ALABAMA PLAYS FINAL ROAD GAME AT LSU

After securing its sixth win of the season last weekend to become bowl eligible for the first time since the 2001 season, the Alabama Crimson Tide (6-3, 3-3 SEC) travels to Baton Rouge, La. this weekend for a Saturday night showdown with No. 15 LSU Tigers (6-2, 3-2 SEC) at historic Tiger Stadium. The game will be televised to a national cable audience by ESPN with kickoff set for 6:47 p.m. (CT). The Crimson Tide will be playing at the home of the defending national champion for the first time since 1987. The last time Alabama ventured into the house of the defending national champion was Sept. 12, 1987, and led by Bobby Humphrey's 200 rushing yards, No. 19 Alabama beat No. 11 Penn State 24-13 in Happy Valley. The Crimson Tide continues to lead the SEC with 229.8 rushing yards per game this season. In nine games, Bama has 407 rushing attempts for 2,068 yards and 19 touchdowns. The Crimson Tide averages 5.1 yards per carry this season. The bulk of the rushing totals have come from tailback **Kenneth Darby (Huntsville)**, who took over for the injured Ray Hudson (Bonifay, Fla.) after the sixth game of the season. Darby is second in the SEC with 106.3 yards per game. In nine games, he has 169 rushing

attempts for 933 yards and seven TDs, to lead the team in all three categories. He is **67 yards shy of 1,000 yards this season, which would make him just the 11th player in school history to crack the 1,000-yard barrier.** Handling the broadcast duties for ESPN will be **Ron Franklin (play-by-play), Mike Gottfried (analyst) and Erin Andrews.** The game will also be televised on a tape delayed basis by the Crimson Tide Sports Network with **David Crane (play-by-play) and Chris Stewart (color).** Fans can also tune to the 80-plus station Crimson Tide Sports Network with **Eli Gold (play-by-play), Kenny Stabler (analyst) and Tom Roberts (sidelines)** describing the action.

THE HEAD COACHES

Coach **Mike Shula (10-12, .455)** is 6-3 (.667) in his sophomore season as the head coach of the Alabama Crimson Tide. Shula compiled a 4-9 (.308) record in his rookie season at Alabama last year against the nation's most difficult schedule. The Crimson Tide lost to both teams (Oklahoma and LSU) that played in the BCS National Championship game last season. Shula previously served as an assistant coach in the NFL with Tampa Bay, Chicago and Miami. A three-year letterman at Alabama (1984-86), Shula was a two-time All-SEC selection and threw for over 2,000 yards as a junior (1985), leading Alabama to dramatic come-from-behind wins over Georgia and Auburn. LSU head coach **Nick Saban (45-15, .750)** is in his fifth season as head coach of the Tigers. In his first four years at LSU, Saban has guided the Tigers to four bowl games, two SEC Championships and the 2003 National Championship. Last year, LSU posted a 13-1 overall record and won the school's first national championship since the famed "Chinese Bandits" of 1958. Overall, Saban has compiled an 88-41-1 (.681) overall record in 11 years as a collegiate head coach. Prior to LSU, he was the head coach at Michigan State.

UP NEXT

Alabama will close out the 2004 regular season with its annual "bragging rights" game with the Auburn Tigers. The Alabama-Auburn game will kickoff at 2:34 p.m. (CT) from Bryant-Denny Stadium and will be televised by CBS Sports.

MIKE SHULA NOTEBOOK

*Former All-SEC quarterback Mike Shula made his head coaching debut as the Crimson Tide defeated the South Florida Bulls, 40-17, Aug. 30, 2003 at Legion Field.

*Shula was named the Crimson Tide's 26th head coach on May 9, 2003, returning to his alma mater after spending 16 years in the NFL as a player and assistant coach.

*Shula is currently the second-youngest Division 1A head coach, one year and two days older than Rutgers' head coach Greg Schianno.

*At 39 years old, Shula is the Crimson Tide's youngest modern day head coach and the youngest since the hiring of Frank Thomas in 1931.

*Since his debut with the Alabama Crimson Tide as a true freshman in 1983, the 2003 season will mark Shula's 22nd season in the collegiate or professional ranks.

*Shula made his Alabama playing debut on Sept. 17, 1983 in a 40-0 win over the Ole Miss Rebels at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

*A three-year letterman and starter for coach Ray Perkins from 1984-86, leading the Tide to a 32-15-1 (.678) record.

1984 (Sophomore) -- Shula played in eight games and made six starts for the Crimson Tide...Shula's first career start for the Crimson Tide came in a 38-31 loss to Boston College and 1984 Heisman Trophy winner Doug Flutie on Sept. 8, 1984 at Legion Field...Completed a 67-yard pass to Greg Richardson with 7:57 left in the game to give UA a 24-20 win over Miss. State in Jackson.

1985 (Junior) -- An All-SEC selection after becoming the second QB in Alabama history to throw for more than 2,000 yards in a single-season (138-for-229, 2,009 yards, 16 TDs)... Shula also ranked third in the SEC and fifth nationally with a 150.02 rating...Set UA records for single-game (4) and single-season TD passes (16) and completion percentage (60.3%)... Twice named SEC Player of the Week for his performances against Cincinnati and Memphis State, where he threw a UA record four TD passes...Led Alabama to exciting comeback wins over Georgia and Auburn...Against Georgia, he fired a 17-yard TD pass to Al Bell with 15 seconds to play for the 20-16 game-winning TD...Against Auburn, Shula directed a six-play, 45-yard drive that led to Van Tiffin's 52-yard game-winning FG (UA 25, AU 23)...

Shula completed passes to Gene Jelks (16 yds) and Greg Richardson (19 yards) on the drive and threw a key block on Bell's 20-yard reverse on fourth and four... Caught game-tying TD pass at LSU from Jelks.

1986 (Senior) -- Finished his career with a school record 35 career TD passes...Led the Crimson Tide to its only ever win over Notre Dame (28-10) in Oct. 4, 1986...Shula completed 15 of 23 passes for 191 yards and three TDs in the win over the Irish...Elected a permanent team captain along with future NFL All-Pro Cornelius Bennett.

FORMER QB LEADS THE TIDE

Of the previous seven former UA players to be named head coach at Alabama, Coach Shula is the only former quarterback among the group.

*Shula is one of seven Alabama head coaches to have also played for the Crimson Tide. The list also includes Allen McCants, Eli Abbott, J.B. Whitworth, Paul Bryant, Ray Perkins and Mike DuBose.

*Eli Abbott, a Tuscaloosa native, was a tackle (1892-94) while also serving as the player-coach in his tenure at Alabama. Abbott is listed as the head coach from 1893-95 and then coached again in 1902.

