## LSU TRAVELS TO THE SWAMP TO FACE FLORIDA ON ESPN

LSU, ranked No. 15 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll and No. 18 in the Associated Press poll, will go after its fifth straight win on Saturday at 6:45 p.m. (CDT) when it battles 16th-ranked Florida (4-2, 2-1) in Gainesville on ESPN. LSU (4-1, 1-0) is coming off a 48-0 romp of UL-Lafayette last week, while Florida lost at Ole Miss, 17-14. LSU will take the nation's No. 1 rated defense into Saturday's contest as the Tigers are allowing only 202 total yards per game, and just 115.6 yards through the air. The aptly named "JAMES GANG" (after Bradie and Damien James) is allowing just 11 points per game and has given up a lone passing TD this season. **Bradie James** leads the Tigers with 64 tackles and a pair of sacks, while **Damien James** has 23 tackles, two interceptions and four PBUs. Offensively, quarterback **Matt Mauck** has thrown for 629 yards and seven TDs, while **Domanick Davis** is first in the SEC and fourth in the nation in all-purpose yards with 176 yards per game. He averages a nation's best 20.8 yards per punt return.

## LSU DOMINATES CAJUNS, 48-0

**Matt Mauck** threw three first quarter touchdowns and the LSU defense dominated from start to finish as the Tigers rolled to a 48-0 Homecoming win over Louisiana-Lafayette last week in Tiger Stadium. The meeting was over in matter of minutes as Mauck found **Devery Henderson** for a 20-yard TD on the Tigers' first possession and then connected with **Michael Clayton** on TD passes of 36 and 4 yards in the first quarter for a 21-0 LSU lead. The margin was 41-0 at halftime before LSU used backups on offense for most of the second half. The Tigers held ULL to seven first downs and 70 yards of total offense. The Cajuns were 0 of 16 on third down conversions and punted 12 times, eight of which were kicked out of bounds to avoid LSU's **Domanick Davis**. **Joseph Addai** led LSU with 98 rushing yards and two TDs, while Mauck connected on 8 of 19 passes for 138 yards.

# NICK SABAN

HEAD COACH • THIRD YEAR

You can call LSU head coach Nick Saban the complete package. Brought to Baton Rouge following the 1999 season to revive what many considered a sleeping giant, Saban has transformed the LSU football program into one that wins championships, while graduating players at the same time.

Armed with a plan that gives his players a chance to be successful on the field as well as the classroom, Saban's impact on the program has been immediate and it's been powerful.

In just two short years at LSU's head coach, Saban's on-field success has been unmatched as he has guided the Tigers to 18 victories, a pair of bowl wins, including one in a BCS game, and the 2001 Southeastern Conference title.

Off the field, Saban has spearheaded a fundraising effort that has raised more than \$15 million for a state-of-the-art academic center for student-athletes. The new LSU Academic Center for Student-Athletes is all part of Saban's plan to give his players the best opportunity to best successful when they finish their football career.

Saban didn't waste anytime making his impact felt as the he guided a team coming off back-to-back losing seasons to an 8-4 mark and a win over 15th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl to rekindle the fire of a proud football tradition in Baton Rouge.

Saban's influence on the Tigers went much further in 2001 as he led LSU to the school's first outright Southeastern Conference title since 1986 with a 31-20 win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC title game and followed that win a 47-34 victory over Illinois in the Sugar Bowl, LSU's first New Year's Day Bowl win since 1968.

Beating Tennessee to win the league title is one thing, but the fashion in which Saban and the Tigers did so speaks volumes on the impact he has had on his squad. Playing without two of their offensive standouts, quarterback Rohan Davey and running back LaBrandon Toefield, not only did the Tigers respond to Saban's challenge to step up, they were dominant, outscoring the high-powered Vols offense 21-3 in the second half. LSU's defense allowed just 50 yards rushing.

Losing Davey and Toefield and still overcoming the adversity to win the title game, or any game for that matter, has been a trademark of Saban-coached teams. Teaching the players to trust and believe in each other has been a characteristic that Saban has branded on his squad. Saban preached to his team to play for 60 minutes, to become a dominant team on every play of every game, and to not worry about what the scoreboard read. The players responded.

After the Tigers dropped a 35-24 decision to Ole Miss in Baton Rouge in late October, LSU was practically counted out of the SEC Western Division race. Saban, however, pressed on saying the Tigers would continue to focus on getting better, playing one game at a time, and not worrying about anybody but the next opponent. It worked as the Tigers began to peak during their November run, a stretch that saw LSU win at Alabama, then beat nationally-ranked foes Arkansas and Auburn at home to advance to the SEC title game.

