**LSU To Face Ohio State For BCS National Title**  
 LSU will try to become the first team in the nation to collect a second BCS National Championship when the Tigers face Ohio State in the title game on Monday, Jan. 7 at the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans. Since the inception of the BCS National Championship Game in 1998, nine different teams have claimed the title, including Ohio State in 2002 and LSU in 2003. Other BCS Championship Game winners include: Tennessee (1998), Florida State (1999), Oklahoma (2000), Miami (2001), Southern Cal (2004), Texas (2005) and Florida (2006).

**LSU Has Two National Titles To Its Credit**  
 LSU has claimed two national titles in football during its 115 seasons of the sport. LSU first won a national title in 1958, going 11-0 behind the play of Billy Cannon. The Tigers won their second national title in 2003, beating Oklahoma in the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans.

**Tigers Head Back To Its Home Away From Home - The Louisiana Superdome**  
 LSU will travel to its home away from home, going 80 miles down Interstate 10 to the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans, for the BCS National Championship Game. The game against Ohio State will mark LSU's second game in the Superdome this year as the Tigers posted a 34-9 win over Tulane in the building on Sept. 29. LSU is 12-4 all-time in games played in the Superdome, which includes a 3-2 mark in Sugar Bowl games. LSU's other nine wins in the Superdome have come against Tulane. This decade, LSU is 4-0 in the Superdome, with three of those wins coming in the Sugar Bowl. LSU beat Illinois, 47-34, in the 2002 Sugar Bowl, and then followed that with a 21-14 win over Oklahoma in the 2004 Sugar Bowl, a win that gave the Tigers the 2003 BCS National Title. A year ago, LSU beat Notre Dame, 41-14, in the 2007 Sugar Bowl. LSU has won seven-straight games in the Superdome dating back to a loss to Nebraska on Jan. 1, 1987, in the Sugar Bowl.

**LSU Football Is Must See TV**  
 LSU will be making its school-record 12th appearance on national television when it faces Ohio State in the BCS National Championship Game. The contest will be televised by FOX. This year, LSU has appeared on CBS a record seven times, followed by three appearances on ESPN and one on ESPN2. As far as ratings are

concerned, LSU has played in two of college football's five most watched games in 2007. LSU's win over Tennessee in the SEC Championship Game drew a 5.9 rating, the highest rating for that contest since the Tigers beat the Vols in prime time in 2001. In addition, LSU's win over Florida on Oct. 6 drew a 5.3 rating. The most watched game in 2007 was the Oklahoma-Missouri primetime contest on Dec. 1, which drew a 6.6.

**LSU To Appear On FOX For Third Time**  
 LSU will be making its third appearance on the FOX network. LSU is 1-1 all-time on FOX, falling to Texas in the 2003 Cotton Bowl before a 41-14 win over Notre Dame in last year's Sugar Bowl.

**BCS Championship Game Marks First 1-2 Matchup In LSU History**  
 LSU's game against No. 1-ranked Ohio State will mark the first time in school history that the Tigers will participate in a game featuring the nation's top two ranked teams in the polls. The only other time that LSU was part of a matchup between two teams ranked as high came in 1959 when No. 1 LSU posted a 7-3 win over No. 3 Ole Miss. After that, the 2003 BCS National Championship Game featured No. 2 LSU against No. 3 Oklahoma. LSU won that game 21-14 to capture the national title.

**Tigers In Bowl Game For Record Eighth Straight Year; 39th Overall Bowl**  
 LSU will be playing in a bowl game for a school-record eighth consecutive year when the Tigers face Ohio State on Jan. 7. LSU has played in a bowl game each year dating back to 2000. Overall, LSU is making its 39th bowl appearance, a figure that ties for ninth among all college football teams. Alabama holds the record with 55 bowl games. LSU's 39 bowl appearances tie Ohio State and Michigan.

**LSU Ranks 11th All-Time in Bowl Wins With 19**  
 LSU's 19 bowl victories ranks as the 11th-highest total in college football. Alabama has more bowl victories than any other school with 30. Since 2000, LSU is 5-2 in bowl games, which includes three Sugar Bowl victories. LSU is 19-18-1 all-time in bowl games, which includes a 2-0 mark under Les Miles. Miles and the Tigers beat Miami, 40-3, in the 2005 Peach Bowl and then followed that with a 41-14 victory over Notre Dame in last year's Allstate Sugar Bowl.

