against Western Carolina. The streak of consecutive opening night victories is the longest since a run of eight straight season opening wins from 1962-69.

THE SERIES

Saturday's game marks the return of the one of the South's great traditional rivalries. The game will be the 94th all-time meeting between the two schools, but the first since 1996. The Tigers and Green Wave played every year from 1919-1994. LSU has won 13 consecutive decisions in the series and 36 of the last 40 meetings between the two schools overall. Saturday's contest will mark the earliest the teams have ever met - LSU has never opened a season against Tulane. In 1898, LSU did play Tulane in its only contest that year - a 37-0 win in Baton Rouge.

TIGERS-GREEN WAVE BATTLE FOR "RAG" FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 1981

For the first time since 1981, LSU and Tulane will battle for "the Rag." Following a fight between the fans of the two schools after a 14-0 Tulane win in 1938, the student bodies of the two schools decided on a peaceful settlement. Starting in 1939, the winner of the annual LSU-Tulane clash would get to walk off with the rag, ceremonial bragging rights for an entire year. The two schools competed for the rag each year until 1981. Following a Tulane victory, the rag mysteriously disappeared and was never found again. The student bodies of the two schools agreed to bring the tradition back this year.

TIGERS RANKED IN PRESEASON POLLS FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 1998

The Tigers open the 2001 season ranked in the top 25 for the first time since the 1998 season. LSU holds the No. 14 spot in the AP poll, while being ranked 17th in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll. The Tigers entered the 1998 season ranked No. 7 in the AP poll and No. 8 in the coaches poll.

The Tigers have become a popular Top 25 choice among other preseason polls, ranging as high as No. 10 by ESPN.com and the Sporting News.

EARLIEST SEASON OPENER EVER FOR TIGERS

The Tigers' Sept. 1 showdown with Tulane is the earliest the Tigers' have ever started a season. Previously, the earliest the Tigers ever started a season was in 2000 when they opened up on Sept. 2. The mark will only last one year, however, as the Tigers will open up at Virginia Tech next year on Aug. 31, the first time the Tigers will have ever played a game in August.

LSU SETS RECORD FOR SEASON TICKET HOLDERS

Optimism is at an all-time high at LSU and the number of season ticket holders this year supports that notion. LSU sold more than 62,600 season tickets, a school record, after receiving better than 98 percent renewals from last year while adding more than 4,000 new season ticket holders.

SEVERAL TIGERS AMONG NATION'S ELITE ACCORDING TO SPORTING NEWS

Trev Faulk was rated as the nation's top middle linebacker, while Ryan Clark was ranked as the second best free safety in America according to the Sporting News College Football issue, released in July. Faulk, who finished second in the SEC in tackles in 2000, was also listed as the No. 2 overall candidate for the Butkus Award, honoring the nation's top linebacker.

In addition, the Sporting News ranked the Tigers' linebacking corps of Faulk, Bradie James and Jeremy Lawrence the best in the nation. Other Tigers included among the nation's elite in the Sporting News preseason rankings included Robert Royal, ranked the third best tight end in the nation. Senior defensive end Jarvis Green was rated as the nation's seventh best at his position, while Josh Reed was rated No. 9 at wide receiver and James as the 10th-best outside linebacker. Domanick Davis, who ranks second in school history in kickoff return yardage with 1,190 career yards, is listed as the nation's ninth-best return man, while quarterback Rohan Davey is ranked 20th.

TIGERS PICKED TO WIN SEC WEST

LSU has been picked to win the Southeastern Conference's Western Division, according to a poll taken by members of the media at SEC Football Media Days in Birmingham, Ala. The Tigers received 40 of a possible 84 first place votes to edge out second place Mississippi State in the Western Division. Florida was the overwhelming choice in the Eastern Division as the Gators tallied 78 first place votes. Rounding out the Western Division were Alabama in third, followed by Auburn, Arkansas and Ole Miss. Florida was followed by Tennessee, South Carolina, Georgia, Vanderbilt and Kentucky.

SABAN STEPS UP FUTURE SCHEDULE

The Tigers open the 2001 season against Tulane, their toughest season opener since traveling to Texas A&M in 1995. Player a team from a major conference is a trend LSU head coach Nick Saban looks to continue in the future. The Tigers will travel to Blacksburg, Va., next year to open the 2002 season at Virginia Tech, while the Hokies will return the visit to LSU in 2004 to open the season. LSU will open the 2003 season at Arizona. It is Saban's intention to play at least one major non-conference game each season.

DAVEY ON O'BRIEN AWARD 'WATCH LIST'

LSU quarterback Rohan Davey is one of 30 players on the "watch list" for the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award. Davey is one of four Southeastern Conference quarterbacks to be on the list and is joined by Casey Clausen of Tennessee, Jared Lorenzen of Kentucky and Rex Grossman of Florida. The list of 30 will be cut to eight the first week of November with the winner being announced on Dec. 6.

DAVEY A MODEL OF EFFICIENCY

One of the keys to LSU quarterback Rohan Davey's success is his efficiency. After starting the season a perfect 11 for 11 against Western Caroling, the senior from Miami threw seven touchdown passes to just one interception in 2000. In addition, he completed an impressive 64.4 percent of his passes a year ago, the second highest completion percentage in LSU history.

JOSH REED CLOSES IN ON TOP 10 ALL-TIME LSU RECEIVING LISTS

After a breakout season in 2000 in which he amassed 1,127 yards receiver, Josh Reed is only 275 yards away from breaking into LSU's top 10 all-time receiving yardage list. He is only 25 receptions away from moving into the top 10 in all-time receptions. His 10 touchdowns already rank ninth in school history. The junior from Rayne, La., needs two to move up to eighth. His 1,127 yards receiving and 10 touchdown receptions in 2000 both rank second in LSU history in single-season performances.

