LSU STARTS DEFENSE OF SEC TITLE AGAINST MISSISSIPPI STATE

LSU begins its SEC title defense on Saturday when it hosts Mississippi State at 11:30 a.m. in Tiger Stadium in a game televised by Jefferson Pilot. LSU enters the contest riding a two-game winning streak and a five game home win streak. In addition, the Tigers have a four-game SEC winning streak into the contest. LSU (2-1) is ranked No. 20 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll and No. 22 by the Associated Press. Mississippi State enters Saturday's game with a 1-2 mark and is coming off a 42-14 loss to Auburn last Thursday. Saturday's contest will mark the first time Jefferson Pilot has televised a game from Tiger Stadium since 1997. It will mark also be the SEC opener for the Tigers and LSU is 5-0 against the Bulldogs in conference openers since the 1992 season.

TIGERS DOMINATE MIAMI (OHIO) IN 33-7 VICTORY

From the opening kickoff to the final horn, LSU dominated Miami (Ohio) in every phase of the game, posting a 33-7 victory over the RedHawks. Led by the running of **LaBrandon Toefield** and passing of **Matt Mauck**, LSU's balanced offensive attack compiled 422 yards (207 rushing, 215 passing). **John Corbello** tied a school-record with four field goals, including two in the first seven minutes that gave the Tigers a 6-0 lead. Mauck connected with **Michael Clayton** on an 8-yard scoring pass late in the first quarter to push the lead to 13-0. Miami pulled to within 16-7 with 50 seconds left in the half, but the Tigers responded with a 5-play, 71-yard drive, capped off by a Mauck-to-Clayton TD pass that covered 24 yards, giving LSU a 23-7 halftime lead. LSU added a field goal and a TD in the third quarter for the final margin of 33-7. Toefield led LSU with 111 yards rushing, while Mauck passed for career-highs of 215 yards and 3 TDs.

NICK SABAN

HEAD COACH • THIRD YEAR

You can call LSU head coach Nick Saban the complete package. Brought to Baton Rouge following the 1999 season to revive what many considered a sleeping giant, Saban has transformed the LSU football program into one that wins championships, while graduating players at the same time.

Armed with a plan that gives his players a chance to be successful on the field as well as the classroom, Saban's impact on the program has been immediate and it's been powerful.

In just two short years at LSU's head coach, Saban's on-field success has been unmatched as he has guided the Tigers to 18 victories, a pair of bowl wins, including one in a BCS game, and the 2001 Southeastern Conference title.

Off the field, Saban has spearheaded a fundraising effort that has raised more than \$15 million for a state-of-the-art academic center for student-athletes. The new LSU Academic Center for Student-Athletes is all part of Saban's plan to give his players the best opportunity to best successful when they finish their football career.

Saban didn't waste anytime making his impact felt as the he guided a team coming off back-to-back losing seasons to an 8-4 mark and a win over 15th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl to rekindle the fire of a proud football tradition in Baton Rouge.

Saban's influence on the Tigers went much further in 2001 as he led LSU to the school's first outright Southeastern Conference title since 1986 with a 31-20 win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC title game and followed that win a 47-34 victory over Illinois in the Sugar Bowl, LSU's first New Year's Day Bowl win since 1968.

Beating Tennessee to win the league title is one thing, but the fashion in which Saban and the Tigers did so speaks volumes on the impact he has had on his squad. Playing without two of their offensive standouts, quarterback Rohan Davey and running back LaBrandon Toefield, not only did the Tigers respond to Saban's challenge to step up, they were dominant, outscoring the high-powered Vols offense 21-3 in the second half. LSU's defense allowed just 50 yards rushing.

Losing Davey and Toefield and still overcoming the adversity to win the title game, or any game for that matter, has been a trademark of Saban-coached teams. Teaching the players to trust and believe in each other has been a characteristic that Saban has branded on his squad. Saban preached to his team to play for 60 minutes, to become a dominant team on every play of every game, and to not worry about what the scoreboard read. The players responded.