**LSU vs. No. 1 Ranked Teams**  
 LSU's game against Ohio State will mark only the ninth time that LSU has faced an opponent ranked No. 1 in the nation in the Associated Press Poll. LSU is 1-7-1 all-time against No. 1-ranked teams. LSU's only win against a top-ranked team came in 1997 when the Tigers beat Florida, 28-21, in Tiger Stadium. That's the last time LSU has faced a No. 1-ranked team. **Miles vs. Ohio State**  
 LSU coach Les Miles, a native of Elyria, Ohio, has faced Ohio State 15 times as a player, an assistant coach and a head coach. Miles is 6-8-1 all-time in those games, which includes an 0-1 mark in his only meeting against the Buckeyes as a head coach. That game came in 2004 when Miles, then the head coach at Oklahoma State, dropped a 33-7 decision to Ohio State in the Alamogordo Bowl in San Antonio. As a player, Miles was 0-2 against Ohio State, losing 12-10 in 1974 and then 21-14 in 1975. Miles won four straight against Ohio State as an assistant coach at Michigan from 1988-1991. **LSU is 3-0 In BCS Bowl Games - All Three Have Come In New Orleans**  
 LSU will be making its fourth trip to a BCS bowl game since the system was put in place for the 1998 season. LSU is 3-0 in its two previous BCS bowl games, beating Illinois, 47-34, in the 2002 Sugar Bowl before a 21-14 win over Oklahoma in the 2004 Sugar Bowl, which was also the 2003 BCS National Championship contest. Last year, the Tigers knocked off Notre Dame, 41-14, in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

**LSU Went 6-2 Against Bowl Teams In 2007**  
 LSU posted a 6-2 mark in 2007 against teams that are participating in bowl games. LSU's victories over bowl-bound teams include a win over Virginia Tech, which won the ACC and will play in the Orange Bowl. LSU also beat Mississippi State (Liberty Bowl), Florida (Capital One Bowl), Auburn (Chick-fil-A Bowl), Alabama (Independence Bowl) and Tennessee (Outback Bowl).

## LSU and Ohio State To Meet For First Time Since 1988

When LSU and Ohio State meet on Jan. 7 in the Louisiana Superdome, it will mark only the third meeting between the schools, and the first since a 36-33 Buckeye win in Columbus in 1988. LSU is 0-1-1 vs. Ohio State, tying the Buckeyes, 13-13, in Baton Rouge in 1987 in the first meeting between the schools.

## LSU-Ohio State Ties

Current LSU defensive coordinator/Nebraska head coach Bo Pelini was a four-year letterwinner for the Buckeyes from 1987-90 ... Pelini was team captain at Ohio State in 1990 ... Pelini played in both games against LSU in 1987 and 1988 ... LSU offensive line coach Greg Studrawa worked at Ohio State in 1997, serving as a graduate assistant on the offensive side of the football ... Ohio State WR Brian Robiskie is the son of former LSU standout Terry Robiskie ... The elder Robiskie is a native of Lucy, La., and was a four-year letterwinner at running back for the Tigers from 1973-76 ... He was an All-SEC selection in 1976 after rushing for 1,117 yards.

## LSU Claims 10th SEC Title On Way To BCS Championship Game

LSU's 21-14 win over Tennessee in the SEC Championship Game on Dec. 1 in Atlanta marked the 10th league title won by the Tigers. Since the establishment of the SEC in 1933, LSU has won a league titles in football in 1935, '36, '58, '61, '62, '70, '86, '88, 2001, '03 and '07.

## 2007: Another Year Of Firsts For LSU Football

With an 11-2 overall mark, the 2007 season will go down as another year of firsts for the Tigers.

- First time won at least 10 games in three-straight seasons
- First outright SEC Western Division title
- First time scored 40 or more points in at least seven games
- First time won six games against Top 25 teams during regular season
- First time was No. 1 in the BCS Standings during the regular season

## Dorsey Racks Up Honors, Becomes Most Decorated Defensive Player in LSU History

DT Glenn Dorsey became LSU's most decorated defensive player in school history this year after receiving the Outland Trophy (top interior lineman), Lombardi Award (top lineman player), the Lott Trophy (IMPACT player) and the Nagurski Award (top defensive player). The senior was also one of three finalists for the Bednarik Award (top defensive player). Dorsey earned first-team All-America honors from the AP, AFCA, FWAA, Walter Camp Foundation, ESPN, CBSSports.com, CNN.com, Rivals.com and Sporting News and was the SEC Defensive Player of the Year and named a first-team All-SEC selection.

## Steltz Was A Finalist For Thorpe Award

S Craig Steltz was one of three finalists for the Thorpe Award, given annually to the top defensive back in college football. Steltz, a native of New Orleans, leads LSU with 97 tackles, five of which have gone for losses. Steltz also leads the SEC with six interceptions to go with seven pass break-ups. He's also recorded one sack, forced two fumbles and recovered a fumble. He's fifth in the league in passes defended with 13. Arizona's Antoine Cason was named the winner of the Thorpe Award.

## Colt David Kicks Way Into LSU Record Books

Junior PK Colt David has kicked his way into the LSU record books as he now holds the school's single-season record for field goals (25) and points (139). With a pair of field goals against Ole Miss, David moved past David Browndyke (19 field goals in 1988) for first place in LSU history for field goals in a season. In addition, David's 11 points against the Rebels allowed him to surpass RB LaBrandon Toefield for points in a season. Toefield held the school mark with 114 points scored during the 2001 season. David's 139 points this year ranks as the second-highest total in SEC history, while his 25 field goals tie for fourth in SEC history. The SEC record for points in a season is 144 set by Alabama's Shaun Alexander in 1997, while Georgia's Billy Bennett holds the field goal mark for the league with 31 in 2003. Senior DT Glenn Dorsey was tabbed a first-team All-American by the AP, AFCA, FWAA, Walter Camp Foundation, ESPN, CBSSports.com, CNN.com, Rivals.com and the Sporting News. Senior S Craig Steltz joined Dorsey on the first-team by the AP, Walter Camp Foundation, ESPN, CBSSports.com, CNN.com and Rivals.com. Senior LB Ali Highsmith joined his defensive teammates on the CBSSports.com first team. Highsmith was also a second-team AP All-American and was an honorable mention by CNN.com along with CB Chevis Jackson.