The win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC Championship game and then No. 7 Illinois in the Sugar Bowl were just two more steps along the way for the Tigers as Saban continues to restore the winning tradition to an LSU program that will soon be a fixture among the nation's elite in college football.

Prior to LSU, Saban spent five years as the head coach at Michigan State, where he built the Spartans into a perennial BigTen contender after going to four bowl games in five seasons.

## IN THE POLLS

LSU moved up to No. 15 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll and to No. 18 in the AP poll following the 48-0 victory over Louisiana-Lafayette on Saturday. Florida fell to No. 16 in both polls after its 17-14 loss to unranked Ole Miss last week. LSU has been ranked in 12 consecutive top 25 polls dating back to last season. Under Nick Saban, LSU is 9-4 as a ranked team and the Tigers are 7-5 against Top 25 teams, which includes an 0-1 mark this year. Saturday's matchup will mark the first time that LSU will take a higher ranking into the Florida contest since 1988 when the Tigers were ranked No. 14 and the Gators No. 17. Florida won that game by a 19-6 margin.

## TOEFIELD OUT FOR SIX WEEKS WITH FRACTURED LEFT FOREARM

LSU's all-conference running back **LaBrandon Toefield** will be out at least six weeks after fracturing the radius in his left forearm in Saturday's win over Louisiana-Lafayette. LSU team doctor Brent Bankston performed the 45-minute surgery. "The fracture was relatively a clean break and it went back together very easily," Bankston said. Bankston said the surgery required the placing of a plate along with seven screws into Toefield's arm to stabilize the bone. Toefield will be in a cast for at least four weeks and will begin therapy after that. Toefield, a junior from Independence, La., had played in all five games for the Tigers this year and he ranked second on the squad with 323 yards. Toefield earned First Team All-Southeastern Conference honors last year after rushing for 992 yards and an SEC-record tying 19 touchdowns. For his career, Toefield has rushed for 1,997 yards and 26 touchdowns in 27 regular season games for the Tigers. Toefield missed most of last year's SEC Championship game and all of the Sugar Bowl after suffering a torn anterior cruciate ligament in the first half of the Tigers' 31-20 win over Tennessee in the conference title game.

"This is a very unfortunate injury," **Nick Saban** said. "LaBrandon worked so hard to come back from last year's knee injury that it's a shame that something like this has to happen. Toe's a great person and a fierce competitor and someone we are going to miss on the field. Right now, our main concern is doing whatever we can to support him."

## LSU-FLORIDA TIES

LSU has eight players from the state of Florida ... Sophomore TE **Demetri Robinson**'s hometown of Lake City, located about 50 miles north of Gainesville, is the closest to the University of Florida ... Robinson is joined by sophomore CB **Travis Daniels** (Hollywood), freshman OL Steve Alfin (Jacksonville), freshman OL **Terrell McGill** and junior DT **Torran Williams** (Miami), freshman LB **Willie Demps** (Pensacola), freshman OL **Brian Johnson** (Tallahassee) and freshman DB **Keron Gordon** (Tampa) ... Florida defensive coordinator John Thompson was LSU's defensive coordinator from Dec. 1999 to Jan. 2000 ... Gator offensive coordinator Ed Zaunbrecher was the Tigers' coordinator from 1984 to 1990 and was a member of the last LSU staff to beat Florida in Gainesville in 1987 ... Florida's tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator Tyke Tolbert was a three-year letter winner as a receiver at LSU from 1988 to 1990 ... Tolbert also served as a graduate assistant for the Tigers in 1994.

## SABAN AND ZOOK MEET AGAIN

It's been nearly 30 years since LSU coach **Nick Saban** and Florida coach Ron Zook have met on the football field. The last time the two met, they were players - Saban for Kent State and Zook for Miami (Ohio). Saban's Kent State squad defeated Zook and Miami (Ohio), 21-10, on Nov. 11, 1972. The two haven't crossed paths since, however Zook did follow Saban in one of his coaching stops. Saban coached the secondary at Ohio State in 1980-81 and Zook coached the same unit with the Buckeyes from 1988-90.

