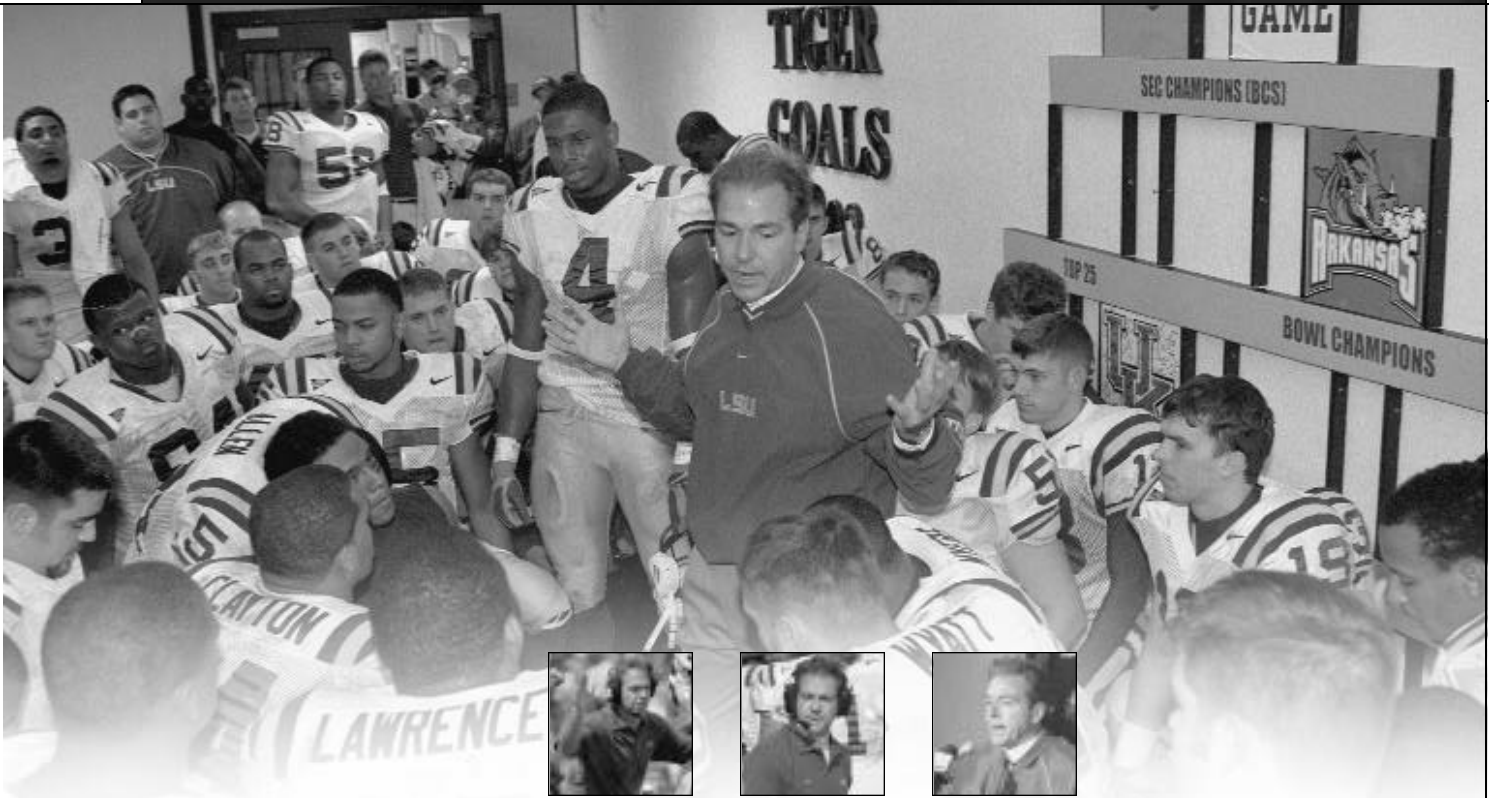

# Nick Saban

LSU head coach Nick Saban is the complete package.

Brought to Baton Rouge following the 1999 season to revive what many considered a sleeping giant, Saban has transformed the LSU football program into one that wins championships, while graduating players at the same time.

Equipped with a plan that gives his players the best chance to be successful on the field as well as in the classroom, Saban's impact on the program has been immediate and it's been powerful.

In just three years as LSU's head coach, Saban's on-field success has been nothing short of remarkable, as he's guided the Tigers to 26 victories, a pair of bowl wins, including one in the Bowl Championship Series, and the 2001 Southeastern Conference title. The Tigers have also played in back-to-back New Year's Day bowls for the first time since the 1960's.

On top of LSU's success on the gridiron, the Tigers are being recognized for their efforts in the classroom. Currently, all 22 of the Tiger seniors from the 2002 team are on pace to graduate within the next 12 months, while Rodney Reed earned First Team Academic All-America honors and Bradie James was awarded an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship from the National Football Foundation last year.

