LSU LOOKS TO MAINTAIN SEC WEST LEAD AGAINST KENTUCKY

LSU, ranked 16th by the AP and 14th by the coaches, returns to action today in Lexington as it faces Kentucky in an 11:30 a.m. CT kickoff. The contest will be televised to a by Jefferson Pilot. LSU had an open date last week after falling to Auburn 31-7 two weeks ago. Kentucky beat Mississippi State last week, 45-24. LSU's "JAMES GANG" defense enters the Kentucky contest ranked No.1 in the nation in total defense by allowing only 230.4 yards per contest. LSU also ranks in the top 10 nationally in scoring defense (5th at 13.5 ppg), pass defense (2nd at 121.6 ypg) and pass efficiency defense (1st at 76.0 pct.). Offensively, the Tigers continue to be lead by multi-purpose threat **Domanick Davis**, who has rushed for 569 yards and 6 TDs. Davis also ranks first in the SEC in a fourth nationally with 168.1 all-purpose yards per contest.

TURNOVERS DOOM TIGERS IN 31-7 LOSS TO AUBURN

A combination of turnovers and poor field position did LSU in as the Tigers dropped a 31-7 decision at Auburn. LSU fumbled on its first play from scrimmage to set the tone for a game that saw the Tigers commit five turnovers. Despite four first half turnovers, the defense kept LSU in the game as Auburn managed only a 17-0 advantage at half-time. Auburn put the game out of reach early in the third quarter when Jason Campbell found Robert Johnson in the endzone for a 3-yard TD pass to make the score 24-0. Auburn tacked on another score early in the fourth quarter before the Tigers scored their only points of the game on an 8-yard run by **Joseph Addai** midway through the final quarter. **Marcus Randall** led LSU with 74 yards rushing, while Addai added 44 yards and 1 TD on 10 carries. Randall connected on 9 of 20 passes for 79 yards and 4 interceptions. **Bradie James** led the defense with 14 tackles.

NICK SABAN

HEAD COACH • THIRD YEAR

You can call LSU head coach Nick Saban the complete package. Brought to Baton Rouge following the 1999 season to revive what many considered a sleeping giant, Saban has transformed the LSU football program into one that wins championships, while graduating players at the same time.

Armed with a plan that gives his players a chance to be successful on the field as well as the classroom, Saban's impact on the program has been immediate and it's been powerful.

In just two short years at LSU's head coach, Saban's on-field success has been unmatched as he has guided the Tigers to 18 victories, a pair of bowl wins, including one in a BCS game, and the 2001 Southeastern Conference title.

Off the field, Saban has spearheaded a fundraising effort that has raised more than \$15 million for a state-of-the-art academic center for student-athletes. The new LSU Academic Center for Student-Athletes is all part of Saban's plan to give his players the best opportunity to be successful when they finish their football career.

Saban didn't waste anytime making his impact felt as he guided a team coming off back-to-back losing seasons to an 8-4 mark and a win over 15th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl to rekindle the fire of a proud football tradition in Baton Rouge.

Saban's influence on the Tigers went much further in 2001 as he led LSU to the school's first outright Southeastern Conference title since 1986 with a 31-20 win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC title game and followed that win a 47-34 victory over Illinois in the Sugar Bowl, LSU's first New Year's Day Bowl win since 1968.

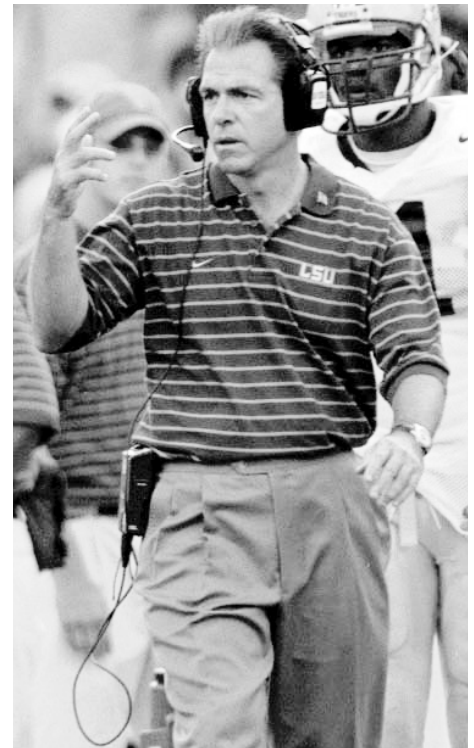
Beating Tennessee to win the league title is one thing, but the fashion in which Saban and the Tigers did so speaks volumes on the impact he has had on his squad. Playing without two of their offensive standouts, quarterback Rohan Davey and running back LaBrandon Toefield, not only did the Tigers respond to Saban's challenge to step up, they were dominant, outscoring the high-powered Vols offense 21-3 in the second half. LSU's defense allowed just 50 yards rushing.

