Next Game

Arkansas will conclude the 2003 regular season with a 1:30 p.m. game in Baton Rouge against the third-ranked LSU Tigers.

The Razorbacks have won three of the last five meetings against LSU including last year's 21-20 victory that sent the Razorbacks to Atlanta for the SEC Championship Game. Arkansas has not won in Baton Rouge since 1993 when the Hogs posted a 42-24 win.

Noting the Razorbacks

♦ The Razorbacks have out-rushed opponents by an average of 100.5 yards per game this season. The Razorbacks are out-rushing SEC opponents by an 88.7 yards per game average.

♦ Arkansas is 9-7 when unranked and playing against a ranked opponent under Houston Nutt, including wins in its last three games.

♦ Matt Jones has scored 17 career rushing touchdowns including a 62-yard scamper vs. New Mexico State this season. Jones is averaging 27.0 yards per touchdown run in his career.

♦ Under Houston Nutt, the Razorbacks have 27 wins by 20 points or more including five wins by that margin this season.

♦ The Razorbacks are 7-0 when leading at halftime this season and 35-3 overall under Houston Nutt.

♦ Arkansas has 2,644 yards rushing this season which ranks as the 11th-best season total in team history. Arkansas needs 70 rushing yards to tie for 10th with the 1988 team.

♦ The LSU game will mark the eighth televised game for the Razorbacks this season. It is the third time since 1998 the Hogs have had at least eight games on TV.

♦ Split end George Wilson has caught a pass in 24 consecutive games. The last game Wilson did not have a reception was the 2002 season opener against Boise State.

♦ Since 1998, Arkansas is 16-9 in games decided by a touchdown or less including 6-4 in games decided by three points or less. The Razorbacks are 1-2 in 2003 in games decided by a touchdown or less and 1-0 in games decided by three or fewer points.

♦ Matt Jones needs 26 rushing yards to move into second place in the SEC career rushing yards for a quarterback. Jones has 1,859 yards and trails Don Smith of Mississippi State with 1,868 in third place and Phil Gargis of Auburn with 1,884 in second place. John Bond of Mississippi State is first with 2,280 yards rushing.

DID YOU KNOW

- ♦ OT Shawn Andrews' cousin Jonathan Cheatham was killed in Iraq during operation Iraqi Freedom and his brother, Derrick, is currently serving in Iraq and is a sergeant in the U.S. Army.
- ♦ Andrews' brother Stacy is an offensive lineman and an All-America track and field athlete at Ole Miss.
- ♦ CB Ahmad Carroll earned All-America honors in the 100m and 200m and is only the second Razorback to earn such honors in the 100m. Carroll is the first UA football player since Clyde Scott (1948) to earn points in the NCAA Outdoor meet.
- ♦ Carroll is the first UA trackster to take All-America honors in the 100 and 200 in the same year.
- ♦ FL Richard Smith earned All-America honors in the long jump and triple jump.

Last Game

The Razorbacks notched their fourth-straight win with a 52-6 victory over Mississippi State. The win concluded the Hogs' home schedule this season.

Cedric Cobbs went over the 1,000 yard rushing mark for the season with 150 yards against the Bulldogs. Cobbs is just the sixth different Razorback to eclipse the 1,000 yard rushing mark in a season.

Last Time vs. LSU

Drama was the order of the day when the Hogs and Tigers last met. Matt Jones found DeCori Birmingham in the back corner of the end zone with less than a minute left to tie the game at 20-20.

An excessive celebration penalty against Arkansas forced kicker David Carlton to attempt a 35-yard extra point. Carlton's kick was good and gave the Razorbacks a 21-20 win and berth in the SEC Championship Game.

Nutt in November

Houston Nutt has posted a 18-7 (.720) record in the month of November as the Razorbacks' head coach. Nutt was 2-2 in 1998, 1999 and 2000. In 2001, Nutt guided the Hogs to a 3-1 mark during the month. The 2002 Razorbacks were a perfect 5-0 during November en route to winning the SEC Western Division title. Arkansas is 3-0 thus far in 2003.

Sweet November

The Razorbacks have won 12 of their last 13 games in the month of November, including the last nine straight. Arkansas' last loss in the month came against LSU on Nov. 23, 2001, in Baton Rouge. Arkansas has not lost a home game in November since a 38-24 setback against Ole Miss on Nov. 4, 2000.

Andrews Named Lombardi Finalist

Junior offensive tackle Shawn Andrews is one of four finalists for the 34th Lombardi Award. Andrews is joined on the list by UCLA's David Ball, Oklahoma's Tommie Harris and Georgia's David Pollack. The winner will be announced on Dec. 10, in Houston. Andrews is attempting to become the first Razorback to win the award.

Battle for the Boot

For the eighth time since its inception, Arkansas and LSU will be playing for "The Golden Boot," a trophy shaped like the two states combined. The trophy was introduced into the series prior to the 1996 game. It is believed to be the heaviest trophy awarded in a college football rivalry. It weighs approximately 175 pounds.

LSU won the trophy in its first two years (1996, 1997) before Arkansas reclaimed it in 1998. LSU won the trophy in 1999. The Razorbacks won the trophy in 2000 with a 14-3 win in Little Rock before the Tigers earned it back last season with a 41-38 victory at Baton Rouge. The Hogs took the trophy back in 2002 with a 21-20 win over LSU in Little Rock.

