LSU Opens Fourth Year of Saban Era Against Louisiana-Monroe

LSU opens its 110th season of football, including the fourth under head coach Nick Saban, on Saturday when the Tigers host in-state foe Louisiana-Monroe at 7 p.m. in Tiger Stadium. The Tigers return 16 starters (8 offense, 7 defense, 1 specialist) from last year's 8-5 squad that tied for the SEC Western Division title and played in the Cotton Bowl. Louisiana-Monroe, under first-year coach Charlie Weatherbie, will make its first trip to Baton Rouge to face LSU. The Indians are coming off a 3-9 mark in 2002. LSU is 2-1 in season-openers under Nick Saban and the Tigers are 76-28-5 all-time in season-opening contests, which includes a 66-14-3 record in Baton Rouge. Last year, the Tigers dropped a 26-8 decision to Virginia Tech to open the season to snap a 6-game season-opening win streak. LSU enters the Louisiana-Monroe contest having won its last six season-openers in Tiger Stadium. In those six season-opening wins in Tiger Stadium, LSU has outscored its opponents 267-81, which includes a 48-17 win over Tulane to open 2001 and a 58-0 win over Western Carolina in LSU's first game under Saban in 2000.

Looking Back at 2002

The Tigers put together an 8-5 overall mark and grabbed at least a shared the SEC Western Division crown (1996-97-2001-02) for the fourth time in the last seven years. LSU's bid to advance to the SEC Championship game fell just short as Arkansas rallied for a last-minute 21-20 win over the Tigers to represent the west in the league title game. LSU managed an invitation to the Cotton Bowl, marking the first back-to-back New Year's Day Bowl games for the Tigers since the mid-60s. LSU closed the year with a 35-20 setback to Texas in the Cotton Bowl.

Nick Saban

HEAD COACH • FOURTH YEAR

For years outsiders viewed the LSU football program as an unpolished gem, a potential giant waiting to be reborn in the world of college football. With the wealth of resources LSU has to offer, its tradition and the available talent within the state of Louisiana, all the program needed was the right leader to lead it. Entering his fourth year as head coach of the Tigers, Nick Saban is that leader.

Since taking over in Baton Rouge in 2000, Saban has transformed the LSU football program into one that wins championships, while graduating players at the same time.

Equipped with a plan that gives his players the best chance to be successful on the field as well as in the classroom, Saban's impact on the program has been immediate and it's been powerful.

In just three years as LSU's head coach, Saban's on-field success has been nothing short of remarkable, as he's guided the Tigers to 26 victories, a pair of bowl wins, including one in the Bowl Championship Series, and the 2001 Southeastern Conference title. The Tigers have also played in back-to-back New Year's Day bowls for the first time since the 1960s.

On top of LSU's success on the gridiron, the Tigers are being recognized for their efforts in the classroom. Currently, all 22 of the Tiger seniors from the 2002 team are on pace to graduate within the next 12 months, while Rodney Reed earned First Team Academic All-America honors and Bradie James was awarded an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship from the National Football Foundation last year.

Off the field, Saban and his players are active in the community, promoting goodwill by participating in such things as community service projects and visiting hospitals and schools in the Baton Rouge area on a regular basis. Saban has also worn the hat of fundraiser during his stay in Baton Rouge as he spearheaded an effort that raised more than \$15 million for a state-of-the-art academic center for student-athletes. The new Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes is part of Saban's plan to give his players the best opportunity to be successful when they finish their football careers. The center, which spans 54,000 square feet, is the best of its kind and features 100 computers, a 1,000-seat auditorium, a library and a communications center for training student-athletes.

Saban became the 31st head coach of the LSU Tigers on November 30, 1999, after five years as head coach at Michigan State.

He didn't waste anytime making his impact felt as he guided a team coming off back-to-back losing seasons to an 8-4 mark and a win over 15th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl in 2000 to rekindle the fire of a proud football tradition in Baton Rouge.

A year later in 2001, Saban guided the Tigers to their first outright SEC title since 1986 with a 31-20 win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC Championship game. LSU followed that with a 47-34 victory over Illinois in the Sugar Bowl to cap a 10-3 season for the Tigers.

Last year, Saban guided the Tigers to an 8-5 overall mark and a share of the SEC Western Division title. The Tigers also played in a New Year's Day bowl game for the second consecutive year, a first for LSU since the 1960's, with an appearance in the Cotton Bowl.

Prior to LSU, Saban spent five years as the head coach at Michigan State, where he built the Spartans into a perennial Big Ten contender after going to four bowl games in five seasons.