*Abbott is the only player-coach in school history and the only coach to serve two tenures at Alabama.

*Allen McCants was a right halfback from 1892-94 for coach Eli Abbott. McCants was a native of Meridian, Miss.

*J.B. Whitworth lettered as a tackle under coach Wallace Wade (1930) and Frank Thomas (1931).

*Paul Bryant was an end for coach Frank Thomas and was a teammate of NFL Hall of Famer and Green Bay Packers legend Don Hutson.

*Ray Perkins was a standout receiver at Alabama, catching passes from NFL Legends Joe Namath and Kenny Stabler from 1964-66 and helping Bama to a pair of national championships (1964-65) and an 11-0 season as a senior in 1966.

*Mike DuBose was a standout defensive lineman under Coach Bryant (1972-73) and was a member of two SEC Championship teams while a Bama player.

*Shula was a three-year starter at quarterback under Ray Perkins and is the school's sixth all-time winningest signal-caller.

FOR THE RECORD

*Legendary coach Paul W. "Bear" Bryant (1958-82) remains the winningest coach in school history with his 232-46-9 (.824) record in 287 career games. He led the Crimson Tide to six national titles (1961, '64, '65, '73, '78 and '79) in his tenure at the Capstone.

BAMA BECOMES BOWL ELIGIBLE

*Alabama notched its sixth win of season on Nov. 6 with a 30-14 win over Mississippi State to become bowl eligible for the first time since the 2001 season.

*Coach Mike Shula did not down play the importance of the team's sixth win following the win over Miss. State.

"It was a nice win. It was nice to get that sixth win and become bowl eligible," Shula said. "The guys were really excited in the lockerroom after the game.

"For what these kids have been through, and this program has been through the last few years, it's good to become bowl eligible.

"Now at Alabama, our goals are higher than just becoming bowl eligible. But based on what has happened the last few years, they need to be excited.

"This is a start. It is a signal that we are making progress. Wesley Britt has been here five years and only played in one bowl game. He deserves another bowl game.

"Our ultimate goal is a New Year's Day bowl and if we can win our next two games we have a good chance at that."

*Alabama has not participated in the post season bowl party since a 14-13 win over Iowa State in the Independence Bowl on Dec. 27, 2001.

*Alabama has college football's most storied bowl history. The Crimson Tide has posted a 29-19-3 (.598) all-time record in 51 bowl appearances.

*Alabama owns the NCAA record for most bowl games and most victories.

TIDE HAS WINNING SEASON IN SIGHT

*The 30-14 win over Miss. State on Nov. 6 not only made the Crimson Tide bowl eligible, but it's also one win away from clinching another winning season in the long and storied tradition of Alabama football.

*One win in its next three games would clinch Alabama's 93rd winning season in school history.

*This is Alabama's 110th year of football and one more win would mean the Tide has posted a winning record in 84.5 percent of its football playing seasons.

*Since 1997, Alabama has had only four winning seasons, with its last coming in 2003 (10-3) under former coach Dennis Franchione.

*Alabama posted 26 consecutive winning seasons from 1958-83, including all 25 years under head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant.

*From 1958-1996, Alabama had 39 winning seasons in 40 years of football competition.

RED ZONE SUCCESS

*When the Crimson Tide offense takes the ball into the "red zone" chances are it is going to score.

*Through nine games this season, Alabama has put together the best "red zone" offense in the SEC and the fifth-best "red zone" totals in the nation in terms of scoring percentage.

*Alabama has scored on 32 of its 35 (.914) "red zone" chances this season, including 21 TDs.

*The Crimson Tide's touchdown efficiency is 60 percent for the season.

*The Crimson Tide has been perfect of late in the "red zone", scoring on its last 17 trips inside the 20-yard line, including 11 TDs.

*The Crimson Tide's touchdown efficiency is 64.7 percent during its recent stretch inside the 20-yard line.

*In addition to being adept in the "red zone" on offense, the Crimson Tide is also solid on defense, too.

*Alabama has the best "red zone" defense in the SEC and the eighth best percentage in the nation.

*UA opponents have had only four trips inside the Bama 20-yard line in the last four games. Mississippi State did not have any trips in the red zone in its 30-14 loss to Alabama.

*Alabama is fourth in the nation with nine TDs allowed. Georgia is third with eight TDs allowed.

SECOND YEAR SUCCESS

*Despite a rash of injuries, which includes the entire starting backfield, and recent scholarship limitations, Alabama head coach Mike Shula has seen his team make significant progress this season.

*In fact, Alabama has two more wins after nine games (6-3) this season than they recorded in 13 games (4-9) last season.

*Shula's two-game improvement ties him with Paul Bryant, Bill Curry and Xen Scott for sixth-place on the school's all-time list for most improvement from the first to the second year.

*The two-game improvement continues a long-standing tradition at Alabama, where the head coach shows improvement from year one to year two.

*Of the 17 head coaches who have worked at Alabama for more than one season, 11 have shown improvement from the first to the second year.

*Three other coaches had the same number of wins in year one and year two on the UA sidelines.

*Gene Stallings (1990-96) and W.B. Blount (1903-04) hold the Alabama record for most improvement between their first and second seasons.

*Both coaches won four more games in their second year than they did in their season.

*Stallings led Alabama to a 7-5 record in his first season in 1990 and followed that up with an 11-1 record in 1991, an improvement of four games.

*Blount posted a 3-4 record in 1903 and followed that up with 7-3 mark in his final season as head coach in 1904.

*Here is a look at the UA head coaches and their records in their first two seasons as head coach.

*Darby's 200-yard performance is the 12th best in Alabama football history and first by an Alabama player since Shaun Alexander ran for 214 yards in a 30-27 win at Ole Miss on Oct. 16, 1999. The 200 rushing yards rank 12th on the school's single-game rushing list.

*Darby's 36 rushing attempts tied Alexander (vs. Ole Miss, 1999 and Southern Miss, 1998) for fifth-place on the school's single-game charts for most rushing attempts. In addition, Darby's 36 rushing attempts are the most by an Alabama player since Shaud Williams had 40 rushing attempts in a five-overtime loss to Tennessee last year.

*His 36 rushing attempts accounted for almost 60 percent of Alabama's offensive plays (36 of 62, 58.1 percent) while his 200 rushing yards were 52.8 percent of the Tide's total yards (379). He had 150 rushing yards in the first half alone and scored on a 14-yard run to give the Crimson Tide a 17-7 lead at the half.

*Darby is the first Alabama player to be named SEC Offensive Player of the Week since Shaud Williams was honored twice last season.

