## TIGERS HOST 10TH-RANKED ALABAMA IN DEATH VALLEY

LSU returns to action on Saturday as it hosts 10th-ranked Alabama at 8 p.m. in Tiger Stadium. The game will be televised by ESPN. LSU, ranked No. 12 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll and No. 14 by the Associated Press, is 7-2 overall and sits in first in the Southeastern Conference Western Division with a 4-1 mark. Alabama, which is not eligible to win the SEC this season, is 8-2 overall and 5-1 in league play. LSU is a perfect 5-0 in Tiger Stadium this year and the Tigers have won eight straight home games overall. The contest will pit two of the nation's top defenses as LSU's ranks first and Alabama's is third. LSU and Alabama rank Nos. 1-2 in the SEC in scoring defense, giving up 15.3 and 16.7 points per game, respectively. Offensively, the teams are almost identical with the Crimson Tide averaging 30.8 points per game to LSU's 29.9. The Tigers are looking to beat Alabama three consecutive years for the first time in school history.

## HAIL MARY LIFTS TIGERS PAST KENTUCKY, 33-30

Marcus Randall connected with Devery Henderson on a 75-yard "Hail Mary" TD pass with no time left on Saturday to lift the Tigers to a very unlikely 33-30 win over Kentucky in Lexington. Billed as "THE BLUEGRASS MIRACLE", LSU won on the final play of a football game for the first time since a 17-16 victory over Ole Miss in 1972. Trailing 30-27 after a 29-yard field goal by Kentucky, were backed up to their own 8-yard line with nine seconds left. After a 17-yard gain that put the ball on the 25-yard line with two seconds left, Randall heaved the ball as far as he could. A pair of UK defenders deflected the ball directly to Henderson who then raced into the endzone for the game-winning TD. Henderson finished the contest with five receptions for 201 yards and three TDs, the second of which put the Tigers up 14-7 just before halftime.

# NICK SABAN

HEAD COACH • THIRD YEAR

You can call LSU head coach Nick Saban the complete package. Brought to Baton Rouge following the 1999 season to revive what many considered a sleeping giant, Saban has transformed the LSU football program into one that wins championships, while graduating players at the same time.

Armed with a plan that gives his players a chance to be successful on the field as well as the classroom, Saban's impact on the program has been immediate and it's been powerful.

In just two short years at LSU's head coach, Saban's on-field success has been unmatched as he has guided the Tigers to 18 victories, a pair of bowl wins, including one in a BCS game, and the 2001 Southeastern Conference title.

Off the field, Saban has spearheaded a fundraising effort that has raised more than \$15 million for a state-of-the-art academic center for student-athletes. The new LSU Academic Center for Student-Athletes is all part of Saban's plan to give his players the best opportunity to be successful when they finish their football career.

Saban didn't waste anytime making his impact felt as he guided a team coming off back-to-back losing seasons to an 8-4 mark and a win over 15th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl to rekindle the fire of a proud football tradition in Baton Rouge.

Saban's influence on the Tigers went much further in 2001 as he led LSU to the school's first outright Southeastern Conference title since 1986 with a 31-20 win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC title game and followed that win a 47-34 victory over Illinois in the Sugar Bowl, LSU's first New Year's Day Bowl win since 1968.

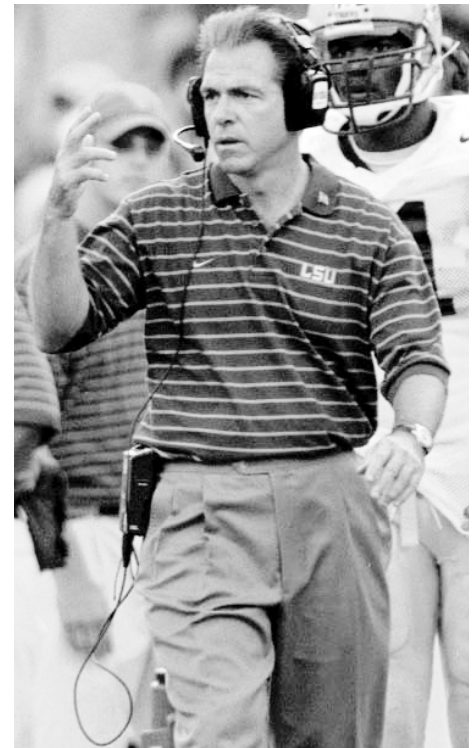
Beating Tennessee to win the league title is one thing, but the fashion in which Saban and the Tigers did so speaks volumes on the impact he has had on his squad. Playing without two of their offensive standouts, quarterback Rohan Davey and running back LaBrandon Toefield, not only did the Tigers respond to Saban's challenge to step up, they were dominant, outscoring the high-powered Vols offense 21-3 in the second half. LSU's defense allowed just 50 yards rushing.

Losing Davey and Toefield and still overcoming the adversity to win the title game, or any game for that matter, has been a trademark of Saban-coached teams. Teaching the players to trust and believe in each other has been a characteristic that Saban has branded on his squad. Saban preached to his team to play for 60 minutes, to become a dominant team on every play of every game, and to not worry about what the scoreboard read. The players responded.