## LSU PUTS SEC WIN STREAKS ON THE LINE

LSU will carry a pair of SEC winning streaks into Saturday's contest against Florida. Overall, LSU has won four straight regular-season SEC games dating back to last year (the streak is five straight vs. SEC teams if you count the SEC Championship game) as well as winning three consecutive SEC road games. Last year, the Tigers closed out their season by posting SEC wins over Alabama, Arkansas and Auburn followed by a win over Mississippi State this year. The Tigers closed last year's SEC road slate by picking up wins over Kentucky, Mississippi State and Alabama. LSU's three-game SEC road winning streak is the longest for the Tigers since winning seven straight over a span of three years - 1996, 1997 and 1998. LSU's five straight wins over SEC teams is the longest such streak since winning five consecutive over conference foes in 1988. LSU has not beat six straight SEC opponents since a six-game streak covering the 1986 and 1987 seasons.

## TIGERS ON THE TUBE

Saturday's game will mark LSU's second appearance on national television this year and its 39th all-time appearance on ESPN. LSU opened the season with a 26-8 loss to Virginia Tech on ABC. LSU is 20-18 all-time on ESPN, which includes a 3-2 mark on the all sports network under **Nick Saban**.

## DAVIS GETS SCHOOL RECORD EARLY

Senior RB/return specialist **Domanick Davis** entered the Louisiana-Lafayette game last week needing eight punt return yards to surpass Eddie Kennison's record for the school's top spot of 947 yards. It did not take the Breaux Bridge, La., native long to get the mark. He returned the first punt of the game (less than two minutes into the game) 41 yards to get the record. That punt was the only one Davis returned in the game and finished with 981 punt return yards. Davis also entered the game needing 20 kickoff return yards for the school record as well, but he did not return ULL's lone kickoff that opened the second half.

## JUST CALL HIM DOMINANT DAVIS

To borrow a line from a local newspaper, you can call **Domanick Davis**, LSU's senior all-purpose threat, Dominant Davis. Two weeks ago against Mississippi State, Davis recorded a career-best 286 all-purpose yards, which included a 78-yard punt return for a touchdown and a career-high tying 122 yards rushing. Davis collected 91 all-purpose yards against Louisiana-Lafayette last week (41 punt return and 50 rushing) and now ranks fourth in the nation in all-purpose yards with a 176.0 average and leads the nation in punt returns with a 20.8 average. Through five games, Davis has 330 yards rushing, 43 yard receiving, 354 punt return yards and 153 kickoff return yards. This year, Davis has touched the ball 93 times - 66 rushing, 17 punt returns, 6 kickoff returns and 4 receptions and he's averaging a remarkable 9.5 yards every time he touches the ball.

## TAKING NOTE

LSU is now 5-3 in October under **Nick Saban** after last week's win over Louisiana-Lafayette ... The Tigers are 15-3 at home under Saban, which includes a 8-1 non-conference mark and a 12-2 record at night ... The Tigers are 5-1 under Saban in games decided by 7 points or less and an impressive 19-1 under Saban when leading at halftime ... The Tigers are 18-1 under Saban when leading after the third quarter ... LSU is also 17-0 under Saban when they score at least 30 points in a game and 23-1 under Saban when they score 20 or more points ... LSU is 10-0 under Saban when having a 100-yard rusher.

## HOME SWEET HOME

After last Saturday's 48-0 victory over Louisiana-Lafayette, LSU now owns a seven-game winning streak at Tiger Stadium. The Tigers have not lost a home game since Oct. 27, 2001, 35-24, to Ole Miss. The streak includes wins over Middle Tennessee, Alabama, Auburn, The Citadel, Miami (Ohio), Mississippi State and Louisiana-Lafayette. The seven-game home winning streak is the longest for the Tigers since LSU won eight straight games between Oct. 14, 1995 and Oct. 26, 1996.

## NO OPENING DRIVE TDS ALLOWED HERE

LSU ran its streak of keeping the opposition out of the endzone on its first possession of the game to seven against Louisiana-Lafayette. The streak includes all five games this year as well as the Tigers' final two games of the 2001 season. The last time an opponent scored on its opening possession against LSU came against Auburn on Dec. 1 of last year.

## FIRST QUARTER SUCCESS

LSU's defense has yielded only 10 first quarter points this season. A touchdown that came with 30 second left in the opening quarter at Virginia Tech on Sept. 1 and a field goal with 5:38 remaining by Mississippi State on Sept. 28. Over the past seven first quarters, which dates back to the final two games last year, LSU has only given up 10 first quarter points (7 to Virginia Tech and 3 to Mississippi State). In those seven opening quarters, the Tigers have outscored the opponents 69-10.