Back Home to Open the Season

LSU's back at home to open the 2003 season after the Tigers opened their 2002 campaign on the road against Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Va. LSU has won six straight season openers at home, which includes a 48-17 win over Tulane to open the 2001 season. LSU is scheduled to open it season at home for the next eight years, which includes a home title against Virginia Tech in 2004.

About Louisiana-Monroe

Louisiana-Monroe enters its 10th season playing in Division I-A after playing in Division I-AA for 12 years ... Nicknamed the Indians ... Played as a Division I-A Independent for seven years before joining the Sun Belt Conference as a football-only member in 2001 ... ULM, formerly known as Northeast Louisiana, won the 1987 I-AA national title under head coach Pat Collins, the father of current LSU strength and conditioning intern Mike Collins ... Since moving to Division I-A in 1994, the Indians are 2-17 vs. the SEC with wins coming against Kentucky in 1994 and Mississippi State in 1995.

Who's In and Who's Out for the Tigers

LSU will be without the services of five players against UL-Monroe as offensive guard **Terrell McGill** (bruised kidney), wide receiver **Amp Hill** (knee), wide receiver Craig Davis (elbow), linebacker Phillip Maxwell (broken foot), and tight end **Kory Hebert** (ankle) will all miss the contest.

Up Next

The Tigers travel to Tucson, Ariz., for a nationally-televised contest against Arizona. It will mark LSU's second meeting against Arizona as the Tigers beat the Wildcats, 27-26, in Tiger Stadium in 1984. The LSU-Arizona game will be televised to a national audience by TBS Sports, which marks the Tigers first appearance on the SuperStation since a 29-26 win over Kentucky in Lexington in 1991.

Home Openers

LSU is 66-14-3 in season-opening games at home, including a six-game winning streak. The last time LSU dropped a season opener at home was in 1994 when Texas A&M defeated the Tigers 18-13. The Tigers are 76-28-5 all-time on opening day and 2-1 in opening games under **Nick Saban**. Saban is 6-3 all-time in season-openers as a head coach (1-0 at Toledo, 3-2 at Michigan State, 2-1 at LSU).

In the August Heat

Saturday marks the first game LSU will play in the month of August. Previously the earliest the Tigers have opened a season was Sept. 1, both last year at Virginia Tech and the year before against Tulane in Tiger Stadium.

Tigers Streaking Against Non-SEC Foes

LSU is riding a six-game winning streak against non-conference opponents in Tigers Stadium dating back to the 2000 season. The Tigers defeated Tulane, Utah State and Middle Tennessee at home in 2001, and beat The Citadel, Miami (Ohio) and UL-Lafayette last season. The last time LSU was defeated at home against a non-SEC foe was on Sept. 23, 2000 to UAB.

In the Polls

LSU opens the 2003 season ranked No. 14 in the Associated Press poll and No. 15 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll. This marks the third straight season LSU has been tabbed No. 14 in the preseason AP poll.

Mauck Gets the Nod for Second Straight Season

Junior quarterback **Matt Mauck** will become the first LSU quarterback to start consecutive season openers since Herb Tyler started the opening game in both the 1997 and 1998 seasons. Mauck started LSU's first six games last season before suffering an injury to his right foot in LSU's 36-7 win over Florida. He posted a 5-1 record in those six starts.

Mauck Enjoys Success Under Center

Junior quarterback **Matt Mauck** has played in nine games in his career at LSU and the Tigers are 7-2 in those nine games, including a 5-1 mark with Mauck as the starting quarterback.

McGill Out With Bruised Kidney

LSU offensive lineman **Terrell McGill** bruised a kidney in the Tigers' final scrimmage of fall camp on Aug. 20 and will miss the Louisiana-Monroe game. McGill, who is expected to see significant action on the o-line this year, is expected to miss at least two weeks of action with the injury.

Mauck Riding Streak of 88 Passes Without an Interception

Quarterback **Matt Mauck** enters the Louisiana-Monroe contest riding a streak of 88 straight passes without an interception. After throwing an interception in games against Virginia Tech and The Citadel last year, Mauck then went four straight games without being picked off. In 171 career passing attempts, Mauck has only thrown four interceptions.

Tigers Have Experience on the O-Line

The LSU offensive line has been touted as one of the best in the nation. The Tiger offensive line may be one of the most experienced as the LSU front five have 91 career starts between them. **Rodney Reed** leads the way with 34, followed by **Stephen Peterman** with 25, **Ben Wilkerson** with 19 and **Andrew Whitworth** 13. **Nate Livings** is expected to make his first career start against Louisiana-Monroe. LSU is 14-4 when Reed, Peterman and Wilkerson start on the offensive line together (8-0 in 2001, 6-4 in 2002).