In each of the last five meetings, the trophy has changed hands. LSU is the only school to defend the trophy. The Tigers won it in back-to-back tries in 1996 and 1997.

Louisiana Razorbacks

The Razorbacks have five players on the roster who hail from the state of Louisiana, including a pair of starters. Safety Tony Bua and flanker Richard Smith both call the Bayou State home. Bua is from River Ridge, while Smith is from Shreveport. Reggie Banks is also from Shreveport. Stephen Parker hails from Mandeville. Lucas Jackson calls West Monroe home.

High Rollers

For just the third time in team history the Razorbacks have a 1,500-yard passer and a 1,000-yard rusher in the same season. QB Matt Jones has thrown for 1,768 yards this season, while TB Cedric Cobbs has 1,010 yards rushing. It marks the second straight year the Razorbacks have accomplished the feat as Jones threw for 1,592 yards and Fred Talley ran for 1,119 yards in 2002. The only other duo to hit the 1,500-1,000 mark was QB Barry Lunney Jr. who threw for 2,181 yards and TB Madre Hill who rushed for 1,387 yards in 1995.

On Target

In the month of November, no quarterback in the SEC has been in a groove more than Matt Jones. Since the first of the month, Jones has completed 46-of-65 passes for a 70.7 completion percentage. That mark is the best in the league, with LSU's Matt Mauck just behind Jones in second having completed 68.2 percent of his passes (58-of-85). Jones has thrown for 734 yards in that stretch, and a league-best nine touchdowns and no interceptions. Jones is the only quarterback in the Southeastern Conference not to have thrown an interception in the month of November.

Upset Alert

A national ranking has not been a favorable sign in the UA-LSU series in recent history. The last time a ranked team won in the series was 1998 when the 13th-ranked Hogs posted a 41-14 victory in Little Rock. In the last four games the unranked team has upset the ranked team. The Tigers were ranked 17th in 2002, but lost in the final minute 21-20 in Little Rock. In 2001, the Razorbacks entered Tiger Stadium with a No. 24 national ranking, but lost 41-38 to the Tigers. In 2000, the 24th-ranked Tigers dropped a 14-3 decision in Little Rock. It was the 17th-ranked Razorbacks who were toppled in the 1999 meeting as the Tigers posted a 35-10 victory in Baton Rouge.

Arkansas vs. No. 3

The Razorbacks have played 11 games against teams holding the No. 3 ranking in the AP poll and have posted a 1-10 record in those games. The only win was a 28-24 victory over the third-ranked Tennessee Volunteers in 1999 in Fayetteville.

A Little More Jones

In the last four games Matt Jones has chewed up yardage like a rolling ball of butcher knives. Jones has accounted for 51 percent of Arkansas' total offensive yardage in that stretch, rolling up 1,057 of the Hogs' 2,077 yards. Jones had 372 of the team's 605 (61 percent) yards in the seven overtime win vs. Kentucky. Jones accounted for just 38 percent of the yardage against South Carolina (154-of-396), but amassed 271 of the Hogs' 500 yards (54 percent) against New Mexico State. Jones has accounted for 13 (four rushing, nine passing) of Arkansas' 25 touchdowns in those four games.

Leading the Pack

Of the 100 players listed in the NCAA's total offense leaders, QB Matt Jones leads the group with an 8.47 yards per play average. Jones is just ahead of Oklahoma QB Jason White who is averaging 8.45 yards per play this season. Should it hold, Jones' average would shatter the current Arkansas record of yards per play in a season of 7.34 by Jack Robbins in 1935.

The 700 Club

Matt Jones is 47 yards shy of reaching 700 rushing yards this season. Should Jones hit that mark, it would be the first time since 1989 the Razorbacks had a pair of backs rush for at least 700 yards in a season. Cedric Cobbs has already eclipsed the mark with 1,010 rushing yards this season. Barry Foster (833 yards) and James Rouse (869 yards) accomplished the feat that year.

Finding the End Zone

Matt Jones has accounted for 23 touchdowns this season (seven rushing, 16 passing) which ties him for the second-most in a single season in UA history. Jones is tied with Quinn Grovey who had 23 TDs in 1990. Jones is four scores shy of tying the record of 27 set by Clint Stoerner in 1998.

Tough Schedule

Based on the cumulative record's of the their 2003 opponents, the Razorbacks have the 17th toughest schedule in the nation. The Hogs' foes have an overall record of 73-45 for a .574 winning percentage. Arkansas is one of three SEC teams in the national top 20. Alabama's schedule is rated first, while Auburn comes in at 20th.

Blanked

Since 1998 the Razorbacks are tied for the most shutouts in the SEC with five. The Razorbacks posted one shutout in 1998, 1999 and 2000 and a pair of shutouts during the 2002 season. Tennessee, LSU and Auburn have each posted five shutouts since 1998.

Bua Earns Defensive POW

Senior safety Tony Bua was named the SEC's Defensive Player of the Week following his 19-tackle performance against South Carolina last week. Bua registered 12 solo stops and three quarterback hurries against the Gamecocks. Bua is the third Razorback to earn defensive POW honors. Arrian Dixon took the award following the Hogs' win over Kentucky, while Caleb Miller did the same following the win over Texas.