## QB MAUCK PUTS NAME IN LSU RECORD BOOK

Quarterback **Matt Mauck** became the first quarterback in LSU history to toss three TD passes in one quarter as he achieved the feat last week against Louisiana-Lafayette. Mauck set a career-high with three TD passes in the first quarter against the Cajuns as the Tigers cruised to a 48-0 win. What's even more impressive about Mauck's three TDs

is that they came in an eight-minute span in the opening quarter. Mauck hit **Devery Henderson** from 20-yards out with 12:14 left in the first quarter, then connected with **Michael Clayton** from 36-yards out with 7:57 left in the quarter and hit Clayton again with a four-yard pass with 4:37 left in the first. Mauck's feat marked the first time LSU had thrown three touchdown passes in a quarter since Oct. 6, 1989 when **Tommy Hodson** hit **Ronnie Haliburton** and **Tony Moss** and **Todd Kinchen** connected with Moss in the second quarter of that game.

## JAMES GANG DEFENSE LEADS NATION IN THREE CATEGORIES

LSU's **JAMES GANG** defense, named for its leader and captain **Bradie James**, enters the Florida contest leading the nation in three categories. The Tigers rank first in the nation in total defense (202.0 ypg), passing defense (115.6 ypg) and pass efficiency defense (70.8 rating). The Tigers also rank first in the SEC and eighth in the nation in rushing defense (86.4 ypg).

## LSU'S RETURN TEAMS ARE SPECIAL

LSU's return team combination of **Domanick Davis**, **Shyrone Carey** and **Devery Henderson** have turned into a dominating trio for the Tigers. Through five games, the Tigers lead the SEC and rank third in the nation in punt return average with 19.3 yards per return, while LSU ranks second in the league and third in the nation in kickoff returns with a 28.8 average. Davis leads the SEC and ranks third nationally with a 20.8 yard punt return average, while Henderson ranks first in the SEC with a 32.8 kickoff return average. Carey, who does not have enough punt returns to qualify for the league standings, is averaging 17.5 yards on four punt returns. Carey had a 52 yard punt return against Louisiana-Lafayette, while Henderson had a 69-yard kickoff return vs. the Cajuns last week.

## DOUBLE-D STRIKES FEAR IN THE EYES OF THE CAJUNS

LSU return specialist **Domanick Davis** must have given Louisiana-Lafayette coach **Ricky Bustle** nightmares last week because the Cajuns opted to punt the ball out of bounds rather than to Davis last week. The one time in which the Cajuns did punt to Davis - the first punt of the game - he returned it 41 yards to set up the Tigers' first TD.

## JAMES GANG CONTINUES TO BE STINGY

LSU's **JAMES GANG** defense has held all five of its opponents to under 250 yards of total offense this season, a streak that is the longest of its kind since 1969. Last week, the Tigers limited Louisiana-Lafayette to just 70 yards of offense. LSU's current streak of holding five straight opponents to fewer than 250 yards of offense matches the 1969 Tiger team that did it against Texas A&M (172 yards), Rice (172), Baylor (212), Miami (15) and Kentucky (227). This year's defensive total yardage totals for the Tigers are: Virginia Tech (231 yards), The Citadel (236), Miami (224), Mississippi State (249) and Louisiana-Lafayette (70).

## JAMES GANG DEFENSE STIFLES CAJUNS

The **JAMES GANG** held Louisiana-Lafayette to 70 total yards, just 17 rushing and 53 passing, in the 48-0 victory on Saturday. The 70 total yards was the fewest since at least 1962 and only the second time since 1980 the Tigers have held an opponent to under 100 total yards. The 17 rushing yards was the fewest by an LSU opponent since Tulane had 10 yards on the ground on Nov. 30, 1985. The 53 passing yards by ULL is the fewest by an opponent since North Texas threw for 10 yards on Sept. 11, 1999.

## NO 100-YARD GAMES AGAINST THE JAMES GANG

LSU's defense ran its streak of not allowing a 100-yard rushing game to 10 straight by limiting Louisiana-Lafayette's top rusher to 19 yards on Saturday. The Tiger defense has not allowed an opponent to rush for 100 yards since the Middle Tennessee contest last Nov. 10. In that game, Dwone Hicks rushed for 117 yards in the 30-14 loss to the Tigers. LSU has not yielded a 100-yard rushing game to an SEC opponent since the season-finale in 2000 when Brandon Holmes rushed for 143 yards and 1 TD in Arkansas' 14-3 win over the Tigers. LSU has kept its last 10 SEC opponents without a 100-yard rusher.