Losing Davey and Toefield and still overcoming the adversity to win the title game, or any game for that matter, has been a trademark of Saban-coached teams. Teaching the players to trust and believe in each other has been a characteristic that Saban has branded on his squad. Saban preached to his team to play for 60 minutes, to become a dominant team on every play of every game, and to not worry about what the scoreboard read. The players responded.

After the Tigers dropped a 35-24 decision to Ole Miss in Baton Rouge in late October, LSU was practically counted out of the SEC Western Division race. Saban, however, pressed on saying the Tigers would continue to focus on getting better, playing one game at a time, and not worrying about anybody but the next opponent. It worked as the Tigers began to peak during their November run, a stretch that saw LSU win at Alabama, then beat nationally-ranked foes Arkansas and Auburn at home to advance to the SEC title game.

The win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC Championship game and then No. 7 Illinois in the Sugar Bowl were just two more steps along the way for the Tigers as Saban continues to restore the winning tradition to an LSU program that will soon be a fixture among the nation's elite in college football.

Prior to LSU, Saban spent five years as the head coach at Michigan State, where he built the Spartans into a perennial BigTen contender after going to four bowl games in five seasons.

IN THE POLLS

LSU jumped one spot in each of the national polls on Sunday as the Tigers are ranked No. 14 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll and No. 16 in the Associated Press poll. LSU has been ranked for 17 consecutive weeks. Under **Nick Saban**, LSU is 11-5 as a ranked team and 8-5 against Top 25 teams, which includes a 1-1 mark this year.

LSU-KENTUCKY SERIES HAS INTERESTING STORYLINES

When the Tigers face Kentucky on Saturday, you can expect a contest that will provide some lasting memories, at least that will be the case if history is any indicator as to what the future holds. In 1995, LSU wore purple pants for the first and only time in school history in a 24-16 loss to Kentucky in Lexington. Two years later in 1997, **Kevin Faulk** rushed for a school-record 5 TDs and 212 yards as the Tigers rolled to a 63-28 win over the Wildcats in Lexington. The 63 points were the most ever scored by an LSU team in a conference game. A year later in Baton Rouge, Kentucky kicked a field goal as time expired for a 39-36 win over the Tigers and then last year, **Rohan Davey** drove the Tigers 80 yards in three minutes, culminating with a 6-yard game-winning TD pass to **Michael Clayton** with 13 seconds left for a 29-25 LSU victory.

SABAN MEETS MORRIS AGAIN

LSU head coach **Nick Saban** and Kentucky head coach **Guy Morriss** are no strangers when it comes to meeting on the football field. Before last year's head to head meeting as head coaches, they had met four times in the NFL. The first two came during the 1988 NFL season when Saban was the defensive secondary coach of the Houston Oilers and Morriss coach the New England Patriots offensive line. Saban's Oilers defeated the Patriots in both meetings. The next meeting came the following season when the Patriots defeated Houston in the Astrodome. The other meeting also came on NFL sidelines, but five years later when Saban was the defensive coordinator of the Cleveland Browns and Morriss coached the offensive line for the Arizona Cardinals. Saban's defense shutout the Cardinals in the victory at Cleveland. Last year, Saban and the Tigers rallied for a 29-25 last-minute win over Morriss and the Wildcats in Kentucky.

TIGERS NEARLY UNBEATABLE AFTER HALLOWEEN UNDER SABAN

Once the month turns to November, the Tigers have become nearly unbeatable under **Nick Saban** as LSU sports a 9-1 mark in games after October under the third-year coach. As a matter of fact, LSU will carry a seven-game winning streak in games played in November and beyond into Saturday's contest at Kentucky. Last year, LSU was 4-3 at the conclusion of October. The Tigers then reeled off six straight wins, covering November, December and January, to finish with a 10-3 overall mark. In 2000, the Tigers were 3-1 in post-October games, the lone loss coming in a driving rainstorm against Arkansas in Little Rock. Dating back to Saban's last year at Michigan State, he's posted a 12-1 mark in post-October games, with seven of the 12 games coming against teams ranked in the Top 25.

TIGERS ON THE TUBE

Saturday's game will mark LSU's third appearance on Jefferson Pilot this year and its 17th all-time appearance on JP. LSU opened the SEC season with a 31-13 win over Mississippi State on JP on Sept. 28 and then fell to Auburn two weeks ago on JP. The Tigers are 4-11-1 in the previous 16 games televised by JP, including a 1-2 mark under Nick Saban. LSU is 0-1 against Kentucky on JP with a 31-5 loss at Lexington in 1999.

TAKING NOTE UNDER NICK SABAN ...

LSU is 5-1 in November, the lone loss came to Arkansas in 2000 ... The Tigers are 16-3 at home, which includes a 7-2 SEC mark and a 13-2 record at night ... The Tigers are 5-1 in games decided by seven points or less ... LSU is an 20-1 when leading at halftime and 20-1 when leading after the third quarter ... LSU is 19-0 when it scores at least 30 points in a game and 25-1 when they score 20 or more points ... LSU is 11-0 when having a 100-yard rusher ... LSU is 3-2 after an open date, including 1-0 this season.

