10TH-RANKED LSU TO FACE AUBURN IN KEY SEC TILT

LSU, ranked 10th in the nation during the regular season for the first time since 1998, travels to Auburn, Ala., on Saturday to face Auburn at 11:30 a.m. (CDT) in a game televised to a regional audience by Jefferson Pilot. LSU (6-1, 3-0), enters the contest riding a six-game winning streak after a 38-14 win over South Carolina on Saturday. Auburn (4-3, 2-2) is coming off a 30-23 overtime loss to Florida. LSU has now won 12 of its past 13 games dating back to last season, which includes seven consecutive wins over SEC foes. LSU brings the nation's No. 1 defense into the contest as "THE JAMES GANG" is holding opponents to 217.4 yards and just 11 points per contest. Offensively, quarterback **Marcus Randall** stepped in last week for an injured **Matt Mauck** and completed 12 of 23 passes for 183 yards and rushed for another 36 yards and a TD. For the first time in school history, LSU has scored 30 points or more in six straight games and the Tigers have outscored three SEC opponents 105-34.

TIGERS EXPLODE PAST USC IN SECOND HALF, 38-14

Trailing 14-6 at halftime, LSU put together a dominating half of football to roll to a 38-14 victory over South Carolina in Tiger Stadium. In the third quarter, LSU outscored South Carolina 25-0 and held the Gamecocks to only one-yard of total offense. Behind the play of first-time starter **Marcus Randall**, LSU scored two touchdowns and added a field goal to go along with cornerback **Demetrius Hookfin's** interception return for a touchdown to put the game out of reach at 31-14. **Domanick Davis** finished with 113 yards rushing, while Randall completed 12 of 23 passes for 183 yards. Randall added 36 yards rushing, including a 12-yard TD run. Defensively, "THE JAMES GANG" held South Carolina to only 275 yards of offense, including 63 yards and no points in the second half.

NICK SABAN

HEAD COACH • THIRD YEAR

You can call LSU head coach Nick Saban the complete package. Brought to Baton Rouge following the 1999 season to revive what many considered a sleeping giant, Saban has transformed the LSU football program into one that wins championships, while graduating players at the same time.

Armed with a plan that gives his players a chance to be successful on the field as well as the classroom, Saban's impact on the program has been immediate and it's been powerful.

In just two short years at LSU's head coach, Saban's on-field success has been unmatched as he has guided the Tigers to 18 victories, a pair of bowl wins, including one in a BCS game, and the 2001 Southeastern Conference title.

Off the field, Saban has spearheaded a fundraising effort that has raised more than \$15 million for a state-of-the-art academic center for student-athletes. The new LSU Academic Center for Student-Athletes is all part of Saban's plan to give his players the best opportunity to be successful when they finish their football career.

Saban didn't waste anytime making his impact felt as he guided a team coming off back-to-back losing seasons to an 8-4 mark and a win over 15th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl to rekindle the fire of a proud football tradition in Baton Rouge.

Saban's influence on the Tigers went much further in 2001 as he led LSU to the school's first outright Southeastern Conference title since 1986 with a 31-20 win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC title game and followed that win a 47-34 victory over Illinois in the Sugar Bowl, LSU's first New Year's Day Bowl win since 1968.

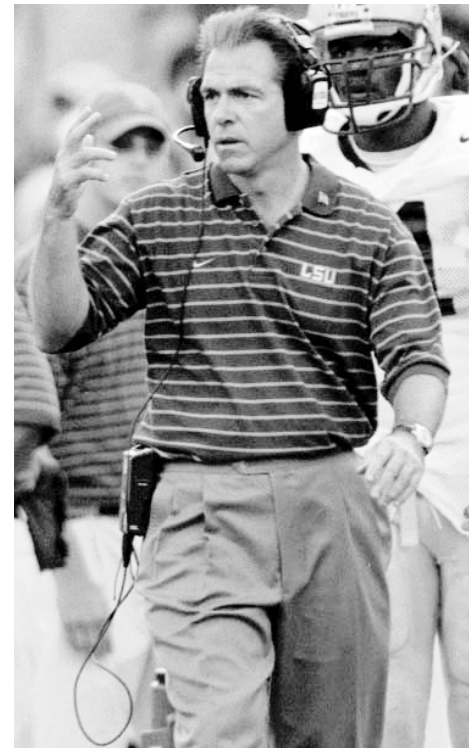
Beating Tennessee to win the league title is one thing, but the fashion in which Saban and the Tigers did so speaks volumes on the impact he has had on his squad. Playing without two of their offensive standouts, quarterback Rohan Davey and running back LaBrandon Toefield, not only did the Tigers respond to Saban's challenge to step up, they were dominant, outscoring the high-powered Vols offense 21-3 in the second half. LSU's defense allowed just 50 yards rushing.