## LSU'S MAGIC NUMBER: 20

One thing is almost certain and that's when the Tigers score at least 20 points they get a win. LSU enters Saturday's contest with a 22-1 mark under **Nick Saban** when they score at least 20 points in a game. LSU was 8-0 in 2000, 10-1 in 2001 and they are 4-0 this season when reaching 20 points. The only loss during that span was a 35-24 defeat to Ole

Miss last season. Dating back to last season, LSU has scored at least 20 points in 12 of its last 13 games. However, the Tigers are winless, 0-7, when not reaching the 20-point plateau under Saban.

### 30 ALSO MAGIC FOR SABAN'S TIGERS

LSU is 16-0 under **Nick Saban** when they score at least 30 points. The Tigers posted a 4-0 mark in 2000 when scoring 30 or more, collected a 8-0 record last season and are 4-0 this season when putting at least 30 points on the board. In fact, LSU has won its last 18 games when scoring at least 30 points, including two wins in the 1999 season. The last time LSU lost a game in which 30 points were scored was Nov. 21, 1998 with Notre Dame defeated the Tigers 39-36 in South Bend.

### GET "TOE" OR "DOUBLE-D" TO 100 AND THE TIGERS WIN

When it comes to LSU football and 100-yard rushing games, the Tigers have proven to be tough to beat. Seven times in his career, **LaBrandon Toefield** has rushed for 100 yards and seven times the Tigers have come away with a victory. The same is true for **Domanick Davis**. Davis has four 100-yard rushing games and LSU is 4-0 in those games. Five of Toefield's seven 100-yard rushing games have come in SEC action, including a 119-yard, 2-TD performance in LSU's 45-38 overtime win over Mississippi State in 2000. Overall, LSU is 163-25 all-time when having a 100-yard rusher, which includes an 9-0 mark under **Nick Saban**. LSU's last loss when having a 100-yard rusher came on Nov. 3, 1998, when **Kevin Faulk** posted 201 yards in a 22-16 loss to Alabama.

### TOEFIELD'S CLIMB ON HOLD

Junior **LaBradon Toefield's** climb up the LSU records book was put on hold last week in the first quarter of the Louisiana-Lafayette game when the running back suffered a fractured radius in his left forearm in the first half. Toefield suffered the injury on his third carry of the game. When the Independence, La., native returns to action he will be in ninth in career rushing yards (1,997), ninth in career rushing attempts (452) and eighth in career touchdowns with 26

### CORBELLO STREAK SNAPPED AT EIGHT STRAIGHT

**John Corbello** saw his streak of successful field goals to eight straight snapped against Louisiana-Lafayette when he missed a 50-yard attempt in the third quarter. Corbello was a perfect 5-for-5 this year before his miss on Saturday and had made his final three field goals last season. Corbello earned SEC Special Teams Player of the Week following his school-record tying four field goals vs. Miami (Ohio). For his career, Corbello has converted 38 field goals, which ranks second in LSU history. David Browndyke holds the school record with 61 field goals.

### GROUND GAME SCORES AGAIN

LSU has recorded at least one rushing touchdown in 14 of the last 15 games. A streak of 12 straight games with a rushing touchdown came to halt in the Miami (Ohio) game, but LSU found the endzone on the ground again against Mississippi State and this past Saturday in the victory over Louisiana-Lafayette. Before the Miami (Ohio) game, the last time the Tigers did not score a touchdown on the ground was Sept. 29, 2001 at Tennessee.

### GAINING ON THE GROUND

LSU's 293 rushing yards against The Citadel were the most in a game for the Tigers under head coach **Nick Saban**. The previous mark under Saban was 262 against Utah State last season. The last time LSU had at least 290 rushing yards was in 1999 against North Texas when the Tigers amassed 350 yards on the ground. In 29 games under Saban, the Tigers have rushed for 200 yards or more five times (Tulane and Utah State in 2001, The Citadel, Miami (Ohio) and Mississippi State in 2002) and they are 5-0 in those games.

### GROUND ATTACK

The Tigers have gained at least 200 yards on the ground in four straight games following the 205 net rushing yards on Saturday against Louisiana-Lafayette. It is the first time since 1978 an LSU team has rushed for over 200 yards in four straight games.

### SPREADING IT OUT

A trademark of the **Jimbo Fisher** offense is spreading the ball around and the Tigers have done a good job of that thru five games this year as 11 different players have

caught at least one pass. **Michael Clayton** leads all LSU receivers with 21 receptions for 258 yards and four touchdowns. Of the 11 different receivers for the Tigers this year, six are wide outs, three are running backs, and two are tight ends. Last year, 15 different players caught passes for the Tigers and in 2000, 13 players caught at least one pass.