IN SEVEN GAMES SINCE THE VIRGINIA TECH LOSS ...

- LSU is outscoring its opponents by 20.8 points per game (32.5-11.7).
- The Tigers have put the ball in the endzone 28 times, an average of 4.0 per game.
- LSU is averaging 229.1 yards rushing, while opponents manage just 100.6.
- The Tigers time of possession has averaged better than five minutes more per game than its opponent (32:23-27:37)
- The James Gang has 15 sacks, compared to just four for opponents.

TIGERS LOOK FOR FIRST 4-1 SEC START SINCE 1996

A win on Saturday against Kentucky would give the Tigers a 4-1 mark in SEC action. LSU hasn't been 4-1 in SEC play since going 4-1 over the first five league games in 1996. LSU went on to a 6-2 league mark and a tie for the Western Division title that year.

TIGERS LOOK FOR SWEEP AGAINST SEC EAST FOES

LSU heads into the Kentucky contest with a 2-0 mark against SEC Eastern Division teams this year. A win over the Wildcats would give the Tigers their first sweep over SEC East foes since 1997 when LSU beat Florida, Kentucky and Vanderbilt in the same season. Since the league went to divisional format, LSU has gone perfect against the SEC East only one time (1997) in a single-season. Dating back to last year, LSU has won four straight regular-season contests against SEC Eastern Division teams, and counting the SEC Championship game, the Tigers have won five consecutive games against opponents from the other division. LSU is 6-3 vs. the SEC East under Nick Saban.

SABAN ADDS ANOTHER NOTCH TO HIS SEC BELT

With LSU's win over South Carolina, **Nick Saban** has now recorded at least one victory over every SEC team that he has faced. The only two SEC teams that Saban has yet to beat are the only two hasn't faced - Georgia and Vanderbilt.

IT MUST BE THE HALFTIME SPEECH

Whether it's the halftime motivational speech or adjustments by the coaching staff, something is going on in the LSU locker room at halftime as the Tigers have outscored their opponents 72-17 in the third quarter this year, including 65-7 in the last six games. Against SEC opponents, the third quarter score is 48-7. On Oct. 19, LSU trailed 14-6 at halftime and then promptly went out and held South Carolina to 1 yard of offense in the third quarter, while outscoring the Gamecocks 25-0. Auburn is the only SEC team to score in the third quarter against the Tigers this year.

LSU'S JAMES GANG DEFENSE LEADS NATION IN TOTAL DEFENSE

LSU's **JAMES GANG** defense, named for captain **Bradie James**, enters the Kentucky contest leading the nation in total defense (230.4 ypg) as well as pass defense efficiency (76.0 rating). The James Gang also ranks second in pass defense (121.6 ypg) and the Tigers are fifth in scoring defense (13.5 points per game). LSU leads the SEC in all four of those categories. The Tiger defense is also third in the SEC and 19th in the nation in rushing defense, allowing just 108.8 yards per game

BRADIE JAMES IS A SEMIFINALIST FOR THE BUTKUS AWARD

LSU linebacker **Bradie James** has been named one of 11 semifinalists for the 2002 Butkus Award, the Downtown Athletic Club of Orlando announced on Oct. 17. James, a Butkus Award candidate each of the past three years, currently leads LSU with 100 tackles. James also has 11 quarterback hurries, five tackles for loss, two sacks, one interception and one forced fumble. This year, James has two of the highest tackles games in the SEC with 19 against Virginia Tech and 18 versus The Citadel. Other 2002 Butkus Award semifinalist include: Boss Bailey (Georgia), Michael Boulware (Florida State), Rod Davis (Southern Miss), E.J. BRADIE REACHED CENTURY MARK FOR THIRD STRAIGHT YEAR

Senior linebacker **Bradie James** has recorded at least 100 tackles in each of the past three seasons after collecting 14 tackles in last week's loss at Auburn. James has right at 100 tackles this season, recorded 113 last year and had 110 as a sophomore. The West Monroe, La., native is just the second Tiger in history to record three straight 100-tackle seasons. Linebacker **Al Richardson** was the first to accomplish the feat recording 129 tackles in 1980, 150 in 1981 and 121 in 1982.

BRADIE JAMES NAMED NATIONAL SCHOLAR-ATHLETE

The National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame announced linebacker **Bradie James** has been named to the 2002 National Scholar-Athlete Class, which includes 14 players from all divisions. The award, an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship is one of the top academic honors available to college football players. Past LSU recipients of the award include punter **Chad Kessler** in 1997, quarterback **Sol Graves** in 1990 and center **Nacho Albergamo** in 1987.