After the Tigers dropped a 35-24 decision to Ole Miss in Baton Rouge in late October, LSU was practically counted out of the SEC Western Division race. Saban, however, pressed on saying the Tigers would continue to focus on getting better, playing one game at a time, and not worrying about anybody but the next opponent. It worked as the Tigers began to peak during their November run, a stretch that saw LSU win at Alabama, then beat nationally-ranked foes Arkansas and Auburn at home to advance to the SEC title game.

The win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC Championship game and then No. 7 Illinois in the Sugar Bowl were just two more steps along the way for the Tigers as Saban continues to restore the winning tradition to an LSU program that will soon be a fixture among the nation's elite in college football.

Prior to LSU, Saban spent five years as the head coach at Michigan State, where he built the Spartans into a perennial BigTen contender after going to four bowl games in five seasons.

IN THE POLLS

LSU moved up to No. 20 in the coaches poll and to No. 22 in the AP poll following the off week. Mississippi State in not ranked in either poll. LSU has been ranked in nine consecutive top 25 polls dating back to last season. Under Nick Saban, LSU is 7-4 as a ranked team and the Tigers are 7-5 against Top 25 teams.

THIS DAY VS. NIGHT THING IN TIGER STADIUM

The tradition of playing night games in Tiger Stadium goes all the way back to 1931 when the Tigers downed Spring Hill, 35-0, under the lights on Oct. 3 in the first night game in Tiger Stadium history. The reason for playing at night was three-fold - to avoid the heat and humidity of afternoon games, to avoid scheduling conflicts with Tulane and Loyola in New Orleans and to go give the fans who were busy tending to plantations in the afternoon the opportunity to see the Tigers play. An immediate increase in attendance was noted, and night football soon became ingrained in LSU football lore. Since 1960, LSU is 179-60-4 (.744) under the lights of Tiger Stadium and only 13-20-3 (.402) during the day at home. Since 1990, LSU is 37-22 at home at night and 5-11 in Tiger Stadium during the day. LSU has three of its last four day games in Tiger Stadium and the Tigers are 2-1 during the day at home under Nick Saban.

LSU-MISSISSIPPI STATE TIES

LSU currently has one player that hales from Mississippi. Starting left guard **Stephen Peterman** is from Waveland and attended St. Stanislaus High School. Former LSU head coach Curley Hallman (1991-94) serves as Mississippi State's secondary coach, while former Tiger assistant John Hendrick (1989-90) is State's defensive line coach.

JACKIE'S TIES WITH LSU

Jackie Sherrill has coached against, coached with and coached three current members of the LSU coaching staff prior to his arrival at Mississippi State. While serving as the head coach at Washington State in 1978, Sherrill coached current LSU offensive line coach **George Yarno**. In 1988, Sherrill was the head coach at Texas A&M and current LSU asst. head coach/linebackers coach **Kirk Doll** was an assistant on his staff with the Aggies. Sherrill also coached against LSU coach **Nick Saban** three times prior to the 2000 season. Saban was an assistant coach at Syracuse that lost to Pitt in 1977 and Saban was an assistant at West Virginia that fell to the Panthers in 1978 and 1979.

MORE ON THE LSU-MISSISSIPPI STATE SERIES

LSU and Mississippi State have met every year since 1944 ... The teams first met in Baton Rouge in 1896 with the Tigers posting a 52-0 victory ... LSU's 59 wins over the Bulldogs are the most by the Tigers over any SEC team ... As a matter of fact, the only team in which LSU has more wins against is Tulane with 65 ... Current Mississippi State defensive backs coach and former LSU head coach Curley Hallman posted a 3-1 mark vs. the Bulldogs as the Tigers coach from 1991-94.

STREAKING VS. STATE

The Tigers have a few streaks they will be trying to keep alive against Mississippi State. LSU has won two straight games against Mississippi State and five straight at home over the Bulldogs. The last time MSU defeated LSU was on Oct. 23, 1999, 17-16 in Starkville. The last time the Bulldogs won in Baton Rouge was on Nov. 16, 1991 by the score of 28-19. Overall, LSU has won nine of the last 10 meetings between the two schools.

