Tigers Open 2004 Season Versus UCF in Orlando, Fla.

LSU begins the 2004 season with a three-game series at the University of Central Florida Friday, Feb. 13 through Sunday, Feb. 15. The games will be played on the UCF campus at Jay Bergman Field (cap. 2,230), which opened during the 2001 season. The series marks LSU's fourth trip to Orlando to face UCF in the past 20 seasons. The Tigers will play their season opener away from Alex Box Stadium for the first time since 1995, when the Tigers opened versus Lamar in the Winn-Dixie Showdown in the Louisiana Superdome.

LSU leads the overall series between the clubs, 9-2. The Tigers hold a 5-2 advantage in Orlando and a 4-0 edge in Alex Box Stadium. The Tigers swept the Knights in two-game series in Baton Rouge in 1993 and again in1999.

The last time LSU opened a season at an opponent's home field was in 1985 at UCF, and the Tigers took two of three games from the Knights (7-0, 4-5, 9-8). The Tigers returned to UCF on March 24, 1992, defeating the Knights in the first game of a scheduled two-game series by a final score of 5-2; the second game was canceled due to inclement weather, including severe hail.

LSU journeyed back to Orlando on March 3-5, 2000, and the Tigers won two of three games against UCF, as the series was contested at Tinker Field in downtown Orlando, adjacent to the Citrus Bowl football stadium. The Knights captured a wild, extra-inning affair, 14-13, in Game 1, before the Tigers rebounded to sweep the remaining two games by scores of 11-4 and 4-1.

About UCF

The Knights opened their 2004 season last weekend with a two-game sweep at Florida International (6-2, 8-6). UCF is a member of the Atlantic Sun Conference, which also includes Belmont, Campbell, Florida Atlantic, Gardner-Webb, Georgia State, Jacksonville, Lipscomb, Mercer, Stetson and Troy State. The team competes under the direction of coach Jay Bergman, who is in his 22nd season at the school and his 28th year as a college head coach. Last season, the Knights posted a 31-25 record and a 14-16 mark (ninth place) in Atlantic Sun games. UCF's last appearance in the NCAA Tournament came in 2002, when the Knights posted a 1-2 mark in the Tallahassee Regional.

The LSU Injury Report

RHP Nate Bumstead -- LSU's leader in wins (11) and innings pitched (110) in 2003, Bumstead's status for this season is questionable after he injured his shoulder during a pre-season intrasquad game on Feb. 3. An MRI revealed a tear in the labrum of his right shoulder. Bumstead will conduct a bullpen workout during this weekend's series at UCF to determine the extent of the injury. If he is able to throw without pain during the bullpen workout, and his velocity is in the mid-to-upper 80s, there is a chance he could pitch this season.

INF Bryan Harris -- Harris, a transfer from Santa Ana (Calif.) College, was projected to be the Tigers' starter at third base; however, a hernia operation limited his participation during fall practice, and he underwent arthroscopic surgery in January to remove bone chips from his right knee. He stills several weeks away from being able to contribute to the Tigers lineup.

RHP Brandon Nall -- LSU's closer at the beginning of 2003, he pitched in just six games last season before suffering a shoulder injury which required surgery. He could return to the mound at some point this season, depending upon the progress of his rehabilitation.

Tigers in Season Openers

LSU has won eight of its last nine season openers and 18 of its last 21. The Tigers lost to Kansas State in Baton Rouge to begin the 2001 season. LSU swept a three-game home series with Northwestern State to open the 2003 campaign; in fact, the Tigers have started 3-0 four times in the previous five seasons.

Tigers Defeat Alumni, 8-2, in Exhibition Contest on Jan. 30

Left fielder Ryan Patterson and shortstop Matt Horwath drove in two runs apiece to lead a 10-hit attack as LSU defeated a squad of former Tiger players, 8-2, in the annual Alumni Game on January 30 in Alex Box Stadium.

LSU is now 5-0 against the Alumni squad in a series which began prior to the 2000 regular season. The Alumni team was composed of former LSU players who are currently active in professional baseball, including second baseman Todd Walker of the Chicago Cubs, who was 2-for-3 at the plate and scored a run. The Alumni grabbed a 2-0 lead in the top of the first inning on a two-run single by right fielder Brad Hawpe, but LSU tied the game in the bottom of the inning on an RBI groundout by third baseman Ivan Naccarata and an RBI single by designated hitter Nick Stavinoha.

Horwath's RBI single in the third gave the Tigers a 3-2 advantage before centerfielder J.C. Holt contributed an RBI double in the fourth and scored on a throwing error to increase the margin to 5-2. Horwath again provided an RBI single in the sixth to make it 6-2, and Patterson delivered a two-run homer in the eighth to account for the final score.

True freshman right-hander Michael Bonura earned the victory for LSU, working the first three innings and allowing two runs on four hits with no walks and three strikeouts. Alumni starting pitcher Shane Youman took the loss, as he allowed three runs on four hits in two innings with one walk and one strikeout.

Bonura was relieved in the fourth inning by left-hander Lane Mestepey, who was making his first appearance on the mound since undergoing shoulder surgery in the summer of 2002. Mestepey worked two solid innings, allowing no runs on two hits with one strikeout. Relievers Collin Smith and Clay Dirks combined to pitch the final four innings, surrendering no runs on one hit with five strikeouts. The LSU pitchers did not allow a walk and limited the Alumni squad to only seven hits with nine strikeouts.

Patterson, Harris Earn Collegiate Baseball Pre-Season Recognition

LSU outfielder Ryan Patterson and first baseman Clay Harris were named to the 2004 Collegiate Baseball pre-season all-America team. Patterson, a junior from Rowlett, Texas, was voted to the first team. Harris, a junior from Slidell, La., was a third-team selection.