Losing Davey and Toefield and still overcoming the adversity to win the title game, or any game for that matter, has been a trademark of Saban-coached teams. Teaching the players to trust and believe in each other has been a characteristic that Saban has branded on his squad. Saban preached to his team to play for 60 minutes, to become a dominant team on every play of every game, and to not worry about what the scoreboard read. The players responded.

After the Tigers dropped a 35-24 decision to Ole Miss in Baton Rouge in late October, LSU was practically counted out of the SEC Western Division race. Saban, however, pressed on saying the Tigers would continue to focus on getting better, playing one game at a time, and not worrying about anybody but the next opponent. It worked as the Tigers began to peak during their November run, a stretch that saw LSU win at Alabama, then beat nationally-ranked foes Arkansas and Auburn at home to advance to the SEC title game.

The win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC Championship game and then No. 7 Illinois in the Sugar Bowl were just two more steps along the way for the Tigers as Saban continues to restore the winning tradition to an LSU program that will soon be a fixture among the nation's elite in college football.

Prior to LSU, Saban spent five years as the head coach at Michigan State, where he built the Spartans into a perennial BigTen contender after going to four bowl games in five seasons.

IN THE POLLS

LSU moved up to No. 10 in both the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll and the Associated Press poll following the 38-14 victory over South Carolina on Saturday. The No. 10 ranking is the highest for the Tigers since finishing last year ranked No. 7 in the AP poll and No. 8 in the coaches poll. As far as the regular season is concerned, it's the highest ranking for the Tigers since being ranked No. 6 in the AP poll the week of Sept. 28-Oct. 3, 1998. LSU has been ranked in 14 consecutive weeks. Under **Nick Saban**, LSU is 11-4 as a ranked team and 8-5 against Top 25 teams, which includes a 1-1 mark this year.

LSU-AUBURN TIES

LSU offensive coordinator **Jimbo Fisher** served as quarterbacks coach at Auburn from 1993 to 1998 ... LSU defensive coordinator **Will Muschamp** received his graduate degree from Auburn in 1997 and served as a graduate assistant from 1995 to 1997 ... Assistant AD for Football Operations **Dr. Sam Nader** was a quarterback at Auburn from 1963 to 1967 and also received his master degree on the Plains ... LSU has three players that hail from the state of Alabama. DT **Melvin Oliver** will be returning to his home area, the redshirt freshman is a Opelika High School graduate, located about 10 miles from Jordan-Hare Stadium. DE **Brandon Washington** (Tuscaloosa) and freshman LB **Chris McCauley** (Homewood) also hail from Alabama.

TAKING NOTE

LSU is 6-1 for the first time since 1996 and 3-0 in the SEC for the first time since 1987 ... LSU started the 1987 SEC schedule 4-0 ... The last time the Tigers were off to at least a 7-1 start came in 1987 when LSU opened 7-0-1 ... LSU is 7-3 in October under **Nick Saban** after last week's win against South Carolina ... The Tigers are 16-3 at home under Saban, which includes a 7-2 SEC mark and a 13-2 record at night ... The Tigers are 5-1 under Saban in games decided by seven points or less ... LSU is an 20-1 under Saban when leading at halftime and 20-1 when leading after the third quarter ... LSU is 19-0 under Saban when it scores at least 30 points in a game and 25-1 when they score 20 or more points ... LSU is 11-0 under Saban when having a 100-yard rusher.

IN SIX GAMES SINCE THE VIRGINIA TECH LOSS ...

- LSU is outscoring it's opponents by 28.3 points per game (36.8-8.5).
- LSU has scored 30 or more points each game compared to 14 or less for the opponent.
- The Tigers have put the ball in the endzone 27 times, an average of 4.5 per game.
- LSU is averaging 240.2 yards rushing, while opponents manage just 81.3.
- The Tigers time of possession has averaged better than five minutes more per game than its opponent (32:44-27:16)
- The **JAMES GANG** has 15 sacks, compared to just four for opponents.
- LSU has intercepted at least one pass in each game and a total of 12, three of which have been returned for a touchdown.
- The **JAMES GANG** has allowed just six touchdowns, while scoring three.
- LSU has reached the "Red Zone" 24 times while opponents have gotten there just eight times in that span.
- LSU has owned the battle of field position. The Tigers average drive starts at the 38 while the opponents average drive begins at the 26.