## Jones, Toliver Earn Freshman All-Americans

S/RS Chad Jones was named a first-team Freshman All-American by the Sporting News and joined WR Terrance Toliver as an honorable mention Freshman All-American by CollegeFootballNews.com.

## Record Number of Tigers Highlight All-SEC Coaches Team

LSU collected a record 10 players on the 2007 All-SEC Coaches' first and second teams. The Tigers' 10 members on the coaches' teams, seven on the first team and three on the second team, surpassed the program's previous high of nine members from the 2004 team. DT Glenn Dorsey led LSU's four first team players on the defensive side of the ball. Dorsey was a unanimous choice by the coaches after collecting 64 tackles during the season, including six sacks and 11.5 tackles for loss. S Craig Steltz and LB Ali Highsmith were also both unanimous first-team selections. Steltz leads the Tigers with 97 tackles and lead the conference with six interceptions, while Highsmith is second on the team with 93 stops. CB Chevis Jackson also earned first-team honors. Herman Johnson was named to the first team on offense. Johnson anchors a line that helped LSU average 218 rushing yards per game. LSU earned two of the three first-team honors on

special teams. Place kicker Colt David and punter Patrick Fisher each received first-team All-SEC honors. OT Ciron Black and RB Jacob Hester received second-team honors on offense, while LB Darry Beckwith was a second-team selection on the defensive side of the ball.

### Dorsey Named 2007 SEC Defensive Player of the Year

Glenn Dorsey was named the 2007 SEC Defensive Player of the Year by the league's head coaches. The Gonzales, La., native is the undisputed leader of an LSU defense that ranks third in the country in total defense and is listed among the top two in five different statistical categories in the SEC this year. Through 13 games, Dorsey ranks as the Tigers' third-leading tackler with 64 stops. He is also responsible for six sacks, 11.5 tackles for loss, four quarterback hurries and three passes defended. Dorsey is the first LSU athlete to earn Defensive Player of the Year honors in the league since Chad Lavalais was selected following the 2003 season.

### Toliver and Jones Named To All-SEC Freshman Team

Terrance Toliver and Chad Jones were each named to the eighth annual SEC All-Freshman team as voted on by the league's 12 coaches. Toliver, a wide receiver from Hempstead, Texas, was one of two unanimous selections on offense, while Jones earned as spot as both a defensive back and return specialist.

### LSU's Class of 2007: Winningest Senior Class in School History

This year's senior class will leave its mark at LSU as the winningest group of seniors in the history of the program. Most of this year's 25 seniors joined the Tigers in the spring of 2003 and were a part of the school's first national title in over 50 years when LSU posted a 13-1 overall mark and claimed the BCS National Championship. This year's senior class has been ranked in the top 25 for their entire career.

### LSU Claims First Outright SEC Western Division Title

LSU claimed the school's first outright SEC Western Division title this year. LSU finished its SEC slate with a 6-2 mark, one game ahead of Auburn. Since the SEC went to divisions in 1992, the Tigers have shared the SEC Western Division title six times (1996, '97, '01, '02, '03, '05) and claimed the division title outright once (2007).

### LSU No. 2 In All Polls Heading Into BCS Title Game

LSU jumped five spots from No. 7 to No. 2 in the latest BCS Standings, which were released on Dec. 2. The No. 2 ranking in the BCS put the Tigers in the national championship game on Jan. 7 against Ohio State. With its win over Tennessee in the SEC Championship Game, the Tigers jumped from No. 7 in the BCS to the No. 2 spot. The Tigers are also ranked No. 2 in the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll as well as the AP Poll. This year, LSU has spent four weeks as the No. 1-ranked team in the AP Poll and three weeks as the No. 1 team in the Harris and USA Today Coaches Polls. LSU has now been

ranked for 82 consecutive weeks in the USA Today Coaches Poll and for 81 straight weeks in the AP Poll. The last time LSU failed to make the top 25 in either poll came following the Tigers loss to Texas in the 2003 Cotton Bowl to conclude the 2002 season.

### Tigers Post Third-Straight 11-Win Season

LSU's win over Tennessee gave the Tigers their third-straight season with at least 11 wins, which is a first in school history. Never before has an LSU posted double-figure wins in back-to-back seasons. Les Miles is the only coach in school history to lead the Tigers to at least 10 victories in consecutive seasons and now he's done it for a third time this year. In addition, LSU joins Alabama, Georgia, Tennessee and Florida as the only teams in SEC history to win at least 10 games in three-straight seasons.