JEFFERSON PILOT TELEVISION

This will be the 15th time LSU will appear on Jefferson Pilot. The Tigers are 3-10-1 in the previous 14 games on JP, including an 0-1 mark under **Nick Saban**. This will be the first time since 1997 JP will broadcast a game from Tiger Stadium. The last JP game from Death Valley resulted in a 36-21 Mississippi victory over the Tigers on Oct. 18, 1997. LSU is 1-2 at home on JP with its win being a 28-20 victory over Mississippi State in 1996 and the other loss coming at the hands of Florida by a 28-10 count in 1995. The Mississippi State contest will be LSU's first appearance on JP since a 41-9 loss to Florida in Gainesville in 2000. Overall, this will be LSU's 165th game on TV. The Tigers are 72-85-7 on television.

TAKING NOTE

LSU is 7-4 in September under **Nick Saban** ... The Tigers are 13-3 at home under Saban, which includes a 7-1 non-conference mark and a 11-2 record at night ... The Tigers are 5-

1 under Saban in games decided by 7 points or less and an impressive 17-1 under Saban when leading at halftime ... The Tigers are 16-1 under Saban when leading after the third quarter.

HOME SWEET HOME

LSU enters Saturday's game with Mississippi State riding a five-game winning streak at Tiger Stadium. The Tigers have not lost a home since Oct. 27, 2001, 35-24, to Mississippi. The streak includes wins over Middle Tennessee, Alabama, Auburn, The Citadel and Miami (Ohio). The five-game home winning streak is the longest for the Tigers since LSU won six straight games spanning over the 2000 and 2001 seasons. Florida snapped LSU's six-game home winning streak last year with a 44-15 win over the Tigers.

AFTER AN OPEN DATE

LSU is 2-2 after an open date under head coach **Nick Saban**. The Tigers defeated Alabama after an open date in 2000, Saban's first season, and defeated Arkansas after an open date last season. The two losses came to Arkansas in 2000 and Tennessee last season.

SABAN SECOND-FASTEST TO 20

LSU coach **Nick Saban** became the second-fastest coach in school history to reach 20 victories at LSU with last week's victory over Miami (Ohio). Saban won his 20th in just his 28th game. **Charles McClendon** was the quickest to win 20 games as he did it in 26 contests. Saban is now tied with former Tiger coach **Bill Arnsparger** for the second quickest to 20 wins as Arnsparger won his 20th in game 28 against Georgia on Oct. 11, 1986.

NO OPENING DRIVE TDS ALLOWED HERE

LSU ran its streak of keeping the opposition out of the endzone on its first possession of the game to five straight against Miami (Ohio). The streak includes all three games this year as well as the Tigers' final two games of the 2001 season. The last time an opponent scored on its opening possession against LSU came against Auburn on Dec. 1 of last year.

100-YARD GAMES HAVE BEEN HARD TO COME BY AGAINST THE LSU "D"

LSU's defense ran its streak of not allowing a 100-yard rushing game to eight straight by limiting Miami's top rusher to just 18 yards two weeks ago. The Tiger defense has not allowed an opponent to rush for 100 yards since the Middle Tennessee contest last Nov. 10. In that game, Dwone Hicks rushed for 117 yards in the 30-14 loss to the Tigers. LSU has not yielded a 100-yard rushing game to an SEC foe since the season-finale in 2000 when Brandon Holmes rushed for 143 yards and 1 TD in Arkansas' 14-3 win over the Tigers. LSU has kept its last nine SEC opponents without a 100-yard rusher.

LSU "D" CONTINUES TO BE STINGY

For the third straight game, the LSU defense held the opposition to under 300 yards of total offense as the Tigers limited Miami (Ohio) to a season-low 224 yards. LSU opened the year by holding Virginia Tech to 231 yards of offense and held The Citadel to 236 total yards. You have to go back to 1976 to find a span in which LSU has held its opponents to fewer than 250 yards in three straight games. In 1976, LSU held Vanderbilt to 213 yards on Oct. 9 in a 33-20 win, then followed that by allowing 210 yards on Oct. 16 in a 21-7 loss to Kentucky and then limited Ole Miss to only 132 yards in a 45-0 victory on Oct. 30. For the season, LSU is allowing an average of 230.3 yards per game, which ranks ninth in the nation and second in the SEC.

