LSU Tigers (2-2) vs. #11 Tennessee Vols (2-1)

TIGERS SET TO HOST NO. 11 TENNESSEE IN NATIONALLY-TELEVISED SHOWDOWN

A sell-out crowd in Death Valley will serve as the back drop as the LSU Fighting Tigers and the 11th-ranked Tennessee Volunteers battle for the first time since 1993 this Saturday in a nationally-televised tilt on ESPN. It marks LSU's second appearance in three weeks on ESPN. The Tigers enter the contest with a 2-2 mark after dropping a last-second 13-10 decision to UAB last Saturday. Tennessee is 2-1 after posting a 70-3 win over Louisiana-Monroe. Both teams are 0-1 in league play as the Tigers fell to Auburn, 34-17, two weeks ago, while the Vols fell to Florida, 27-23. Saturday's game will mark the first between the teams since a 42-20 win by Vols in Knoxville in 1993. Tennessee owns an 18-3-3 record all-time vs. the Tigers.

TIGERS FALL TO UAB ON LAST SECOND FIELD GOAL, 13-10

UAB's Rhett Gallego kicked a 32-yard field goal as time expired to lift the Blazers to an unlikely 13-10 win over LSU in Tiger Stadium on Saturday night. Gallego's field goal came just seconds after UAB's Chris Brown intercepted a Josh Booty pass and returned it 25 yards to the LSU 17-yard line. with 25 seconds left in the contest. UAB defeated the Tigers despite picking up just 178 yards of total offense, which included only 57 yards of offense in the second half. UAB led 10-0 at halftime before the Tigers managed to tie the game at 10-10 on a 35-yard field goal by John Corbello with 10:33 left in the contest. The two teams traded possessions before UAB kicked the game winner as time expired. Domanick Davis led the Tigers with 226 all-purpose yards and their only touchdown of the evening, a one-yard run at the 3:04 mark in the third quarter. Linebacker Trev Faulk led the LSU defense with 13 tackles.

THE LSU-TENNESSEE SERIES

Tennessee owns a decisive 18-3-3 lead in the series as the Vols have won three straight over LSU. The two teams last met in Knoxville in 1993 when the Vols won 42-20. The teams last met in Baton Rouge in 1992 with Tennessee coming away with a 20-0 victory. LSU's last victory in the series came in 1988 when the Tigers marched into Knoxville and posted a convincing 34-9 victory. A year later the Vols avenged the loss, winning a 45-39 shootout in Baton Rouge in which Tommy Hodson passed for an LSU record 438 yards.

- * Josh Booty moved past Y.A. Tittle into ninth place on the all-time LSU passing list during the second quarter on a three-yard pass to LaBrandon Toefield.
- * The loss was LSU's first homecoming loss to a non-conference opponent since dropping a 38-14 decision to Florida State in 1981.
- * Domanick Davis' 226 all-purpose yard were the most by a Tiger since Kevin Faulk amassed 249 against Alabama in 1998.
- * Davis' 153 return yards (98 on punts, 55 on kickoffs) was a career high and the most since Kevin Faulk had 195 yards against Alabama in 1996.
- * After stopping UAB on the opening drive of the game, the Tigers have not allowed an opening possession score in nine games, dating back to their loss at Kentucky a year ago.

LSU VS. TENNESSEE

The LSU Tigers will look to bounce back from Saturday's loss to UAB when they host 11th-ranked Tennessee at 6:35 p.m. in Tiger Stadium. The game will be televised to a national audience by ESPN, the second time in three weeks in which the Tigers are on the all sports cable network. Two weeks ago, LSU dropped a 34-17 decision at Auburn on ESPN. The Tennessee contest will also mark the second time this year in which the Tigers have faced a team ranked in the top 25 - the other came against Auburn. LSU has lost six straight games against teams ranked in the AP Top 25. LSU's last win over a team ranked in the top 25 came in 1998 when the Tigers blasted then-No. 24 Mississippi State, 41-6, in Baton Rouge. LSU and Tennessee are playing for the first time since 1993 when the Vols beat the Tigers, 42-20, in Knoxville. A year earlier, Tennessee shutout LSU, 20-0, in Baton Rouge. In the 1989 meeting between the teams in Baton Rouge, LSU's **Tommy Hodson** completed 31 of 49 passes for a school-record 438 yards. Tennessee won the game, 45-39.

ABOUT TENNESSEE

The Vols are coming off a 70-3 win over Louisiana-Monroe last Saturday in Knoxville. In that game, Tennessee's freshman quarterbacks **A.J. Suggs** and **Casey Clausen** combined to complete 20 of 31 passes for 274 yards and 4 TDs. UT's **Travis Henry** ranks second in the SEC in rushing with 118.3 yards per contest, while **Cedrick Wilson** is tied for the league lead with six receptions a contest. Defensively, the Vols are allowing only 47.7 yards rushing per contest (fifth in the nation) and they have already recorded 16 sacks in just three games.