Long Distance (Updated 11-24-03)

Since joining the Razorback lineup midway through 2001 Matt Jones has provided plenty of excitement. As a runner, Jones has scored 17 touchdowns on the ground including a 62-yard scamper vs. New Mexico State this season. Jones is averaging 27.0 yards per touchdown run in his career. Through the air, Jones has 36 career scores for an average of 19.4 yards per TD. Combined, the Fort Smith, Ark., product is averaging 21.6 yards per touchdown since 2001.

Scoring Streak (Updated 11-24-03)

The Razorbacks have scored in 97 consecutive games, the second-longest streak in team history. Arkansas has not been shutout since a 28-0 loss to LSU in Baton Rouge on Nov. 18, 1995. The longest scoring streak in Razorback history is 125 games set from Sept. 15, 1973 to Nov. 19, 1983. The Hogs were shutout by Southern Cal, 17-0, in the season opener on Sept. 15, 1973 and went 125 games before being blanked by SMU, 17-0, on Nov. 19, 1983.

Hitting' 20 (Updated 11-24-03)

In Houston Nutt's six seasons at Arkansas, the Razorbacks have scored 20 points or more in a game 55 times and have posted a 43-12 record in those games. Arkansas went 9-1 in 2002 when hitting the 20-point mark. The Hogs had a 9-3 mark in Nutt's first year in 1998 and followed that with a 7-2 record in 1999. Arkansas went 5-3 in 2000 and 5-2 the following year in 2001.

Always in the Lineup (Updated 11-24-03)

A quartet of Razorbacks have double-digit consecutive start streaks. Linebacker Caleb Miller owns the longest current streak on the team at 38 games after starting every contest the last two seasons. Tony Bua is a close second with 34 straight starts. Offensive tackle Bo Lacy has started 26 consecutive games.

Arkansas in Fayetteville, Little Rock (Updated 11-24-03)

With two home stadiums, the Razorbacks have proven to be tough on both home fronts. Arkansas holds a 135-66-2 (.670) mark at Donald W. Reynolds Razorback Stadium including a 17-7 (.708) record under Houston Nutt. At War Memorial Stadium in Little Rock, the Hogs are 134-50-2 (.726) and are unbeaten at 16-0 under Nutt.

Dixon Earns SEC POW

Junior defensive tackle Arrion Dixon was named the SEC Player of the Week following Arkansas' 71-63 win over Kentucky. Dixon recorded a career-best 15 tackles including three tackles for loss (-11) and a sack (-6). Dixon also had two quarterback hurries helped cause a fumble on the game's final play to preserve the win against the Wildcats.

Cobbs Added To Doak Walker List

Senior tailback Cedric Cobbs has been included as a Doak Walker candidate as a mid-season supplemental addition. The list will be paired down to eight finalists on Nov. 19. Cobbs has rushed for a team-high 728 yards rushing and leads the SEC with a 121.3 yards per game average. Cobbs has rushed for at least 100 yards in four games this season.

200 Yards And A Cloud of Dust (Updated 11-16-03)

With a 322-yard rushing performance against Mississippi State, Arkansas has cracked the 200-yard barrier 27 times in Houston Nutt's 73 games (37 percent) as head coach. Since 2001, the Razorbacks have rushed for 200+ yards 21 times in 36 contests (58 percent) including 10 times in 2002. The Hogs hit the 200-yard mark four times in 2001. The Razorbacks are 23-3 in those 26 games.

Andrews, Cobbs Named to Midseason All-America Team

Arkansas junior offensive tackle Shawn Andrews and senior tailback Cedric Cobbs were named to SI.com's Midseason All-America Team. The squad, selected by SI.com's college football writers, recognizes players that have distinguished themselves in the first half of the college football season. Arkansas joined Georgia, Miami, Nebraska and Oklahoma as the only teams with multiple players on the All-America list.

Hurricane on the Web

Offensive tackle Shawn "Hurricane" Andrews' has taken the World Wide Web by storm with the launch of a new website www.shawnandrews.net. The site is designed to keep sportswriters, broadcasters and college football fans across the nation updated on the Razorbacks' Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award candidate. shawnandrews.net includes biographical information, fun facts about Shawn and a photo gallery. It also tracks Andrews' game-by-game performances and the Razorback's 2003 schedule and results.

Jones Named USA Today.com POW

Matt Jones was named national player of the week by USA Today.com following Arkansas' 38-28 victory over the Texas Longhorns. Jones, a junior, threw for 139 yards and one touchdown on 8-of-16 passing, and ran for 102 yards and another score on 12 carries. Jones recorded the fourth 100-yard rushing game of his career, and he ran and threw for a touchdown in the same game for the eighth time in his career.

Cobbs Takes National Honor

Following his 198-yard rushing performance against Alabama, tailback Cedric Cobbs was named the *The Sporting News* National Player of the Week. Cobbs had 36 carries, including one for a five-yard touchdown, as the Razorbacks posted a 34-31 double-overtime win over the Crimson Tide.