Off the field, Saban and his players are active in the community, promoting goodwill by participating in such things as community service projects and visiting hospitals and schools in the Baton Rouge area on a regular basis. Saban has also worn the hat of fundraiser during his stay in Baton Rouge as he spearheaded an effort that raised more than \$15 million for a state-of-the-art academic center for student-athletes. The new Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes is part of Saban's plan to give his players the best opportunity to be successful when they finish their football careers. The center, which spans 54,000 square feet, is the best of its kind and features 100 computers, a 1,000-seat auditorium, a library and a communications center for training student-athletes.

Saban became the 31st head coach of the LSU Tigers on November 30, 1999, after five years as head coach at Michigan State.

He didn't waste anytime making his impact felt as he guided a team coming off back-to-back losing seasons to an 8-4 mark and a win over

15th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl in 2000 to rekindle the fire of a proud football tradition in Baton Rouge.

Saban's influence on the Tigers went much further in 2001 as he led LSU to the school's first outright SEC title since 1986 with a 31-20 win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC Championship game.

A year after losing two of the most prolific offensive players in school history in quarterback Rohan Davey and wide receiver Josh Reed, Saban used a tenacious defense coupled with a steady offense to lead the 2002 Tigers to an 8-5 overall mark and the school's second straight appearance in a New Year's Day bowl. LSU scored a school-record 30 or more points in six straight games in 2002, while the Tiger defense held the opposition to less than 275 yards in each of the first six games of the year.

A trademark of Saban-coached team's has been their ability to overcome adversity and still effectively perform on the field. In 2001, the Tigers had to overcome the loss of Davey and running back LaBrandon Toefield in the SEC Championship game, while last year LSU prevailed despite losing starting quarterback Matt Mauck midway through the season.

Beating Tennessee to win the league title in 2001 is one thing, but the fashion in which Saban and the Tigers did so speaks volumes on the impact he has had on his squads. Playing without two of their offensive standouts in Davey and Toefield, not only did the Tigers respond to Saban's challenge to step up, but they were dominant, outscoring the high-powered Vols offense 21-3 in the second half. LSU's defense allowed just 50 yards rushing.

A year later, LSU found itself in a very similar situation, losing Mauck, Toefield and free safety Damien James in consecutive weeks. LSU overcame that adversity and found itself heading into the final week of the 2002 season with a chance at reaching the SEC Championship game. Only a last-minute comeback by Arkansas kept the Tigers from winning its second consecutive SEC Western Division title and participating in the league's championship game.

Losing players such as Mauck, Davey and Toefield and still finding a way to be successful on the field has been a trademark of Saban-coached teams. Teaching the players to trust and believe in each other is a characteristic that Saban has branded on his squads. The philosophy of "out of



yourself and into the team" is something that Saban instills on a daily basis into his squad. He also preaches to his teams to play for 60 minutes, to become a dominant team on every play of every game, and not worry about what the scoreboard reads. The players respond.

That couldn't have been more true than last year's "Bluegrass Miracle" as Marcus Randall's 75-yard Hail Mary pass to Devery Henderson as time expired gave the Tigers an unlikely 33-30 win over Kentucky in one of the wildest finishes to a football game in LSU history.

In three years, Saban impact on LSU football can be seen on a daily basis. Whether it's competing to the final horn on the football field, performing in the classroom or making a difference in the community, LSU football has been transformed into the complete program.

Saban's first three years with the Tigers includes winning a conference title to go with back-to-back New Year's Day bowl games. However, those are just a few steps for the Tigers as Saban continues to restore the winning tradition to an LSU program that is on the verge of being a fixture among the nation's elite in college football.

Saban's success at LSU shouldn't come as a surprise considering the success he had rebuilding a Michigan State program that was riddled with scholarship limitations. In no time, Saban had the Spartans ranked in the top 10 and playing in a New Year's Bowl games.

In 2001, the Tigers closed the year by winning six straight games, the longest streak since the 1973 team won nine straight. In addition, the 2001 team became the first LSU squad to win its final six games of a season since 1961, when the Tigers won 10 straight games to finish at 10-1. The Tigers finished the 2001 season ranked No. 7 in the nation in the Associated Press poll and No. 8 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll, the first Top 10 ranking for the program since 1987.

Known for his defensive prowess, Saban's LSU offense shattered several school records in 2001 as the Tigers scored at least 30 points eight times and went over the 40-point mark four times. LSU set six single-season records on offense, including yards per game (451.5) and passing yards per contest (298.5). LSU ranked second in the SEC and 11th nationally in total offense and passing offense.

For his efforts, Saban was named one of seven finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and both the Atlanta Touchdown Club and the Birmingham News recognized him as the SEC Coach of the Year.