Reed Among Nation's Elite In Starts on Offensive Line

Senior offensive tackle **Rodney Reed** will start his 35th straight game on Saturday against Louisiana-Monroe. Reed's 34 career starts ranks as the seventh-highest total among active Division I players. Marshall's Nate McPeek leads the way with 39 career starts, followed by Texas Tech's Toby Cecil with 37, North Carolina State's Chris Colmer with 36, North Texas' Nick Zuniga and Cal's Mark Wilson are next with 35 each, followed by LSU's Reed, Oregon's Joey Forster, Kentucky's Antonio Hall, Stanford's Kirk Chambers and Missouri's A.J. Ricker with 34 apiece.

Cap and Gown Tigers

LSU has two players on this year's roster who have already earned their bachelor's degree - offensive tack- le **Rodney Reed** and center **Jimmy Courtenay**. Reed and Courtenay both graduated last May. Reed, who earned First Team Academic All-America honors last year, graduated with a 3.9 grade point average in accounting. He is currently pursuing his Master's in accounting.

Proud Papa

Senior offensive guard **Stephen Peterman** has never been happier in his live then at 4:31 p.m. on Aug. 26 when he and his wife Colleen welcomed Stephen Frederick Peterman, Jr. into the world. The newest Peterman, born at East Jefferson Hospital in Metairie, La., weighed 6-pounds, 20-ounces and was 20 inch-es long.

Clayton Can Pull Double-Duties

Expect to see junior **Michael Clayton** on both sides of the ball when the Tigers lineup against Louisiana-Monroe on Saturday. Clayton will start at wide receiver and will also see spot duty at safety on defense for the Tigers. Clayton first played on both sides of the ball last year against Texas in the Cotton Bowl. Clayton will actually play three ways for the Tigers, as he's a key member of LSU's special teams as well.

Give Devery An ESPY

LSU wide receiver **Devery Henderson** became the second Tiger to win an ESPY when he claimed the honor for Best Play in July in Hollywood for his part in the Bluegrass Miracle. Henderson beat out Barry Bonds, Kobe Bryant, LeBron James and Michael Vick to win the award. Henderson joined Warren Morris as the two LSU athletes to be named winners of an ESPY. Morris was honored in 1997 with the Showstopper of the Year award for his ninth-inning game-winning home run against Miami in the championship game of the 1996 College World Series.

Among the SEC's Best

LSU was selected to finish second in the SEC West by the media at the annual SEC Media Days in Birmingham in late July. The Tigers received 162 points and 13 first-place votes. Auburn was picked to win the West and the overall title, while Georgia was tabbed as East champions.

Preseason All-SEC

LSU was well represented on the preseason All-SEC teams selected by the media at the 2003 SEC Media Days. Junior center **Ben Wilkerson**, junior wide receiver **Michael Clayton**, senior defensive tackle **Chad Lavalais** and junior cornerback **Corey Webster** were all selected to the first team, while senior offensive guard **Stephen Peterman** and senior punter **Donnie Jones** were named to the second-team.

In-state Foe

LSU is 120-25-8 against opponents from Louisiana. The Tigers have defeated 14 straight in-state oppo-nents, including a 48-0 victory over Louisiana-Lafayette last season. The last time an in-state team defeat-ed the Tigers was in 1982 when Tulane upended LSU 31-28 in Tiger Stadium. LSU has never played Louisiana-Monroe.

The strongest LSU-ULM tie is current Tiger strength and condition intern Mike Collins, who served as head coach of the Indians for nine games last year. Collins posted a 3-6 mark as ULM's head coach. LSU's recruiting intern Chad Walker served as a defensive graduate assistant at Louisiana-Monroe in 2002 and ULM secondary coach Tim Rebowe is a 1987 graduate of LSU.

ULM's Weatherbie Has Coached in Tiger Stadium Before

Louisiana-Monroe head coach Charlie Weatherbie will coach in Tiger Stadium for the second time on Saturday. Weatherbie served as head coach of the Utah State team that fell to LSU, 38-17, in 1993. Weatherbie didn't get to full appreciate Tiger Stadium back in 1993 as a crowd of only 57,316 saw the Tigers beat the Aggies. A crowd of close to 90,000 is expected to Saturday's contest against ULM.