### LSU Sets School Record For Points In A Season

This year's LSU team became the first squad in school history to score more than 500 points in a season. The Tigers have scored a school-record 503 points in 13 games for a current average of 38.7 points per game, which is also a school record. The previous school record for points in a season was 475 set by the 2003 national championship team. The previous record for points per game was 34.9 set by the 1969 squad.

### Tigers Have Scored At Least 21 Points In Every Game This Year; An LSU First So Far

LSU goes into the Ohio State game having scored at least 21 points in every game this year. No other LSU team in school history has gone the length of a season with 21 points as the fewest points scored in a single-game. The only other LSU team in to score at least 20 points in every game during the season came in 1969. That year, the Tigers posted a 9-1 overall mark under Charles McClendon. The fewest points the Tigers scored in a single-game in 1969 was 20 points, doing it twice in a 20-0 victory over Miami (Fla.) and a 20-15 win over Alabama.

### Tigers Rank Among Nation's Best At Taking Care Of Football

When it comes to taking care of the football, LSU has been one of the nation's best as the Tigers are No. 5 in the nation in turnover margin with a +1.38 average per game. In 13 games, the Tigers have turned the ball over only 15 times - 12 interceptions and 3 fumbles. With only 3 fumbles, the Tigers are ranked No. 1 in the nation in that category. LSU is 11th nationally in turnovers lost with 15.

### LSU's Defense Has Been Good With Takeaways

While the LSU offense has been good at protecting the football, the Tiger defense has been just as productive in terms of turnovers gained as the squad has produced 33 takeaways this year. LSU has 21 interceptions and 12 fumble recoveries. The 33 takeaways rank as the fourth-best total in college football, trailing only South Florida (41), Cincinnati (39) and Wake Forest (34). LSU's 21 interceptions was the most of any SEC team and ranks No. 5 in the nation.

### Statistically Speaking, LSU Still Has One Of Nation's Best All Around Defenses

LSU brings one of the nation's best overall defenses into the Ohio State game as the Tigers are ranked among the top 10 in the country in three categories. LSU is third in the nation in total defense, allowing 283.8 yards per game, and it is No. 9 in pass defense, yielding 180.8 yards per contest. The following is a look at how LSU ranks both nationally and in the SEC in several key defensive categories:

### LSU Has Nation's Third-Best Winning Percentage Away From Tiger Stadium Since 2003

With the win over Tennessee, LSU has now won 24 of its last 31 games away from Tiger Stadium since the 2003 season. LSU's .767 away-from-home winning percentage since 2003 ranks as the nation's second-best mark, trailing only Southern Cal (.853). The following is a look at the teams with the best winning percentage away from home (road or neutral site games) since the 2003 season:

### LSU Running Back Finally Loses Fumble; Tigers Still Take Care Of The Football

For the first time this year an LSU running back lost a fumble when Trindon Holliday fumbled in the third quarter against Tennessee on Dec. 1. That fumble by Holliday snapped a streak of 392 carries by LSU running backs in 2007 without a fumble. The fumble by Holliday is still the only lost fumble by LSU running backs in 402 carries this year. Of LSU's five running backs - Jacob Hester, Keiland Williams, Charles Scott, Richard Murphy and Holliday - only Hester and Holliday have lost a fumble on a rushing attempt. Hester's lost fumble on a rush came against Georgia in what was the first game of his career in 2004. Hester fumbled for the first time since the 2004 season against Arkansas, however, LSU was able to recover, keeping his streak of carries without a lost fumble intact. Hester has now gone 330 carries without losing a fumble. The following is a look at the number of carries LSU's running backs have toted the football without a fumble:

## LSU Sets School Record With Seven 40-plus Point Games

By scoring 48 points against Arkansas, LSU has now set the school record for games with at least 40 points with seven. Last year's squad scored 40 points six times, which was the previous mark.

## Bowl Eligible Again; Tigers Have Won At Least Eight Games In A Season For Eight-Straight Years

With the win over Florida in week 6, LSU became bowl eligible for a school-record eighth-straight season. Since the 2000 season, LSU has played in the Peach Bowl (2000 and 2005), Sugar Bowl (2001, 2003, 2006), Cotton Bowl (2002) and Capital One Bowl (2004). In addition, the Tigers have now recorded at least eight wins for the eighth-straight season, also a first for LSU.

## Hester Goes Over 1,000-Yard Mark

With 120 yards against Tennessee on Dec. 1, RB Jacob Hester became the 11th 1,000-yard rusher in school history. To date, Hester has rushed for 1,017 yards and 11 TDs. The 1,017 yards rank as the ninth-highest total in school history. Hester is the first 1,000-yard rusher for LSU since Justin Vincent rushed for 1,001 yards in 2003.

## Hester and Flynn Part of 2,000-1,000 Yard Club

This year's LSU team became just the sixth in school history to feature both a 2,000-yard passer and a 1,000-yard rusher. QB Matt Flynn has thrown for 2,233 yards, while RB Hester has rushed for 1,017 yards. It's the first time since Matt Mauck and Justin Vincent in 2003 that LSU has featured a 2,000-yard passer and a 1,000-yard rusher.