HELD'EM TIGERS

The 224 total yards gained by Miami (Ohio) was the fewest allowed by LSU since giving up 178 total yards to UAB on Sept. 23, 2000.

LSU'S MAGIC NUMBER: 20

One thing is almost certain and that's when the Tigers score at least 20 points in a game they have become tough to beat under Nick Saban. LSU enters Saturday's contest with a 20-1 mark under Saban when they score at least 20 points in a game. LSU was 8-0 in 2000, 10-1 in 2001 and they are 2-0 this season when reaching 20 points. The only loss during that span was a 35-24 defeat to Ole Miss last season. Dating back to last season, LSU has scored at least 20 points in 11 of its last 12 games.

LSU'S PASS DEFENSE TO BE TESTED, AGAIN

LSU's pass defense, ranked second in the SEC and No. 9 in the nation, will be tested again against Mississippi State. The Bulldogs possess the SEC's No. 1 passing offense (282 yards per game) and are 12th in the nation. LSU has held its opponents to 121.3 yards per contest. The Tigers defense passed the test last week against the Miami (Ohio) air attack. Miami entered the game averaging 273 yards per game and were held to 195 yards by the Tigers' pass defense. LSU has allowed just one passing TD this season.

GET "TOE" TO 100 AND THE TIGERS ARE TOUGH TO BEAT

One thing is for certain when it comes to LSU football and that's when **LaBrandon Toefield** rushes for 100 yards, the Tigers are tough to beat. During his career, Toefield has rushed for 100 or more yards in seven games and the Tigers are a perfect 7-0 in those games. Last week, Toefield rushed for 111 yards in LSU's 33-7 win over Miami (Ohio). Five of Toefield's seven 100-yard rushing games have come in SEC action, including a 119-yard, 2-TD performance in LSU's 45-38 overtime win over State in 2000. Last year, Toefield rushed for 55 yards and one score in the 42-0 win over the Bulldogs in Starkville. Overall, LSU is ... all-time when having a 100-yard rusher, which includes an 9-0 mark under Nick Saban.

TOE CONTINUES TO CLIMB 100-YARD RECORD BOOK

With 111 yards against Miami (Ohio), **LaBrandon Toefield** moved into a fifth place tie with **Steve Van Buren** for most 100-yard games in a career with seven. Ranking ahead of Toefield in 100-yard games are **Harvey Williams** (8), **Charles Alexander** (16), **Dalton Hilliard** (20) and **Kevin Faulk** (22).

FIRST QUARTER SUCCESS

LSU's defense has allowed only one first quarter score this season and that came with 30 second left in the opening quarter at Virginia Tech on Sept. 1. For the past two games (The Citadel and Miami (Ohio)) the Tigers have not allowed a score in the first quarter. In fact, LSU has allowed only those seven first quarter points to Virginia Tech over the past five first quarters, including the 2001 SEC Championship game and the 2002 Sugar Bowl. In those five opening quarters, the Tigers have outscored the opponents 41-7.

OPENING DRIVES

LSU has scored points on the opening drive of each of its last two games. The Tigers marched the ball 51 yards on five plays resulting in a **Domanick Davis** 22-yard touchdown run to open The Citadel game. Against Miami (Ohio), the Tigers used an eight-play, 40-yard drive capped by a **John Corbello** 42-yard field goal to get things started.

CORBELLO NAMED SEC SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE WEEK

LSU senior **John Corbello** tied a school-record, which has been set six other times, by successfully connecting on all four of his field goal attempts against Miami (Ohio). Corbello has now made seven straight field goals dating back to the SEC Championship game last season and he currently sits atop the SEC in field goal percentage at 100.0. Against Miami, Corbello kicked field goals of 42, 29, 35, and 41 yards. For his efforts, Corbello earned SEC Special Teams Player of the Week honor, the first of his career and the first time this season that a Tiger has been recognized as the league's player of the week.