His final Spartan team finished with a No. 7 ranking in the nation and became the first Michigan State team to win 10 games in one season since the Spartans' 1965 national championship team.

Saban's 1999 Michigan State team defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State all in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since 1912.

Saban has long been revered in football coaching circles as one of the keen minds of the game, having coached under some of the best football technicians in the country on both the college and professional levels.

He built his reputation as an assistant coach, but as a head coach he has shown the ability to put together a total program, one that produces in big numbers on both sides of the football while stressing discipline and responsibility off the field.

"He's a first-rate person and he's a marvelous football coach," said Bill Polian, the president of the NFL's Indianapolis Colts, who is considered one of the premier minds in professional football. "He brings all the right values to the position and to the job. He believes in an exciting and up-tempo offense and yet his teams are always terrifically sound and very physical."

Saban's background in football is rich and varied. He coached in the NFL under Bill Belichick at Cleveland and under Jerry Glanville at Houston. He is a protégé of George Perles at Michigan State and Earle Bruce at Ohio State. He got his start under venerable Washington coach Don James as a graduate assistant at Kent State.

"No-nonsense" is one description of his style of coaching, but consistent and exacting might be more precise. "Hard work" can be attached to any successful program, but also working smart is a trademark of Saban coached teams. The keys to Saban's success are founded on aggressive and disciplined leadership and a philosophy of personal responsibility both on the football field and in the classroom.

"Basically, if anybody doesn't want to work hard or be committed to the way he's committed, then they're going to have a problem with him,"

said Belichick, coach of the 2001 Super Bowl Champion New England Patriots. "Now, if they like to work, they won't have any problems at all."

Saban is a communicator who gets the best out of his players, a coach who can guarantee that a player willing to dedicate himself to the program will maximize his talents.

"Instead of looking at the overall picture, he gives his players something they can really lash their teeth into, which allows them to play more aggressively," said Dean Pees, the head coach at Kent State who served as a defensive coordinator under Saban. "There are a lot of guys who can draw up defenses in the dirt and draw X's and O's. The question is what little things can you find to help each player play his position? That's one thing Nick is good at."

Saban has a career win-loss record of 69-38-1 for a winning percentage of .650, a total that includes five years as head coach at Michigan State (1995-99), three seasons at LSU and one year at Toledo (1990). He also has extensive experience in the NFL, having coached the secondary of the Houston Oilers for two seasons (1988-89) and having served as defensive coordinator for the Cleveland Browns for four seasons (1991-94).

During his five-year tenure as head coach at Michigan State, Saban tutored four first-team All-Americans and 10 NFL draft picks.

The 51-year-old Saban returned to Michigan State following four seasons as the Cleveland Browns' defensive coordinator from 1991-94. The Browns went from allowing the most points in the NFL prior to Saban's arrival to allowing the fewest points in 1994. His defensive unit allowed a league-low 21 touchdowns and 204 points in 1994, the sixth-fewest points surrendered in NFL history at the time.

Saban previously served as head coach at the University of Toledo where he guided the Rockets to a 9-2 overall record in 1990, including a share of the Mid-America Conference title at 7-1. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points). In his rookie season as a head coach, Toledo missed posting an undefeated record by only five points.

He began his first stint in the NFL with the Houston Oilers as the secondary coach from 1988-89. The Oilers ranked among the AFC leaders in interceptions in both 1988 (tied for second with 22) and 1989 (fourth with 21).

As secondary coach and defensive coordinator, Saban played an integral part in helping Michigan State to three postseason bowl appearances from 1983-87, including a Big Ten championship in 1987 and a 20-17 triumph over Southern California in the 1988 Rose Bowl. The Spartans led the nation in rushing defense in 1987, allowing only 61.2 yards per game, and ranked second in scoring defense, permitting 12.4 points.

His college coaching credits also include stops at the U.S. Naval Academy (1982), Ohio State (1980-81), West Virginia (1978-79), Syracuse (1977) and Kent State (1975-76). While coaching the secondary at Ohio State, he helped produce four NFL draft choices.

He began his coaching career in 1973 as a graduate assistant at his alma mater Kent State. A defensive back for the Golden Flashes from 1970-72, Saban played in the 1972 Tangerine Bowl against Tampa. He also picked up two letters as a shortstop on the Kent State baseball team.

Born October 31, 1951, in Fairmont, W.Va., Saban earned his bachelor's degree in business from Kent State in 1973 and his master's in sports administration in 1975. Saban, who is an avid golfer, co-authored "Tiger Turnaround" in 2001, a 128-page book documenting his first two years in Baton Rouge.

He and his wife, the former Terry Constable of Fairmont, W.Va., have two children, Nicholas and Kristen.