After the Tigers dropped a 35-24 decision to Ole Miss in Baton Rouge in late October, LSU was practically counted out of the SEC Western Division race. Saban, however, pressed on saying the Tigers would continue to focus on getting better, playing one game at a time, and not worrying about anybody but the next opponent. It worked as the Tigers began to peak during their November run, a stretch that saw LSU win at Alabama, then beat nationally-ranked foes Arkansas and Auburn at home to advance to the SEC title game.

The win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC Championship game and then No. 7 Illinois in the Sugar Bowl were just two more steps along the way for the Tigers as Saban continues to restore the winning tradition to an LSU program that will soon be a fixture among the nation's elite in college football.

Prior to LSU, Saban spent five years as the head coach at Michigan State, where he built the Spartans into a perennial BigTen contender after going to four bowl games in five seasons.

## IN THE POLLS

LSU jumped two spots in each of the national polls on Sunday as the Tigers are ranked No. 12 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll and No. 14 in the Associated Press poll. LSU has been ranked for 17 consecutive weeks. Under **Nick Saban**, LSU is 12-5 as a ranked team and 8-5 against Top 25 teams, which includes a 1-1 mark this year. LSU fell in the season-opener to then No. 16 Virginia Tech, 26-8, before posting a 36-7 win over then No. 16 Florida.

### "HAIL DEVERY" - TIGERS BEAT KENTUCKY ON LAST-SECOND MIRACLE

LSU's last-second win over Kentucky on Saturday marks the first time an LSU team has won on the games last play since **Bert Jones** connected with **Brad Davis** to beat Ole Miss in Tiger Stadium in 1972. **Marcus Randall's** 75-yard TD pass to **Devery Henderson** came as time expired, and with Kentucky blasting fireworks and UK students tearing down the goal posts. In what will go down as one of the most memorable plays in the history of college football, Saturday's "**BLUEGRASS MIRACLE**" marks the fourth time in the Saban era that an LSU team has won in the closing moments of a contest. LSU beat Tennessee and Mississippi State in overtime in 2000 and last year, the Tigers scored with 13 seconds left to beat Kentucky in Lexington.

### LSU-ALABAMA TIES

LSU has three players that hail from the state of Alabama, including freshman DE **Brandon Washington** who went to Central High School in Tuscaloosa. Freshman DT **Melvin Oliver** (Opelika) and freshman LB **Chris McCauley** (Homewood) also call Alabama home. LSU's defensive backs coach **Charlie Harbison** spent three seasons as DBs coach for the Crimson Tide from 1998 to 2000 and defensive line coach Lance Thompson coached the D-line at Alabama from in 1999 and 2000.

### TIGERS AND TIDE TO BATTLE ON ESPN

LSU's game against Alabama will be televised to a national audience by ESPN. The game will mark LSU's fourth appearance on national television this season and the second time this year that the Tigers have been on ESPN. Earlier this year, LSU beat Florida, 36-7, on ESPN. LSU is 20-19 all-time on ESPN, which includes a 1-4 mark vs. Alabama. Under Nick Saban, the Tigers are 4-2 on ESPN.

### TAKING NOTE UNDER NICK SABAN ...

LSU is 6-1 in November, the lone loss came to Arkansas in 2000 ... The Tigers are 16-3 at home, which includes a 7-2 SEC mark and a 13-2 record at night ... The Tigers are 6-1 in games decided by seven points or less ... LSU is an 21-1 when leading at halftime and 21-1 when leading after the third quarter ... LSU is 20-0 when it scores at least 30 points in a game and 26-1 when they score 20 or more points ... LSU is 11-0 when having a 100-yard rusher.

### LOOKING BACK AT LAST YEAR'S 35-21 LSU WIN

A year ago against Alabama, **Josh Reed** solidified his name as at least a finalist for the Biletnikoff Award with an SEC record 19 receptions for league record 293 yards in the 35-21 win over the Crimson Tide. LSU quarterback **Rohan Davey** set school records for completions (35) and passing yards (528) and tied Archie Manning's SEC record for total yards with 540. LSU's 611 yards of total offense, the 528 passing yards and 35 completions were the most ever recorded against Alabama.

### MARCUS TO DEVERY FOR HISTORY

QB **Marcus Randall** and **Devery Henderson** connected on two big-play touchdowns in the 33-30 victory over Kentucky. The first, a 70-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter, the second, a 75-yard touchdown pass with no time left in the game for the victory. It is the first time in school history two passes for over 70 yards resulted in a touchdown in the same game. The next closest to the multiple 70-yard scores was two 60-plus yard touchdown passes for LSU in the 77-0 victory over Rice on Sept. 25, 1977. Carlos Carson caught a 63-yard pass from Steve Ensminger and a 67-yard pass from Woodley.