BRADIE NOW THIRD IN CAREER TACKLES

Among other feats senior linebacker **Bradie James** has accumulated during his career at LSU, he is now third in career tackles in Tiger history. James has 364 entering the Kentucky game and is 23 away from passing Lawrence Williams into second place and 89 away from becoming LSU's all-time leader in tackles.

NO 100-YARD GAMES AGAINST THE JAMES GANG

LSU's defense ran its streak of not allowing a 100-yard rushing game to 12 straight by limiting Auburn's top rusher to 95 yards on Oct. 26. Dwone Hicks of Middle Tennessee was the last to hit 100 yards when he rushed for 117 in a 30-14 loss to the Tigers on Nov. 10. LSU has not yielded a 100-yard rushing game to an SEC opponent in 13 games, since the season-finale in 2000 when Brandon Holmes rushed for 143 yards and a touchdown in Arkansas' 14-3 victory in Little Rock.

JAMES GANG CONTINUES TO BE STINGY

LSU's defense continues to be the mark of consistency as the Tigers have allowed only one opponent to surpass the 300-yard mark this season. Auburn is the only team this year to record more than 275 yards of offense against LSU as they had 321 in a 31-7 win over LSU on Oct. 26. Prior to the Auburn game, LSU had held its first seven opponents to fewer than 300 yards of total offense. In addition, LSU went the first six games before allowing a team go over the 250-yard mark. South Carolina snapped the string in Week 7 with 275 yards against the Tigers. Here's a look at the yardage for LSU's opponents this season: Virginia Tech (231 yards), Citadel (236), Miami (224), Mississippi State (249), Louisiana-Lafayette (70), Florida (237), South Carolina (275), and Auburn (321).

LSU GOES FOR A PICK-SIX IN BACK-TO-BACK GAMES

The **JAMES GANG** has now returned three interceptions for touchdowns this season, including scores in back-to-back games. **Corey Webster** had a 45-yard interception return for at TD against Florida and **Demetrius Hookfin** returned an interception 10 yards for a score against South Carolina. The interceptions returned for TD's in back-to-back games is the first time LSU has accomplished the feat since 1999 when the Tigers returned interceptions against San Jose State and North Texas. Earlier this year, Damien James also returned an interception for a TD. His went 32 yards against The Citadel.

LSU'S DOUBLE-D VS. UK'S ABNEY

Saturday's game between LSU and Kentucky will showcase two of the most dangerous return men in all of college football in LSU's **Domanick Davis** and Kentucky's Derek Abney. Davis, who holds the LSU career mark for punt return and kickoff return yardage, ranks second in the SEC and fourth in the nation with 18.7 yards per punt return. Abney is first in the league and third in the nation with 18.8 yard a punt return. Abney is fourth in the SEC and 18th nationally with a 25.5 kickoff return average, while Davis is fifth in the SEC and 21st nationally with a 25.1 average. Davis leads the SEC and ranks seventh nationally in all-purpose yards with 168.1 per contest, while Abney is second in the league and ninth in the nation with 166.4 all-purpose yards per contest.

LSU'S RETURN TEAMS ARE SPECIAL....

LSU's return team combination of **Domanick Davis**, **Devery Henderson** and **Shyrone Carey** have turned into a dominating trio for the Tigers. The Tigers lead the SEC and rank first in the nation in kickoff return average at 28.1 yards per return. The Tigers rank second in the SEC and third nationally in punt returns with a 17.9 average.

....AND SO IS THE KICKOFF COVERAGE UNIT

While LSU's return teams get most of the publicity, the Tiger kickoff coverage team has been just as good as they lead the league by allowing only 16.6 yards per return. On 39 kickoff returns this year against LSU, the Tigers have allowed 649 yards. Over the last three games, LSU has allowed 165 yards on 12 returns, for an average of 13.8 a return. Miami (Ohio) had a 41-yard return, the longest return against the Tigers this year.

DAVIS PICKS UP ANOTHER SCHOOL RECORD

Senior RB/return specialist **Domanick Davis** entered the South Carolina game needing just six kickoff return yards to pass **Robert Dow**'s school record of 1,780. Davis got those yards and more on his first kickoff return, gaining 22 yards on the return. Davis finished the game with 61 kickoff return yards and now has 1,884 for his career. He also owns the school punt-return record with 1,075 yards.

JUST CALL HIM DOMINANT DAVIS

To borrow a line from a local newspaper, you can call **Domanick Davis**, LSU's senior all-purpose threat, Dominant Davis. Davis has recorded at least 100 all-purpose yards in 12 of his past 13 games, including 101 yards against Auburn and a career-high 286 yards against Mississippi State, which is the fourth-best all-purpose total for a single game in LSU history. The game against the Bulldogs included a 78-yard punt return for a touch-down and a career-high tying 122 yards rushing. He ranks first in the SEC and seventh in the nation in all-purpose yards (168.1 per game). This year, Davis has touched the ball 164 times - 120 rushing, 24 punt returns, 11 kickoff returns and nine receptions and he's averaging 8.2 yards per touch.