GROUND GAME STREAK HALTED

LSU had recorded at least one rushing touchdown in 12 straight games entering last week's game with Miami (Ohio). The streak came to an end against the RedHawks as all three Tiger touchdowns came via the pass. Before last week, the last time the Tigers did not score a touchdown on the ground was Sept. 29, 2001 at Tennessee. LSU recorded multiple touchdowns on the ground in nine of those 12 games. Florida and Kentucky last year and Virginia Tech this year mark the only times during the streak the Tigers ran for just one TD.

GAINING ON THE GROUND

LSU's 293 rushing yards against The Citadel were the most in a game for the Tigers under head coach **Nick Saban**. The previous mark under Saban was 262 against Utah State last season. The last time LSU had at least 290 rushing yards was in 1999 against North Texas when the Tigers amassed 350 yards on the ground. In 28 games under Saban, the Tigers have rushed for 200 yards or more four times (Tulane and Utah State in 2001, The Citadel and Miami (Ohio) in 2002) and they are 4-0 in those games.

THREE TIMES IS A CHARM

Three different Tigers scored a rushing touchdown (**LaBrandon Toefield**, **Domanick Davis** and **Matt Mauck**) against The Citadel, marking the first time since Davis, Toefield and **Devery Henderson** each scored on the ground against Mississippi State on Oct. 20, 2001.

THREE TIMES IS A CHARM, THROUGH THE AIR TOO

LSU scored all three of its touchdowns through the air in the 33-7 victory over Miami (Ohio) last week marking the first time since the 2002 Sugar Bowl the Tigers have scored three passing touchdowns. The last time LSU accomplished the feat in the regular season was against Arkansas on Nov. 23, 2001 when **Rohan Davey** connected with **Josh Reed** twice and **Michael Clayton** once.

SPREADING IT OUT

A trademark of the **Jimbo Fisher** offense is spreading the ball around and the Tigers have done a good job of that thru three games this year as 11 different players have caught at least one pass. **Michael Clayton** leads all LSU receivers with 17 receptions for 195 yards and two touchdowns. Of the 11 different receivers for the Tigers this year, six are wide outs, three are running backs, and two are tight ends. Last year, 15 different players caught passes for the Tigers and in 2000, 13 players caught at least one pass.

YOUTH IN THE TRENCHES

LSU may have one of the youngest pairs of offensive and defensive lines in the nation this season. On the offensive side of the ball, the Tigers start a freshman, a sophomore, pair of juniors and a single senior in the trenches. The defensive line starters consists of two true sophomores, a junior and a lone senior. When looking at the Tigers depth chart, LSU gets even younger. Four of the five offensive line backups are freshmen while only center John Young is older, a senior. Defensively, two juniors and two freshmen represent the second unit.

FOUR TRUE FRESHMEN HAVE SEEN ACTION

Through three games, four true freshmen - LB **Cameron Vaughn**, DL **Kyle Williams**, RB **Jason Spadoni**, and OL **Terrance McGill** - have seen action for the Tigers. Vaughn and Williams have played in all three games this year, while Spadoni and McGill saw their first action against The Citadel and also played against Miami (Ohio).

OTHER FIRSTS

Redshirt freshman running back **Ryan Gilbert** saw his first action last week against Miami (Ohio). The Dallas, Texas, native carried the ball twice for six yards. Gilbert makes the total number of Tigers to see their first game action this season to 14 players.

MORE FIRSTS

Sophomore quarterback **Matt Mauck** and sophomore tight end **Demetri Robinson** each collected a first last week against Miami (Ohio). Mauck threw his first career touchdown, a 8-yard strike to **Michael Clayton** in the first quarter. Robinson grabbed his first career touchdown as well. He hauled in a 6-yard pass from Mauck in the third quarter.