### RANDALL IMPRESSIVE IN THIRD CAREER START

Sophomore QB **Marcus Randall** was impressive again in his third career start. He threw for a career-high 264 yards and three touchdowns on 10 of 23 passing. His first career touchdown pass came when hit **Devery Henderson** with a shovel pass early in the second quarter. Randall also found Henderson for two more touchdowns in the game, a 30-yard strike with time running down in the second quarter and a 75-yard pass with no

time on the clock to win the game. Randall is 2-1 as a starter, including a 1-0 mark in Tiger Stadium.

### **TIGERS LOOK TO STAY PERFECT IN DEATH VALLEY IN 2002**

LSU takes a perfect 5-0 home record into Saturday's contest with Alabama. Dating back to last season, LSU has won eight consecutive home games, the longest streak for the Tigers since an eight-game streak between Oct. 14, 1995 and Oct. 26, 1996. Prior to that, LSU's longest home winning streak was 15 straight covering all of the final two games in 1971, all of 1972 and the first six home games in 1973. Alabama snapped the 15-game streak with a 21-7 victory over the Tigers in 1973. In addition, the Crimson Tide snapped LSU's eight-game home winning streak with a 26-0 victory over the Tigers in 1996. The Tigers could complete a perfect season in Tiger Stadium for the first time since 1972.

### **THIS DAY VS. NIGHT THING IN TIGER STADIUM**

A great deal has been made comparing LSU's record at night versus its day game record in Tiger Stadium. The facts are that LSU has a better winning percentage at night as compared to during the day. Since 1960, LSU is 181-60-4 (.747 winning percentage) at home under the lights as compared to only a 14-20-3 (.419 winning percentage) mark during the day. LSU is 4-0 at home this year at night and the Tigers have won 11 of their last 12 night games dating back to midway through the 2000 season. Under Saban, LSU is 13-2 at night and 3-1 during the day in Tiger Stadium.

### **WHEN IT'S THIRD DOWN TIGERS GO TO CLAYTON**

**Michael Clayton** has become LSU's "go to" man on third down situations this year as the sophomore wideout has 14 third-down receptions this year that have resulted in either a touchdown or a first down. Clayton had four catches against Kentucky and two of them came on third down that resulted in a first down for the Tigers. Of Clayton's 35 receptions this year, 40 percent have come on third down. In addition, of Clayton's 482 receiving yards, 192 have come on those 14 third-down receptions (39.8 percent). All four of Clayton's receiving TDs this year have come on third down - 2 against Miami (Ohio) and 2 vs. UL-Lafayette.

### **HENDERSON HAS RECORD DAY AT KENTUCKY**

Junior receiver **Devery Henderson** grabbed a career-high 201 receiving yards and three touchdowns in the thrilling 33-30 victory over Kentucky. He became the first LSU receiver to have at least 200 receiving yards since Josh Reed had 239 against Illinois in the Sugar Bowl. Henderson also became the first Tigers to pull down three touchdowns since Reed accomplished the feat against Tennessee on Sept. 30, 2000. Henderson's 40.2 per catch average vs. Kentucky tied a school-record, which was set by **Carlos Carson** in 1977. Carson had identical numbers of 5 catches for 201 yards in LSU's 77-0 win over Rice in 1977. The only difference in Carson and Henderson is that all five of Carson's receptions went for touchdowns.

### **HENDERSON'S CAUGHT LSU'S LAST FIVE TD PASSES**

With three TD receptions vs. Kentucky, **Devery Henderson** has now caught LSU's last five touchdown passes. Henderson had a pair of TD receptions vs. Florida. For the year, Henderson has caught 7 TD passes, the fifth-highest total in the SEC this year and the seventh-best total in school history. With 19 receptions this year, Henderson is averaging a TD reception every 2.7 catches.

### **TIGERS NEARLY UNBEATABLE AFTER HALLOWEEN UNDER SABAN**

Once the month turns to November, the Tigers have become nearly unbeatable under **Nick Saban** as LSU sports a 10-1 mark in games after October under the third-year coach. As a matter of fact, LSU will carry a eight-game winning streak in games played after Halloween into Saturday's contest against Alabama. Last year, LSU was 4-3 at the conclusion of October. The Tigers then reeled off six straight wins to finish with a 10-3 overall mark. In 2000, the Tigers were 3-1 in post-October games, the lone loss coming in a driving rainstorm against Arkansas in Little Rock. Dating back to Saban's last year at Michigan State, he's posted a 13-1 mark in post-October games, with seven of the 14 games coming against teams ranked in the Top 25.

### **IN EIGHT GAMES SINCE THE VIRGINIA TECH LOSS ...**

- LSU is outscoring its opponents by 18.6 points per game (32.6-14.0).
- The Tigers have put the ball in the endzone 32 times, an average of 4.0 per game.

## TIGERS HAVE BEST SEC START SINCE 1996; EYE BEST START SINCE 1988

LSU is off to its best SEC start at 4-1 since starting 4-1 in 1996 before the Crimson Tide sent the Tigers to their second conference defeat. LSU went on to a 6-2 league mark in 1996 and a tie for the Western Division title. LSU hasn't been 5-1 in league play since the SEC went to an eight-game conference schedule in 1992. LSU's last 5-1 start came in 1988 when the Tigers finished 6-1 in league play and tied for conference title. In addition, LSU hasn't been 8-2 since the 1996 when the Tigers beat Tulane to improve to 8-2. LSU finished that year 10-2 overall and beat Clemson in the Peach Bowl.