LSU PUTS SEC WIN STREAKS ON THE LINE

LSU carries a pair of winning streaks into Saturday's contest at Auburn. LSU has won seven-straight SEC games and four straight SEC road games. Last year, the Tigers closed SEC action last year by posting wins over Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn and Tennessee. This year they have added wins over Mississippi State, Florida and South Carolina. The road streak includes Alabama, Mississippi State, Kentucky and Florida. The seven-straight SEC wins is the longest streak since winning nine straight from 1969-71.

LSU HAS WON 12 OF 13 DATING BACK TO LAST YEAR

Dating back to the Oct. 27, 2001, loss to Ole Miss, LSU has won 12 of its last 13 games, including the final six contests of the 2001 season and six of seven this season. The run is the longest for the Tigers since the 1971-72 seasons when LSU won the final four games of 1971 and eight of the first nine to begin the 1972 campaign.

SABAN ADDS ANOTHER NOTCH TO HIS SEC BELT

With LSU's win over South Carolina, **Nick Saban** has now recorded at least one victory over every SEC team which he has faced. The only two SEC teams that Saban has yet to beat are the only two hasn't faced - Georgia and Vanderbilt.

MAUCK UNDERGOES SURGERY; OUT EIGHT WEEKS

LSU sophomore quarterback **Matt Mauck** underwent surgery on Sunday morning to repair a sprained ligament in the mid-foot area of his right foot. Mauck, who suffered the injury in a 36-7 win over Florida on Oct. 12, is expected to be out of action for eight weeks. The surgery was performed by LSU team doctors Brent Bankston and Larry Ferachi. Bankston said the surgery went extremely well and said the procedure involved placing two screws in Mauck's foot to stabilize the joint. Mauck started the first six games of the year for the Tigers, leading LSU to a 5-1 mark. He completed 63 of 130 passes for 782 yards, nine touchdowns and only two interceptions. He rushed for 175 yards and two TD's. Mauck hasn't thrown an interception since the second game of the season, a streak that spans 88 consecutive passes.

RANDALL HAS SUCCESS AS STARTER AT QB

Marcus Randall made his first career start against South Carolina on Saturday and came away victorious. Randall was the 16th first-time starting quarterback at LSU since 1980 when **Robbie Mahfouz** started in a 24-7 win over Florida. Randall was the just the seventh LSU quarterback since 1980 making a first-time start in a conference game. IT MUST BE THE HALFTIME SPEECH

Whether it's the halftime motivational speech or adjustments by the coaching staff, something is going on in the LSU locker room at halftime as the Tigers have outscored their opponents 72-10 in the third quarter this year, including 65-0 in the last five games. Against SEC opponents, the third quarter score is 48-0. On Oct. 19, LSU trailed 14-6 at halftime and then promptly went out and held South Carolina to 1 yard of offense in the third quarter, while outscoring the Gamecocks 25-0. The Citadel's TD in the second game of the season was the last third-quarter points against the Tigers. Dating back to last year's Auburn game, LSU has held its last five SEC opponents scoreless in the third quarter. On the other hand, LSU has scored 81 points over that span.

TIGERS ON THE TUBE

Saturday's game will mark LSU's second appearance on Jefferson Pilot this year and its 16th all-time appearance on JP. LSU opened the SEC season with a 31-13 win over Mississippi State on JP on Sept. 28. The Tigers are 4-10-1 in the previous 15 games televised by JP, including a 1-1 mark under **Nick Saban**. LSU is 0-2 against Auburn on JP, falling at Auburn, 30-26 in 1994 and 30-28 in 1992.

BRADIE JAMES IS A SEMIFINALIST FOR THE BUTKUS AWARD

LSU linebacker **Bradie James** has been named one of 11 semifinalists for the 2002 Butkus Award, the Downtown Athletic Club of Orlando announced on Oct. 17. James, a Butkus Award candidate each of the past three years, currently leads LSU and ranks fourth in the SEC with 86 tackles. James also has 11 quarterback hurries, five tackles for loss, two sacks, one interception and one forced fumble. This year, James has two of the highest tackles games in the SEC with 19 against Virginia Tech and 18 versus The Citadel. Other 2002 Butkus Award semifinalist include: Boss Bailey (Georgia), Michael Boulware (Florida State), Rod Davis (Southern Miss), E.J. Henderson (Maryland), Derrick Johnson (Texas), Teddy Lehman (Oklahoma), Jonathan Vilma (Miami), Courtney Watson (Notre Dame), Matt Wilhelm (Ohio State), D.J. Williams (Miami).