*Bostick, a native of Cullman, connected on 3-of-3 field goals and made all three of his PAT attempts as Alabama defeated Mississippi State, 30-14. The three made field goals matched his career high for the Crimson Tide.

*Perhaps his most significant kick was a 47-yard field goal that gave Alabama a 23-14 lead midway through the fourth quarter. The 47-yard field goal matched his season high set two weeks earlier against Tennessee. He also made a 34-yard field goal midway through the third quarter which put Alabama ahead 20-14. His first field goal of the game was a 24-yarder early in the second quarter, cutting the Mississippi State lead to 7-3.

*Bostick finished the game with 12 points, missing his career high for points in a game by one point.

*For the season, Bostick is 13-of-16 in field goals, second in the SEC in field goals per game and field goal percentage, and he has hit all 31 of his PAT attempts. He is second among SEC kickers in league in scoring with 7.2 points per game, which ranks him fourth among all players this year.

*Bostick is the second Alabama player to win SEC Special Teams Player of the Week honors this season, joining sophomore Tyrone Prothro for his efforts against Kentucky (Oct. 9). Bostick is the first Alabama kicker to win the SEC Special Teams Player of the Week award since its inception in 2003.

CARTER MAKES EMOTIONAL RETURN

*Senior split end Antonio Carter (Tallahassee, Fla.) made an emotional return to the field in the closing minutes of the Crimson Tide's 30-14 win over Miss. State on Nov. 6.

"I didn't know at all [if I would play] when Coach Shula came, found me and put me in," said Carter, who had not played for the Crimson Tide since Nov. 29, 2001 against Southern Miss.

"It was just a wonderful surprise. I found him afterwards and hugged him and told him how much I appreciated it. The feeling when I went out there made it all worth it.

"I am at the end of my career. I wanted to get out there, although I am not really at 100 percent. I am hurting, but at the same time, it feels good." Shula said he called Carter's number to honor his leadership.

"That was great for him and great for our team," Shula said. "He is one of our captains, and is one of our leaders. Our young guys need to emulate A.C. and what he stands for. He goes out every day and does what needs to be done."

Carter had not played for the Crimson Tide in nearly three years after a sustaining a number of injuries following his junior season. He was granted a sixth year of eligibility by the NCAA.

ALABAMA PLAYER PARTICIPATION

*Alabama has played 78 different players in its first nine games this season.

*The newest addition to the list is senior wide receiver Antonio Carter (Tallahassee, Fla.), who played the final five snaps of the Crimson Tide's 30-14 win over Miss. State on Nov. 6.

*Junior punter Jeremy Schatz (Homewood) made his debut in the Crimson Tide's 27-3 Homecoming win over Southern Miss on Oct. 16. He punted one time and dropped his 40-yard punt at the Southern Miss six-yard line late in the fourth quarter.

*Junior tight end Greg McClain (Lineville), made his 2004 debut on Oct. 9 at Kentucky.

*McClain played 10 snaps at tight end in the fourth quarter of the Crimson Tide's 45-17 win.

*The list includes 35 first-time players, including 11 "true" freshmen.

*The Crimson Tide dressed 101 players for the 2004 season opener with Utah State and 65 players saw action in 48-17 win.

*Of the 101 players that dressed for the Utah State game, a total of 57 had never played in a game for the Crimson Tide.

*Alabama's opening day depth chart showed that 23 of the 44 players listed had never played in a game before the season opener.

*A total of 27 players made their debut against Utah State, including 10 "true" freshmen.

*Alabama used 58 players in its win over Ole Miss, but none were first-time players.

*Alabama dressed more than 100 players for the Western Carolina game and played a season-high 74 players in the 52-0 win.

*The Crimson Tide used seven first-time players, including one "true" freshman in the win over the Catamounts bringing the season total to 34 first-time players.

*The most notable first-time players to see action against Western Carolina were true freshman Curtis Dawson and redshirt sophomore Marcus McKnight.

*Dawson played last year at Hoover High School and came to Alabama as a line-backer. He moved to the defensive line prior to the Ole Miss game and made his debut at defensive tackle in the win over WCU.

*McKnight came to Alabama as a true freshman in 2002 and had not played in a game until his debut against Western Carolina on Sept. 18, 2004. McKnight also hauled in a 14-yard pass reception from Marc Guillon, his first career reception with the Tide.

*Other first-timers to play against Western Carolina included Kyle Bennett, Bryan Kilpatrick, Allen Long, Forrest Rayford and Travis West.

*Alabama played 57 of the 70 players that dressed out for the Arkansas game on Sept. 25.

*Alabama played 58 of the 80 players that dressed for the South Carolina game on Oct. 2.

*In the win at Kentucky (Oct. 2), Alabama played 67 of the 70 players that dressed for the game. UA used every available man on the roster in its 45-17 win with the exception of its three backup quarterbacks Marc Guillon, Adam Thrash and A.J. Milwee.

*The Crimson Tide dressed 127 players for its homecoming game with Southern Miss (Oct. 16) and 66 saw action in the 24-point win.

*Alabama played 54 players in its loss to Tennessee (Oct. 23).

*The Crimson Tide played 61 players in the win over Miss. State.

START ME UP

*The Crimson Tide has used 11 first-time starters in the first nine games of the 2004 season.

*In fact, Alabama has used at least one first-time starter in all but three games (South Carolina, Tennessee and Miss. State) this season.

*The newest addition to the list of first-time starters is sophomore tailback Kenneth Darby (Huntsville), who took over as the starting tailback when senior Ray Hudson (Bonifay, Fla.) was lost on Oct. 9 with a season-ending knee injury.

*Darby ran for an Alabama record 197 yards by a first-time starter in the Crimson Tide's 27-3 win over Southern Miss on Oct. 16.

*In the Sept. 4 season opener with Utah State, Alabama used four first-time starters, including two on offense and two on defense.

*On offense, Alabama employed two first-time starters, including Kyle Tatum (RT) and Tyrone Prothro (WR).

*On defense two more players made their first career starts, including juniors Rudy Griffin (LDT) and Juke King (SLB).

*Alabama used three first-time starters in its 28-7 win over Ole Miss in its Southeastern Conference opener on Sept. 11.

*All three were on offense and included senior tailback Ray Hudson (Bonifay, Fla) and freshmen wide receivers DJ Hall (Fort Walton Beach, Fla.) and Keith Brown (Gulfport, Miss.).

*Hudson snapped a streak of 37 consecutive games without a start in the win over Ole Miss.

*Only four current UA players have started 20 or more consecutive games entering Saturday's game at LSU.

*Senior Evan Mathis has now made 44 consecutive starts for Alabama, the longest active streak on the team.

*Mathis' first career start came at South Carolina on Sept. 29, 2001 and he started 35 straight games at the right tackle position.