DAVIS MOVING CLOSER TO ANOTHER LSU PUNT RETURN MARK

With 448 yards in punt returns, **Domanick Davis** has already recorded the third-highest single-season total in LSU history. Davis, who owns the LSU career punt return record, needs 92 yard to overtake **Pinky Rohm** (1937) for the single-season record. In what is one of the oldest records on the LSU books, Rohm returned 35 punts for 539 yards and three TD's in 1937. **Young Bussey** (1937) ranks second with 465 yards on 37 returns.

HOME SWEET HOME

Following the victory over South Carolina, LSU has won eight-straight games in Death Valley. The Tigers have not lost at home since Oct. 27, 2001 (35-24 to Ole Miss). The streak includes wins over Middle Tennessee, Alabama, Auburn, Citadel, Miami (Ohio), Mississippi State, UL-Lafayette and South Carolina. The eight-game streak is the longest for the Tigers since winning eight straight between Oct. 14, 1995, and Oct. 26, 1996.

25 POINTS IN THE THIRD QUARTER

The Tigers' 25 points in the third quarter was the most by an LSU team in one quarter since scoring 27 in the second quarter of the 2002 Sugar Bowl against Illinois. The 25 is the most in a regular-season quarter since a 35 point third-quarter against Rice in 1977.

COMEBACK KIDS

LSU trailed 14-6 at the half and came back to score 32 unanswered points to defeat South Carolina on Oct. 19. It was the first time the Tigers came back from a halftime deficit to win since the 2001 SEC Championship game. LSU trailed Tennessee 17-10 at the break in that game and outscored the Vols 21-3 in the second half for a 31-20 victory.

GET ON THE BOARD FIRST EQUALS SUCCESS

The Tigers are 5-0 this season when scoring first and 20-2 under **Nick Saban** when they do so. The last time LSU lost a game in which they scored first was last season at Tennessee. The only other loss came after scoring first came at Auburn in 2000.

WEBSTER CONTINUES TO LEAD THE SEC IN INTERCEPTIONS

Defensive back **Corey Webster**, a converted wide receiver, continues to lead the SEC in interceptions with five through eight games. Webster, who was named SEC Player of the Week after picking off three passes vs. Florida on Oct. 12, has returned the five interceptions for 75 yards and one TD. The three interceptions vs. Florida tied a school-record as he became only the sixth Tiger to intercept three passes in a single game. He was the first to do it since **Chris Williams** against Rice in 1978. The last time a Tiger had three picks in an SEC game came in 1970 when Craig Burns did it against Ole Miss. Webster took the second interception 45 yards for a touchdown and another pick led to an LSU field goal.

LSU'S MAGIC NUMBER: 20

LSU is almost automatic under **Nick Saban** when they score at least 20 points in a game, posting a 24-1 record. However, the Tigers are 0-7 when not reaching the 20-point plateau under Saban. LSU was 8-0 in 2000, 10-1 in 2001 and is 6-0 this season when reaching 20 points. The only loss during that span was a 35-24 defeat to Ole Miss. Dating back to last season, LSU has scored at least 20 points in 13 of its past 14 games.

30 ALSO MAGIC FOR SABAN'S TIGERS

LSU is even better under **Nick Saban** when scoring at least 30 points. The Tigers are 18-0 with a 4-0 mark in 2000, a 8-0 record last season and a 6-0 mark this season when reaching 30. In fact, LSU has won its last 20 games when scoring at least 30 points, including two wins in the 1999 season. The last time LSU lost a game in which 30 points was Nov. 21, 1998, when Notre Dame defeated the Tigers 39-36 in South Bend.

RECORD SET FOR PUTTING 30 ON THE BOARD

LSU had put at least 30 points on the scoreboard for a school-record six straight games before failing to do so in the 31-7 loss at Auburn. The previous record was five straight games during the tail end of the 1968 season and into the 1969 season. The 2002 Tigers put up 35 against The Citadel, 33 against Miami (Ohio), 31 against Mississippi State, 48 against Louisiana-Lafayette, 36 against Florida and 38 against South Carolina. The previous mark was set against Tulane (34) and Florida State (31) in 1968 and Texas A&M (35), Rice (42) and Baylor (63) in 1969.

71 STRAIGHT GAMES WITHOUT BEING SHUTOUT IS SCHOOL MARK

LSU broke a school record this past Saturday against Auburn by not being shutout for the 71st straight game. The last time the Tigers were shutout was in 1996 by Alabama (27-0). The streak ties the mark set between the 1985 and 1991 seasons.