## TIGERS SWEEP SEC EAST FOES

With the win over Kentucky on Saturday, the Tigers completed their regular-season with a 3-0 mark against the SEC Eastern Division this year. The three wins signals the first sweep by LSU over the east since 1997 when LSU beat Florida, Kentucky and Vanderbilt. Since the league went to divisional format, LSU has gone perfect against the SEC East prior to this season only one time (1997) in a single-season. Dating back to last year, LSU has won five straight regular-season contests against SEC Eastern Division teams, and counting the SEC Championship game, the Tigers have won six consecutive games against opponents from the other division. LSU is 7-3 vs. the SEC East under Nick Saban.

## SABAN ADDS ANOTHER NOTCH TO HIS SEC BELT

With LSU's win over South Carolina on Oct. 19, Nick Saban has now recorded at least one victory over every SEC team that he has faced. The only two SEC teams that Saban has yet to beat are the only two hasn't faced - Georgia and Vanderbilt.

## IT MUST BE THE HALFTIME SPEECH

Whether it's the halftime motivational speech or adjustments by the coaching staff, something is going on in the LSU locker room at halftime as the Tigers have outscored their opponents 79-24 in the third quarter this year, including 72-14 in the last seven games. Against SEC opponents, the third quarter score is 55-14. On Oct. 19, LSU trailed 14-6 at halftime and then promptly went out and held South Carolina to 1 yard of offense in the third quarter, while outscoring the Gamecocks 25-0. Auburn and Kentucky are the only SEC teams to score in the third quarter against the Tigers this year.

## LSU'S JAMES GANG DEFENSE LEADS NATION IN TOTAL DEFENSE

LSU's JAMES GANG defense, named for captain Bradie James, enters the Alabama contest leading the nation in total defense (246.4 ypg). The James Gang also ranks third in pass defense (132.7 ypg), fifth in pass efficiency defense (85.3 rating) and the Tigers are eighth in scoring defense (15.3 points per game). LSU leads the SEC in all four of those categories. The Tiger defense is also third in the SEC and 23rd in the nation in rushing defense, allowing 113.8 yards per game

## BRADIE JAMES IS A SEMIFINALIST FOR THE BUTKUS AWARD

LSU linebacker **Bradie James** has been named one of 11 semifinalists for the 2002 Butkus Award, the Downtown Athletic Club of Orlando announced on Oct. 17. James, a Butkus Award candidate each of the past three years, currently leads LSU with 109 tackles. James also has 14 quarterback hurries, five tackles for loss, two sacks, one interception and one forced fumble. This year, James has two of the highest tackles games in the SEC with 19 against Virginia Tech and 18 versus The Citadel. Other 2002 Butkus Award semifinalist include: Boss Bailey (Georgia), Michael Boulware (Florida State), Rod Davis (Southern Miss), E.J. Henderson (Maryland), Derrick Johnson (Texas), Teddy Lehman (Oklahoma), Jonathan Vilma (Miami), Courtney Watson (Notre Dame), Matt Wilhelm (Ohio State), D.J. Williams (Miami).

## BRADIE SEMIFINALIST FOR ANOTHER AWARD

Senior linebacker **Bradie James** had made the first cut for the Lombardi Award and is one of 12 players from around the nation selected as semifinalists. The winner of the award will be announced at a diner in Houston on Dec. 11. The other 11 semifinalist are: Boss Baily (Georgia), Jeff Faine (Notre Dame), Tommie Harris (Oklahoma), E.J. Henderson (Maryland), William Joseph (Miami), Jimmy Kennedy (Penn State), Jerome

McDougle (Miami), Cory Redding (Texas), Brett Romberg (Miami), Jon Stinchcomb (Georgia) and Tyrrell Suggs (Arizona State).

### **BRADIE REACHED CENTURY MARK FOR THIRD STRAIGHT YEAR**

Senior linebacker **Bradie James** has recorded at least 100 tackles in each of the past three seasons after collecting 14 tackles in the Oct. 26th loss at Auburn. Currently James has 109 tackles this season, recorded 113 last year and had 110 as a sophomore. The West Monroe, La., native is just the second Tiger in history to record three straight 100-tackle seasons. Linebacker Al Richardson was the first to accomplish the feat recording 129 tackles in 1980, 150 in 1981 and 121 in 1982.

### **BRADIE JAMES NAMED NATIONAL SCHOLAR-ATHLETE**

The National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame announced linebacker **Bradie James** has been named to the 2002 National Scholar-Athlete Class, which includes 14 players from all divisions. The award, an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship is one of the top academic honors available to college football players. Past LSU recipients of the award include punter Chad Kessler in 1997, quarterback Sol Graves in 1990 and center Nacho Albergamo in 1987.

### **BRADIE NOW THIRD IN CAREER TACKLES**

Among other feats senior linebacker **Bradie James** has accumulated during his career at LSU, he is now third in career tackles in Tiger history. James has 373 entering the Alabama game and is 14 away from passing Lawrence Williams into second place and 80 away from becoming LSU's all-time leader in tackles.