# Assistant Coaches



## Kirk Doll

**Assistant Head  
Coach/Linebackers**

Kirk Doll, a veteran on the defensive side of the football, enters his second year as LSU's assistant head coach and linebackers coach. Doll joined the LSU staff in the spring of 2002 after serving as the assistant head coach at Notre Dame for eight years.

In his first year with the Tigers, Doll coached Bradie James to First-Team All-America honors as the senior set a school-record with 154 tackles in 2002. In addition, Doll assisted with an LSU defense that ranked among the best in the nation as the Tigers allowed 286 yards per contest, eighth best nationally.

While at Notre Dame, Doll helped lead the Irish to five bowl games, including an appearance in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl in 2000.

Among Doll's coaching responsibilities at Notre Dame were the linebackers, special teams and the kickers. In 2000, Notre Dame punter Joey Hildbold was a finalist for the Ray Guy Award, which is given to the nation's top punter.

In 1995, Doll helped Notre Dame reach the Orange Bowl as the Fighting Irish defense allowed just 270 yards per contest, the lowest figure at the school since the 1980 season.

Prior to his stint at Notre Dame, Doll coached at Texas A&M for six years, helping the Aggies to five bowl games, including three appearances in the Cotton Bowl. Doll helped Texas A&M lead the nation in total defense in 1991 (222.4 yards per game) and rank third nationally in 1993 (247.6). The Aggies ranked third nationally in scoring defense in 1993 by allowing only 10.8 points per contest. In his final three years at Texas A&M, the Aggies posted a 32-5 overall mark, including a 12-1 record in 1992.

Doll has also coached at the collegiate level at Arizona State (1985-87), Tulsa (1980-84), Iowa State (1979) and Wichita State (1975-76). Doll coached outside linebackers at Arizona State, helping the Sun Devils to a 10-1-1 mark and an appearance in the Rose Bowl in 1986. Doll served as the offensive line coach at Tulsa for five years and he coached the tight ends for one spring as a part-time coach at Iowa State.

Doll's coaching career has featured 14 bowl games, including appearances in the Rose Bowl, Orange Bowl, Cotton Bowl and Fiesta Bowl.

Doll, a native of Wichita, Kan., earned Bachelor's degrees from both East Carolina and Wichita State. He played as both a defensive end and tackle at East Carolina for two years.

Doll is married to the former Kathy Reding and the couple has three children - Kate, Kelsey and Kyle.



## Derek Dooley

**Special Teams  
Coordinator/Running  
Backs**

Derek Dooley, who has spearheaded LSU's nationally-ranked recruiting classes for the past three years, including the nation's No.1 rated class in 2003, was promoted to special teams coordinator and running backs coach for the Tigers during the offseason.

Dooley, who has helped lead the Tigers to three straight bowl games, is no stranger to successful Southeastern Conference football programs. The son of legendary Georgia football coach Vince Dooley, Derek enters his fourth season with the Tigers, the first three of which were spent as recruiting coordinator and tight ends coach.

In his first three years with the Tigers, Dooley played a key role in the development of LSU's tight end corps, a group considered to be among the finest in the nation.

As LSU's tight ends coach, Dooley helped develop Robert Royal into one of the nation's premier tight ends. In 2001, Royal caught 18 passes for 224 yards and one touchdown. Royal capped his career ranked third in LSU history among tight ends for receptions (59) and yards (707), and ranked second in receiving touchdowns (7). Royal also set the LSU tight ends' record for touchdowns in a season with five in 2000. Following his senior season, Royal was drafted in the fifth round of the 2002 NFL Draft by the Washington Redskins.

Royal earned First Team All-SEC honors in both 2000 and 2001, while Marcus Spears, now a defensive end for the Tigers, earned a spot on the Freshman All-SEC squad as a tight end.

Prior to his arrival at LSU, Dooley spent three seasons at SMU. While at SMU, he helped develop a young group of receivers, including Albert Johnson, who became the first player in SMU history to have three straight multiple touchdown games. In 1999, Dooley helped develop two true freshmen, Chris Cunningham and Cody Cardwell, who caught 70 passes for 1,039 yards and eight touchdowns.

A native of Athens, Ga., Dooley attended the University of Virginia, where he walked on the football team and earned a scholarship following his second season. While at Virginia, Dooley participated in three bowl games (Sugar, Citrus, All-American) and helped the Cavaliers win the 1989 ACC Championship. In 1990, Dooley was named First Team Academic All-ACC and was invited to participate in the Senior Bowl.

He graduated from Virginia in 1990 with a bachelor's degree in government and foreign affairs, then went on to earn his law degree from Georgia in 1994. Dooley served as a graduate assistant coach at Georgia in 1996 before going to SMU in 1997.

Derek and his wife, Allison, have two sons, John Taylor and Peyton.