JOSH REED AND 100-YARD GAMES GO TOGETHER NICELY

It was one of the greatest position changes in LSU history. Josh Reed, a seldom-used running back lined up at receiver for the first time on Nov. 6, 2000 in a game against Alabama. 14 games later, he has become one of the best receivers in LSU history. In 14 games, Reed has posted seven 100-yard performances, a 50 percent clip. His seven 100-yard games rank fifth in school history. Reed is two 100-yard games away from moving into a third place tie on the all-time LSU list with Tony Moss and Andy Hamilton and six off the all-time record of 13 by Wendell Davis. He has registered at least one reception in each of his 14 games since moving to the position and enters the 2001 season with the longest consecutive streak of any Tigers on the active 2001 roster.

TIGER BACKFIELD YOUNG, BUT EXPLOSIVE

LSU returns its top two runners from the 2000 season, as LaBrandon Toefield and Domanick Davis will once again pace the Tigers. Last year Toefield became the first freshman since Kevin Faulk in 1995 to lead the Tigers in rushing, gaining 682 yards.

DAVIS A TRUE TRIPLE THREAT

Domanick Davis came to LSU in 1999 as one of the top running back prospects in the state of Louisiana. While he has been a tremendous asset to the Tigers backfield each of the past two seasons, and has been even more dangerous as a return man, the junior from Breaux Bridge will try his hand on defense as well in 2001. Davis will become the first Tiger since Tyler LaFauci in 1973 to play both offense and defense. Davis will be inserted as a nickel back on defense and he'll continue to serve as one of LSU's tailbacks. Factor in his pivotal role as a return man and Davis is truly a triple threat.

DAVIS SETS SITES ON LSU RETURN YARDAGE RECORD

In only two years at LSU, Domanick Davis has become one of top return men in Tiger history. He already owns two of the three most productive seasons in kick returning in LSU history. As a freshman in 1999, he established an LSU record with 618 yards, then followed it up with 572 yards his sophomore season, the third highest total in LSU history. Now entering his junior season, he is only 590 yards away from breaking the school record for career kick return yardage of 1,780 yards set by Robert Dow from 1973-76.

In addition, Davis ranks 10th in all-time punt return yardage with 364 yards and needs 106 yards to move into ninth.

HENDERSON TRIES TO UTILIZE HIS SPEED OUT WIDE

Devery Henderson is the most recent running back turned receiver, as following Reggie Robinson's season-ending injury, the Tigers needed depth at the position and turned to the speedster. Henderson had 23 carries for 116 yards and two TDs last season while catching four passes for 25 yards. Henderson was a logical choice to move out wide based on his speed. A track standout in the spring, Henderson ranks second on the LSU all-time list in the 60-meter dash with a time of 6.72 seconds, just .01 off the school record held by former football player Chris Cummings. Henderson also ran the first leg of the Tigers' 4x100-meter relay team which qualified for the NCAA Outdoor Championships this past spring.

ROBINSON TO MISS 2001 SEASON WITH HERNIATED DISC

Flanker Reggie Robinson will miss the entire 2001 season with a herniated disc in his neck in a non-football related injury. Robinson underwent an MRI and the test revealed a large herniated disc with spinal cord compression in the upper cervical spine. After undergoing unsuccessful treatment, Robinson elected to have surgery. Robinson, who has not had a redshirt season, will be able to train during the off season and is expected to return to the squad next year. Last year, Robinson started all 12 games for the Tigers and he ranked second on the team with 31 receptions for 391 yards and two touchdowns, including an 80-yard TD against Western Carolina. For his career, Robinson has played in 30 games with 19 starts and he's caught 77 passes for 1,061 yards and six touchdowns.

TIGERS' LEADING SCORER CORBELLO BACK

In 2000 John Corbello became the first Tiger kicker since Andre Lafleur in 1995 to lead the team in scoring, totaling 63 points. Corbello connected on 33 of 35 extra points and 10 of 18 field goals. Not included in those totals is a career-best 49-yard effort in the Tigers' Peach Bowl victory over Georgia Tech.

TIGERS IN SEASON OPENERS

LSU enters 2001 with a record of 75-27-5 in season openers. The Tigers have won five consecutive season openers dating back to a 33-17 loss to Texas A&M in College Station. The Tigers will be opening at home for the sixth consecutive season. Their current streak of five straight season opening wins is their longest since winning eight straight openers from 1962-69, the first eight season of the Charlie McClendon era. Current LSU head coach Nick Saban is 5-2 all-time in season openers, 1-0 at LSU. LSU's string of five consecutive season-opening wins is tied for fourth in the SEC with Ole Miss. Florida has the longest active streak with 11, followed by Mississippi State (7) and Tennessee (6).

TIGERS IN HOME OPENERS

LSU has won six consecutive home openers dating back to an 18-13 loss to Texas A&M in 1994. The streak started with a 12-6 upset victory over Auburn in 1995, in the first home game for then-head coach Gerry DiNardo. The Tulane game marks the 93rd time in which LSU's home opener is also its season opener. LSU's all-time record at home in season openers is 65-14-3.

TIGER OFFENSE STRIVES FOR CONSISTENCY

One major goal for the Tigers during the 2001 campaign will be offensive consistency. A year ago the Tigers were very difficult to stop when their offense clicked. In the Tigers' seven regular season wins they averaged 36.1 points per game. In their four losses they scored a combined total of 39 points. The Tigers were 7-0 when they scored 20 or more points during the regular season in 2000.