MOVING UP FRESHMAN SACKS LIST

LSU rookie **Melvin Oliver** continues to move up the school sacks list for freshman. Through seven games, Oliver has recorded five sacks, which ties him with **James Gillyard** (1992) and **Ron Sancho** (1985) for the second-most sacks by a freshman in school history. **Jarvis Green** (1998) holds the freshman mark with eight sacks. Oliver is coming off a 2.5 sack performance vs. South Carolina last week.

GET A RUSHER TO 100 AND THE TIGERS WIN

When it comes to LSU football and 100-yard rushing games, the Tigers have proven to be tough to beat. Ten times since **Nick Saban** took over in 2000, LSU has had a player rush for 100 yards and 10 times the Tigers have come away with a victory. **Domanick Davis** has four of those 100-yard rushing games. Overall, LSU is 164-25 all-time when having a 100-yard rusher. LSU's last loss when having a 100-yard rusher came on Nov. 3, 1998, when Kevin Faulk posted 201 yards in a 22-16 loss to Alabama. **LaBrandon Toefield** cracked the century mark to help LSU to a 29-25 win over Kentucky last year.

GROUND GAME SCORES AGAIN

LSU has now scored a rushing TD in 17 of the past 18 games following **Joseph Addai's** 8-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter. The score was Addai's third of the season, giving the freshman tailback the second most rushing touchdown on the team.

GROUND ATTACK

LSU had gained at least 200 yards rushing in five straight games before failing to get to the mark against Auburn. The five straight games was the first time for an LSU team since the 1973 Tigers have rushed for over 200 yards in five straight games. The 1973 Tigers recorded at least 200 rushing yards in six-straight games. In 32 games under **Nick Saban**, the Tigers have rushed for more than 200 yards seven times and are 7-0 in those games. LSU rushed for 293 yards against The Citadel earlier this year, the most by the Tigers under Saban.

LSU STREAK OF PASSES WITHOUT AN INTERCEPTION ENDS AT 122

LSU's streak of passes without an interception came to an end last week at Auburn at 122 attempts. Before **Marcus Randall** threw an interception on his fourth attempt against Auburn. **Matt Mauck** had thrown 88 straight (before suffering a season-ending injury against Florida) and Randall had thrown 34 straight without an interception. Before the first quarter at Auburn, the last time LSU threw an interception came in the first quarter against The Citadel in the second week of the season.

SIX TRUE FRESHMEN HAVE SEEN ACTION

Through six games, six true freshmen - LB **Cameron Vaughn**, DL **Kyle Williams**, RB **Jason Spadoni**, OL **Nate Livings**, OL **Terrance McGill** and WR **Skyler Green** - have seen action for the Tigers. Vaughn and Williams have played in all eight games this year. In addition to the true freshman that have played this year, 15 other Tigers have seen action for the first time this year.

DEVERY WARMING UP TO THE RECEIVER POSITION

Converted running back **Devery Henderson** has really warmed up to the receiver position. In fact, you could say he has caught fire. The junior has four touchdown receptions, including two in the victory over Florida. His 14 receptions and 202 yards are second on the team and his four scores are tied for the team lead.

WITH TOEFIELD OUT, ADDAI AND CAREY STEP UP

With **LaBrandon Toefield** out with an injury, backup running backs **Joseph Addai** and **Shyrone Carey** have answered the call. Against UL-Lafayette, Addai rushed for a career-best 98 yards and two TD's and then carried 16 times for 56 yards in the win at Florida. Carey, a converted wide receiver carried the ball six times for 68 yards and a touchdown in the win over South Carolina. Through eight games, Addai has rushed for 325 yards and three TD's, while Carey has 14 carries for 96 yards and a score.

DOMANICK CREEPS UP IN SEC CAREER RECORDS

Domanick Davis enters the Kentucky game ranked second in SEC career kick return yards (punts and kickoffs) with 2,959, fifth in kickoff return yards with 1,884, ninth in punt return yards with 1,075 and sixth in all-purpose yards with 4,968.

CLAYTON'S STILL GOING

Sophomore receiver **Michael Clayton** has caught a pass in all 21 games (including the 2002 Sugar Bowl) of his career. In that span, he has pulled down at least five receptions in nine games, including at least five catches in four games in the 2002 season.

CORBELLO KICKING TO THE TOP

Senior place kicker **John Corbello** is three points from moving past **Charles Alexander** into fourth place on the LSU career points list. Corbello ranks second in school history with 44 career field goals, 17 fewer than career leader **David Browndyke**. Corbello is fourth in the SEC this season in scoring, averaging 7.2 points per game.

MYERS ON THE MOVE

Senior receiver **Jerel Myers** enters the Kentucky game in fourth place on the LSU career receptions list. The Houston, Texas, native has 139 receptions for 1,780 yards in his career. He is also seventh in career receiving yards with 1,780, 132 away from passing **Todd Kinchen** and moving into sixth.