## Flynn Cracks LSU Top 10 List For Passing Yards and TDs In A Season

QB Matt Flynn has cracked the school's top 10 list for passing yards and passing TDs in a season. With 2,233 passing yards, Flynn is currently ranked eighth in school history in that category. In addition, Flynn's 17 TD passes is tied with Josh Booty and Herb Tyler as the seventh-highest single-season total in school history. Flynn also ranks seventh in completions with 183, and seventh in attempts with 332.

## Doucet Up To No. 4 In School History With 163 Catches

With five receptions against Tennessee, WR Early Doucet ran his career total to 163 catches, which ranks fourth in school history. Despite missing four games this year with an injury, Doucet has still managed to catch 50 passes for 474 yards and four scores.

## Holliday Returns Another Kickoff For TD; Sets LSU Mark

Trindon Holliday became the first player in school history to return two kickoffs for touchdowns in his career when he scored on a 98-yard return against Ole Miss. Holliday's first kickoff return for a score came last year when he went 92 yards for a TD against Arkansas. For his career, Holliday has returned 23 kickoffs for 630 yards and two touchdowns. He's averaging 27.4 yards per return for his career, which includes an average of 26.0 yards on 18 returns this year.

## Holliday Makes Most Of His Touches

Trindon Holliday makes the most of his touches as he's averaging 11.1 yards every time he touches the football. In 13 games, Holliday has accounted for 822 total yards on 74 attempts. He's rushed for 351 yards on 50 carries; returned 18 kickoffs for 468 yards; caught two passes for three yards and returned a punt for zero yards.

## The Cardiac Tigers

Six times this year, LSU has had the outcome of games decided either late in the fourth quarter or in overtime. Most recently, LSU scored midway through the fourth quarter and then had to hold off a pair of Tennessee drives in its 21-14 win over the Vols in the SEC Championship Game. Prior to the Tennessee game, LSU and Arkansas had to go to three overtimes before the contest was decided with the Razorbacks coming out on top by a 50-48 margin. LSU went four straight games - Florida, Kentucky, Auburn and Alabama - with the outcome of those contests determined either late in the fourth quarter or in overtime. Against Alabama on Nov. 3, LSU scored with less than two minutes left and basically on its final possession to post a 41-34 win over Alabama. The win over the Crimson Tide capped a comeback that saw LSU score 14 points in the final 2:49 of the contest to register the come-from-behind victory. LSU scored on its final possession with just over a minute left to beat Florida, 28-24, on Oct. 13. The game-winning drive featured a pair of fourth-down conversions that kept LSU's hopes alive. The following week, the Tigers went to triple-overtime before dropping a 43-37 decision to Kentucky. Then, on Oct. 20, LSU scored with just one second left when QB Matt Flynn connected with WR Demetrius Byrd on a 22-yard pass to beat Auburn, 30-24.

## LSU Is 14-3 All-Time In Games Played As No. 1-Ranked Team

The loss to Arkansas dropped LSU's all-time record in games played as the No. 1-ranked team to 14-3, which includes a 2-2 mark this year. The Florida contest on Oct. 6 marked the first time since the 1959 season that LSU played a football game as the nation's No. 1-ranked team.

## LSU's Streak Of 33 Straight Wins Against Unranked Opponents Snapped By Arkansas

The Tigers' streak of 33 straight wins against unranked opponents was snapped against Arkansas on Nov. 23. Prior to the Arkansas game, LSU hadn't lost a game to an unranked team since the 2003 season when the No. 6 Tigers fell to unranked Florida, 19-7, in Tiger Stadium.

## Miles Now 33-6 At LSU; Best Start For A Coach In LSU History

With an 11-2 mark this year, coach Les Miles is now 33-6 overall with the Tigers. The 33 wins in his first 39 games is the most of any coach in school history during that span. Bernie Moore ranks second with 31 wins during his first 39 games.

## Flynn Is 10-2 As LSU's Starting Quarterback

Matt Flynn's record fell to 10-2 as LSU's starting quarterback with the Tigers' loss to Arkansas. Flynn is 9-2 this year as LSU's starter after going 1-0 in 2005. Flynn's first start for the Tigers came in the 2005 Peach Bowl as he directed LSU to a 40-3 victory over Miami.

## D-Line U

You can now refer to LSU as D-line U as the Tigers have made it a habit of producing All-Americans and NFL Drafts from its defensive line. Since the 2003 season, LSU has had five defensive linemen earn First-Team All-America status and seven members of its defensive line selected in the NFL Draft. Senior defensive tackle Glenn Dorsey earned First-Team All-America recognition in 2006 and then opted to return to LSU for his senior season despite being projected as a first round pick in last spring's NFL Draft.

## Miles Does It Again - Beats Auburn, Florida And Alabama In Same Year

With LSU's win over Alabama, coach Les Miles swept those three conference foes for the second time during his LSU career. Miles is the only coach in LSU history to beat Auburn, Florida and Alabama in the same season, and now he's done it twice.