## Jimbo Fisher

**Offensive Coordinator/  
Quarterbacks**

One of the nation's top offensive minds, Jimbo Fisher enters his fourth season as LSU's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. In three years with the Tigers, Fisher's offense has set numerous school records while developing the reputation as being one of the SEC's most potent units.

Last year, with a pair of first-time starters at quarterback in Matt Mauck and Marcus Randall, Fisher guided an LSU offense to average 350 yards per contest and nearly 25 points per game. LSU scored 30 or more points seven times in 2002, including a school-record tying mark of six straight contests with at least 30 points.

In three years with the Tigers, Fisher has coached three LSU quarterbacks who have gone on to become NFL Draft picks. Last year, former Tigers Rohan Davey, Josh Booty, and Craig Nall, all of which learned under Fisher, were on active NFL rosters.

Perhaps Fisher's most impressive season with the Tigers came in 2001 as he developed Davey, then a first-time starter as well, into one of the nation's premier signal callers. In 2001, Davey set a total of six school-records during the regular-season and then broke another seven Sugar Bowl or LSU bowl records in the Tigers' 47-34 win over Illinois. For the year, Davey completed 217 of 367 passes for 3,347 yards and 18 touchdowns. He connected on 31 of 53 passes for 444 yards and three scores in the Sugar Bowl. Throw in Josh Reed's 94 receptions for an SEC record 1,740 yards and LSU's offense had two of the nation's most explosive players. Reed was named the winner of the Biletnikoff Award, the honor that goes to the nation's top wide receiver, while Davey was a Second Team All-SEC selection.

In 2001, LSU's offense ranked second in the SEC and 11th in the nation in total offense (451.5 yards per game) and passing offense (298.2). LSU set seven school-records during the regular-season in 2001, including single-season yards of total offense (5,418), single-season passing completed (238), passing yards per game (298.5), total offense per game (451.5) and single-season passing yards (3,578).

Fisher's two finest moments as LSU's offensive coordinator came during the 2001 season in a 35-21 win over Alabama and a 31-20 victory over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC Championship game. Against Alabama, LSU set a school-record with 528 passing yards, the most-ever recorded against the Crimson Tide. Davey tied an SEC record with 540 yards of total offense in the game, while Reed set SEC records for receptions (19) and receiving yards (293).

Against Tennessee and with starting quarterback Davey out of the game with an injury, Fisher altered the Tiger game plan to better suit second team quarterback Mauck. Mauck took advantage of his rushing skills to lead the Tigers to a 31-20 win and the SEC title.

In the Sugar Bowl, the Tigers racked up a Sugar Bowl record 595 yards of total offense, including 444 through the air, in their win over Illinois. LSU also set a Sugar Bowl record with 34 first half points, including 27 in the second quarter.

For his efforts in 2001, Fisher was named a

finalist for the Broyles Assistant Coach of the Year Award.

In his first year with the Tigers, Fisher's influence on quarterbacks Booty and Davey was nothing short of remarkable as Booty was named First Team All-SEC, while Davey earned Most Outstanding Offensive Player honors at the Peach Bowl. The First Team All-SEC honor for Booty marked the first time since 1989 that an LSU player earned all-league honors at quarterback.

In 2000, LSU ranked third in the SEC in passing offense with 245.3 yards per game and the Tigers were second in passing efficiency with a 129.4 rating. As a unit, the Tiger offense ranked fourth in the league in total offense with 376.4 yards a contest.

Prior to joining the Tigers, Fisher engineered one of the nation's most potent offensive attacks at Cincinnati in 1999. The Bearcats finished the 1999 season ranked No. 16 in the nation in total offense with an average of 424.4 yards a contest (172.2 rushing, 252.2 passing).

Before joining the Cincinnati staff in 1999, Fisher served as the quarterbacks coach at Auburn under Terry Bowden from 1993-98 where he tutored record-setting quarterbacks Stan White, Patrick Nix and Dameyune Craig, who is the only 3,000-yard passer in Auburn history. He helped lead Auburn to appearances in the 1996 Outback, 1996 Independence and 1998 Peach Bowls.

Fisher, a native of Clarksburg, W. Va., also served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Samford for two years (1991-92) before joining the Auburn staff. He started his coaching career as a graduate assistant tutoring quarterbacks at Samford from 1988-90.

In college, Fisher played quarterback for Terry Bowden for three seasons, two at Salem College (1985-86) and one at Samford (1987). While at Samford he set the national record for touchdowns in a season with 34 and was named the Division III National Player of the Year that season. He also set 13 school passing and total offense records.

Following college, Fisher played for one season with the Chicago Bruisers of the Arena Football League in 1988.

Fisher, who graduated from Salem College in 1989, is married to the former Candace Coogler. The couple has one child, Trey, who is two.



## Stan Hixon

**Associate Head Coach/Wide Receivers**

Stan Hixon continued to make his mark as an outstanding receivers coach last year as the Tigers, despite the loss of All-America wideout Josh Reed, assembled one of the SEC's top receiving corps in 2002.