SPREADING IT OUT

A trademark of the **Jimbo Fisher** offense is spreading the ball around and the Tigers have done a good job of that thru seven games this year as 12 different players have caught at least one pass. **Michael Clayton** leads all LSU receivers with 31 receptions for 569 yards and four touchdowns. Of the 12 different receivers for the Tigers this year, six are wide outs, four are running backs, and two are tight ends. Last year, 15 different players caught passes for the Tigers. In 2000, 13 players caught at least one pass.

MAUCK UNDERGOES SURGERY; OUT EIGHT WEEKS

LSU sophomore quarterback **Matt Mauck** underwent surgery on Oct. 20 to repair a sprained ligament in the mid-foot area of his right foot. Mauck, who suffered the injury in a 36-7 win over Florida on Oct. 12, is expected to be out of action for eight weeks. The surgery was performed by LSU team doctors Brent Bankston and Larry Ferachi. Bankston said the surgery went extremely well and said the procedure involved placing two screws in Mauck's foot to stabilize the joint. Mauck started the first six games of the year for the Tigers, leading LSU to a 5-1 mark. He completed 63 of 130 passes for 782 yards, nine touchdowns and only two interceptions. He rushed for 175 yards and two TD's. Mauck had a streak of 88 consecutive passes without an interception.

TOEFIELD OUT FOR AT LEAST SIX WEEKS WITH FRACTURED LEFT ARM

LSU's all-conference running back **LaBrandon Toefield** will be out at least four more weeks after fracturing the radius in his left forearm in the Oct. 5 win over UL-Lafayette. LSU team doctor Brent Bankston performed the 45-minute surgery. "The fracture was relatively a clean break and it went back together very easily," Bankston said. Bankston said the surgery required the placing of a plate along with seven screws into Toefield's arm to stabilize the bone. Toefield will be in a cast for at least four weeks and will begin therapy after that. Toefield, from Independence, La., had played in five games this year and he ranked second on the squad with 323 yards rushing. He earned First-Team All-SEC honors last year after rushing for 992 yards and an SEC-record tying 19 TD's.

• All 11 starters on the defense are from the state of Louisiana.

• LSU has held six of its seven opponents to **FEWER THAN 300** total yards this year. It is the first time since 1976 that a Tiger defense has held seven consecutive opponents under 300 yards. Only Auburn has cracked the 300-yard plateau, posting 321.

• The Tigers allowed UL-Lafayette just 70 total yards, the fewest allowed by a Tiger defense **SINCE 1966**. Later in the year, offensive juggernaut Florida passed for only 163 yards and four interceptions against the stingy LSU pass defense.

• Opponents are converting a miniscule 26.7 percent of their third-down opportunities against the Tigers this year. At one point, LSU **STOPPED 24 STRAIGHT** third-down conversion attempts.

• LSU has forced a turnover in every game this season, including five games with more than one.

• Only eight of the 13 touchdowns given up by LSU have been on drives of more than 30 yards. The other five (27, 29, 2, 28, 22) came when the opposing offense had a short field following a shanked punt, a blocked punt, a fumble and two interceptions.

• The Tigers have not allowed a **100-YARD RUSHER** in 12 games, since Dwone Hicks of Middle Tennessee reached the mark last year. No SEC back has hit 100 in 13 games, since Brandon Holmes of Arkansas, who did so at the end of the 2000 season.

• Nearly 40 percent (187 of 492) of opponents offensive plays this year have gone for **NO GAIN OR NEGATIVE YARDAGE**.

• LSU has given up just five pass plays of more than 20 yards this season and **ONLY FOUR PASSING TOUCHDOWNS**.

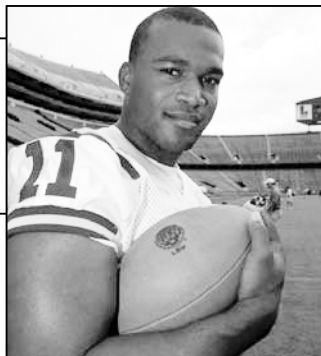

NOV. 9 IN LSU HISTORY

1996

With a berth to the SEC Championship Game on the line, No. 10 Alabama ran for 351 yards to beat No. 11 LSU, 26-0, and end an eight-game LSU win streak in Death Valley. The game marks the last time the Tigers were shutout.

1985

LSU kicker **Ronnie Lewis** misses a last-second field goal as the 15th-ranked Tigers and No. 20 Alabama played to a 14-14 deadlock in Tiger Stadium. The tie was the only time Alabama failed to win in Death Valley in 15 tries from 1971 until 1998.

RECENT MEMORIES VS. KENTUCKY

NOV. 1, 1997

Kevin Faulk rushed for 212 yards and a school-record five touchdowns as LSU scored 43 second-half points to beat Kentucky, 63-28, in Lexington. The 63 points are the most LSU has ever scored in an SEC contest. The victory was the 600th in the history of LSU football.