## LSU Now 6-4 In Overtime Games

With LSU's triple-overtime defeat to Arkansas, the Tigers dropped their all-time overtime record to 6-4. LSU is 2-1 in overtime road games and 4-1 in overtime games against Top 25 teams. Coach Les Miles is 3-3 in overtime games. Only two of LSU's 10 overtime games have gone more than one period (3OT loss to Kentucky, 43-37, in 2007; 3OT loss to Arkansas, 50-48, in 2007)

## LSU Has Six Wins Over Top 25 Teams This Year

LSU has a 6-1 mark against top 25 teams this year. The seven top 25 opponents is the most LSU has faced during the regular season since 1999 when the Tigers played six ranked teams during their 3-8 season under Gerry DiNardo. LSU was 1-5 against top 25 teams that year. The most top 25 teams that LSU has ever faced in a season (both regular and post season) is seven, which has happened twice - 2005 and 1988. LSU was 3-4 against ranked teams in 1988 and 5-2 against ranked teams in 2005. This year, LSU has wins over then-No. 9 Virginia Tech, 48-7, in week 2; a 28-16 win over then-No. 12 South Carolina in week 4; a 28-24 win over then-No. 7 Florida in week 6, a 30-24 win over then-No. 18 Auburn in week 8, a 41-34 win over then-No. 17 Alabama in week 9, and a 21-14 win over No. 14 Tennessee in the SEC Championship Game. LSU's only loss against a top 25 team came against then-No. 17 Kentucky, 43-37, in triple

overtime in week 7. Since taking over at LSU, Les Miles has a 13-5 mark against Top 25 teams.

## LSU A Second Half Team

Through 13 games, LSU has made its mark as a second half team, outscoring its opponents, 277-105 in the third and fourth quarters. LSU has outscored its opposition 141-52 in the third quarter and 136-53 in the fourth quarter.

## Running Back Hester Adds To Receiving Total

When it comes to catching the ball out of the backfield, RB/DE Jacob Hester has become one of the best in school history. During his career, Hester has 60 receptions from the running back position, a figure that ranks just outside of the top six in LSU history. A year ago, Hester caught 35 passes, which ranked as the third-highest single-season total in school history. Gary James (1982-85) holds both the LSU career mark (122) and single-season record (50 in 1985) for receptions by a running back. This year, Hester has 12 catches for 101 yards and one touchdown.

## LSU "D" Has Held Opponents Scoreless In 27 Of Last 60 Quarters

Dating back to last year's Notre Dame contest, LSU has held its opponent scoreless in 27 of the last 60 quarters in which it has played. That streak includes holding opponents scoreless in 24 of 52 quarters this year.

## LSU's Only Allowed One 100-Yard Rusher

LSU goes into the Ohio State game having allowed only one 100-yard rusher this year as Arkansas' Darren McFadden with 206 yards is the only player to reach the mark against the Tigers. LSU held Tulane's Matt Forte, who has rushed for over 2,000 yards this season, to 73 yards on 16 attempts back on Sept. 29. Prior to

McFadden's 206 yards, the last time a player went over the 100-yard mark against LSU came in the Sugar Bowl a year ago when Notre Dame's Darius Walker accounted for 128 yards.

### Except For Arkansas, LSU Defense Stingy Against The Run Under Pelini

LSU's defense under Bo Pelini has become stingy when it comes to rushing yards. In 39 games as LSU's defensive coordinator, the Tigers have held 26 of their 39 opponents to less than 100 net rushing yards. LSU is 23-3 in those games with the losses coming to Tennessee in 2005 and Auburn and Florida in 2006. Only four teams have gone over the 100-yard mark against LSU this year - Arkansas with 385 yards, Ole Miss with 201 yards, Florida with 156 yards and Kentucky with 125 yards.

### First Quarter Dominance Continues Into 2007

One big reason for LSU's success last year was its ability to take control of the contest early. Last year, the Tigers outscored their opponents 136-27 in the first quarter and 240-87 in the first half. LSU didn't allow a single point in the first quarter of a game last year until the sixth contest of the year when Florida scored with 11 seconds remaining in the opening frame. In all, LSU held nine of its 12 opponents without a point in the first quarter a year ago. This year, LSU has outscored its opponents 94-41 in the first quarter and 196-112 in the first half.

### David Scores TD, Then Kicks PAT - A First For LSU Since 1965

The last time an LSU player scored a touchdown and then kicked the ensuing PAT came back on Nov. 20, 1965 when Doug Moreau (who now handles the color analyst duties for the Tiger broadcast team) did it against Tulane. In the 62-0 win over the Green Wave, Moreau scored on a 9-yard TD pass from Pat Screen with 30 seconds left in the first quarter and then followed with one of his six extra points that day. Now, 42 years later, PK Colt David did it again, scoring on a 15-yard run on the Tigers' fake field goal just before halftime in the win over South Carolina. It was the first touchdown of David's career.