TOE-ING THE LINE

Junior running back **LaBrandon Toefield** is three touchdowns away from cracking the top five in career rushing touchdowns by an LSU player. Toefield has 26 career rushing touchdowns, while **Harvey Williams** and **Garry James** are tied for sixth place just one ahead of Toefield. **Rondell Mealey** and **Terry Robiskie** are tied for the fourth spot with 29.

"TOE" AND "DOUBLE D" TIGERS DYNAMIC DUO

LSU's backfield tandem of junior **LaBrandon Toefield** and senior **Domanick Davis** could be the best pair in the Southeastern Conference. Both are preseason All-SEC selections and both have over 1,000 rushing yards in their career. Toefield has gained 1,916 yards and scored 26 touchdowns in his career, while Davis has collected 1,283 rushing yards and 15 touchdowns in his career. Combined the pair have 3,199 yards and 41 touchdowns in 61 games.

TRIPLE THREAT IN THE BACKFIELD

With the emergence of freshman **Joseph Addai**, LSU's running back corps has turned into a triple threat. LSU's backfield of Addai, **LaBrandon Toefield** and **Domanick Davis**

combined for 257 yards and three TDs against The Citadel. Addai led the Tigers with 88 yards, while Toefield added 85 and Davis 84. It's the first time in school history that LSU has had three running backs rush for 80 yards or more in the same game. So far this season, the trio has combined for 513 yards and four TDs.

TOEFIELD AMONG THE TOP 10

With his 111 yards last week against Miami (Ohio), **LaBrandon Toefield** moved into the top 10 on LSU's career rushing yards list. The junior now sits in ninth-place with 1,916 yards. He passed **Eddie Fuller** (1,816 yards) and **Billy Cannon** (1,867) to move into ninth. With 84 more yards, The Independence, La., native will become the ninth player in school history to reach 2,000 rushing yards in a career. He is 250 yards away from passing **Brad Davis** (2,165 yards) into eighth place.

DOMANICK SEEMS DESTINED FOR A TD ON A PUNT RETURN

Domanick Davis has been victimized of two punt returns for touchdowns in LSU's first two games. In the season-opener vs. Virginia Tech, Davis returned a punt 81-yards for an apparent TD. However, the play was nullified for an illegal block by an LSU player on special teams. Davis went a yard better against The Citadel as he returned a punt 82-yards for a TD only to have the play called back due to a penalty. Neither block would have changed the outcome of the play as Davis had already passed the defender on both occasions. He did return one 57 yards (no TD) to spark the Tigers in the victory over Miami (Ohio). Davis enters the Mississippi State game with 70 career punt returns for 809 yards and one TD.

DOMANICK DAVIS KEEPS ALL-PURPOSE STREAK ALIVE

Domanick Davis kept his streak of games with at least 100 all-purpose yards alive as he recorded 202 yards against Miami (Ohio). Davis has now recorded at least 100 all-purpose yards in eight straight games dating back to the Alabama game last year. Against Miami, Davis had 51 yards on 11 rushes and 116 yards on 5 punt returns and 35 yards on 3 receptions. The 202 yards marked his fourth-best total of his career.

DOUBLE "D" IS A TRIPLE THREAT

Domanick Davis continues to be a multiple threat for the Tigers as he continues to be among the best all-purpose players in the nation. Through three games, Davis is averaging 167.7 all-purpose yards per game, tops in the SEC and 12th in the nation. This year, Davis has rushed for 158 yards on 33 carries, he's returned 12 punts for 185 yards (15.4 avg.), he's returned five kickoffs for 117 yards (23.4 avg.) and he has four receptions for 43 yards. Davis has recorded 100 or more all-purpose yards eight straight games dating back to last season.

DOMANICK CREEPS UP SEC AND LSU KO RETURN YARDAGE CHART

With a 32-yard kickoff return against The Citadel, **Domanick Davis** moved into seventh place all-time in SEC history in kickoff returns with 1,725 yards. Davis, who needs just two yards to move past James Brooks of Auburn (1,726 yards), is 56 yards away from becoming LSU's all-time leader in kickoff return yards and he needs 539 yards to break the SEC mark. **Robert Dow** holds the LSU record with 1,780 yards, while Mark Johnson of Vanderbilt holds the league mark with 2,263 yards.