Arkansas National Team of the Week

The American Football Writer's Association of America named the Razorbacks it's national team of the week following their 38-28 victory over No. 5 Texas in Austin. The honor is decided by a 16-member panel of the organization's Grantland Rice Super 16 poll. The win ended Texas' 20-game home winning streak and was the third straight over the Longhorns.

In Little Rock Under Houston Nutt

Since 1998 the Razorbacks have posted a perfect 16-0 mark in games played in Little Rock, including a 28-6 victory over South Carolina this season. The Hogs have not lost in the state capital since Tennessee claimed a 33-20 win on Nov. 15, 1997.

Houston Nutt vs. Ranked Teams (Updated 11-24-03)

Since becoming the Razorbacks head coach in 1998, Houston Nutt has posted an 11-10 mark against nationally ranked teams. The Razorbacks have won five of their last eight games against ranked opponents with two of those wins against top 10 teams (No. 6 Texas, 2003 and No. 9 South Carolina, 2001). Nutt is 2-2 against non-conference ranked foes. The Razorbacks lost to No. 15 Michigan, 45-31, in the 1999 Citrus Bowl, beat No. 14 Texas, 27-6, in the 2000 Cotton Bowl, lost to No. 10 Oklahoma, 10-3, in the 2002 Cotton Bowl and beat No. 6 Texas, 38-28, in Austin in 2003.

Hogs On Jim Thorpe Watch List

Arkansas defensive backs Lawrence Richardson and Ahmad Carroll are on the 2003 Jim Thorpe Award watch list. The award is presented to the nation's best defensive back. Richardson is the active career SEC leader in interceptions with seven and in pass deflections with 33. Carroll enters

2003 picked as one of the five best cover-corners in the nation by ESPN's Kirk Herbstreit.

Doughty Center of Attention

After only one season as a starter (2002), senior Dan Doughty was placed on the Rimington (nation's top center) watch list. The Wynne, Ark., native started 12 games in 2002 after appearing in only one game the previous two years. Doughty had 36 knockdown blocks last season and graded out at 80 percent or higher nine times.

Hogging The Altar

Three Razorback seniors took advantage of the summer break to make time for a trip to the altar. Offensive guard Mark Bokermann (Leah), wide receiver Tom Crowder (Kristin) and offensive guard Jerry Reith (Amy) all said "I Do" in the offseason. They join seniors Steven Harris (Winter) and Scott Davenport (Sarah) to make six Razorbacks that have walked down the aisle prior to completing their playing careers. Justin Scott added his name to the list of married Razorbacks when he married his fiancée, Donnisha, the week of the Alabama game (Sept. 21).

Oh Brother (In-Law) Where Art Thou?

Senior offensive guard Jerry Reith thought he might have the ideal woman for friend and teammate Mark Bokermann. It just so happened Jerry's choice was his sister, Leah. Jerry set up a meeting between the two and the couple began dating. Bokermann and Leah were married last June. Reith and Bokermann are also starters on the Hogs' o-line.

Going for Six

The Razorbacks enter the 2003 season looking to make it six-for-six in bowl appearances under head coach Houston Nutt. Arkansas is one of only four SEC schools to earn a bowl bid each of the past five seasons and the only SEC Western Division team to earn five straight bowl trips. Lou Holtz and Ken Hatfield each led the Razorbacks to bowl games in their first six seasons as head. Holtz took the Hogs bowling from 1977-1982, while Hatfield accomplished the feat from 1984-1989.

UA Players Now Coaches

Four current Arkansas coaches also played collegiately for the Razorbacks. Head coach Houston Nutt was a quarterback for Frank Broyles and then Lou Holtz from 1976-77 before transferring to Oklahoma State. Running backs coach Danny Nutt transferred in as a senior and helped lead the Hogs to the 1984 Liberty Bowl. James Shibest, who coaches receivers and specialists, earned All-Southwest Conference honors as a receiver for the Razorbacks in 1984 and 1986. His career receiving yardage of 1,920 ranks third all-time in the UA record books. Louis Campbell, director of football operations, was a defensive back for Arkansas from 1970-72 and is tied for third in career interceptions with 12.

MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

♦ With six interceptions vs. Mississippi State, the Razorbacks have now forced at least one turnover in 35 consecutive regular season games. The last regular season game the Hogs failed to get an interception or fumble was on Nov. 11, 2000, against Tennessee.

♦ In those 35 games, the Razorbacks have 18 games with at least one interception and fumble. Arkansas also has 10 games with at least two interceptions and six games with at least three picks. The Hogs also have seven games with at least two fumble recoveries, two games with three recovered fumbles and one game with four recoveries.

♦ The Razorbacks have allowed only 13 tailbacks to net 100 yards rushing in a game in the last 38 contests. Since 2002, the Hogs have had only seven opposing players rush for 100 yards or better.

♦ Following Arkansas' 38-28 win over then No. 6 Texas, the Razorbacks jumped to a national ranking of 14th after not being listed in the polls. No team that was unranked one week has ever made a higher debut the next week than Arkansas' No. 14 since the AP expanded from 20 to 25 teams in 1989.

♦ Cedric Cobbs has nine career 100-yard rushing games which is tied for the fifth most in Arkansas history along with Bill Burnett and Oscar Malone.