### Miles Is 6-3 Against Top 10 Teams As LSU's Coach; He's 13-5 In Top 25 Games

Les Miles has a 6-3 record against top 10 teams as LSU's head coach and he's now 13-5 against top 25 teams. Miles and the Tigers are 6-1 against top 25 teams this year, which includes a 2-0 mark against top 10 teams.

### Taking Note On The Tigers Under Miles (Since 2005)

Here are some notable trends for LSU in the 39 games its played under head coach Les Miles ... The Tigers are 30-2 when rushing for 100 yards or more ... The Tigers are 24-2 when leading after the first quarter with the only losses during that span coming against Tennessee in 2005 and Arkansas this year ... LSU is 30-3 when scoring 20 or more points and 26-3 when scoring 25 or more points ... The Tigers are 23-3 when holding opponents to fewer than 100 yards rushing.

### The Bo Pelini "D"

Since taking over as defensive coordinator for the Tigers in 2005, defensive coordinator Bo Pelini has put a unit on the field that rarely allows opponents to reach the 20-point mark. In 39 games with Pelini as its defensive coordinator, LSU has held 28 opponents to fewer than 20 points. In addition, 18 of LSU's 36 opponents

failed to score more than 10 points. Last year, LSU limited seven of its 13 opponents to 10 points or less, including holding Kentucky scoreless, Arizona to 3 points, Fresno State to 6 points, and Auburn to 7 points. Pelini's defenses have also recorded four shutouts over the past two-plus seasons, including two this year.

### Flynn Adds Name to Short List of LSU QBs with Three TD Passes in Three-Straight Games

By throwing for three touchdowns in LSU's win over Louisiana Tech, Matt Flynn became just the second quarterback in school history to toss at least three TD passes in three-straight games. In consecutive games, Flynn tossed three TD passes against Auburn, Alabama and Louisiana Tech. The only other Tiger to accomplish the feat is JaMarcus Russell, who tossed three TD passes in consecutive games against Tennessee, Alabama and Ole Miss in 2006.

### Flynn Joins Elite Group of LSU QBs With Second 300-Yard Passing Game

When Matt Flynn threw for a career-best 353 yards against Alabama on Nov. 3, he became only the seventh quarterback in LSU history to throw for 300 or more yards in two games in the same season. Flynn has done it twice this year - also throwing for 319 yards and three scores against Auburn on Oct. 20. Flynn is also just one of four LSU quarterbacks who have thrown for 300 yards in back-to-back games joining Rohan Davey (three-straight times in 2001), Jeff Wickersham (twice in 1983) and Tommy Hodson (twice in 1989).

### Just Who Is Backup QB Andrew Hatch?

LSU backup QB Andrew Hatch joined the Tigers over the summer after spending a year on a church mission in Chile. Hatch originally committed to BYU and current LSU OC Gary Crowton when Crowton was still the head coach in Provo. Hatch eventually signed with Harvard and spent the 2005 season with the Crimson, playing on the junior varsity squad. After a year at Harvard, Hatch took a planned leave of absence from the program, going to Chile as part of a Mormon mission. Originally, Hatch was going on a two-year mission, however, his trip was cut short by a knee injury suffered while playing soccer with some of the locals. Hatch remained in Chile, undiagnosed for two months, before returning to the United States for surgery. Hatch finished the year rehabbing in his hometown of Henderson, Nev., where he re-connected with Crowton, who had stayed in touch with the Hatch family over the years. Eventually Hatch was offered a chance to walk on at LSU in the summer of 2007 with a chance of earning not only a spot on the roster, but also a scholarship. Hatch has seen action in one game this year, playing against Middle Tennessee. He's completed 1-of-2 passes for nine yards and rushed four times for 27 yards.

### Oh Brother

LSU has two sets of brothers on this year's team - defensive end Rahim Alem (formerly Al Jones) and defensive back Chad Jones are brothers, as are center Brett Helms and offensive lineman Trey Helms. Alem is a backup defensive end, while Jones serve as either a nickel or dime back in LSU's subpackages on defense. Brett Helms is LSU's starter at center, while Trey is a walk on true freshman.