LSU'S JAMES GANG DEFENSE LEADS NATION IN TOTAL DEFENSE

LSU's **JAMES GANG** defense, named for captain **Bradie James**, enters the Auburn contest leading the nation in total defense, allowing 217.4 yards per game. The **JAMES GANG** also ranks second in scoring defense (11.0 points per game) and third in pass defense (124.0 yards per game). LSU leads the SEC in each of those categories. The Tigers defense is also second in the SEC and 11th in the nation in rushing defense, allowing just 93.4 yards per game

JAMES GANG GANGS UP USC IN SECOND HALF

The Tigers defense allowed just 63 yards in the second half to South Carolina on Saturday. The Gamecocks gained 212 yards on 30 plays in the first half, but managed just 63 yards on 22 plays in the final 30 minutes, including just 1 yard on nine plays in the third quarter. In its first six second half possessions, South Carolina gained zero yards after losing 5 yards on three three-and-outs, having two drives begin with interceptions and a four-play drive that gained five yards. The final South Carolina drive, when trailing 38-14, accounted for all 63 second-half yards for the Gamecocks.

NO 100-YARD GAMES AGAINST THE JAMES GANG

LSU's defense ran its streak of not allowing a 100-yard rushing game to 11 straight by limiting South Carolina's top rusher to 49 yards on Saturday. Dwone Hicks of Middle Tennessee was the last to hit 100 yards when he rushed for 117 in a 30-14 loss to the Tigers on Nov. 10. LSU has not yielded a 100-yard rushing game to an SEC opponent in 12 games, since the season-finale in 2000 when Brandon Holmes rushed for 143 yards and a touchdown in Arkansas' 14-3 victory in Little Rock.

JAMES GANG CONTINUES TO BE STINGY

LSU's defense has held all seven of its opponents to under 300 yards of total offense this year. The current streak is the longest since 1976 when the Tigers held seven straight under the mark: Nebraska (256), Oregon State (182), Rice (164), Florida (293), Vanderbilt (213), Kentucky (210) and Ole Miss (132). Here is a look at the current seven-game streak: Virginia Tech (231 yards), Citadel (236), Miami (224), Mississippi State (249), Louisiana-Lafayette (70), Florida (237) and South Carolina (275).

JAMES GANG HOLDS OFF GROUND ATTACK

LSU's "**JAMES GANG**" defense has held four of the last five opponents to under 100 yards rushing. South Carolina snapped a four-game streak of holding the opponents to under 100 yards rushing by gaining 148 yards on 30 carries. The previous four games, the Tigers held Miami (Ohio) to 29 yards, Mississippi State to 88 yards, UL-Lafayette to 17 yards and Florida to 74 yards. This season, opponents average just 2.9 yards/carry.

LSU GOES FOR A PICK-SIX IN BACK-TO-BACK GAMES

The **JAMES GANG** has now returned three interceptions for touchdowns this season, including scores in back-to-back games. **Corey Webster** had a 45-yard interception return for a TD against Florida and **Demetrius Hookfin** returned an interception 10 yards for a score against South Carolina. The interceptions returned for TD's in back-to-back games is the first time LSU has accomplished the feat since 1999 when the Tigers returned interceptions against San Jose State and North Texas. Earlier this year, **Damien James** also returned an interception for a TD. His went 32 yards against The Citadel.

"HOOK" HAS A BIG NIGHT AGAINST SOUTH CAROLINA

LSU cornerback **Demetrius Hookfin** played perhaps the best game of his career on Saturday as he picked off two passes, returning one for a TD, and adding seven tackles and three passes broken up. Hookfin's first interception came in the third quarter and setup a 37-yard **John Corbello** field goal. Two possessions later, Hookfin intercepted a pass and returned it 10 yards for a TD and a 31-14 LSU lead. Hookfin picked off a third pass in the fourth quarter and returned it for his second TD, however it was called back due to a roughing the passer call. Hookfin leads the SEC with 15 pass deflections and he's ranked among the top 10 in the league with three interceptions this year.

SUCCESS AGAINST THE EAST

With its victory over South Carolina on Saturday, LSU improved to 6-3 against the SEC East under **Nick Saban**. The Tigers were 2-2 against the East last year, including a 31-20 win over Tennessee in the SEC Championship game. LSU was 2-1 in 2000 and is 2-0 this season against the East. Dating back to last year, LSU has won four straight games over East teams: South Carolina, Florida, Tennessee and Kentucky.

LSU'S RETURN TEAMS ARE SPECIAL

LSU's return team combination of **Domanick Davis**, **Devery Henderson** and **Shyrone Carey** have turned into a dominating trio for the Tigers. The Tigers lead the SEC and rank third in the nation in punt return average at 18.2 yards per return. The Tigers lead the league and the nation in kickoff returns with a 28.7 average. Davis leads the SEC and ranks third nationally in punt return average (19.1), and ranks sixth in the SEC and 23rd in the nation in kickoff return average (25.3). Carey, who does not have enough punt returns to qualify for the league standings, averages 17.5 yards per return.