♦ Cedric Cobbs is averaging 17.8 yards per TD run this season.

♦ Arkansas is 7-3 in its last 10 road games dating back to 2001.

♦ The Razorbacks have 15 touchdowns on plays of 20 yards or more this season.

♦ The Razorbacks have the best winning percentage in overtime games of any SEC team. Arkansas is 5-1 in OT games for an .833 percentage. The Hogs are tied for the most wins with Ole Miss (5-3).

♦ Arkansas has scored 90 points off opponent turnovers (29).

♦ Arkansas is second in the SEC in fourth-quarter scoring with a +31 margin.

♦ The Razorbacks forced opponents into 53 three-and-out drives this season, fourth-most in the SEC.

OUTLOOK: He enters his junior season as a consensus preseason All-America selection and a leading candidate for both the Outland and Lombardi Awards. **He is one of four finalists for the Lombardi Award including the only offensive player to make the finalist round.** He is also attempting to become the sixth two-time All-America selection at Arkansas and the first since Billy Ray Smith Jr. (1981-82). Smith was also the last Razorback to be a finalist for the Lombardi Award. He has already been named to the SI.com Midseason All-American Team. In the 35 games he has started as a Razorback, Arkansas has boasted a total of 23 100-yard rushing efforts including nine such efforts in 11 games this season. **He has logged six snaps as part of the Hogs' short-yardage "Refrigerator" package.** Arkansas has scored touchdowns on four plays run with Andrews in the backfield on the goal line including a pair of rushing touchdowns on three career carries. He has registered a team-leading 81 knockdown blocks this season. **Arkansas leads the SEC in fewest sacks allowed (11) and Andrews has allowed only one sack this season.**

2003: He made his 24th career start in the season opener vs. Tulsa and earned nine knockdown blocks. He tallied a 94 percent grade including 93 percent on running plays and 95 percent in passing situations. He help pave the way for two 100-yard rushers and a UA upset of No. 5 Texas (38-28). He posted a 93 percent grade (94 run - 91 pass) and earned eight knockdown blocks. He registered six knockdown blocks and a grade of 90 percent against North Texas. He turned in the best performance of his Razorback career with a 99 percent grade and a school-record 21 knockdown blocks on 91 snaps in Arkansas' 34-31 double-overtime win over Alabama. Twice in the game he recorded two knockdown blocks on the same play. He led the way for 491 yards of total offense including 289 yards rushing. He scored a perfect 100 percent in passing situations. In addition, he saw his first action as part of the "Refrigerator" offensive package in which he lines up at fullback. He helped clear the way for a third-quarter touchdown. He also lined up on the defensive line on a game-winning field goal attempt by Alabama in the first overtime. He penetrated into the backfield on the missed field goal attempt. He recorded an 88-percent mark on rushing plays and a 94 percent grade in passing situations against Auburn. He earned an overall grade of 91 percent and tallied seven knockdowns against the Tigers. He posted an overall grade of 93 percent and earned eight knockdowns in the Hogs' 33-28 loss to Florida. He graded

out at 88 percent in the running game and 98 percent in passing situations. He tallied an 85 percent grade in pass blocking and earned five knockdown blocks against Ole Miss. He earned a team-high nine knockdowns while logging all 99 offensive snaps in Arkansas' 71-63 seven-overtime win over Kentucky. He graded out at 91 percent in the running and 90 percent in the passing game against the Wildcats. The Razorbacks earned 605 yards in total offense including boasting two 100-yard rushers in the win. He posted a 95 percent grade and earned five knockdown blocks in the Hogs' 28-6 win over South Carolina. He tallied a perfect 100 percent mark in pass blocking and a 90 percent grade in run blocking. He lined up at fullback for one play against the Gamecocks as part of the "Refrigerator" package. Arkansas scored on a one-yard touchdown pass on the play. **He made school history when he became the first UA offensive lineman to carry the ball on a designed play against New Mexico State.** He took the handoff from the tailback position on consecutive plays near the goal line. He gained a yard on his first carry and then bullied his way into the end zone on a one-yard touchdown carry in his second attempt. In addition, he graded out at 91.5 percent (88 run, 95 pass) in the Hogs' 48-20 win over the Aggies. For the second straight game, he scored a rushing touchdown when he carried it one yard to paydirt in a 52-6 win over Mississippi State. It was his second career rushing touchdown and his second in as many weeks. He earned a 93.5 percent grade and three knockdowns against the Bulldogs. He carded a 92 percent grade in the running game and a 95 percent score in passing situations against MSU.

OUTLOOK: The All-SEC outside linebacker made the switch to free safety for his senior season. Bua moved to the secondary with the departure of UA All-American free safety Ken Hamlin to the NFL (Seattle Seahawks). He was named to the Butkus Award Watch List for the nation's most outstanding linebacker, but is playing his senior season at his new position. He is the SEC's active career tackle leader and the UA career leader with 391 stops. **He passed former Razorback and current Seattle Seahawks' free safety Ken Hamlin (381) for the UA career tackle record with three tackles against New Mexico State.** Bua owns 19 double-digit tackle games in his career including five such outings this season. He leads the team this season with 109 tackles and is second on the team with two interceptions.