### YOUTH IN THE TRENCHES

LSU may have one of the youngest pairs of offensive and defensive lines in the nation this season. On the offensive side of the ball, the Tigers start a freshman, a sophomore, pair of juniors and a single senior in the trenches. The defensive line starters consist of two true sophomores, a junior and a lone senior. When looking at the Tigers depth chart, LSU gets even younger. Four of the five offensive line backups are freshmen while only center John Young is older, a senior. Defensively, a senior, two juniors and two freshmen represent the second unit.

### SIX TRUE FRESHMEN HAVE SEEN ACTION

Through five games, six true freshmen - LB **Cameron Vaughn**, DL **Kyle Williams**, RB **Jason Spadoni**, OL **Nate Livings**, OL **Terrance McGill** and WR **Skyler Green** - have seen action for the Tigers. Vaughn and Williams have played in all five games this year, while Spadoni, Livings and McGill saw their first action against The Citadel and also played against Miami (Ohio), Mississippi State and Louisiana-Lafayette. Green played his first game against Miami and saw more action against MSU and ULL. In addition to the six true freshman that have played this year, 14 other Tigers have seen action for the first time this year.

### DEVERY GETS FIRST TD VS. STATE, THEN ADDS ANOTHER VS. ULL

Converted running back **Devery Henderson** caught the first TD pass of his career against Mississippi State with a 36-yard reception from Matt Mauck. Henderson, who actually stumbled just before catching the pass, played running back for the Tigers for two years before moving to wide receiver last spring. The TD was the fourth of his career, three of which have come on the ground. Henderson pulled down his fifth career touchdown and second receiving in the 48-0 victory over Louisiana-Lafayette.

### WITH TOEFIELD OUT, ADDAI STEPS UP

With **LaBrandon Toefield** out with an injury, backup running back Joseph Addai answered the call on Saturday night as he rushed for a career-best 98 yards and two TDs in the 48-0 win over UL-Lafayette. Addai scored on runs of 10 and 34 yards and also caught two passes for 50 yards, including a 42-yarder. The 42-yard reception is the longest pass play of the season for the Tigers. Through five games, Addai has rushed for 211 yards and two TDs. He's averaging 6.8 yards per carry. He's also caught three passes for 59 yards.

### DAMIEN JAMES MAKES ANOTHER PICK VS. CAJUNS

**Damien James** intercepted the second pass of the season and ninth of his career on Saturday vs. UL-Lafayette. James' nine career interceptions ties Florida's Todd Johnson for the most among active players in the SEC. James' nine interceptions leaves the senior three shy of moving into a tie for second most in school history. Chris Williams holds the LSU record with 20 interceptions, while Craig Burns and Charley Oakley rank second at LSU with 12 to their credit.

### TWO IF BY LAND

**Domanick Davis** recorded his sixth multi-touchdown game of his career on Saturday against Louisiana-Lafayette. The senior running back/return specialist had a one-yard rushing touchdown early in the second quarter and added his second with 1:33 left to play in the first half on a three-yard run. Davis recorded his fifth career multi-touchdown game the week before against Mississippi State the unconventional way. He had a 78-yard punt return for a touchdown in the first quarter and later added a 5-yard touchdown run in the second quarter in the 31-13 victory. Davis' career-best is four touchdowns in a game when he rushed for four in the 2002 Sugar Bowl against Illinois.

### "TOE" AND "DOUBLE D" TIGERS DYNAMIC DUO

LSU's backfield tandem of junior **LaBrandon Toefield** and senior **Domanick Davis** could be the best pair in the Southeastern Conference. Both are preseason All-SEC selections and both have over 1,000 rushing yards in their career. Toefield has gained 1,997 yards and scored 26 touchdowns in his career, while Davis has collected 1,455 rushing yards and 18 rushing touchdowns in his career. Combined the pair have 3,452 yards



and 44 touchdowns in 65 games.

### DOMANICK FINALLY BREAKS ONE

**Domanick Davis** had a punt return for a touchdown called back in each of LSU's first two games this season, but the senior return specialist finally got his due on against Mississippi State on Sept. 28. Davis fielded a punt from MSU's Jared Cook at the LSU 22-yard line and proceeded to return it 78 yards for his second punt return of his career and lead LSU to a 31-13 victory over the Bulldogs. Davis now leads the nation and the SEC in punt return yards with 20.4 yards per return.