THE SABAN RECORD

LSU coach **Nick Saban** enters Saturday's contest against Tennessee with a 45-28-1 overall mark after the Tigers' lost to UAB last week. Saban, who is in his seventh season as a collegiate head coach, guided Michigan State to four bowl games in five years. Saban opened his head coaching career at Toledo in 1990, where he guided the Rockets to a 9-2 mark and a share of the Mid-American Conference title.

Saban's string of serving six seasons as a head coach without suffering a losing record ranks as the nation's fourth-longest current streak.

LSU ON ESPN

LSU enters the Tennessee game with a 16-18 all-time mark on ESPN. The record includes an 0-1 record this season as the Tigers dropped a 34-17 decision to Auburn two weeks ago. LSU is 7-11 in ESPN games in Baton Rouge. LSU is the only team in the SEC to have appeared on ESPN every year since the all-sports cable network began televising college football games.

DAVIS BREAKS OUT

Domanick Davis had a breakout performance despite last weekend's loss against UAB. The sophomore amassed a career-high 226 all-purpose yards (32 rushing, 41 receiving, 98 on punts, 55 on kickoffs). The total was the highest by a Tiger since **Kevin Faulk's** 249 all-purpose yards against Alabama in 1998, while the 153 combined return yards surpassed his previous high of 144 and was the most since Faulk had 195 combined return yards against Alabama in 1996. Davis is currently ranked fourth in the SEC with 131 all-purpose yards a contest. He's second in the league with 25.8 yards a kickoff return.

TIGERS DEFENSE TOUGH ON OPENING DRIVES

Last Saturday vs. UAB, the LSU defense held the opposition without points on the opening drive for the ninth consecutive game. Kentucky was the last team to score against the Tigers on their opening offensive possession, doing so in their match up in the sixth week of the 1999 season.

LSU DEFENSE FINALLY YIELDS FIRST QUARTER POINTS

UAB's field goal at the 5:00 mark in the first quarter marked the first points scored against the Tigers in the first quarter this season. That streak dated back to last year's season-finale against Arkansas when the Tigers blanked the Razorbacks in the opening quarter. LSU's streak of not allowing a touchdown in the first quarter remained intact as the Tigers have not allowed a first quarter touchdown since Houston scored in

the opening period in the 10th week of the 1999 season.

LSU DEFENSE CONTINUES TO BE TOUGH AGAINST THE RUN

The LSU defense continues to be tough against the run as the Tigers are allowing just 122.5 yards rushing a contest. In addition, the Tigers, along with Tennessee, have allowed an SEC -best one rushing touchdown this season. Rudy Johnson's 2-yard run with just three seconds left in the Auburn game is the only rushing TD that the Tiger defense has yielded this season. Last year, the Tigers allowed 18 rushing, TDs, a number that ranked 11th in the league.

REED CONTINUES TO BE LSU'S TOP RECEIVING THREAT

When **Josh Reed** lined up at receiver for the first time against Alabama last season, the Tigers couldn't have possibly imagined what they discovered. Seven games later, Reed has developed into LSU's top receiving threat. Over the last seven games, Reed has surpassed the 100-yard barrier three times. Two weeks ago, Reed hauled in a career-best eight balls for a career-high 167 yards and a pair of TDs. One of Reed's TDs was a 75-yard reception in the first quarter. The 167 yards receiving was the most for a Tiger since **Sheddrick Wilson** had 201 yards receiving against Rice in 1995. Against UAB, Reed hauled in four passes for a team-best 53 yards. Through four games this season, Reed has led LSU in receptions twice and receiving yardage in all four contests.

Reed served notice in the Tigers second-to-last game in 1999, catching five balls for 100 yards against Houston. He opened the 2000 season with a 137-yard performance against Western Carolina. Over the last seven games dating back to 1999, Reed is averaging four catches and 81 yards per game.

BOOTY PASSES TITTLE ON LSU'S ALL-TIME PASSING YARDAGE LIST

LSU junior quarterback **Josh Booty** moved pass **Y.A. Tittle** into ninth place on the school's all-time passing yardage list on Saturday vs. UAB. Since joining the Tigers a little over a season ago, Booty has passed for 2,666 yards. Booty currently stands 105 yards shy of moving past **Steve Ensminger** into eighth place.

REED RANKS SECOND IN SEC AND SIXTH IN NATION IN RECEIVING YARDS/GAME

Despite just having 53 yards receiving vs. UAB, LSU sophomore wide out **Josh Reed** continues to rank second in the SEC with 108.2 yards receiving a contest. Reed's average also ranks sixth nationally. In four games, Reed has hauled in 20 passes for 433 yards and 3 TDs. He's averaging 21.6 yards per catch.