*He moved to left guard in this spring and has started all eight games this season to extend his streak to 43 consecutive starts.

*Mathis' former right tackle position is now anchored by sophomore Kyle Tatum, who switched from the defensive line to the offensive line this spring.

*Junior free safety Roman Harper and junior strong safety Charlie Peprah have logged 23 straight starts, while senior cornerback Anthony Madison has started 22 consecutive games.

*Senior Chris James (LCB) has played more games (45) than anyone on the Alabama team without at least one career start.

*Senior Carlos Andrews (FS) has also played in 45 games in his Alabama career, but has started only once.

KNEE INJURIES TIMES THREE

*Alabama has suffered three season-ending knee injuries this season.

*The Crimson Tide has lost its starting quarterback (Brodie Croyle), starting tailback (Ray Hudson) and starting fullback (Tim Castille) in the first eight games.

*The trio accounted for 1,574 yards and 17 TDs this season.

*Junior quarterback Brodie Croyle suffered a season-ending injury against Western Carolina on Sept. 18.

*Croyle tore his ACL (right knee) on the Crimson Tide's first offensive possession of the third quarter. He had successful surgery on Monday, Sept. 20, according to surgeons Dr. James Andrews and Dr. Larry Lemak.

*According to Dr. Lemak, recovery time for Croyle will be about five months, which should put him on target to return to spring practice.

*Croyle missed all of 2004 spring practice as he underwent successful surgery on Dec. 11, 2003 to repair a partially dislocated shoulder (non-throwing).

*He missed two games last season against Georgia and Southern Miss as a result of the shoulder injury and played hurt the remainder of the year.

*Croyle missed his senior year at Westbrook Christian High School when he tore the ACL (left knee) in the first quarter of his first game of the year.

*In three games this season, Croyle completed 44 of 66 passes for 534 yards and six touchdowns. He also did not have an interception this season.

*Senior tailback Ray Hudson (Bonifay, Fla.) suffered a season-ending knee injury at Kentucky on Oct. 9.

*In six games this season, Hudson ran 92 times for 638 yards and four touchdowns.

*At the time of his injury, he was the second-leading rusher in the SEC with a 106.3 per game average.

*Hudson also ranked second in the league with 119.3 all-purpose yards per game.

*He had 18 carries for 99 yards and one touchdown at Kentucky which gave him exactly 1,000 career rushing yards in 27 SEC games.

*Hudson played in 42 career games and ran 278 times for 1,639 yards and seven touchdowns.

*Hudson also accounted for 2,441 career all-purpose yards and 10 touchdowns.

*The latest victim is sophomore Tim Castille (Birmingham), who tore his ACL and LCL in his right knee during the fourth quarter of the Alabama-Tennessee game on Oct. 23.

*Castille had surgery on Tuesday, Oct. 26th at Health South Medical Center in Birmingham Tuesday afternoon.

*"The surgery went as planned," Dr. James Andrews said. "We repaired and reconstructed the anterior cruciate and lateral collateral ligaments in his right knee. Under the normal healing process and rehabilitation, he should be ready to resume his playing career next season."

*In eight games this season, Castille was the Tide's third-leading rusher and second-leading receiver.

*Castille had 62 rushing attempts for 247 yards and a team-high six TDs this season. He did not have a negative rushing attempt this season.

*In addition, Castille caught 14 passes for 104 yards.

CAVAN OUT, TOO

*Alabama senior tight end David Cavan (Tuscaloosa) became the fourth player to suffer a season-ending injury when he left the Miss. State game with a back injury in the second quarter.

*Coach Mike Shula announced on Wednesday, Nov. 10 that Cavan would miss the remainder of the season with a broken vertebrae in his back.

*The back injury is just one of many suffered by Cavan throughout his injury-plagued career.

*Cavan has also suffered injuries to head his head/neck, shoulder, wrist and foot during his five-year career.

*Davidson has played in all eight games, but saw his most significant action against Miss. State (36 snaps) when Johnston and Cavan were both injured.

*McLain has played 10 total snaps this season in two games against Kentucky (8) and Miss. State (2).

PENNINGTON NOW UNDER CENTER

*Junior Spencer Pennington (Fayette) became the third different quarterback to start for Alabama this season when he made his second career start at Kentucky on Oct. 9.

*In addition, Pennington is the fourth different starting quarterback in Shula's 22 games as head coach.

*Pennington, subbing for the injured Marc Guillon (sore back) led the Crimson Tide to a 45-17 win over the Wildcats for his first career win at the starting quarterback.

*Pennington is now 3-2 (.600) in his UA career as the starting quarterback, including a 3-1 (.750) mark this season.

*In his five career starts, Pennington has completed 43 of 83 passes for 496 yards, with six interceptions and three touchdowns.

*In his four starts this season, Pennington has completed 34 of 63 passes for 387 yards, with five interceptions and two touchdowns.

*Pennington made his first career start for Alabama on Oct. 4, 2003 in a 37-23 loss at Georgia. Against the Bulldogs, he completed 9 of 20 passes for 109 yards, with one interception and one TD before leaving the game with a shoulder injury.

*Pennington opened the season as the third-string quarterback but became the starter at Kentucky (Oct. 9) when Marc Guillon (Chico, Calif.) was injured.

*Guillon (Chico, Calif.) made two starts this season in the absence of junior Brodie Croyle (torn ACL).

*Guillon was 0-2 (.000) as the starter, losing two SEC games against Arkansas and South Carolina.

*He suffered a back injury during the week leading up to the Kentucky game and was replaced by Pennington.

*Guillon made his first career start on Sept. 25, 2004 in a 27-10 loss at Arkansas.

*Guillon took all 64 snaps under center in his debut with the Crimson Tide.

*The redshirt sophomore completed just six of 18 passes for 54 yards and threw one interception in the loss. He also had one rushing attempt for minus one yard.

*In his second start against South Carolina (Oct. 2), Guillon completed nine of 18 passes for 63 yards and threw two interceptions before being benched in the third quarter.

*Prior to the Arkansas game, Guillon had taken just 18 snaps this season in games against Utah State and Western Carolina.

*He took 15 snaps under center against the Catamounts, leading the Crimson Tide to a pair of second-half touchdowns.

*Guillon was 5-for-7 for 71 yards and one TD in the 52-0 win.

*He made his Crimson Tide debut against Utah State on Sept. 3 and took three snaps at the end of the game, handing the ball off all three times to freshman tailback Aaron Johns.

*Croyle (Rainbow City) started the first three games of the season for Alabama before suffering a season-ending knee injury in the third quarter of the Western Carolina game on Sept. 18.