2003: He led the Hogs with nine tackles, including five solo stops, in the season-opening win over Tulsa. He earned eight tackles in a 38-28 win over No. 5 Texas. Five of his eight stops were of the solo variety. He paced the Razorbacks in tackles for the second time this season with 10 stops in a win over North Texas. With his 10 tackles, he eclipsed the 300-tackle career mark at Arkansas. He recorded his second-straight double-digit tackle effort with 11 stops, including one tackle for loss (-1), in a 34-31 double-overtime win at Alabama. In addition to his tackle total, he earned a pass deflection, quarterback hurry and recovered a fumble. His fumble recovery set up a UA touchdown that cut the Crimson Tide's lead to seven points in the fourth quarter. For the third-straight game, he earned double-digit tackles with 11 stops against Auburn. He snared his first interception of the season to stop a Tigers' drive inside the 10-yard line. He also made one tackle for loss (-1). He racked up five tackles, including a sack (-12), in the Hogs' 33-28 loss to Florida. His sack for a loss of 12 yards marked the largest loss recorded in his career. For the second straight week, he intercepted a pass inside the Hogs' 10-yard line to stop an opponent's prospective scoring drive. He racked up nine tackles, including six solo stops, and a pass broken up against Ole Miss. He earned 15 tackles a pass deflection and a fumble recovery in the Razorbacks' 71-63 seven-overtime win at Kentucky. With his 15 tackles, he moved passed Ronnie Caveness (357) into third on the UA career tackle chart. His fumble recovery preserved the UA victory on the

game's final play when UK's Jared Lorenzen fumbled on fourth down in the seventh overtime. He racked up a team-high 19 tackles, including 12 solo stops, in the Razorbacks' 28-6 win against South Carolina earning him SEC Defensive Player of the Week honors. His total tied for the 13th-best single game total in UA history and second only in his career to his 20-tackle effort against Georgia in 2001. With his effort, he bypassed Cliff Powell (367) for second on the UA career tackle list. He also tied a career-high three quarterback hurries. He became the UA career tackle leader with three tackles against New Mexico State. He passed former Razorback free safety Ken Hamlin (381) with his third stop of the day and his 382nd of his career late in the first half against the Aggies. He finished the day with a season-low three tackles. He tallied nine tackles, including five solo stops, and a pass deflection in the Razorbacks' 52-6 win over Mississippi State.

OUTLOOK: One of two UA cornerbacks (Richardson) on the Jim Thorpe Award watch list, he has already been named as one of the five best cover corners in the nation by ESPN's Kirk Herbstreit. Last spring, he became the first UA football player since Clyde Scott (1948) to score at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships. He earned All-America honors in both the 100 and 200 meters in helping Coach John McDonnell and the Hogs to their 38th national championship. He became the first athlete to earn All-America honors in both the 100 and 200 in the same meet in UA history. He leads the team with three interceptions.

OUTLOOK: With his stellar early season performances, he has vaulted his way back on the national scene. He has already won two SEC Offensive Player of the Week honors, *The Sporting News* National Player of the Week and has been named to SI.com's First Team Midseason All-America team. He is the leading active career rusher in the SEC, he has amassed 2,708 career rushing yards including 1,010 this season. He also ranks second among active SEC players in career all-purpose yardage (3,340). He is third in the league in career touchdowns (26) and is sixth in scoring (156). He ranks fourth on the UA career rushing yards (2,708) and is tied for sixth in rushing touchdowns (24). He owns nine career 100-yard rushing games, tied for fourth in UA history,

including five games this season. He became the first Razorback to earn 100-yards or more rushing in the first four games of the season since Jerry Eckwood tallied 100-yards in the first five games of the 1975 season. He became the sixth Razorback to eclipse the 1,000 yard rushing mark in a season when he tallied 150 yards against Mississippi State.