DAVIS CLIMBING IN THE BOOKS

Domanick Davis is fourth in career punt return yards and fourth on the career all-purpose yards list. Davis collected 202 all-purpose yards against Miami (Ohio) to give him 4,126 in his career. He also had 116 punt return yards to give him 812 for his career. The Breaux Bridge, La., native is 388 all-purpose yards shy of passing **Charles Alexander** (4,513) and moving into third-place. Davis is also 21 punt return yards away from passing **Kevin Faulk** (832) to move into third-place, 94 yards from passing **Sammy Grefazzi** (905) for second and 136 yards from becoming the school's all-time leader and passing **Eddie Kennison** (947).

ROBINSON BACK IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD

Senior receiver **Reggie Robinson** is back in action in 2002 after missing all of last season due to a herniated disc in his neck. Robinson started all 12 games for the Tigers in 2000 and grabbed 31 receptions for 391 yards and two touchdowns. He has collected 79 receptions for 1,094 yards and six scores in 33 career games. Robinson caught his first pass since returning for the injury against The Citadel and also made a grab for 23-yards against Miami (Ohio).

MYERS ON THE MOVE

Senior receiver **Jerel Myers** enters the Mississippi State game in fourth-place on the LSU career receptions list. The Houston, Texas, native has 134 receptions and passed Tony Moss with one catch against Virginia Tech. Myers is 19 receptions away from third and 51 away from breaking the record of 183 held by Wendell Davis.

MY-O-MYERS

Senior receiver **Jerel Myers** has caught at least one pass in all but two of the 39 games he has played during his career. The only two games that he has not recorded a catch were at Mississippi during the 2000 season and against The Citadel this season. Myers had his streak of 16 straight games with at least one reception (including the 2000 Peach Bowl and the 2002 Sugar Bowl) snapped against The Citadel.

CLAYTON'S STILL GOING

Sophomore receiver **Michael Clayton** has caught a pass in all 16 games (including the 2002 Sugar Bowl) he has played in his career. During that streak Clayton has pulled down at least five receptions in eight games, including at least five catches in each of the first three games in the 2002 season. He had five catches against both Virginia Tech and The Citadel and a season-best seven in the win over Miami (Ohio).

JAMES ON A ROLL

Senior All-America linebacker **Bradie James** is the mark of consistency. The West Monroe, La., native has recorded at least one tackle in all but one of the 38 games in which he has played. The only game that he did not make a stop was against Houston in 1999. Since that game, he has made at least one tackle in 56 consecutive games (including the 2000 Peach and 2002 Sugar bowl games), including 13 games with 10 or more stops. James collected a career-high 19 tackles in the season-opener against Virginia Tech and had a 18 tackles against The Citadel.

CORBELLO KICKING TO THE TOP

Senior place kicker **John Corbello** is now fifth in career scoring in LSU history. He kicked a career-best four field goals and added three extra points in the victory over Miami (Ohio) to give him a career-best 15 points in the game and 214 points in his career. Corbello is 41 points away from passing Charles Alexander (254) for fourth.

TWO TIGERS SIT ATOP SEC ACTIVE LISTS

Linebacker **Bradie James** and running back/return specialist **Domanick Davis** sit atop the SEC active lists for tackles and all-purpose yardage, respectively. James heads the list of defenders with 308 career tackles, while Davis is first among active SEC players with 4,126 all-purpose yards. Running back **LaBrandon Toefield** ranks second in rushing yards and rushing TDs with 1,916 and 26, respectively. Safety **Damien James** is second with eight career interceptions, one back of Florida's Todd Johnson.

FIVE TIGERS ON AWARD WATCH LISTS

Five Tigers are begin watched this year. Offensively, Junior running back **LaBrandon Toefield** is on the Doak Walker list, sophomore wide receiver **Michael Clayton** is on the Biletnikof list and sophomore center **Ben Wilkerson** is on the Rimington Award list. On the defensive side of the ball, senior linebacker **Bradie James** is on nearly everyone's preseason watch list as people from the Butkus, Nagurski and Lombardi Awards have their eyes on him. Junior defensive tackle **Chad Lavalais** joins James on the Lombardi list and junior punter **Donnie Jones** is on the Ray Guy Award watch list.