*In those three games, Croyle completed 44 of 66 passes for 534 yards and five touchdowns. He did not have an interception in leading the Crimson Tide to a 3-0 start.

THREE QUARTERBACKS

*For the second year in a row, Alabama has used three different starting quarterbacks this season.

*Croyle (3), Pennington (2) and Guillon (2) have each started at least two games for the Crimson Tide this year.

*In fact, Alabama has used four different starting quarterbacks in Shula's 22 games as the Crimson Tide's head coach.

*Alabama also started three different quarterbacks in 2003 in Shula's first season.

*The list of starting quarterbacks last season included Croyle, Pennington and Brandon Avalos.

*Croyle started the first four games of the 2003 season before injuring his shoulder in the double-overtime loss to Arkansas (Sept. 27, 2003).

*Pennington made his first career start on Oct. 4., 2003 at Georgia. He completed nine of 20 passes for 109 yards, with one TD and one interception before leaving the game with a shoulder injury.

*Avalos, the third-string quarterback, started the next week against Southern Miss (Oct. 11) and led UA to a 17-3 win despite just 12 passing yards.

*Prior to the 2003 season, the last time a third-team quarterback eventually started a game for Alabama was Oct. 17, 1987 when Jeff Dunn led the Crimson Tide to a 41-22 win over Tennessee at Legion Field.

*Dunn replaced an ineffective Vince Sutton after a 13-10 loss to Memphis State the previous week (Oct. 10). Sutton had become the starter when David Smith suffered a season-ending injury at Vanderbilt on Sept. 26, 1987.

QUARTERBACK DEBUTS

*Marc Guillon made his first career start on Sept. 25 at Arkansas to become the 13th different starting quarterback for the Crimson Tide since the 1991 season.

*Since 1991, Alabama's starting quarterbacks have gone 9-4 (.692) in their first career start for the Crimson Tide.

*The four losses were charged to Lance Tucker (Miss. State, 1997), David Palmer (LSU, 1993), Spencer Pennington (at Georgia, 2003) and Guillon (Arkansas, 2004).

*Guillon's start under center marked the third consecutive season that Alabama has started a first-time quarterback in its first SEC road game.

*Then redshirt freshman Brodie Croyle made his first career start in Fayetteville on Sept. 28, 2002 as the Crimson Tide posted a 30-12 win.

*In the win, Croyle completed 12 of 24 passes for 285 yards and two touchdowns and was named the National Freshman of the Week.

*In the 2003 SEC road opener, then sophomore Spencer Pennington completed nine of 20 passes for 109 yards in a 37-23 loss. Pennington suffered a shoulder injury in the second half and missed the next four games.

*Alabama has scored 84 points in the second quarter this season and averages more than nine points per game during the second quarter.

*Alabama has scored during the second quarter in all nine games this season and 10 straight games dating back to last season.

*The Crimson Tide scored 17 second-quarter points in the win over Miss. State on Nov. 6.

*The 17 points against Miss. State equaled the most this season by Alabama.

*The Crimson Tide had managed only six points (two field goals) during the second quarter of its previous two games.

*Alabama also scored 17 second quarter points and racked up a season-high 196 total yards in its win over Western Carolina on Sept. 18.

UA HAS SEC'S TOP RUSHING OFFENSE

*The Alabama Crimson Tide enters this weekend's game against LSU with the best rushing offense in the SEC.

*Alabama leads the league with 229.8 rushing yards per game. Alabama also ranks 13th in the nation in rushing offense this season.

*Through nine games, Alabama has rushed the ball 407 times for 2,068 yards and 19 touchdowns.

*Alabama has rushed the ball 69.3 percent of the time this season.

*The 2,068 rushing yards accounts for 64.9 percent of UA's total offense in 2004.

*The rushing offense has really been emphasized the last four weeks as Alabama has run the ball 190 times for 931 yards.

*Alabama averaged 47.5 rushing attempts and 232.75 rushing yards per game against Kentucky, Southern Miss, Tennessee and Miss. State.

*Alabama's best rushing attack of the season came at Kentucky on Oct. 9 as the Tide ran a season-high 63 times for 304 yards in a 45-17 win.

*The 63 rushing attempts and 304 rushing yards were the most in the Shula era.

*The last time Alabama rushed for 300 yards in a game was Sept. 21, 2002 when the Crimson Tide had 64 carries for 351 yards in a 20-7 win over Southern Miss.

*The bulk of the Crimson Tide's rushing offense this season has come from senior tailback Ray Hudson, who suffered a season-ending knee injury against Kentucky.

*In six games this season, Hudson had 92 rushing attempts for 638 yards and four touchdowns. Hudson was the SEC's second-leading rusher at the time of his injury.

*The Crimson Tide also lost its starting fullback in the fourth quarter of the Tennessee game on Oct. 23.

*Prior to the season-ending injury, sophomore fullback Tim Castille (Birmingham) had 62 rushing attempts for 247 yards and six TDs.

*Castille did not have a negative rushing attempt in eight games this season.

*Hudson and Castille combined for 897 rushing yards and 10 TDs this season.

*Sophomore Kenneth Darby (Huntsville) and true freshman Aaron Johns (Thomasville) will pick up the rushing load the remainder of the season at tailback.

KENNETH DARBY NEARS 1,000 YARDS

*Sophomore tailback Kenneth Darby (Huntsville) needs to just 67 yards to become the 11th player in Alabama history to rush for 1,000 yards in a single-season.

*Through nine games, Darby has 169 rushing attempts for 933 yards and seven touchdowns.

*In his brief Alabama career, Darby has 203 rushing attempts for 1,118 yards and seven touchdowns in 19 career games.

*He is averaging 58.8 yards per game and 5.5 yards per carry in his two-year career.

*He is coming off the best game of his career where he ran 36 times for 200 yards and one touchdown in a 30-14 win over Miss. State on Nov 6.

*He became the 12th player in Alabama history to rush for 200 yards in a single game.

*In addition, the 36 rushing attempts tied for the fifth-best mark in school history.

*Darby is the first player in Alabama history to rush for 200 yards in a single-game at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

*In his last four games, Darby has rushed 110 times for 585 yards and four touchdowns.

*Darby is averaging 146.25 rushing yards over his last four games. He is also averaging 5.3 yards per carry in those four games.

*In his first career start against Southern Miss (Oct. 16), Darby ran the ball 29 times for 197 yards and one touchdown.

*The 197 rushing yards are the most in a game by an Alabama making his first career start.

*With 67 rushing yards this week at LSU, Darby would become the 11th player in school history to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a single-season.

*Darby is also trying to give Alabama a 1,000-yard rusher for the second consecutive year.