Six Players with Monroe Ties

Six Tigers have ties to either Monroe or West Monroe. Senior tightend **Eric Edwards**, sophomore offensive lineman **Rudy Niswanger** and sophomore offensive lineman **Brandon Hurley** all graduated from Ouachita Christian High School in Monroe, while senior offensive tackle **Rodney Reed**, senior linebacker **Jason LeDoux** and sophomore offensive tackle **Andrew Whitworth** all graduated from West Monroe High School.

Wilkerson Named to Rimington Watch List

Junior center **Ben Wilkerson** is one of 38 players named to the watch list for the Rimington Trophy. The award, established in 2000, is named for Nebraska's Dave Rimington, one of college football's most decorated offensive linemen. This is the second straight season Wilkerson has made the preseason watch list for the award. Wilkerson has started 19 games in his career and LSU is 14-5 in those games.

Webster on Thorpe and Nagurski Watch List

Junior cornerback **Corey Webster**, who led the Southeastern Conference last season with seven interceptions, has been named to the Jim Thorpe Award and the Bronko Nagurski watch lists. The Thorpe award, presented annually to the nation's top defensive back, is named after history's greatest all-around athlete who excelled on both defense and offense during his football career. The Nagurski award is presented to the nation's top all-around defensive player.

Peterman on Lombardi Watch List

Senior offensive guard **Stephen Peterman**, a 2002 first-team All-SEC selection, has been named to the preliminary watch list for the Rotary Lombardi Award. Peterman is one of 41 players on the list for the award that is presented annually to the nation's top offensive or defensive lineman.

Turner of Butkus Watch List

Junior linebacker **Lionel Turner** has been named to the preseason Butkus Award watch list. The Walker, La., native finished third on the team is tackles last season with 71 and recorded three sacks. The award is presented annually to the nation's top linebacker.

Jones on Guy Watch List

Senior punter **Donnie Jones** has been named to the Ray Guy Award watch list. Jones, Baton Rouge native, is one of the best punters in LSU history and is poised to break several school records during the season. Last year Jones averaged 44.0 yards per kick and broke the LSU record by booming a 86-yard punt against Kentucky. He is one of 32 punters from around the nation named to the list.

Jones Punting to the Top

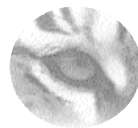
Donnie Jones, a senior punter, ranks in the top three of all three career punting stats. The Baton Rouge native ranks second in punting average at 41.9 yards per kick, just one yard behind career leader Chad Kessler's 42.9. Jones ranks third in punting yardage with 7,041 in his career, 263 behind Clay Parker from second and 935 behind Chad Kessler's top spot. Jones is also third in total punts with 168, 12 behind Parker for second and 18 behind Kessler.

Clayton on the Move

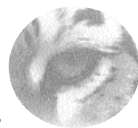
Junior wide receiver **Michael Clayton** is moving up the LSU career record books as he begins his third season with the Tigers. The Baton Rouge native is 10th in career touchdown receptions with 11 (six in 2001 and five in 2002) and is just out of the top 10 in both career receptions and yards. Clayton has 104 career receptions, nine away from passing Todd Kinchen for 10th place, and has 1,503 receiving yards, 226 away from passing Carlos Carson for 10th place.