TABBED TO DEFEND

LSU was selected to defend their 2001 SEC Western Division title by the media. The Tigers received 43 first-place votes and 140 total points, while Alabama was second with 24 first-place votes and 203 total points. Mississippi placed third, followed by Auburn, Arkansas and Mississippi State. Tennessee, the defending SEC Eastern Division champion, was picked to defend their title as well. The Vols got 41 first-place votes and 136 total points.

PRESEASON ALL-SEC

Six Tigers were selected preseason All-SEC by the media. Junior RB **LaBrandon Toefield**, senior return specialist **Domanick Davis** and senior LB **Bradie James** were each selected to the first-team, while sophomore WR **Michael Clayton**, junior DT **Chad Lavalais** and senior FS **Damien James** were tabbed as second-team All-SEC selections.

TIGERS DOMINATE MSU, 42-0

LSU delivered its most dominant performance of the season as the Tigers rolled to a 42-0 win over Mississippi State in Starkville. **Josh Reed** caught 10 passes for 146 yards and two touchdowns, while **Rohan Davey** threw for 255 yards and three TDs as the Tigers took a 14-0 halftime lead and blew it open with a 21-point third quarter. The shutout was the first for the Tigers in an SEC road game since shutting out Alabama 27-0 at Tuscaloosa in 1997. The margin of victory was the highest for LSU in an SEC game since 1986. The Tiger defense forced four turnovers with all four resulting in touchdowns for LSU. **Damien James** picked off his nation's best fifth pass in the contest.

- LSU began playing football in Tiger Stadium in 1924 and is currently in its 79th year in the venerable stadium on Saturday Night.
- Mississippi State has not won in Death Valley since 1991, a streak of five straight losses. On three of those occasions, the Bulldogs came into Baton Rouge ranked and were upset by an unranked LSU team, including the last two trips.
- LSU has won five straight games at home dating back to its homecoming victory over Middle Tennessee State last year. That is the second home win streak of at least five games for the Tigers since 2000.
- Under Nick Saban, the Tigers have posted a 13-3 home record, including a 4-1 mark against ranked opponents. Against conference foes, Saban is 6-2 in Death Valley. In home games at night, LSU is 11-2 since Saban took over.
- More than 85,000 fans have attended each of LSU’s last 14 home games. In that span, the Tigers have eclipsed the 90,000 mark eight times, including a school-record 92,141 for last year’s Auburn contest, which LSU won 27-14.
- A school-record 63,017 season tickets were sold this year, not counting the more than 15,000 seats reserved for students. Last year, 62,600 season tickets were sold.
- Since national attendance figures began being kept in 1957, LSU has ranked in the top 20 all 45 seasons. The Tigers have been in the top 15 for 43 of the 45 years and in the top 10 on 37 occasions, including 32 straight from 1957-88. Fourteen times, LSU has ranked in the top five in the nation, including the last two.
- Since 1960, LSU owns a stellar 179-60-4 (.745) record in traditional Tiger Stadium night games. On the other hand, the Tigers are just 13-20-3 (.403) at home during the day in that span.

EARTHQUAKE GAME

October 6, 1988. Tommy Hodson connected with Eddie Fuller on 4-and-10 with 1:41 to play for the game-winning touchdown as LSU upset No. 4 Auburn. The play caused such a thunderous explosion from the crowd of 79,341 that the tremor caused by the vibrations measured on the seismograph across campus.

HALLOWEEN NIGHT

No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss, 3-0, late in the fourth quarter when Billy Cannon fielded a punt off the bounce at the 11-yard line. He raced 89 yards, careening off seven Rebel defenders, to paydirt to give the Tigers victory and all but clinch the 1959 Heisman Trophy.

From the opening kickoff to the final horn, LSU dominated Miami (Ohio) in every phase of the game, posting a 33-7 victory over the RedHawks.