*In 2003, tailback Shaud Williams ran for 1,367 yards, the third-best total in school history.

*The last time Alabama had a 1,000-yard rusher in back-to-back seasons was 1998 and 1999 when Shaun Alexander did it as a junior (1,178) and a senior (1,383).

*Darby also seeks to become just the second sophomore in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in a single-season.

*Bobby Humphrey ran for an Alabama record 1,471 yards as a sophomore in 1986.

*Senior Ray Hudson (Bonifay, Fla.) and sophomore Kenneth Darby (Huntsville) each ran for 100 yards in the 2004 season opener against Utah State.

*Hudson ran 16 times for 111 yards and one TD in the Crimson Tide's 48-17 win.

*It was the first 100-yard rushing game in his four-year career with the Crimson Tide.

*Hudson's seven-yard touchdown run with just over four minutes left in the game was his first TD for Alabama since the 2003 Tennessee game.

*Darby eclipsed the 100-yard mark with 11 carries for 111 yards and one TD in the win over the Aggies.

*He scored his first collegiate touchdown with a 29-yard run to give Alabama a 17-7 lead with 5:47 left in the second quarter.

*In the process, Darby becomes the first running back from the state of Alabama to rush for 100 yards for the Crimson Tide since Tuscaloosa native Dennis Riddle ran for 131 yards in a 24-23 win over Auburn on Nov. 23, 1996 (a span of 86 games).

*Another Alabama native, Tyler Watts (Pelham) had three consecutive 100-yard rushing games against South Carolina, UTEP and Ole Miss during the 2001 season, but Watts was the Tide's starting quarterback.

*Hudson and Darby became the first Alabama duo to rush for 100 yards in the same game since Shaud Williams (131) and Santonio Beard (109) combined for 240 rushing yards in a 31-0 win at LSU on Nov. 16, 2002.

*Senior punter Bo Freelend (Eutaw) has been named one of the 10 semifinalists for the the 2004 Ray Guy Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top collegiate punter by the The Greater Augusta (Ga.) Sports Council.

*The other semifinalists are Dustin Colquitt (Sr., Tennessee), Gary Cook (Sr., UNLV), Brandon Fields (So., Michigan State), Chris Kluwe (Sr., UCLA), Tom Malone (Jr., Southern California), Matt Payne (Sr., Brigham Young), Adam Podlesh (So., Maryland), Daniel Sepulveda (So., Baylor) and Steve Weatherford (Jr., Illinois).

*In nine games this season, the Eutaw native has punted 44 times (1,836) for a 41.7 yard average.

*Freelend has pinned 11 of his punts inside the 20-yard line. UA opponents have only 13 punt returns (8.2 avg) this season, with 14 fair catches.

*During his UA career, Freelend has punted 117 times (4,812 yards) for a 41.1 yard average with the Tide.

*In 2003, he punted 73 times for a 40.8 average. The 73 punts and 2,976 punting yards ranked third on the school's single-season charts.

*In the 2003 Ole Miss game, he punted five times for 262 yards and tied the Alabama single-game record with a 52.4 yard average for a minimum of five punts.

*The 10 semifinalists were chosen from the initial list of 41 punters, who were evaluated on overall statistics and contribution to his team with emphasis placed on the following categories: net average, percentage of total punts inside the 20, average return yardage and percentage not returned.

*These various components are what made Ray Guy, the awards namesake, a most exceptional punter and these characteristics are indicative of the nation's top collegiate punter.

*A national voting body of Division I-A coaches and sports information directors, media, and former punters will decide the three award finalists and the winner.

*The 2004 Ray Guy Award recipient will be announced on Thursday, December 9, 2004 on the Home Depot College Football Awards Show, televised live on ESPN.

*The winner will again be honored at the Greater Augusta Sports Awards Gala in Augusta, Georgia in early 2005. Also honored at the Gala will be the annual G.A.M.E.S. (Greater Augusta Medals for Excellence in Sports) Award winners.

BRIAN BOSTICK NAMED SEMIFINALIST FOR LOU GROZA AWARD

*University of Alabama senior place kicker Brian Bostick (Cullman, Ala.) is one of the 20 semifinalists for the 2004 Lou Groza Award, according to an announcement by the Palm Beach County Sports Commission.

*The Lou Groza Award, presented by the 2005 FedEx Orange Bowl National Championship committee, is awarded annually to best place kicker in college football.

*In nine games this season, Bostick is 13-of-16 in field goals, second in the SEC in field goals per game and field goal percentage, and he has hit all 31 of his PAT attempts. He is second among SEC kickers in league in scoring with 7.2 points per game, which ranks him fourth among all players this year.

*Bostick has made 44 of his 47 total kicks (.936) this season and leads the Crimson Tide with 65 points through nine games.

*He connected on 3-of-3 field goals and made all three of his PAT attempts as Alabama defeated Mississippi State, 30-14. The three made field goals matched his career high for the Crimson Tide.

*Perhaps his most significant kick was a 47-yard field goal that gave Alabama a 23-14 lead midway through the fourth quarter. The 47-yard field goal matched his season high set two weeks earlier against Tennessee. He also made a 34-yard field goal midway through the third quarter which put Alabama ahead 20-14. His first field goal of the game was a 24-yarder early in the second quarter, cutting the Mississippi State lead to 7-3.

*Bostick finished the game with 12 points, missing his career high for points in a game by one point. For his efforts against Miss. State, he was named the SEC Special Teams Player of Week.

*The voters for the Lou Groza Award are comprised of all Division I head coaches, sports writers and sportscasters from across the country, conference officials, various NFL kickers and all previous Lou Groza Award finalists.

*The three finalists for the Lou Groza Award will be announced on Monday November 22nd. Finalists will be honored at the 13th Annual Lou Groza Award Banquet on Tuesday December 7th at the West Palm Beach Marriott in West Palm Beach, FL.

*The award, now in its 13th year, is named for NFL Hall-of-Fame kicker Lou Groza, who played 21 seasons with the Cleveland Browns. Groza won four NFL championships with Cleveland and was named NFL Player of the Year in 1954.

* Nicknamed "The Toe," Groza was one of the first people to truly make kicking an art form, and he helped usher in to football the idea that a player could be used exclusively for kicking.

*The Lou Groza Award is sponsored by AIM Riverside Press, BankAtlantic, The Breakers, Clipper Corporate Apparel, Continental Airlines, ESPN Radio 760, ESPN Regional Television, Florida Atlantic University Athletics

Alabama special teams stalwart Chris James (Albany, Ga.) hosted his own block party in 2003 for the Crimson Tide.

*James set the single-season Alabama record with four blocked kicks last year, including three punts and one field goal attempt.