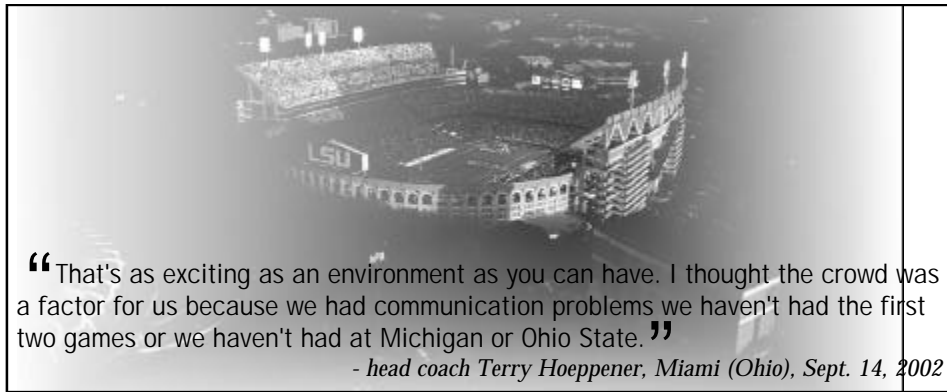

- LSU began playing football in Tiger Stadium in 1924 and is currently in its 80th year in the venerable stadium on **SATURDAY NIGHT**.
- Under **Nick Saban**, the Tigers have posted a **17-4 HOME RECORD**, including a 4-2 mark against ranked opponents. Against conference foes, Saban is 8-3 in Death Valley. In home games at night, LSU is 13-3 since Saban took over.
- LSU has won **NINE OF ITS LAST 10** games at home, including an eight-game win streak during the stretch. That was the longest home streak for the Tigers since winning eight straight from 1995-96.
- More than **85,000 FANS** have attended each of LSU’s last 19 home games. In that span, the Tigers have eclipsed the 90,000 mark 13 times, including a school-record 92,141 for the 2001 Auburn contest, which LSU won 27-14.
- Since national attendance figures began being kept in 1957, LSU has ranked in the top 20 all 45 seasons. The Tigers have been in the top 15 for 43 of the 45 years and in the top 10 on 37 occasions, including 32 straight from 1957-88. Fourteen times, LSU has ranked in the **TOP FIVE IN THE NATION**, including the last three.
- Since 1960, LSU owns a stellar **182-61-4 (.745)** record in traditional Tiger Stadium night games. On the other hand, the Tigers are just 14-20-3 (.419) at home during the day in that span.
- Death Valley is the **SIXTH LARGEST** on-campus stadium in the nation holding 91,600 fans.

Earthquake Game

October 8, 1988. Tommy Hodson connected with Eddie Fuller on 4-and-10 with 1:41 to play for the game-winning touchdown as LSU upset No. 4 Auburn. The play caused such a thunderous explosion from the crowd of 79,341 that the tremor caused by the vibrations measured on the seismograph across campus.

Halloween Night

October 31, 1959. No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss, 3-0, late in the fourth quarter when Billy Cannon fielded a punt off the bounce at the 11-yard line. He raced 89 yards, careening off seven Rebel defenders, to paydirt to give the Tigers victory and all but clinch the 1959 Heisman Trophy.

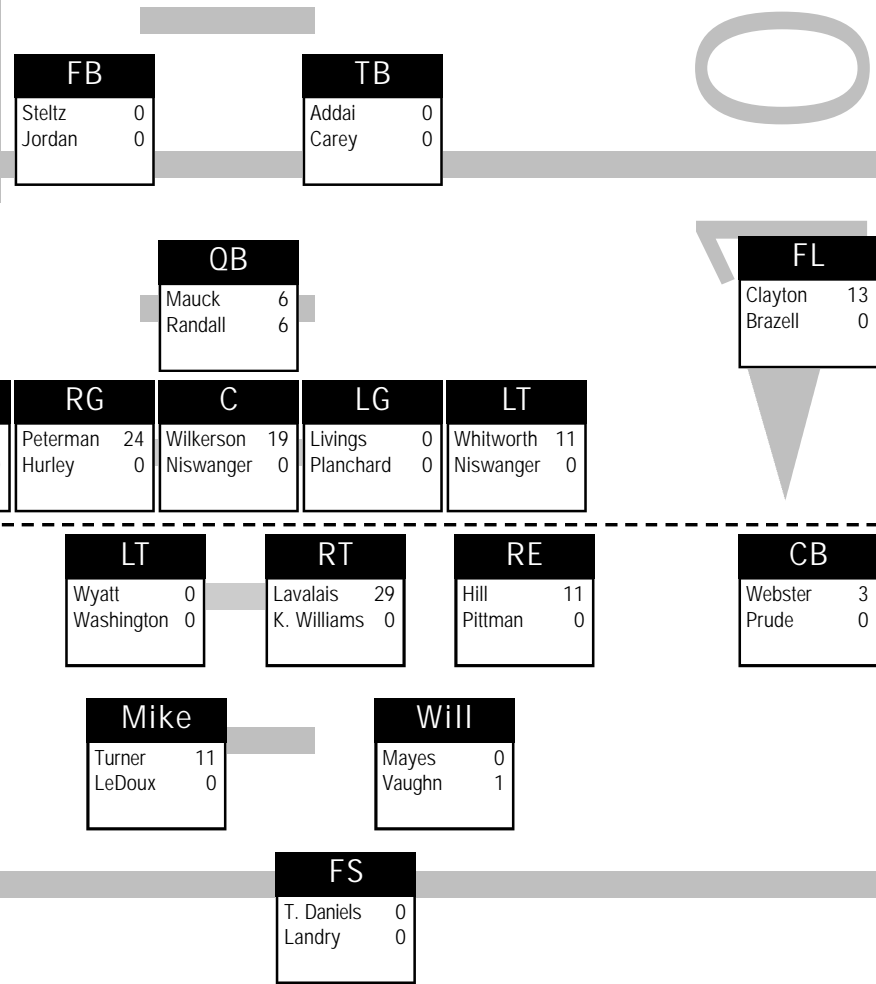