### **KENTUCKY FIRST TO GET A 100-YARD RUSHER AGAINST LSU**

LSU's defense had its streak of not allowing a 100-yard rusher in a game snapped at 12 straight games when Kentucky's Artose Pinner, the leading rusher in the SEC, gained 143 yards on the ground on Saturday. Pinner was the first rusher to eclipse the 100-yard mark since Dwone Hicks of Middle Tennessee rushed for 117 in a 30-14 loss to the Tigers on Nov. 10, 2001. LSU had also not yielded a 100-yard rusher in a game by an SEC opponent since the season finale in 2000 when Brandon Holmes rushed for 143 yards and a touchdown in Arkansas' 14-3 victory in Little Rock.

### **JAMES GANG CONTINUES TO BE STINGY**

LSU's defense continues to be the mark of consistency as the Tigers have allowed only two opponents to surpass the 300-yard mark this season. Auburn and Kentucky are the only teams this year to record more than 275 yards of offense against LSU. AU had 321 in a 31-7 win over LSU on Oct. 26 and UK recorded 375 total yards in the 33-30 loss on Nov. 9th. Prior to the Auburn game, LSU had held its first seven opponents to fewer than 300 yards of total offense. In addition, LSU went the first six games before allowing a team go over the 250-yard mark. South Carolina snapped the string in Week 7 with 275 yards against the Tigers. Here's a look at the yardage for LSU's opponents this season: Virginia Tech (231 yards), Citadel (236), Miami (224), Mississippi State (249), Louisiana-Lafayette (70), Florida (237), South Carolina (275), Auburn (321) and Kentucky (375).

### **LSU'S RETURN TEAMS ARE SPECIAL....**

LSU's return team combination of **Domanick Davis**, **Devery Henderson** and **Shyrone Carey** have turned into a dominating trio for the Tigers. The Tigers lead the SEC and rank first in the nation in kickoff return average at 27.1 yards per return. The Tigers rank second in the SEC and fourth nationally in punt returns with a 16.8 average.

### **....AND SO IS THE KICKOFF COVERAGE UNIT**

While LSU's return teams get most of the publicity, the Tiger kickoff coverage team has been just as good as they lead the league by allowing only 16.9 yards per return. On 42 kickoff returns this year against LSU, the Tigers have allowed 708 yards. Over the last four games, LSU has allowed 224 yards on 15 returns, for an average of 14.9 a return. Miami (Ohio) had a 41-yard return, the longest return against the Tigers this year.

### **DAVIS MOVES PAST THE 5,000 ALL-PURPOSE YARD MARK**

With 135 all-purpose yards vs. Kentucky, **Domanick Davis** became just the third player in LSU history and only the sixth player in SEC history to surpass with 5,000-yard mark for all-purpose yards. Davis enters the Alabama contest with 5,103 all-purpose yards - 1,915 in kickoff returns, 1,094 in punt returns, 1,770 rushing and 324 receiving.

## DOUBLE D CONTINUES TO ADD TO RETURN RECORDS

With 19 punt return yards and 31 kickoff return yards against Kentucky, **Domanick Davis** continues to add to his school record in both categories. Davis holds the LSU career mark in both categories with 1,915 kickoff return yards and 1,094 punt return yards.

## DOMANICK CONTINUES ALL-PURPOSE STREAK

**Domanick Davis** ran his streak of games with at least 100 all-purpose yards to four straight and 13 of 14 with 135 yards against Kentucky on Saturday. Davis currently ranks second in the SEC and 10th in the nation with 164.4 all-purpose yards per contest. Earlier this year, Davis produced 286 all-purpose yards against Mississippi State, which ranks as the fifth-best total in LSU history. This year, Davis has touched the ball 189 times - 140 rushing, 27 punt returns, 12 kickoff returns and 10 receptions and he's averaging 7.8 yards per touch.

## DAVIS CLOSES IN ON LSU'S SEASON PUNT RETURN MARK

With 467 yards in punt returns, **Domanick Davis** has already recorded the second-highest single-season total in LSU history. Davis, who owns the LSU career punt return record, needs 73 yard to overtake Pinky Rohm (1937) for the single-season record. In what is one of the oldest records on the LSU books, Rohm returned 35 punts for 539 yards and three TD's in 1937.

## GET ON THE BOARD FIRST EQUALS SUCCESS

The Tigers are 5-0 this season when scoring first and 20-2 under Nick Saban when they do so. The last time LSU lost a game in which they scored first was last season at Tennessee. The only other loss came after scoring first came at Auburn in 2000.

## LSU'S MAGIC NUMBER: 20

LSU is almost automatic under **Nick Saban** when they score at least 20 points in a game, posting a 25-1 record. However, the Tigers are 0-8 when not reaching the 20-point plateau under Saban. LSU was 8-0 in 2000, 10-1 in 2001 and is 7-0 this season when reaching 20 points. The only loss during that span was a 35-24 defeat to Ole Miss. Dating back to last season, LSU has scored at least 20 points in 14 of its past 16 games.