### DOMANICK DAVIS ALL-PURPOSE STREAK SNAPPED

**Domanick Davis** had his streak of nine straight games with at least 100 all-purpose yards come to an end last week against Louisiana-Lafayette. Davis had 91 all-purpose yards in the 48-0 victory over ULL, nine shy of extending the streak. He recorded a career-high 286 yards against Mississippi State the week before to keep the streak alive at nine game. The 286 yards marked the fourth-best all-purpose total for a single game in LSU history. The record is 376 set by Kevin Faulk against Houston in 1996.

### DOMANICK CREEPS UP SEC AND LSU KO RETURN YARDAGE CHART

With a 36-yard kickoff return against Mississippi State, **Domanick Davis** moved into sixth place all-time in SEC history in kickoff returns with 1,761 yards (He did not return a kickoff against Louisiana-Lafayette). Davis passed James Brooks of Auburn (1,726 yards) to move into sixth. Davis now is 20 yards away from becoming LSU's all-time leader in kickoff return yards and he needs 503 yards to break the SEC mark. Robert Dow holds the LSU record with 1,780 yards, while Mark Johnson of Vanderbilt holds the league mark with 2,263 yards.

### DAVIS'S BIG DAY MOVES HIM CLOSER TO LSU CAREER MARKS

**Domanick Davis** got the LSU record for punt return yards against Louisiana-Lafayette, but still sits second in kickoff return yards with 1,761. The senior needs 20 yards to surpass Robert Dow's record of 1,780 yards. Davis collected 91 all-purpose yards against Louisiana-Lafayette to give him 4,503 in his career. The Breaux Bridge, La., native is 11 all-purpose yards shy of passing Charles Alexander (4,513) and moving into third-place.

### MYERS ON THE MOVE

Senior receiver **Jerel Myers** enters the Louisiana-Lafayette game in fourth-place on the LSU career receptions list. The Houston, Texas, native has 134 receptions and passed Tony Moss with one catch against Virginia Tech. Myers is 19 receptions away from third and 51 away from breaking the record of 183 held by **Wendell Davis**.

### CLAYTON'S STILL GOING

Sophomore receiver **Michael Clayton** has caught a pass in all 18 games (including the 2002 Sugar Bowl) he has played in his career. During that streak Clayton has pulled down at least five receptions in eight games, including at least five catches in the first three games in the 2002 season. He had five catches against both Virginia Tech and The Citadel and a season-best seven in the win over Miami (Ohio).

### JAMES ON A ROLL

Senior All-America linebacker **Bradie James** is the mark of consistency. The West Monroe, La., native has recorded at least one tackle in all but one of the 40 games in which he has played. The only game that he did not make a stop was against Houston in 1999. Since that game, he has made at least one tackle in 28 consecutive games (including the 2000 Peach and 2002 Sugar bowl games), including 14 games with 10 or more stops. James collected a career-high 19 tackles in the season-opener against Virginia Tech and had a 18 tackles against The Citadel.

### CORBELLO KICKING TO THE TOP

Senior place kicker **John Corbello** is now fifth in career scoring in LSU history. He kicked a career-best four field goals and added three extra points in the victory over Miami (Ohio) to give him a career-best 15 points in the game. He added a field goal and three extra points against Mississippi State and six extra points against Louisiana-Lafayette to give him 226 points in his career. Corbello is 29 points away from passing Charles Alexander (254) for fourth. Corbello ranks second in school history with 38 career field goals, 23 shy of **David Browndyke's** mark of 61.

• The **JAMES GANG DEFENSE** is led by seniors **Bradie James** and **Damien James**. Bradie, a first-team All-SEC linebacker and team captain, calls all the shots as the MIKE (middle) linebacker. Damien is the quarterback of the secondary as the free safety.

- All 11 starters on the defense are from the state of Louisiana.
- LSU has held each of its five opponents to fewer than 250 total yards this year. It is the first time since 1969 that a Tiger defense has held five consecutive opponents under 250 yards.
- The Tigers allowed UL-Lafayette just 70 total yards, the fewest allowed by a Tiger defense in more than 40 years.
- Opponents are converting a miniscule 20 percent of their third-down opportunities against the Tigers this year. LSU has stopped 24 straight third-down conversion attempts.
- LSU has not allowed a touchdown in six quarters.
- Only three of the six touchdowns given up by LSU this year have been on drives of more than 30 yards. The other three drives (27, 29, 2) came when the opposing offense had a short field following a shanked punt, a blocked punt and a fumble.
- The Tigers have not had a 100-yard rusher in nine games, since Dwone Hicks of Middle Tennessee reached the mark last year. No SEC back has gone over 100 yards in 11 games, since Brandon Holmes of Arkansas, who did so at the end of the 2000 season.
- Nearly two-fifth's (124 of 315) of opponents offensive plays this year have gone for no gain or negative yardage.
- LSU has given up just two pass plays of more than 20 yards this season and only one passing touchdown.