2003: He is third in the SEC and ranks 23rd in the nation in rushing with an average of 101.0 yards per game. He earned the starting nod at tailback for the fourth straight season. He tallied his fifth career 100-yard rushing game with 145 yards and a touchdown on 12 carries against Tulsa. For his efforts, he was named SEC Offensive Player of the Week. His 145-yard performance was the seventh-best season-opening total in school history and the best since Oscar Malone had 151 yards in the 1994 opener vs. SMU. He also accomplished the rare feat of scoring a rushing TD in five-straight season openers (1999-03). He earned a medical hardship after an injury in 2000 giving him another year of eligibility. He raced 58 yards for the Hogs' first score of the season. It was the longest run of his Razorback career. He rushed 20 times for 119 yards and a touchdown in a 38-28 win over No. 5 Texas at Austin. It marked the first time in his standout career that he had earned 100 yards in consecutive games. He scored on a 46-yard run and averaged 5.8 yards per carry against the Longhorns. The two longest runs of his career (56 - Tulsa, 46 - Texas) have come in the first two games of his senior season. He made it three 100-yard rushing games in a row with 104 yards on 20 carries against North Texas. He averaged 5.2 yards per carry and scored two touchdowns against the Mean Green. His 66 first quarter rushing yards against UNT put him over 2,000 rushing yards for his career. He is just the 10th Razorback to eclipse that mark. He captured his second SEC Offensive Player of the Week award in leading the Hogs to a 34-31 double-overtime win at Alabama. He rushed for a career best 198 yards and touchdown on a career high 36 carries. His 198 yards was the 10th-best rushing day in UA history. He earned 64 of his yards in the fourth quarter and in overtime play. He carried the ball on seven of the Razorbacks' 11 plays in overtime including five of the final six snaps to set up the game-winning field goal. He averaged 5.5 yards per carry against the Crimson Tide including five runs of 10+ yards. He also snared a pass for a five-yard gain in the victory. He netted 78 yards on 16 carries against Auburn. He had a long run of 39 against the Tigers. The carry actually went for 68 yards, but a holding penalty made it a 39-yard gain. He moved past Madre Hill (2,407) on the UA career rushing chart after earning 88 yards on 14 carries against Florida. He scored the first touchdown of the day on a seven-yard run. He also snared two catches for 15 yards against the Gators. It was the third time in his career he has multiple catches in a contest. Ironically, the Hogs are 0-3 in those games. He left the game with five minutes to go in the second quarter with a strained right hamstring and did not return. He did not make the trip to Ole Miss while recovering from his strained right hamstring. He returned to action at tailback in the Hogs' 71-63 seven-overtime win at Kentucky. He entered the game at 12:35 of the second quarter against the Wildcats. He rushed nine times for 46 yards with a long run of 17 yards. He averaged 5.1 yards a carry against Kentucky. He logged a team-high 15 carries for 51 yards in the Hogs' 28-6 win over South Carolina. He also made a catch for three yards against the Gamecocks. With his 15 carries against USC, he became only the seventh Razorback to rack up more than 500 rushing attempts in his career. He earned the start at tailback and toted the ball seven times for 35 yards in a non-conference win over New Mexico State. He averaged 5.0 yards per carry including a long run of 14 yards. OUTLOOK: One of the most versatile and exciting quarterbacks in college football, he is 13-8 as a starter at Arkansas. He became only the second QB (Clint Stoerner) under Houston Nutt at Arkansas to earn the opening day start in back-to-back seasons. He also has seen time at wide receiver for the Razorbacks. He is on target to shatter the UA career total offense yards per play average. In his career, he is averaging 7.33 yards per attempt. Quinn Grovey holds the record with an average of 6.38 yard average. **This season he is averaging 8.47 yards per play. That aver-**

age is the best in the nation of those players ranking in the top 100 in total offense. Oklahoma quarterback Jason White is second with an average of 8.45 yards per play. He also leads the SEC and ranks 12th in the nation in passing efficiency (153.6). Against New Mexico State, he passed Grovey to become the UA career rushing leader among quarterbacks. His 1,859 career rushing yards also ranks 15th on the overall school record list. He ranks fourth among active SEC players with 1,859 career rushing yards. He rates fourth all-time among SEC quarterbacks with the same total. He needs only 26 more yards to jump all the way to second on the SEC quarterbacks' career rushing chart. Former Mississippi State signal caller John Bond (2,280) holds the SEC record. Jones has six career 100-yard rushing games. He also ranks fifth among active SEC quarterbacks with 36 career touchdown passes. The Hogs are 17-7 in games in which he doesn't suffer an interception including a 7-1 mark this season. Arkansas is 5-6 when he throws at least one pick. With the seven-overtime win over Kentucky, he can now claim to be the winning quarterback in the two longest games in NCAA history (2001 - Ole Miss- 7 OT). He has come off the bench in the last three games after starting at quarterback in six of the Hogs' first seven contests. **In the last four games, he has completed 46 passes in 65 attempts (70.8) for nine touchdowns and no interceptions. He has also rushed for 323 yards and four touchdowns on 31 attempts including two 100+ yard rushing efforts.**

2003: He completed six of 10 passes for 72 yards and a touchdown and rushed once for 53 yards and a score in the Hogs' win over Tulsa. The 53-yard run was the fifth-longest of his career. He earned USA Today.com National Player of the Week honors after engineering a 38-28 upset win at No. 5 Texas. He rushed 12 times for 102 yards and a touchdown. He scored on a three-yard run and also broke loose on a 60-yard dash. He completed eight of 16 passes against the Longhorns for 139 yards and a touchdown. He hit George Wilson on an 18-yard pass for a score. He also hooked up with Wilson on a 54-yard pass on third and 30 from the Hogs' own three-yard line. For his career, he is averaging 26.0 yards per rushing score and 23.0 yards per passing touchdown. It was the second time this season and the eighth time in his career that Jones has passed for and rushed for at least one TD in a game. The Hogs are 6-2 in those games. He started, but saw limited time in Arkansas' 31-7 win over North Texas. He completed six of eight passes for 67 yards and a touchdown against the Mean Green. He hit George Wilson for a 26-yard score in the second quarter. He rushed only once for four yards against UNT. He helped rally Arkansas from a 21-point second-half deficit to top Alabama 34-31 in double overtime at Tuscaloosa, Ala. He completed 11 of 18 passes including a three-yard touchdown toss to Richard Smith with 27 seconds left in regulation to send the game into overtime. He suffered his first two interceptions of the year against the Crimson Tide. He rushed nine times for 37 yards and a touchdown. He scored a TD on the Hogs' first offensive possession of the day when he scrambled 39 yards down the sideline to paydirt. He completed 13 of 28 passes for 168 yards and rushed for 59 yards on 12 carries in a 10-3 loss to Auburn. His 28 pass attempts were a career high. He completed a 33-yard pass to Chris Baker and he scrambled 78 yards for a rushing touchdown that was negated by a holding penalty. The Auburn game marked the first time he hadn't earned at least one touchdown rushing or passing since the SEC Championship Game against Georgia last season. He tallied career highs in pass attempts (30), completions (20) and passing yardage (299) and tied a career high with three touchdown passes in a 33-28 loss to Florida. He also suffered two interceptions against the Gators. His 299-yard passing total ranks as the 10th-best single game passing total in UA history. His 20 completions ranked ninth on the school record list.