## 30 ALSO MAGIC FOR SABAN'S TIGERS

LSU is even better under **Nick Saban** when scoring at least 30 points. The Tigers are 20-0 overall, which includes a 7-0 mark this year, when reaching the 30-point mark. The Tigers were 5-0 in 2000 and 8-0 last year when scoring at least 30 points in a contest. In fact, LSU has won its last 22 games when scoring at least 30 points, including two wins in the 1999 season. The last time LSU lost a game in which 30 points was Nov. 21, 1998, when Notre Dame defeated the Tigers 39-36 in South Bend. Included among the 22 straight wins when scoring at least 30 points is a 30-28 victory over Alabama in 2000 followed by a 35-21 win over the Crimson Tide in 2001.

## RECORD SET FOR PUTTING 30 ON THE BOARD

LSU had put at least 30 points on the scoreboard for a school-record six straight games before failing to do so in the 31-7 loss at Auburn. The previous record was five straight games during the tail end of the 1968 season and into the 1969 season. The 2002 Tigers put up 35 against The Citadel, 33 against Miami (Ohio), 31 against Mississippi State, 48 against Louisiana-Lafayette, 36 against Florida and 38 against South Carolina. The previous mark was set against Tulane (34) and Florida State (31) in 1968 and Texas A&M (35), Rice (42) and Baylor (63) in 1969.

## 72 STRAIGHT GAMES WITHOUT BEING SHUTOUT IS SCHOOL MARK

LSU continues to build on its school record of not being shutout. Including the Kentucky game, the Tigers have not been shutout in 72 straight games. The last time the Tigers were shutout was in 1996 by Alabama (27-0). The previous streak record was set between the 1985 and 1991 seasons.

## MOVING UP FRESHMAN SACKS LIST

LSU rookie **Melvin Oliver** continues to move up the school sacks list for freshman. Through nine games, Oliver has recorded five sacks, which ties him with **James Gillyard** (1992) and **Ron Sancho** (1985) for the second-most sacks by a freshman in school history. **Jarvis Green** (1998) holds the freshman mark with eight sacks. Oliver had a season-best 2.5 sacks in the win over South Carolina on Oct. 19th.



## WEBSTER CONTINUES TO LEAD THE SEC IN INTERCEPTIONS

Defensive back **Corey Webster**, a converted wide receiver, continues to lead the SEC in interceptions with five through nine games. Webster, who was named SEC Player of the Week after picking off three passes vs. Florida on Oct. 12, has returned the five interceptions for 75 yards and one TD. The three interceptions vs. Florida tied a school-record as he became only the sixth Tiger to intercept three passes in a single game. He was the first to do it since **Chris Williams** against Rice in 1978. The last time a Tiger had three picks in an SEC game came in 1970 when **Craig Burns** did it against Ole Miss. Webster took the second interception 45 yards for a touchdown and another pick led to an LSU field goal.

## GET A RUSHER TO 100 AND THE TIGERS WIN

When it comes to LSU football and 100-yard rushing games, the Tigers have proven to be tough to beat. Ten times since **Nick Saban** took over in 2000, LSU has had a player rush for 100 yards and 10 times the Tigers have come away with a victory. **Domanick Davis** has four of those 100-yard rushing games. Overall, LSU is 164-25 all-time when having a 100-yard rusher. LSU's last loss when having a 100-yard rusher came on Nov. 3, 1998, when **Kevin Faulk** posted 201 yards in a 22-16 loss to Alabama.

## GROUND GAME SCORES AGAIN

LSU has now scored a rushing TD in 18 of the past 19 games following **Joseph Addai's** 63-yard touchdown run in the in the third quarter against Kentucky. The score was Addai's fourth of the season, giving the freshman tailback the second most rushing touchdowns on the team.

## GROUND ATTACK

LSU had gained at least 200 yards rushing in six of the last seven games, including rushing for 213 yards in the 33-30 victory at Kentucky. Prior to not reaching the 200-yard rushing mark against Auburn, LSU has rushed for 200-plus yards in five consecutive games, the longest such streak since the 1973 Tigers did it six straight times. In 34 games under **Nick Saban**, the Tigers have rushed for more than 200 yards seven times and are 10-0 in those games. LSU rushed for 293 yards against The Citadel earlier this year, the most by the Tigers under Saban.

## SIX TRUE FRESHMEN HAVE SEEN ACTION

Through nine games, six true freshmen - LB **Cameron Vaughn**, DL **Kyle Williams**, RB **Jason Spadoni**, OL **Nate Livings**, OL **Terrance McGill** and WR **Skyler Green** - have seen action for the Tigers. Vaughn and Williams have played in all nine games this year. In addition to the true freshman that have played this year, 16 other Tigers have seen action for the first time this year.

## ADDAI CONTINUES TO PLAY WELL IN TOEFIELD'S ABSENCE

With **LaBrandon Toefield** out with an injury, backup running back **Joseph Addai** has proven that he's more than capable of handling the position. Against Kentucky, Addai led the Tigers with 91 rushing yards on just nine carries. Addai opened the third quarter with a 63-yard TD run, giving the Tigers a 21-7 advantage. Through nine games, Addai has rushed for 416 yards and four TD's. He's averaging a whopping 5.7 yards per carry, which happens to be the same yards per carry Toefield was averaging when he was injured.