DAVIS PICKS UP ANOTHER SCHOOL RECORD

Senior RB/return specialist **Domanick Davis** entered the South Carolina game needing just six kickoff return yards to pass **Robert Dow**'s school record of 1,780. Davis got those yards and more on his first kickoff return, gaining 22 yards on the return. Davis finished the game with 61 kickoff return yards and now has 1,836 for his career. He also owns the school punt-return record with 1,066 yards.

JUST CALL HIM DOMINANT DAVIS

To borrow a line from a local newspaper, you can call **Domanick Davis**, LSU's senior all-purpose threat, Dominant Davis. Davis has recorded at least 100 all-purpose yards in 11 of his past 12 games, including 201 yards against South Carolina and a career-high 286 yards against Mississippi State, which is the fourth-best all-purpose total for a single game in LSU history. The game against the Bulldogs included a 78-yard punt return for a touchdown and a career-high tying 122 yards rushing. He ranks third in the nation in all-purpose yards (177.7 per game) and punt returns (19.1 per return). This year, Davis has touched the ball 146 times - 106 rushing, 23 punt returns, nine kickoff returns and eight receptions and he's averaging 8.5 yards per touch.

DAVIS MOVING CLOSER TO ANOTHER LSU PUNT RETURN MARK

With 439 yards in punt returns, **Domanick Davis** has already recorded the third-highest single-season total in LSU history. Davis, who owns the LSU career punt return record, needs 101 yard to overtake **Pinky Rohm** (1937) for the single-season record. In what is one of the oldest records on the LSU books, Rohm returned 35 punts for 539 yards and three TD's in 1937. **Young Bussey** (1937) ranks second with 465 yards on 37 returns.

HOME SWEET HOME

Following the victory over South Carolina, LSU has won eight-straight games in Death Valley. The Tigers have not lost at home since Oct. 27, 2001 (35-24 to Ole Miss). The streak includes wins over Middle Tennessee, Alabama, Auburn, Citadel, Miami (Ohio), Mississippi State, UL-Lafayette and South Carolina. The eight-game streak is the longest for the Tigers since winning eight straight between Oct. 14, 1995, and Oct. 26, 1996.

25 POINTS IN THE THIRD QUARTER

The Tigers' 25 points in the third quarter was the most by an LSU team in one quarter since scoring 27 in the second quarter of the 2002 Sugar Bowl against Illinois. The 25 is the most in a regular-season quarter since a 35 point third-quarter against Rice in 1977.

COMEBACK KIDS

LSU trailed 14-6 at the half and came back to score 32 unanswered points to defeat South Carolina on Saturday. It was the first time the Tigers came back from a halftime deficit to win since the 2001 SEC Championship game. LSU trailed Tennessee 17-10 at the break in that game and outscored the Vols 21-3 in the second half for a 31-20 victory.

GET ON THE BOARD FIRST EQUALS SUCCESS

The Tigers are 5-0 this season when scoring first and 20-2 under Nick Saban when they do so. The last time LSU lost a game in which they scored first was last season at Tennessee. The only other loss came after scoring first came at Auburn in 2000.

WEBSTER TIES SCHOOL MARK WITH 3 PICKS AGAINST GATORS

Defensive back **Corey Webster**, a converted wide receiver, added his name to the LSU record book on Oct. 12 against Florida when he picked off three passes in the Tigers' 36-7 win. Webster is the sixth player in LSU history to intercept three passes in a game and the first since **Chris Williams** against Rice in 1978. The last time a Tiger had three picks in an SEC game came in 1970 when **Craig Burns** did it against Ole Miss. Webster took the second interception 45 yards for a touchdown and another pick led to an LSU field goal. Webster leads the SEC and ranks third in the nation with five interceptions.

TOEFIELD OUT FOR SIX WEEKS WITH FRACTURED LEFT FOREARM

LSU's all-conference running back **LaBrandon Toefield** will be out at least four more weeks after fracturing the radius in his left forearm in the Oct. 5 win over UL-Lafayette. LSU team doctor Brent Bankston performed the 45-minute surgery. "The fracture was relatively a clean break and it went back together very easily," Bankston said. Bankston said the surgery required the placing of a plate along with seven screws into Toefield's arm to stabilize the bone. Toefield will be in a cast for at least four weeks and will begin therapy after that. Toefield, a junior from Independence, La., had played in five games this year and he ranked second on the squad with 323 yards rushing. He earned First-Team All-SEC honors last year after rushing for 992 yards and an SEC-record tying 19 touchdowns. For his career, Toefield has rushed for 1,997 yards and 26 touchdowns. Toefield missed most of last year's SEC Championship game and the Sugar Bowl after suffering a torn ACL in the first half of the Tigers' 31-20 win in the SEC title game.