In his third season with the Tigers in 2002, Hixon developed first-time wideout Devery Henderson into one of the SEC's top receiving threats, while Michael Clayton continued to emerge as one of the league's top all-around wide receivers. Clayton earned Second Team All-SEC honors in 2002, while Henderson was named the league's player of the week after racking up 201 receiving yards, including the 75-yard last second TD dubbed the "Bluegrass Miracle", in LSU's 33-30 win over Kentucky.

In 2001, Hixon coached All-America and

Biletnikoff recipient Josh Reed to the most dominant season for a receiver in SEC history. Reed re-wrote both the LSU and SEC record books as he caught a school-record 94 passes for an SEC-record 1,740 yards and seven touchdowns during the 2001 regular season. Reed capped his three-year LSU career with then an SEC record 3,001 receiving yards on 167 receptions. In all, Reed, who originally signed with LSU as a running back, set or tied 14 school, SEC or Sugar Bowl records in 2001. Reed was drafted in the second round of the 2002 NFL Draft after deciding to forego his senior season at LSU.

In his first year with the Tigers, Hixon helped develop Reed into a star in the SEC. Reed ranked first in the SEC and sixth nationally with 102.5 yards receiving a contest. For the year, Reed caught 65 passes for 1,127 yards and 10 touchdowns, the second highest total in school history. Reed did all of this despite playing his first full season at wide receiver after shifting from his original position of tailback during the 1999 season. For his efforts, Reed was a consensus First Team All-SEC selection.

Hixon's success coaching wide receivers should not come as a surprise as he developed some of the most prolific receivers in Georgia Tech history from 1995-1999.

Hixon, who joined LSU in December of 1999, coached All-Atlantic Coast Conference receivers Kelly Campbell and Dez White at Georgia Tech in 1999. Campbell in 1999 was No. 2 in the ACC and 12th nationally in receiving yards per game (100.5) and he set school records for receptions (69), receiving yards (1,105) and touchdowns (10).

Campbell earned First-Team All-ACC honors and White was named Second-Team All-ACC as they formed the most prolific receiving tandem in Georgia Tech history.

Prior to the emergence of Campbell and White, Hixon tutored the receiving duo of Harvey Middleton, who re-wrote Tech's receiving records at the time, and Derrick Steagall, who ranks as one of the Yellow Jackets' career leaders.

Hixon went to Georgia Tech in 1995 after serving as running back coach and assistant head coach at Wake Forest for two seasons. While at Wake Forest, Hixon tutored the leading rusher in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Jon Leach, who became the first 1,000-yard rusher for the Deamon Deacons in almost two decades.

He also served as receivers coach at South Carolina from 1989-92, producing All-American wideouts Robert Brooks and Eddie Miller, both of whom later played in the NFL. He coached at Appalachian State from 1983-88, helping the Mountaineers capture consecutive Southern Conference titles in 1986 and 1987, after he served as running backs coach at Morehead State from 1980-82 and tight ends coach at Richmond in 1980.

Hixon, a native of Lakeland, Fla., played at Iowa State. He led the Cyclones in receiving his junior and senior seasons and played in the 1977 Peach Bowl and the 1978 Hall of Fame Bowl. Hixon earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1979. He earned a master's degree at Morehead State in 1984.

Hixon and his wife Rebecca have one son, Drew, and two daughters, Adele and Avis. Drew is a member of the football team at Tennessee State.



## Travis Jones

**Defensive Line**

Travis Jones, a former standout defensive lineman at Georgia, is in his first year as LSU's defensive line coach after being named to his position with

the Tigers in January.

Jones comes to LSU after serving as a member of the Kansas coaching staff in 2001 and 2002. Jones coached the defensive line for the Jayhawks in 2001 and last year, he handled the Kansas defensive ends.

While at Kansas, Jones coached Nate Dwyer, now a member of the Arizona Cardinals, to First Team All-Big 12 honors in 2001.

Prior to his two-year stint at Kansas, Jones spent three years as linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator at Appalachian State. During his three years at Appalachian State, the Mountaineers advanced to the I-AA playoffs each year. He also coached three All-Southern Conference linebackers, including Joe Best, who was a finalist for the Buck Buchanan Award in 2000, which goes to the I-AA Defensive Player of the Year.

Jones began his coaching career at Georgia in 1997, coaching the defensive line for the Bulldogs. Georgia finished the 1997 season with a 10-2 overall mark and beat Wisconsin, 33-6, in the Outback Bowl.

A 1995 graduate of Georgia, Jones also worked as an NCAA Compliance assistant as well as an academic counselor at his alma mater. Jones earned a master's degree from Georgia in 1998.