## DOMANICK CREEPS UP IN SEC CAREER RECORDS FOUR CATEGORIES

**Domanick Davis** enters the Alabama game ranked second in SEC career kick return yards (punts and kickoffs) with 3,009, third in kickoff return yards with 1,915, eight in punt return yards with 1,094 and sixth in all-purpose yards with 5,103.

## CLAYTON'S STILL GOING

Sophomore receiver **Michael Clayton** has caught a pass in all 22 games (including the 2002 Sugar Bowl) of his career. In that span, he has pulled down at least five receptions in nine games, including at least five catches in four games in the 2002 season.

## CORBELLO KICKING TO THE TOP

Senior place kicker **John Corbello** moved past **Charles Alexander** into fourth place on the LSU career points list with nine points in Saturday's victory over Kentucky. He now has 261 career points and is 32 points away from passing **David Browndyke** into third-place. Corbello ranks second in school history with 46 career field goals, 15 fewer than

Browndyke, LSU's career leader. Corbello is second in the SEC this season in scoring, averaging 7.4 points per game.

### COBELLO NAILS 49-YARDER IN WIN AT KENTUCKY

It was not the game-winner, but **John Corbello's** career-high tying 49-yard field goal on Saturday at Kentucky was the difference on the scoreboard in LSU's 33-30 victory. Corbello's kick equaled his career-best of 49 yards from the 2000 Peach Bowl against Georgia Tech. It also tied for the 10th longest field goal in school history.

### JONES BOOTS HIS WAY INTO THE RECORD BOOKS

Junior punter **Donnie Jones** punted his way into the LSU record books on Saturday against Kentucky, in fact he booted his way right to the top of the record books. Jones nailed an 86-yard punt in the first quarter, bettering the previous school record of 76 yards by **Ray Coates** on Oct. 7, 1944 against Rice. Jones' 86-yard punt went from the LSU 13-yard line to the UK 1-yard line. It's the sixth-longest punt in the history of the SEC. Jones also connected for a 60-yard punt later in the game.

### MYERS ON THE MOVE

Senior receiver **Jerel Myers** enters the Alabama game in fourth place on the LSU career receptions list. The Houston, Texas, native has 139 receptions for 1,780 yards in his career. He is also seventh in career receiving yards with 1,780, 132 away from passing Todd Kinchen and moving into sixth.

### SPREADING IT OUT

A trademark of the **Jimbo Fisher** offense is spreading the ball around and the Tigers have done a good job of that thru nine games this year as 12 different players have caught at least one pass. **Michael Clayton** leads all LSU receivers with 35 receptions for 482 yards and four touchdowns. Of the 12 different receivers for the Tigers this year, six are wide outs, four are running backs, and two are tight ends. Last year, 15 different players caught passes for the Tigers. In 2000, 13 players caught at least one pass.

### MAUCK UNDERGOES SURGERY; OUT EIGHT WEEKS

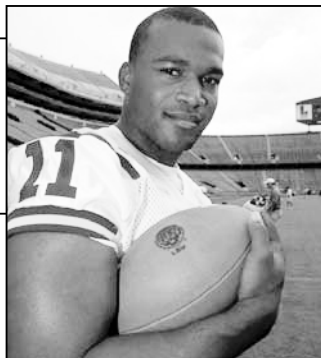
LSU sophomore quarterback **Matt Mauck** underwent surgery on Oct. 20 to repair a sprained ligament in the mid-foot area of his right foot. Mauck, who suffered the injury in a 36-7 win over Florida on Oct. 12, is expected to be out of action for eight weeks. The surgery was performed by LSU team doctors Brent Bankston and Larry Ferachi. Bankston said the surgery went extremely well and said the procedure involved placing two screws in Mauck's foot to stabilize the joint. Mauck started the first six games of the year for the Tigers, leading LSU to a 5-1 mark. He completed 63 of 130 passes for 782 yards, nine touchdowns and only two interceptions. He rushed for 175 yards and two TD's. Mauck had a streak of 88 consecutive passes without an interception.

### TOEFIELD OUT FOR AT LEAST SIX WEEKS WITH FRACTURED LEFT ARM

LSU's all-conference running back **LaBrandon Toefield** will be out at two more weeks after fracturing the radius in his left forearm in the Oct. 5 win over UL-Lafayette. LSU team doctor Brent Bankston performed the 45-minute surgery. "The fracture was relatively a clean break and it went back together very easily," Bankston said. Bankston said the surgery required the placing of a plate along with seven screws into Toefield's arm to stabilize the bone. Toefield will be in a cast for at least four weeks and will begin therapy after that. Toefield, from Independence, La., had played in five games this year and he ranked second on the squad with 323 yards rushing. He earned First-Team All-SEC honors last year after rushing for 992 yards and an SEC-record tying 19 TD's.