LSU'S MAGIC NUMBER: 20

LSU is almost automatic under **Nick Saban** when they score at least 20 points in a game, posting a 24-1 record. However, the Tigers are 0-7 when not reaching the 20-point plateau under Saban. LSU was 8-0 in 2000, 10-1 in 2001 and is 6-0 this season when reaching 20 points. The only loss during that span was a 35-24 defeat to Ole Miss. Dating back to last season, LSU has scored at least 20 points in 13 of its past 14 games.

30 ALSO MAGIC FOR SABAN'S TIGERS

LSU is even better under **Nick Saban** when scoring at least 30 points. The Tigers are 18-0 with a 4-0 mark in 2000, a 8-0 record last season and a 6-0 mark this season when reaching 30. In fact, LSU has won its last 20 games when scoring at least 30 points, including two wins in the 1999 season. The last time LSU lost a game in which 30 points was Nov. 21, 1998, when Notre Dame defeated the Tigers 39-36 in South Bend.

RECORD SET FOR PUTTING 30 ON THE BOARD

LSU has put at least 30 points on the scoreboard for a school-record six straight games, including 38 in Saturday's victory over South Carolina. The previous record was five straight games during the tail end of the 1968 season and into the 1969 season. The 2002 Tigers put up 35 against The Citadel, 33 against Miami (Ohio), 31 against Mississippi State, 48 against Louisiana-Lafayette, 36 against Florida and 38 against South Carolina. The previous mark was set against Tulane (34) and Florida State (31) in 1968 and Texas A&M (35), Rice (42) and Baylor (63) in 1969.

70 STRAIGHT GAMES WITHOUT BEING SHUTOUT TIES SCHOOL MARK

LSU tied a school record on Saturday against South Carolina by not being shutout for the 70th straight game. The last time the Tigers were shutout was in 1996 by Alabama (27-0). The streak ties the mark set between the 1985 and 1991 seasons.

GET A RUSHER TO 100 AND THE TIGERS WIN

When it comes to LSU football and 100-yard rushing games, the Tigers have proven to be tough to beat. Ten times since **Nick Saban** took over in 2000, LSU has had a player rush for 100 yards and 10 times the Tigers have come away with a victory. **Domanick Davis** has four of those 100-yard rushing games. Overall, LSU is 164-25 all-time when having a 100-yard rusher. LSU's last loss when having a 100-yard rusher came on Nov. 3, 1998, when **Kevin Faulk** posted 201 yards in a 22-16 loss to Alabama. **LaBrandon Toefield** cracked the century mark to help LSU to the 27-14 win over Auburn last year.

GROUND GAME SCORES AGAIN

LSU ran its streak of scoring a rushing TD to 16 out of the past 17 games on Saturday when QB **Marcus Randall**, RB **Shyrone Carey** and RB **Domanick Davis** each reached the endzone via the ground. Randall (12 yards) and Carey (13 yards) scored their first career touchdowns, while Davis ran five yards for his team-high sixth rushing touchdown of the season.

GROUND ATTACK

LSU has gained at least 200 yards rushing in five straight games after the 240 yard performance on Saturday against South Carolina. It is the first time since 1973 the Tigers have rushed for over 200 yards in five straight games. The 1973 Tigers recorded at least 200 rushing yards in six-straight games. In 31 games under Nick Saban, the Tigers have rushed for more than 200 yards seven times and are 7-0 in those games. LSU rushed for 293 yards against The Citadel earlier this year, the most by the Tigers under Saban.

LSU'S GONE NINE STRAIGHT QUARTERS WITHOUT A TURNOVER

One reason for LSU's success lately has been its ability to take care of the football. LSU has now gone nine straight quarters without a turnover. On the other hand, the Tigers have forced six turnovers, all interceptions, in the past two games.

LSU STREAK OF PASSES WITHOUT AN INTERCEPTION AT 119

LSU's streak of passes without an interception is at 119 and counting after **Marcus Randall** threw 23 passes against South Carolina without a pick. **Matt Mauck** had thrown 88 straight (before suffering a season-ending injury against Florida) and Randall has thrown 31 straight without an interception. The last time LSU threw an interception came in the first quarter against The Citadel in the second week of the season.