As a player, Jones was a four-year letter-winner for Georgia leading the Bulldogs to the Independence Bowl in 1991 and the Citrus Bowl in 1993. Jones started at defensive end at Georgia his last two seasons and as a senior, he was selected the defensive team captain.

Jones was selected by the Baltimore Stallions in the 1995 Canadian Football League draft. He played one season in the CFL and then joined the Florida Bobcats of the Arena League for one year in 1996.

A native of Irwinton, Ga., Jones is married to the former Melody Barden and the couple is expecting their first children later this year.



## Will Muschamp

**Defensive Coordinator**

If Will Muschamp's first year as LSU's defensive coordinator is any indication as to which direction the defense is heading, then the Tiger defense is in

good hands.

In his first year as LSU's defensive coordinator, Muschamp managed a Tiger defense that ranked among the best in the nation. LSU led the SEC and ranked second in the nation in pass defense (152.7 yards per game) and the Tigers were third in the league and eighth nationally in total defense (286.8 ypg). In addition, the Tigers held their first five opponents in 2002 to fewer than 250 yards of total offense in each game, which included limiting the high-powered Florida offense to 237 yards and on only seven points.

# Assistant Coaches

For the season, the Tigers allowed only 18.3 points a contest, which ranked 15th in the nation.

Muschamp, now in his third season at LSU, served as the Tigers' linebackers coach in 2001 before being elevated to his current position in the spring of 2002. At 32 years of age, Muschamp is one of the youngest coordinators at the Division I level.

In his first season with the Tigers, Muschamp coached one of the nation's best linebacking corps in Trev Faulk and Bradie James. Faulk and James both were semifinalist for the Butkus Award and both were named First Team All-SEC during their careers. James capped his senior season in 2002 with a school-record 154 tackles.

Muschamp's promotion to defensive coordinator marks the second time he has held such a position at the collegiate level. Prior to joining the Tigers, Muschamp served as the defensive coordinator at Valdosta State for one year in 2000. Muschamp helped lead the Blazers to a 10-2 overall mark, a share of the Gulf South Conference title and an appearance in the NCAA Division II playoffs.

Prior to his year at Valdosta State, Muschamp spent the 1999 season coaching the secondary at Eastern Kentucky. Muschamp served as the secondary coach for West Georgia in 1998. From 1995-1997, Muschamp was a graduate assistant coach at Auburn.

Muschamp was a four-year letterwinner at Georgia from 1991-1994 and he served as co-captain of the defense as a senior. In four years with the Bulldogs, Muschamp played in two bowl games, helping Georgia to a 24-15 win over Arkansas in the 1991 Independence Bowl and a 21-14 victory over Ohio State in the 1993 Citrus Bowl. Muschamp earned a spot on the SEC Academic Honor Roll in 1993.

Following his graduation from Georgia in 1994, Muschamp moved to Auburn where he spent the next two seasons as a graduate assistant coach. Muschamp earned his master's degree from Auburn in 1997. While at Auburn, Muschamp coached with current LSU offensive coordinator Jimbo Fisher and former Tiger defensive line coach Pete Jenkins.

Muschamp is a native of Rome, Ga., and he is married to the former Carol Davis of Thomaston, and the couple has one child, Jackson.



## Stacy Searels

### Offensive Line

Stacy Searels, a former First-Team All-America lineman at Auburn, enters his first year as offensive line coach at LSU after

being named to the position in January.

Searels comes to LSU from Cincinnati, where he served in the same capacity for the last two seasons. During his two-year stay with the Bearcats, Cincinnati played in two bowl games as well as winning the school's first conference title since 1964 by capturing the 2002 Conference USA crown.

In 2002, Searels coached an offensive line that helped Cincinnati lead Conference USA in total offense (397.5 yards per game), while averaging 29.2 points a contest.

Prior to joining Cincinnati, Searels served as an assistant coach at Appalachian State from 1994-2000, helping the I-AA squad to five play-

off appearances and to a pair of Southern Conference titles. He also coached players to five All-America and 15 all-conference honors in seven years as an offensive line and tight ends coach at Appalachian State.

Searels got his start in coaching as a graduate assistant at Auburn in 1992, working with the Tiger squad that posted a perfect 11-0 mark in 1993.

As a player, Searels earned First Team All-America honors from both the Associated Press and Football News as a senior at Auburn in 1987. Searels was a three-year starter for Auburn, blocking for Heisman Trophy winner Bo Jackson in 1985 and All-America Brent Fullwood in 1986. He participated in four bowl games as a member of the Auburn football team.

A First-Team All-Southeastern Conference selection as both a junior and senior, he was honored with the team's Ken Rice Award as the school's best blocking lineman in 1987. He played in both the Japan Bowl and the Senior Bowl following the 1987 season.

In 1990, the Birmingham Post-Herald named Searels to the Auburn team of the 1980's.