*He is the only player in Alabama history to block three punts in the same season.

*James 44-yard blocked punt return at Ole Miss makes him the 10th player in Alabama history to score off a blocked kick.

PENALTIES AND TURNOVERS

*The successes and failures of a football team relies in part on the number of penalties and turnovers committed during the course of a game and season.

*The 2004 Crimson Tide football team is no exception.

*In its six wins this season, Alabama has been pretty much turnover free, with just eight turnovers in wins over Utah State, Ole Miss, Western Carolina, Kentucky, Southern Miss and Miss. State.

*In fact, Alabama did not have a turnover in the wins over Utah State (season opener) and Kentucky.

*Alabama had three turnovers its 30-14 win over Miss. State on Nov. 6, marking the first time in the Shula era that Alabama had more than two turnovers and still won the game.

*In its three losses this season to Arkansas, South Carolina and Tennessee, Alabama has had eight turnovers.

*UA had a season-high four interceptions in the loss to the Gamecocks on Oct. 2.

*Alabama is averaging 1.33 turnovers in its six wins this season.

*Alabama is averaging 2.67 turnovers in its three losses.

*Penalties have also played a part in the Tide's fortunes and misfortunes this season.

*In the six wins this season, Alabama has been penalized an average of 6.5 times for 58.33 yards per game.

*Alabama had a season-low five penalties for 35 yards in its 45-17 road win at Kentucky on Oct. 9.

*In its three losses, Alabama has averaged 54.6 yards per game.

*Arkansas was penalized one time (five yards) in its 27-10 win over Alabama on Sept. 25.

*South Carolina was not penalized in its 20-3 road win over the Crimson Tide on Oct. 2.

*Prior to the South Carolina game, the last UA opponent without a penalty was UCLA in the 2000 season opener in Tuscaloosa.

BOTH CASTILLES SCORE IN OPENER

*Freshman cornerback Simeon Castille and sophomore fullback Tim Castille both scored touchdowns in the Crimson Tide's season opening win over Utah State.

*Simeon scored his first collegiate touchdown with a 31-yard interception return on the second play of the third quarter to give Alabama a 24-10 lead.

*Tim added a one-yard run in the fourth quarter to extend Alabama's lead to 41-17 with just under 13 minutes to play.

*When the elder Castille crossed the goal-line it sent Alabama football historians and researchers scurrying to find the last time, if ever, two brothers had scored in the same game.

*After some exhaustive research, the Castille's are the first set of brothers to score touchdowns in the modern era (since 1933) of Alabama football, but not the first set of brothers to accomplish the feat in the Crimson Tide's long and storied football history.

*The feat has now actually happened six times.

*Adrian and Hargrove "Hog" VandeGraaff were the first brothers to score a touchdown in the same game accomplishing the feat in the Crimson Tide's 47-5 win over Birmingham College on Oct. 7, 1911. Adrian scored four TDs and Hargrove added one TD in the win.

*The duo did it again in the Crimson Tide's 22-0 win over Tulane on Nov. 11, 1911, scoring one TD each in the win.

*Adrian and Hargrove combined for three TDs in the Crimson Tide's 52-0 win over Marion on Sept. 28, 1912 as "Hog" scored two and Adrian added one score.

*Hargrove "Hog" and his younger brother W. T. "Bully" VandeGraaff scored one TD each in the Crimson Tide's 81-0 win over Birmingham College on Oct. 4, 1913.

*Bully VandeGraaff became the Crimson Tide's first All-American in 1915, earning First-Team honors from the Walter Camp Foundation.

*Two more brothers added their names to list in 1914 as Bill and Griff Harsh combined for four TDs in the Crimson Tide's 58-0 win over Tulane on Oct. 31, 1914. Bill accounted for three TDs and Griff added one.

OH BROTHER

*For just the second time in school history, Alabama has a trio of brothers have played in the same game.

*The Britt brothers (Wesley, Taylor and Justin) form the first trio of brothers to play football on the same team at Alabama since the VandeGraaff (Adrian, Hargrove and W.T.) brothers all played together in 1912.

*All three of the Britt brothers saw action in the win over Utah State in the 2004 season opener. Senior left tackle Wesley Britt started and played 64 snaps on the offensive line. Junior left guard Taylor Britt played three snaps on the offensive line. True freshman defensive tackle Justin Britt made his Alabama debut against the Aggies and played 17 snaps on the defensive line.

*The VandeGraff brothers made their playing debut together on Sept. 28, 1912 in the Crimson Tide's 52-0 win over Marion Institute. Adrian (senior), Hargrove (junior) and W.T. "Bully" (freshman) all saw action in the win, with Adrian and Hargrove scoring one touchdown each in the win.

*In addition, the Goode brothers (Kerry, Pierre and Clyde) played on the same team in 1987, but never played in the same game. Kerry and Pierre saw action for the Crimson Tide that year, but Clyde never got in a game during the 1987 season.

ALABAMA-LSU SERIES

*Alabama leads the all-time series with LSU 43-19-5 (.679) in a series that dates back to the 1895 season.

*The Fighting Tigers won the inaugural meeting (12-6) played in Baton Rouge on Nov. 18, 1895. The two teams did not meet again until the 1902 season, with LSU prevailing once again. Alabama's first series win came on Nov. 9, 1903 in Baton Rouge as the Crimson Tide scored a 10-0 victory.

*LSU won four of the first six meetings in the series, before Alabama began to take control at the conclusion of World War I. From 1919-45, Alabama posted a 12-game unbeaten streak (9-0-3) against LSU.

*The Fighting Tigers would gain a slight advantage over the next nine meetings, posting a 5-3-1 record from 1946-58.

*In 1964, the series became one-sided in favor of the Crimson Tide. Alabama would go 16-2 (.889) against LSU from 1964-81, including a series-long 11-game winning streak from 1971-81.

*During Paul Bryant's era as head coach (1958-82), UA posted a 16-4 (.800) mark against LSU, which included a five-game winning streak (1964-68) and a 11-game winning streak (1971-81). LSU's four wins over Bryant's teams came in 1958, 1969, 1970 and 1982.

*Since 1982, the Crimson Tide holds a narrow 12-9-1 (.568) series lead with the Tigers. Included in that stretch was a four-game winning streak by Alabama from 1989-92.

*LSU also ended UA's school record 31-game (30-0-1) unbeaten streak with a 17-13 win at Bryant-Denny Stadium in 1993.

*LSU enters the 2004 season having won five of the last eight meetings in the series, including a convincing 27-3 win last year at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

*The Tigers also snapped a 15-game winless streak to the Crimson Tide in Tiger Stadium with a 30-28 win in Baton Rouge on Nov. 4, 2000.