Of his 299 yards passing, 140 yards came in the final nine minutes of the game against the Gators. All three touchdown passes also came in the final stanza. He rushed for 57 yards on six carries against Florida. He also made a tackle vs. the Gators. He completed 12 of 29 passes for 140 yards in a 19-7 loss to Ole Miss. He also suffered an interception. He rushed 10 times for 18 yards against the Rebels. He set a UA record with 372 yards of total offense in leading Arkansas to a 71-63 seven-overtime win over Kentucky. He broke the mark of Clint Stoerner (369 vs. LSU - 1997) by earning 260 yards passing and 112 yards rushing against the Wildcats. He completed 16 of 25 passes for 260 yards and three touchdowns. He three touchdowns were a career high and tied for the second-most in UA history. He also rushed for 112 yards and a touchdown on 15 carries. He averaged 7.5 yards per carry against Kentucky. His total of four touchdowns tied for the third-most in UA history. He tallied 76 yards passing and 24 yards rushing including a touchdown rushing and passing in the seven overtime periods. In perhaps his most efficient performance of his career, he completed 11 of 14 passes for 148 yards and three touchdowns in the Hogs' 28-6 win over South Carolina. He tied a career high and tied for fifth on the UA single game touchdown pass list with three scores. He connected on touchdown passes of one, nine and 36 yards to tie Barry Lunney Jr. for second on the UA career TD list with 33. He utilized six different receivers on his 11 completions including two wide receivers, two tight ends and two running backs. His .786 completion percentage tied for fifth on the UA single game record list. He also rushed three times for six yards against the Gamecocks. He did not start at quarterback or wide receiver against USC breaking a string of 23 consecutive starting nods. He rushed for a career high 132 yards and three touchdowns on only seven carries in the Razorbacks' 48-20 win over New Mexico State. He averaged an astonishing 18.9 yards per carry vs. the Aggies. He scored on touchdown runs of 8, 21 and 62 yards with all of them coming in the third quarter. His three touchdowns rushing marked the first time by a Razorback since Cedric Cobbs in 2001. On his 62-yard touchdown run, he eclipsed Quinn Grovey (1,746) as the top career rushing quarterback in UA history. In addition, he completed eight of 10 passes for 139 yards and a touchdown. His scoring toss was a 25-yard effort to Richard Smith that vaulted him into second on the UA career touchdown pass chart. Combined rushing and passing, he averaged 15.9 yards per play in total offense against NMSU. He completed 11 of 16 passes for 187 yards and two touchdowns in the Hogs' 52-6 win over Mississippi State. It was the fourth-straight game in which he did not throw an interception. He connected on touchdown passes of 12 and 25 yards and also hit on a 55-yard gain to George Wilson. He racked up 73 yards on the ground on six carries including a long run of 33 yards.

He carried three times for two yards and a touchdown against Ole Miss. He earned his second touchdown of the season on a one-yard run vs. the Rebels. He carried the ball twice for three yards and a pair of touchdowns in the Razorback's 71-63 win at Kentucky. He crossed the goal line on a one-yard run in the first overtime and scored on a two-yard run in the sixth overtime period. He toted the ball eight times for 41 yards in a win over South Carolina. He averaged 5.1 yards per carry against the Gamecocks including a long run of 12 yards. Against New Mexico State, he earned 37 yards on three carries for a 12.3 yards per rush average. He broke loose to record the longest rush of the season and the third-longest in his career on a 31-yard run. He also tallied a season-high 27 yards receiving on two catches including a 16-yard gain. He carried the ball five times for 18 yards and snared 21 receptions for 21 yards in the Razorbacks' 52-6 win over Mississippi State.

2003: He made his sixth career start against the Golden Hurricane at left guard. He earned a grade of 90 percent in both the running and passing games and recorded four knockdown blocks. He played all 77 offensive snaps in the Hogs' 38-28 win over No. 5 Texas at Austin. He posted a perfect 100 percent grade in pass protection and an 80-percent grade on running plays. He also recorded two knockdowns against the Longhorns. He posted a career high six knockdown blocks against North Texas. For only the second time in the last 21 games, he failed to make a catch against North Texas. He made three catches for 37 yards and a touchdown in Arkansas' 34-31 double-overtime road win at Alabama. He pulled down a three-yard TD pass from Matt Jones with 27 seconds remaining in regulation to (with the PAT) send the game into overtime. He also snared an 18-yard catch against the Crimson Tide.