SIX TRUE FRESHMEN HAVE SEEN ACTION

Through six games, six true freshmen - LB **Cameron Vaughn**, DL **Kyle Williams**, RB **Jason Spadoni**, OL **Nate Livings**, OL **Terrance McGill** and WR **Skyler Green** - have seen action for the Tigers. Vaughn and Williams have played in all seven games this year. In addition to the true freshman that have played this year, 15 other Tigers have seen action for the first time this year.

DEVERY WARMING UP TO THE RECEIVER POSITION

Converted running back **Devery Henderson** has really warmed up to the receiver position. In fact, you could say he has caught fire. The junior has four touchdowns in the past four games, including two in the victory over Florida. His 12 receptions and 186 yards are second on the team and his four scores are tied for the team lead.

WITH TOEFIELD OUT, ADDAI AND CAREY STEP UP

With **LaBrandon Toefield** out with an injury, backup running backs **Joseph Addai** and **Shyrone Carey** have answered the call. Against UL-Lafayette, Addai rushed for a career-best 98 yards and two TD's and then carried 16 times for 56 yards in the win at Florida. Carey, a converted wide receiver carried the ball six times for 68 yards and a touchdown in the win over South Carolina. Through seven games, Addai has rushed for 281 yards and two TD's, while Carey has 14 carries for 96 yards and a score.

DAMIEN JAMES ON TOP IN SEC

Damien James has two interceptions this season and nine in his career. His nine career interceptions ties the LSU senior with Florida's Todd Johnson for the most among active players in the SEC. James' nine interceptions leaves the senior one shy of moving into a tie for sixth in school history.

DOMANICK CREEPS UP IN SEC CAREER RECORDS

Domanick Davis enters the Auburn game ranked second in SEC career kick return yards (punts and kickoffs) with 2,902, fifth in kickoff return yards with 1,836, ninth in punt return yards with 1,066 and ninth in all-purpose yards with 4,867.

DOMANICK FINALLY BREAKS ONE; LEADS SEC IN PUNT RETURNS

Domanick Davis had a punt return for a touchdown called back in each of LSU's first two games this season, but the senior return specialist finally got his due on against Mississippi State on Sept. 28. Davis fielded a punt from MSU's Jared Cook at the LSU 22-yard line and proceeded to take it 78 yards for the second punt return TD of his career. Davis sits third in the nation and leads the SEC with 19.1 yards per return.

CLAYTON'S STILL GOING

Sophomore receiver **Michael Clayton** has caught a pass in all 20 games (including the 2002 Sugar Bowl) of his career. In that span, he has pulled down at least five receptions in nine games, including at least five catches in four games in the 2002 season.

JAMES GANG LEADER MOVES TO THIRD IN LSU HISTORY IN TACKLES

With eight tackles against South Carolina, All-America linebacker **Bradie James** ran his career total to 347, passing Steve Cassidy for third in school history.

CORBELLO KICKING TO THE TOP

Senior place kicker **John Corbello** is four points from moving past **Charles Alexander** into fourth place on the LSU career points list. Corbello ranks second in school history with 44 career field goals, 17 fewer than career leader **David Browndyke**. Corbello is third in the SEC this season in scoring, averaging 8.1 points per game.

• The **JAMES GANG DEFENSE** is led by seniors **Bradie James** and **Damien James**. Bradie, a semifinalist for the Butkus Award and team captain, calls all the shots as the **MIKE** (middle) linebacker. Damien is the quarterback of the secondary as the free safety.

• All 11 starters on the defense are from the state of Louisiana.

• LSU has held each of its seven opponents to **FEWER THAN 300** total yards this year. It is the first time since 1976 that a Tiger defense has held seven consecutive opponents under 300 yards. Only South Carolina has cracked the 250-yard plateau, doing so on the final play of the game.

• The Tigers allowed UL-Lafayette just 70 total yards, the fewest allowed by a Tiger defense **SINCE 1966**. Later in the year, offensive juggernaut Florida passed for only 163 yards and four interceptions against the stingy LSU pass defense.

• Opponents are converting a miniscule 23.5 percent of their third-down opportunities against the Tigers this year. At one point, LSU **STOPPED 24 STRAIGHT** third-down conversion attempts.

• LSU has allowed just six touchdowns in the past six games.

• Only six of the nine touchdowns given up by LSU this year have been on drives of more than 30 yards. The other three drives (27, 29, 2) came when the opposing offense had a short field following a shanked punt, a blocked punt and a fumble.

• The Tigers have not allowed a **100-YARD RUSHER** in 11 games, since Dwone Hicks of Middle Tennessee reached the mark last year. No SEC back has hit 100 in 12 games, since Brandon Holmes of Arkansas, who did so at the end of the 2000 season.