ROBINSON AND MYERS EXTEND RECEPTION STREAKS

With receptions against UAB, LSU's **Reggie Robinson** and **Jerel Myers** kept their streak of games with at least one catch alive. Robinson has caught at least one pass in his last 21 games, while Myers has caught a pass in 15 straight game, which also represents every game of his career. Robinson's streak of 21 straight games with a receptions is the longest active streak on the team.

BIG PLAY RETURNS TO LSU PASSING ATTACK

While the big play may have been absent from LSU's offense against UAB on Saturday, it played a key role in each of the Tigers' first three games. In LSU's first three games of the season, LSU had seven scoring passing plays of 30 yards or longer. Included in that was **Josh Booty's** 75-yard strike to **Josh Reed** against Auburn, which gave the Tigers two passing plays of over 75 yards in one season for the first time since 1994 (Jamie Howard to Brett Bech, 76 and 81 yard passes). Booty hit **Reggie Robinson** with an 80-yard TD pass in the season opener against Western Carolina.

So far this season, seven of LSU's nine scoring plays through the air have been 30 yards or longer. Last year, the Tigers had just four TD passes of 30 yards or longer, three of which came in the season-finale vs. Arkansas.

LSU'S O-LINE IN BANGED UP

LSU's offensive line received another blow on Saturday night when starting center **John Compton** had to leave the game at halftime after suffering a concussion in the first half. The injury to Compton forced **Louis Williams** to move from his starting position of left guard to center for the second half vs. UAB. **Rodney Reed**, a seldom-used redshirt freshman, played the entire second half of the UAB game at left guard.

Compton's injury is the third of significance to an LSU starting offensive lineman this season. LSU lost starting offensive tackle **Trey Langley** for the season when he tore the ACL and MCL in his right knee in the fourth quarter vs. Houston. Starting offensive guard **Bob Wynne** suffered a neck injury against Houston and has missed LSU's last two games.

FIRST-TIME STARTERS HAVE DOTTED LSU'S LINEUP THIS YEAR

For the first time this season, the Tigers didn't have a first-time starter in the lineup against UAB last Saturday. In the first three games of the year, the Tigers used nine first-time starters, including six in the season-opener vs. Western Carolina.

In addition to those nine first time starters, **Kyle Kipps** started at defensive end vs. Western Carolina, making him both an offensive and defensive starter during his LSU career. Prior to this season, Kipps had started 13 games at tight end, but he had never seen any time on the defensive side of the ball.

GREEN ON PACE TO BREAK SACK RECORD

With 15 sacks in his first two years with the Tigers, junior defensive end **Jarvis Green** is on pace to break the school record for sacks. **Rydell Malancon** holds the school record with 25 sacks from 1980-83 with **Ron Sancho** next with 23.

WILLIAMS EXTENDS STARTING STREAK

LSU senior offensive guard **Louis Williams** made his 26th straight start on Saturday night. Williams, who has been in the Tiger starting lineup since the 1998 season-opener against Arkansas State, has the longest current starting string of any LSU player. Other starting streaks of significance are senior cornerback **Fred Booker** (21 straight), and sophomore split end **Jerel Myers** and junior free safety **Ryan Clark** each with 15 consecutive starts. Sophomore linebacker **Trev Faulk** has started 12 straight games.

For the second straight week of the 1993 season, the LSU Tigers started off strong but couldn't maintain the early momentum in a 42-20 loss to the Tennessee Volunteers.

After a 36-yard opening kickoff return by Eddie Kennison, LSU drove 44 yards in 10 plays capped by a 33-yard field goal by Andre Lafleur to give the Tigers a quick 3-0 lead. The Vols would answer on the ensuing drive which ended with a 1-yard plunge by James Stewart to give Tennessee a 7-3 advantage.

LSU again added a Lafleur field goal, this time of 47 yards to cut the UT lead to 7-6. UT struck quick on a 3-play, 44-yard drive that saw Aaron Hayden on an 8-yard touchdown run to give the Vols a 14-6 advantage.

Tennessee led 21-6 at halftime and the Vols broke the game open in the third quarter scoring on two Shuler touchdown passes giving the Vols a 35-6 lead heading into the fourth.

LSU RIPS W. CAROLINA, 58-0, IN SABAN ERA OPENER

The Tiger offense sizzled, amassing 507 yards of offense in the opening 30 minutes while building a 37-0 lead before ultimately defeating Western Carolina 58-0 before an LSU record 87,188 fans last Saturday. Josh Booty threw for a career high 291 yards and a pair of touchdowns passed, while Rohan Davey was a perfect 11-for-11 for 194 yards and three TD strikes as LSU wracked up a school record 485 yards passing. The Tigers wound up with 680 yards of total offense, the second highest total in LSU history and the most since 1977. Booty hit Reggie Robinson over the middle for an 80-yard strike on the third play of the game and the Tigers never looked back. Jerel Myers caught six balls for 117 yards and a pair of touchdowns, while Josh Reed hauled in five balls for 137 yards.