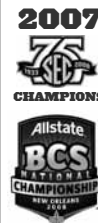

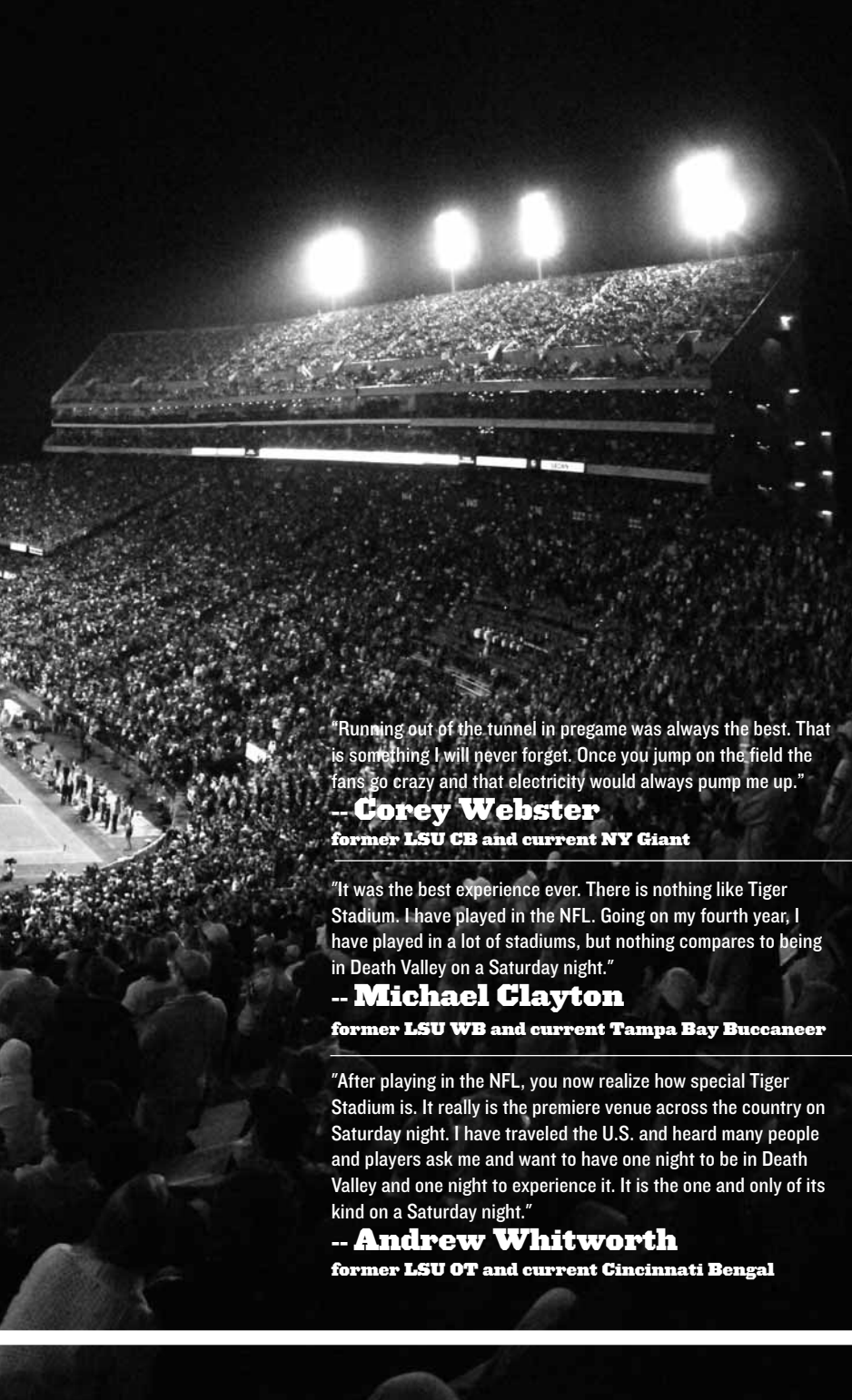

# Football OPERATIONS CENTER

LSU's Football Operations Center is an all-in-one facility that includes football offices, a locker room, a training room, an equipment room and a video operations center. The \$15 million facility is located on Skip Bertman Drive at the Charles McClendon Practice Facility. Built in 2006, the facility is one of the finest of its kind in college athletics, allowing more efficient time for dressing, training and practicing for the LSU football team.

# Locker Room

The Football Operations Center locker room has 140 stations with lockable storage bins and a padded sitting area. The room also includes four plasma screen TVs and six 27-inch TVs.

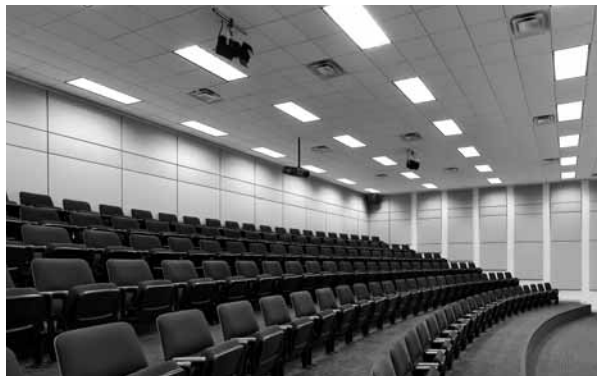

# Indoor Field

The Anderson-Feazel LSU Indoor Field is a 100-yard climate-controlled practice facility connected to the Operations Center. Built in 1991, the area is 8,250 square feet with Momentum Field Turf by SportExe similar to the Louisiana Superdome and M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore.



The main auditorium, that includes a 144 spacious theatre-style seats for team meetings and film sessions, has state-of-the-art audio and visual components necessary for meetings, lectures and reviewing of game tapes.



One of the most state-of-the-art video centers in the nation is housed in the Football Operations Center, complete with editing equipment to produce highlight videos and review game film.



LSU's 66 All-Americans are honored in the atrium.



The facility features four 100-yard football practice fields as well as an indoor practice facility. On Sept. 9, 2002, LSU formally named its football practice facility for Charles McClendon, the winningest football coach in school history.