## MEMORIES VS. ALABAMA

### **NOV. 9, 1996**

With a berth to the SEC Championship Game on the line, No. 10 Alabama ran for 351 yards, including a school-record 291 by Shaun Alexander, to beat No. 11 LSU, 26-0, and end an eight-game LSU win streak in Death Valley. The game marks the last time the Tigers were shutout.

### **NOV. 6, 1993**

LSU amassed only 227 yards of total offense, including just 61 yards passing, but manages to upset No. 5 Alabama, 17-13. The Tigers picked off four passes to end the Crimson Tide's 31-game unbeaten streak.

### **NOV. 5, 1988**

**David Brown** kicked a 34-yard field goal with three seconds left to give No. 13 LSU a 19-18 victory over No. 18 Alabama in Tuscaloosa. The Tigers trailed 15-0 at the half before rallying for their first win in Bryant-Denny Stadium.

### **NOV. 9, 1985**

LSU kicker **Ronnie Lewis** misses a last-second field goal as the 15th-ranked Tigers and No. 20 Alabama played to a 14-14 deadlock in Tiger Stadium. The tie was the only time Alabama failed to win in Death Valley in 15 tries from 1971 until 1998.

- LSU began playing football in Tiger Stadium in 1924 and is currently in its 79th year in the venerable stadium on **SATURDAY NIGHT**.
- LSU has won **EIGHT STRAIGHT** games at home dating back to its homecoming victory over Middle Tennessee State last year. That is the longest home streak for the Tigers since winning eight straight from 1995-96.
- Under **Nick Saban**, the Tigers have posted a **16-3 HOME RECORD**, including a 4-1 mark against ranked opponents. Against conference foes, Saban is 8-2 in Death Valley. In home games at night, LSU is 13-2 since Saban took over.
- More than **85,000 FANS** have attended each of LSU’s last 17 home games. In that span, the Tigers have eclipsed the 90,000 mark 11 times, including a school-record 92,141 for last year’s Auburn contest, which LSU won 27-14.
- A **SCHOOL-RECORD** 63,017 season tickets were sold this year, not counting the more than 15,000 seats reserved for students. Last year, 62,600 season tickets were sold.
- Since national attendance figures began being kept in 1957, LSU has ranked in the top 20 all 45 seasons. The Tigers have been in the top 15 for 43 of the 45 years and in the top 10 on 37 occasions, including 32 straight from 1957-88. Fourteen times, LSU has ranked in the **TOP FIVE IN THE NATION**, including the last two.
- Since 1960, LSU owns a stellar **181-60-4** (.747) record in traditional Tiger Stadium night games. On the other hand, the Tigers are just 14-20-3 (.419) at home during the day in that span.

## EARTHQUAKE GAME

October 6, 1988. Tommy Hodson connected with Eddie Fuller on 4-and-10 with 1:41 to play for the game-winning touchdown as LSU upset No. 4 Auburn. The play caused such a thunderous explosion from the crowd of 79,341 that the tremor caused by the vibrations measured on the seismograph across campus.

## HALLOWEEN NIGHT

October 31, 1959. No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss, 3-0, late in the fourth quarter when Billy Cannon fielded a punt off the bounce at the 11-yard line. He raced 89 yards, careening off seven Rebel defenders, to paydirt to give the Tigers victory and all but clinch the 1959 Heisman Trophy.

From the opening kickoff to the final horn, LSU dominated Miami (Ohio) in every phase of the game, posting a 33-7 victory over the RedHawks. ### LSU TURNS IT OVER IN 31-7 LOSS TO AUBURN

A combination of turnovers and poor field position did LSU in as the Tigers dropped a 31-7 decision to Auburn at Jordan-Hare Stadium. LSU fumbled on its first play from scrimmage to set the tone for the game that saw the Tigers commit five turnovers. Despite four first half turnovers, the Tiger defense kept LSU in the game as Auburn managed to hold only a 17-0 advantage at halftime. Auburn put the game out of reach early in the third quarter when Jason Campbell found Robert Johnson in the end-zone for a 3-yard TD pass to make the score 24-0. Randall connected on 9 of 20 passes for 79 yards and 4 interceptions for the Tigers. **Bradie James** led the defense with 14 tackles.

**HAIL MARY LIFTS LSU PAST KENTUCKY, 33-30**

Marcus Randall connected with Devery Henderson on a 75-yard "Hail Mary" TD pass with no time left on Saturday to lift the Tigers to a very unlikely 33-30 win over Kentucky in Lexington. Billed as "THE BLUEGRASS MIRACLE", LSU won on the final play of a football game for the first time since a 17-16 victory over Ole Miss in 1972. Trailing 30-27 after a 29-yard field goal by Kentucky, were backed up to their own 8-yard line with nine seconds left. After a 17-yard gain that put the ball on the 25-yard line with two seconds left, Randall heaved the ball as far as he could. A pair of UK defenders deflected the ball directly to Henderson who then raced into the endzone for the game-winning TD. Henderson finished the contest with five receptions for 201 yards and three TDs, the second of which put the Tigers up 14-7 just before halftime.