OCT. 17, 1998

Seth Hansen kicked a 33-yard field goal as time expired as Kentucky upset No. 21 LSU, 39-36. The Wildcats piled up 573 yards of total offense to overcome **Herb Tyler's** spectacular offensive performance. Tyler threw for 268 yards and two touchdowns and ran for 40 yards and three scores.

OCT. 14, 2000

LSU's defense forced four turnovers and **Josh Booty** threw three touchdown passes as the Tigers blanked Kentucky, 34-0. The game marked the only time in the Hal Mumme era that the Wildcats were shut out.

OCT. 13, 2001

Rohan Davey hit **Michael Clayton** in the endzone with 13 seconds remaining as LSU rallied to down Kentucky, 29-25. The Wildcats had trailed 22-10 in the third quarter before Jared Lorenzen led two touchdown drives to give the Big Blue the lead. Davey threw for a career-high 383 yards in the contest.

LAST MINUTE HEROICS LIFT LSU, 29-25

Rohan Davey fired a 6-yard touchdown pass to Michael Clayton with just 13 seconds remaining as LSU rallied for a dramatic 29-25 victory over Kentucky. Davey threw for a career-high 383 yards while Clayton caught a career-high nine passes for 105 yards and a pair of scores. LaBrandon Toefield piled up 129 yards on the ground. The Tigers built a 19-3 lead in the second quarter behind a 34-yard run by Toefield and a 9-yard strike from Davey to Clayton. Trailing 22-10 in the third quarter, Kentucky brought in back-up quarterback Jared Lorenzen, who rallied the Cats with back-to-back touchdown drives for a 25-22 lead.

- LSU began playing football in Tiger Stadium in 1924 and is currently in its 79th year in the venerable stadium on **SATURDAY NIGHT**.
- LSU has won **EIGHT STRAIGHT** games at home dating back to its homecoming victory over Middle Tennessee State last year. That is the longest home streak for the Tigers since winning eight straight from 1995-96.
- Under **Nick Saban**, the Tigers have posted a **16-3 HOME RECORD**, including a 4-1 mark against ranked opponents. Against conference foes, Saban is 8-2 in Death Valley. In home games at night, LSU is 13-2 since Saban took over.
- More than **85,000 FANS** have attended each of LSU’s last 17 home games. In that span, the Tigers have eclipsed the 90,000 mark 11 times, including a school-record 92,141 for last year’s Auburn contest, which LSU won 27-14.
- A **SCHOOL-RECORD** 63,017 season tickets were sold this year, not counting the more than 15,000 seats reserved for students. Last year, 62,600 season tickets were sold.
- Since national attendance figures began being kept in 1957, LSU has ranked in the top 20 all 45 seasons. The Tigers have been in the top 15 for 43 of the 45 years and in the top 10 on 37 occasions, including 32 straight from 1957-88. Fourteen times, LSU has ranked in the **TOP FIVE IN THE NATION**, including the last two.
- Since 1960, LSU owns a stellar **181-60-4** (.747) record in traditional Tiger Stadium night games. On the other hand, the Tigers are just 14-20-3 (.419) at home during the day in that span.

EARTHQUAKE GAME

October 6, 1988. Tommy Hodson connected with Eddie Fuller on 4-and-10 with 1:41 to play for the game-winning touchdown as LSU upset No. 4 Auburn. The play caused such a thunderous explosion from the crowd of 79,341 that the tremor caused by the vibrations measured on the seismograph across campus.

HALLOWEEN NIGHT

October 31, 1959. No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss, 3-0, late in the fourth quarter when Billy Cannon fielded a punt off the bounce at the 11-yard line. He raced 89 yards, careening off seven Rebel defenders, to paydirt to give the Tigers victory and all but clinch the 1959 Heisman Trophy.

TIGERS DOMINATE MIAMI (OHIO) 33-7

From the opening kickoff to the final horn, LSU dominated Miami (Ohio) in every phase of the game, posting a 33-7 victory over the RedHawks. Led by the running of **LaBrandon Toefield** and passing of **Matt Mauck**, LSU's balanced offensive attack compiled 422 yards (207 rushing, 215 passing). **John Corbello** tied a school-record with four field goals, including two in the first seven minutes that gave the Tigers a 6-0 lead. Mauck connected with **Michael Clayton** on an 8-yard scoring pass late in the first quarter to push the lead to 13-0. Miami pulled to within 16-7 with 50 seconds left in the half, but the Tigers responded with a 5-play, 71-yard drive, capped off by a Mauck-to-Clayton TD pass that covered 24 yards, giving LSU a 23-7 halftime lead. Auburn tacked on another score early in the fourth quarter before the Tigers scored their only points of the game on an 8-yard run by **Joseph Addai** midway through the final quarter. **Marcus Randall** led LSU with 74 yards rushing, while Addai added 44 yards and 1 TD on 10 carries. Randall connected on 9 of 20 passes for 79 yards and 4 interceptions for the Tigers. **Bradie James** led the defense with 14 tackles.