• Nearly 40 percent (172 of 436) of opponents offensive plays this year have gone for **NO GAIN OR NEGATIVE YARDAGE**.

• LSU has given up just four pass plays of more than 20 yards this season and **ONLY THREE PASSING TOUCHDOWNS**.

LaBrandon Toefield rushed for 120 yards and scored his SEC-record-tying 19th rushing TD of the season and Josh Reed caught 10 passes for 186 yards as LSU beat Auburn, 27-14, to clinch at berth in the SEC Championship game. LSU jumped on Auburn early with an on-side kick on the game's first play. LSU recovered and scored six plays later for a 7-0 lead. Auburn responded with a 72-yard TD pass from Jason Campbell to Tim Carter on its first possession to tie the game at 7-7. From there it was all LSU as the Tigers increased the lead to 14-7 early in the first quarter on a Rohan Davey to Reed pass. The margin was 21-7 at halftime after a 7-yard run by Domanick Davis. John Corbello tacked on two field goals to make it 27-7 early in the fourth quarter.

- LSU began playing football in Tiger Stadium in 1924 and is currently in its 79th year in the venerable stadium on **SATURDAY NIGHT**.
- LSU has won **EIGHT STRAIGHT** games at home dating back to its homecoming victory over Middle Tennessee State last year. That is the longest home streak for the Tigers since winning eight straight from 1995-96.
- Under **Nick Saban**, the Tigers have posted a **16-3 HOME RECORD**, including a 4-1 mark against ranked opponents. Against conference foes, Saban is 8-2 in Death Valley. In home games at night, LSU is 13-2 since Saban took over.
- More than **85,000 FANS** have attended each of LSU’s last 17 home games. In that span, the Tigers have eclipsed the 90,000 mark 11 times, including a school-record 92,141 for last year’s Auburn contest, which LSU won 27-14.
- A **SCHOOL-RECORD** 63,017 season tickets were sold this year, not counting the more than 15,000 seats reserved for students. Last year, 62,600 season tickets were sold.
- Since national attendance figures began being kept in 1957, LSU has ranked in the top 20 all 45 seasons. The Tigers have been in the top 15 for 43 of the 45 years and in the top 10 on 37 occasions, including 32 straight from 1957-88. Fourteen times, LSU has ranked in the **TOP FIVE IN THE NATION**, including the last two.
- Since 1960, LSU owns a stellar **181-60-4** (.747) record in traditional Tiger Stadium night games. On the other hand, the Tigers are just 14-20-3 (.419) at home during the day in that span.

EARTHQUAKE GAME

October 6, 1988. Tommy Hodson connected with Eddie Fuller on 4-and-10 with 1:41 to play for the game-winning touchdown as LSU upset No. 4 Auburn. The play caused such a thunderous explosion from the crowd of 79,341 that the tremor caused by the vibrations measured on the seismograph across campus.

HALLOWEEN NIGHT

October 31, 1959. No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss, 3-0, late in the fourth quarter when Billy Cannon fielded a punt off the bounce at the 11-yard line. He raced 89 yards, careening off seven Rebel defenders, to paydirt to give the Tigers victory and all but clinch the 1959 Heisman Trophy.

From the opening kickoff to the final horn, LSU dominated Miami (Ohio) in every phase of the game, posting a 33-7 victory over the RedHawks. Led by the running of **LaBrandon Toefield** and passing of **Matt Mauck**, LSU's balanced offensive attack compiled 422 yards (207 rushing, 215 passing). **John Corbello** tied a school-record with four field goals, including two in the first seven minutes that gave the Tigers a 6-0 lead. Mauck connected with **Michael Clayton** on an 8-yard scoring pass late in the first quarter to push the lead to 13-0. Miami pulled to within 16-7 with 50 seconds left in the half, but the Tigers responded with a 5-play, 71-yard drive, capped off by a Mauck-to-Clayton TD pass that covered 24 yards, giving LSU a 23-7 halftime lead. Trailing 14-6 at halftime, LSU put together a dominating half of football to roll to a 38-14 victory over South Carolina in Tiger Stadium. In the third quarter, LSU outscored South Carolina 25-0 and held the Gamecocks to only one-yard of total offense. Behind the play of first-time starter **Marcus Randall**, LSU scored two touchdowns and added a field goal to go along with cornerback **Demetrius Hookfin**'s interception return for a touchdown to put the game out of reach at 31-14. **Domanick Davis** finished with 113 yards rushing, while Randall completed 12 of 23 passes for 183 yards. Randall added 36 yards rushing, including a 12-yard TD run. Defensively, "THE JAMES GANG" held South Carolina to only 275 yards of offense, including 63 yards and no points in the second half.