Searels was a fourth round draft pick by the San Diego Chargers in 1988, playing two seasons there before moving to the Miami Dolphins for the 1990 season. He ended his professional career in 1991 with the New York/New Jersey Knights of the World League of American Football.

Searels, a Trion, Ga., native, graduated from Auburn in with a degree in marketing and transportation in 1990. He followed that with a Master's degree in higher education administration from Auburn in 1995.

Searels is married to the former Patricia Hale and the couple has two daughters, Taylor (5) and Savannah (2).



## Lance Thompson

### Asst. Head Coach/Recruiting Coordinator/Tight Ends

Lance Thompson enters his second season with the Tigers after being promoted to assistant head coach in charge of recruiting and tight ends for LSU in 2003.

Thompson, who joined the Tigers for the 2002 season after a stint at Georgia Tech, coached the LSU defensive line last season.

In his first year with the Tigers, Thompson coached defensive tackle Chad Lavalais to First Team All-SEC honors as the Tigers' front four racked up 22 sacks in helping the LSU defense rank among the best in the SEC by allowing only 286 yards and 18 points a contest.

At Georgia Tech in 2001, Thompson coached a defensive line that recorded 21 sacks for the Yellow Jackets, including 10 by All-America defensive end Greg Gathers.

Thompson spent the 1999 and 2000 seasons coaching the defensive line at Alabama, where he helped the Crimson Tide to the Southeastern Conference title in 1999. Alabama capped the 1999 season ranked No. 2 in the nation in rushing defense (75.3 yards per game) and ranked No. 9 nationally in total defense (297.3 ypg).

Prior to his two-year stint at Alabama,

Thompson was a part of the Georgia Tech staff for 11 years. During his 11-year stay with Georgia Tech, Thompson was defensive line coach in 1998, defensive ends coach in 1996 and 1997 and tight ends coach in 1995. Thompson served as the Georgia Tech's recruiting coordinator from 1995-98 and then again in 2001.

Prior to serving as an on-field coach for the Yellow Jackets, Thompson held the position of Director of Football Operations at Georgia Tech from 1992-94.

Thompson got his start in coaching in 1989, serving as a graduate assistant for two years at Georgia Tech followed by two more years as a volunteer assistant in 1990 and 1991. Georgia Tech won the national championship in 1990. Thompson coached Marco Coleman to First Team All-America honors and he eventually became and first round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins in 1992.

As a player, Thompson was a four-year letterwinner at The Citadel. He graduated with from The Citadel in 1987 with a bachelor's degree in education/math.

A native of Riverdale, Ga., Thompson is married to the former Stacy Cambron of Henderson, Ky., and the couple has three daughters - Alexandra, Christina and Lane.



## Tim Walton

### Defensive Backs

Tim Walton, a member of the coaching staff at Syracuse in 2002, enters his first year with the Tigers after being named LSU's defensive backs coach in February.

Walton, a native of Grenada, Miss., spent the 2002 coaching the defensive backs for the Orangemen.

Walton coached the defensive backs at Memphis in 2000 and 2001. In his first year with Memphis, the Tigers ranked fifth in the nation in total defense, allowing only 275 yards per contest. He also coached two First-Team All-Conference USA selections in Idrees Bashir and Michael Stone at Memphis. Bashir was taken as the 37th overall pick of the 2001 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts, while Stone was taken later in the second round (54th overall pick) by the Arizona Cardinals.

Walton started his coaching career as a defensive graduate assistant at Bowling Green in 1995. He was promoted to running backs coach in 1996 and then moved to coach the defensive backs in 1999.

In addition to his collegiate coaching experience, Walton has had two summer internships with NFL teams. He spent the summer of 1998 serving as a defensive intern with the Chicago Bears and then spent the summer of 2001 as a defensive intern for the Green Bay Packers.

As a player, Walton was a two-year starter and four-year letterwinner at Ohio State, serving as co-captain for the Big Ten co-Champions Buckeyes in 1993.

Walton, a 1994 graduate from Ohio State, and his wife Tracy, have three children, Trei, Timia, and Tyler.

Bertman's unyielding desire to succeed drove him to the pinnacle of his profession, and his astute knowledge of the game -- obtained from over 40 years of coaching -- combined with his steadfast determination and irrepressible enthusiasm transformed LSU Baseball into the nation's premier program.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman augmented his impressive list of achievements in his first season as LSU's director of athletics. While supervising the Tigers' magnificent progress on the playing fields, he began to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

LSU's programs enjoyed remarkable success under Bertman's direction in 2001-02, as 18 of the Tigers' 20 sports participated in post-season competition. That accomplishment, along with improved graduation rates, increased team grade point averages and the construction of new academic facilities, foreshadow even more significant deeds in the second season of Bertman's tenure.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$35 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He is scheduled to be inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a Baseball America poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have two grandchildren -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.