SERIES HIGHLIGHTS

*The LSU series is the fourth oldest series in the UA record books. The series dates back to 1895.

*LSU and Southern Miss are the only two teams to play Alabama at all four modern era home sites -- Crampton Bowl, Ladd Stadium, Legion Field and Bryant-Denny Stadium.

*Alabama has shutout LSU 15 times, including last year's 31-0 win in Baton Rouge. The Crimson Tide's biggest shutout win was a 42-0 decision in 1925.

*LSU has shutout Alabama three times and not since 1997 here in Tuscaloosa. The Tigers' biggest shutout win came in 1957 (28-0).

*Alabama's longest series winning streak is 11 games from 1971-82.

*LSU has never won more than two straight games against Alabama.

*The first meeting between Alabama and LSU took place on Monday, Nov. 18, 1895 at 9:30 a.m. The game had originally been scheduled for Friday, Nov. 15th.

*Alabama defeated LSU 6-4 in Mobile during the 1907 season on a 75-yard return by Thomas Reidy with less than one minute to play.

*The Crimson Tide's 21-0 win in Baton Rouge during the 1919 season was the first win of a then school record 12-game winning streak for Alabama.

*This was also the first win in the first 10-game winning streak in school history.

*Alabama and LSU played to 27-27 tie in Baton Rouge on Sept. 30, 1944, marking the first Alabama football game since the Jan. 1, 1943 Orange Bowl win over Boston College (37-21). The Crimson Tide did not field a football team in 1943 due to World War II.

*Legendary Alabama coach Paul "Bear" Bryant's first game as head coach of the Crimson Tide was against LSU. The Tigers defeated the Crimson Tide 13-3 on Sept. 27, 1958 at Mobile's Ladd Stadium. *Also, the bleachers collapsed as Ladd Stadium that night due to the overflow crowd attracted by Bryant's debut.

*Alabama recorded its 500th all-time win with a 21-7 victory over LSU on Thanksgiving night (Nov. 22) in 1973.

*LSU beat Alabama 19-18 in a classic game in Tuscaloosa on Nov. 5, 1988, marking the Tigers' first win on the UA campus since 1902 and first-ever in Bryant-Denny Stadium.

*Alabama's 650th win (32-16) came against LSU on Nov. 11, 1989 in Baton Rouge as UA clinched a share of its first SEC Championship since 1981.

*Alabama's 700th on-the-field win also came in Baton Rouge on Nov. 5, 1994 as the Tide claimed a 35-17 win.

*LSU shutout Alabama 27-0 on Nov. 8, 1997, marking just the sixth time the Crimson Tide had ever been shutout in Bryant-Denny Stadium.

THERE'S NO PLACE LIKE HOME

There's no place like home, unless you play in the Alabama-LSU football series.

*A streaky series at best, this matchup between Alabama and LSU has produced some interesting results.

*The Crimson Tide holds a 43-19-5 series lead over the Tigers in a series that has been dominated by the road team.

*The home team has compiled a 9-24-1 (.279) since the 1970 season.

*The road team won every game in the Alabama-LSU series from 1981-89, with the exception of a 14-14 tie in Baton Rouge in 1985.

*Alabama snapped the nine-game unbeaten streak by the road team with a 24-3 win in Tuscaloosa during the 1990 season.

*Since 1991, the road team is 10-3 (.769) in the last 13 games, including a three-game winning streak.

*Since 1969, Alabama is 15-1-1 (.912) in Baton Rouge.

*On the flip side, LSU has won eight of the last 11 games played in the state of Alabama, including four straight wins in 1982, 1984, 1986 and 1988.

*Only one other Louisiana city has hosted this series, with Alabama and LSU playing to a 7-7 tie in New Orleans in 1921.

*Four Alabama cities have played host to this rivalry, including Tuscaloosa, Mobile, Montgomery and Birmingham.

*LSU coach Nick Saban is 3-1 (.750) in his head coaching career against Alabama.

*There are no players on the Alabama roster from the state of Louisiana.

*LSU has four players on its football roster from the state of Alabama, including true freshman defensive back Chevis Jackson (St. Paul's HS, Mobile), redshirt freshman quarterback JaMarcus Russell (Williamson HS, Mobile), junior defensive end Melvin Oliver (Opelika) and junior offensive tackle Brandon Washington (Central HS, Tuscaloosa).

*Alabama receivers coach Charlie Harbison served as the defensive backs coach at LSU each of the last two seasons (2001-02).

*LSU offensive coordinator and QB coach Jimbo Fisher served as quarterbacks coach at Auburn under Terry Bowden from 1993-98. The Tigers posted a 3-3 record against the Crimson Tide during that six-year period.

*LSU's Director of Athletic Training, Jack Marucci, earned his master's degree from Alabama in 1988. He spent two years with the Crimson Tide football and baseball teams as a graduate assistant trainer.

2003 RECAP - LSU 27, ALABAMA 3

*Alabama's 2003 home finale at Bryant-Denny Stadium was not a victorious one, as the eventual National Champion LSU Tigers defeated the Crimson Tide, 27-3.

*In a series that historically favors the visiting team, (the host has won nine of the last 34 games) the Tigers put on an efficient performance.

*Two quick three-and-outs by the Alabama offense gave the Tigers outstanding field position in the first quarter. Chris Jackson opened all scoring with a 20-yard field goal, the result of a 10 play, 46 yard drive. Then, Matt Mauck found Michael Clayton open in the end zone from 23-yards away, capping off a lightning fast, one-play drive, and establishing the Tigers' momentum early on.

*The Tigers posted 27 unanswered points on the Tide defense, as Mauck and a trio of Tiger running backs methodically moved the ball down the field.

*Bama struggled to find consistency on offense, mostly due to the stingy LSU defense, which surrendered only 219 yards.

*Ranked third nationally at the time, the Tigers became the fifth of the Tide's seven Bryant-Denny opponents to be ranked at the time in which the games took place.

*It was the final home game for 22 senior football players, each of whom were recognized before kickoff.

*The 10th ranked Alabama Crimson Tide posted its first shutout since the 1997 season with a 31-0 win over the 12th ranked LSU Fighting Tigers in Baton Rouge.

*Prior to the 2002 LSU game the last time Alabama recorded a shutout was a 20-0 win at Vanderbilt on Sept. 11, 1997.

*The 67 games between shutouts is the longest such streak in school history.

*Alabama took a 14-0 lead just before halftime with a nine-play, 96 yard drive in less than two minutes (1:41).

*All 96 yards came on the ground and the only pass attempt came on a "spike" to kill the clock by quarterback Tyler Watts, who capped the drive with a two-yard TD run.