Rex Grossman passed for 464 yards and five touchdowns to lead Florida to a 44-15 victory over LSU. Redshirt freshman **Matt Mauck** filled in admirably for **Rohan Davey**, who suffered a knee injury in the second quarter. Mauck completed 11 of 22 passes for 132 yards and rushed for 37 yards on seven carries in relief. Josh Reed caught six passes for 123 yards. **Devery Henderson** posted a career-high 83 yards rushing, including a 50-yarder to set up the Tigers' final score. Florida jumped out to a 21-3 lead just over 10 minutes into the game and never looked back. The Tigers cut the lead to 12 points in the second quarter when **LaBrandon Toefield** scored his eighth TD of the season, but never got closer.

- LSU began playing football in Tiger Stadium in 1924 and is currently in its 79th year in the venerable stadium on Saturday Night.
- LSU has won seven straight games at home dating back to its homecoming victory over Middle Tennessee State last year. That is the second home win streak of at least six games for the Tigers since 2000.
- Under **Nick Saban**, the Tigers have posted a 15-3 home record, including a 4-1 mark against ranked opponents. Against conference foes, Saban is 7-2 in Death Valley. In home games at night, LSU is 12-2 since Saban took over.
- More than 85,000 fans have attended each of LSU’s last 16 home games. In that span, the Tigers have eclipsed the 90,000 mark 10 times, including a school-record 92,141 for last year’s Auburn contest, which LSU won 27-14.
- A school-record 63,017 season tickets were sold this year, not counting the more than 15,000 seats reserved for students. Last year, 62,600 season tickets were sold.
- Since national attendance figures began being kept in 1957, LSU has ranked in the top 20 all 45 seasons. The Tigers have been in the top 15 for 43 of the 45 years and in the top 10 on 37 occasions, including 32 straight from 1957-88. Fourteen times, LSU has ranked in the top five in the nation, including the last two.
- Since 1960, LSU owns a stellar 180-60-4 (.746) record in traditional Tiger Stadium night games. On the other hand, the Tigers are just 14-20-3 (.419) at home during the day in that span.

## EARTHQUAKE GAME

October 6, 1988. Tommy Hodson connected with Eddie Fuller on 4-and-10 with 1:41 to play for the game-winning touchdown as LSU upset No. 4 Auburn. The play caused such a thunderous explosion from the crowd of 79,341 that the tremor caused by the vibrations measured on the seismograph across campus.

## HALLOWEEN NIGHT

October 31, 1959. No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss, 3-0, late in the fourth quarter when Billy Cannon fielded a punt off the bounce at the 11-yard line. He raced 89 yards, careening off seven Rebel defenders, to paydirt to give the Tigers victory and all but clinch the 1959 Heisman Trophy.

From the opening kickoff to the final horn, LSU dominated Miami (Ohio) in every phase of the game, posting a 33-7 victory over the RedHawks. The second half belonged to LSU as the Tigers stretched the lead to 21-10 on a 39-yard TD pass from Matt Mauck to Devery Henderson. Mauck capped the scoring for LSU with a 2-yard run midway through the fourth quarter. For the game, Davis finished with a 286 all-purpose yards, which included 128 yards on punt returns. The Tigers piled up 256 yards rushing, while limiting MSU to only 88 yards on the ground and 249 total yards.

**LSU DOMINATES CAJUNS, 48-0**

**Matt Mauck** became the first quarterback in LSU history to throw three TD passes in one quarter and the Tiger defense dominated from start to finish as the Tigers rolled to a 48-0 Homecoming win over Louisiana-Lafayette last week in Tiger Stadium. The first meeting between the teams since 1938 was over in matter of minutes as Mauck found **Devery Henderson** for a 20-yard TD on the Tigers' first possession and then connected with **Michael Clayton** on TD passes of 36 and 4 yards in the first quarter for a 21-0 LSU lead. LSU stretched the margin to 41-0 at halftime before using backups on offense for most of the second half. The Tigers held ULL to only seven first downs and just 70 yards of total offense. The Cajuns were 0 of 16 on third down conversions and punted 12 times, 11 of which were kicked out of bounds to avoid LSU's **Domanick Davis**. **Joseph Addai** led LSU with 98 rushing yards and two TDs, while Mauck connected on 8 of 19 passes for 138 yards and three TDs.