Patterson earned first-team all-SEC honors last season as the Tigers' primary designated hitter, batting .350 (92-for-263) with 20 doubles, one triple, 16 homers and 51 RBI. He was voted to the NCAA Baton Rouge Regional all-tournament team, and he was named the state's Newcomer of the Year by the Louisiana Sportswriters Association.

Harris, also a 2003 first-team all-SEC selection, tied Patterson for the team lead in home runs with 16. Harris hit .332 (70-for-211) with 16 doubles and 62 RBI, and he was voted second-team all-Louisiana by the LSWA.

WALLY PONTIFF JR. BASEBALL CLASSIC

LSU and Southeastern Louisiana will meet in the first Wally Pontiff Jr. Baseball Classic on Wednesday, February 25 at 6:30 p.m. at Zephyr Field in Metairie. Tickets for the game are \$15, and all seating is reserved. Tickets are on sale at the Southeastern athletic ticket office (985.549.5466), located at Gate 3 of the University Center. Tickets are also on sale at the Zephyr Field box office (504.734.5155) and at any Ticketmaster locations (800.488.5252).

Pontiff, who was a two-time all-SEC selection at LSU, died unexpectedly on July 24, 2002 at 21. Pontiff started for the Tigers from 2000 through 2002 and was the Most Valuable Player of the 2000 SEC Tournament and helped the Tigers win the 2000 national championship.

Pontiff was also a two-time selection to the SEC Academic Honor Roll and was a member of the 2002 District VI all-academic baseball team with a 3.25 GPA in biological sciences.

The game will mark SLU's first visit to Zephyr Field since winning three games at the park to open the 1998 season. LSU has played at least one game in the park each season since 1998, posting a 9-7 overall mark. Southeastern and LSU also have tentative plans to play in 2005 at Zephyr Field. The Lions and the Tigers will also meet in a three-game series at Alex Box Stadium in Baton Rouge March 12-14.

|Holt, Zeringue Receive Baseball America Pre-Season Accolades

LSU outfielders Jon Zeringue and J.C.Holt were named to the 2004 Baseball America pre-season all-America team. Zeringue, a junior from Thibodaux, La., was voted to the second team. Holt, a junior from Sieper, La., was a third-team selection.

Zeringue earned second-team all-SEC honors last season as the Tigers' right fielder, batting .339 (77-for-227) with 15 doubles, 13 homers and 45 RBI. He was LSU's leading hitter during the second half of the season (34 games) with a .382 average.

Holt, the 2003 NCAA Baton Rouge Regional Most Outstanding Player, hit .299 last season with 11 doubles, two triples, five homers, 36 RBI, 51 runs and 16 stolen bases. The Tigers' center fielder was also voted in August the MVP of the Cape Cod League, the wooden-bat summer league for the nation's top collegiate players. Holt batted a league-high .388 (52-for-134) in the CCBL with six doubles, one triple, one homer, 19 RBI, 25 runs and 13 steals.

LSU Baseball Home Opener Moved to Tuesday, Feb. 17

The LSU baseball home opener versus Louisiana-Monroe will be played at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 17, in Alex Box Stadium. The game was originally scheduled for a 3 p.m. start on Wednesday, Feb. 18. The home opener was moved a day earlier to avoid conflict with the LSU men's basketball game versus Auburn, which begins at 7 p.m. on Feb. 18 in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center.

SEC Coaches Select LSU to Repeat as League Champion

The LSU Tigers are the favorite to win the Southeastern Conference Baseball Championship, as voted by the league's 12 baseball coaches in the 13th annual preseason SEC poll. The Tigers seek to capture their 14th SEC Championship, having won or shared the title three times in the past eight seasons (1996, 1997 & 2003) and seven times since 1990. LSU won the both the overall SEC Championship and Western Division titles in 2003, while finishing as the SEC Tournament runner-up, falling to Alabama in the championship game. In the overall SEC Champion vote, LSU received 11 of the 12 championship votes in the poll, the most possible by one team. South Carolina received the other vote.

In addition to picking a preseason SEC champion, the league's head coaches voted a predicted order of finish in the SEC Eastern and Western Divisions. In the Eastern Division, South Carolina was the favorite with 63 points. Florida came in second with 58 points and Vanderbilt third with 42 points. LSU was the predicted winner in the Western Division with a total of 66, again collecting the maximum points for a team. Auburn was second with 51, while Ole Miss finished third with 41.

Smoke Laval

HEAD COACH • THIRD YEAR

Raymond "Smoke" Laval enhanced his reputation as one of the country's top college baseball coaches, as, in just his second season at the helm of the LSU program, he guided the 2003 Tigers to the Southeastern Conference title -- LSU's first since 1997 -- and a berth in the College World Series.

Laval, the 2003 SEC Coach of the Year, directed LSU to a 45-22-1 overall record and a 20-9-1 conference mark, as the Tigers finished No. 5 in the final Baseball America rankings.

The magnificent '03 campaign augmented the success Laval enjoyed in his inaugural season as LSU's coach, as he led the 2002 Tigers to a 44-22 overall mark, an appearance in the NCAA Super Regional and a No. 11 final national ranking.

Laval, who served seven seasons (1994-2000) as the head coach at the University of Louisiana-Monroe, assumed control of the LSU program from Bertman, who led the Tigers to five NCAA championships and 11 College World Series appearances during an 18-year (1984-2001) tenure. Laval worked as Bertman's top assistant coach for 10 seasons (1984-93), helping lead LSU to its first two NCAA titles in 1991 and 1993. During Laval's 10 years as assistant coach, LSU posted a 483-182-1 record, won five SEC titles, appeared in six College World Series and captured two national championships.

Laval was known at LSU as one of the nation's best recruiters and brightest assistant coaches, as the Tigers reached the College World Series in only the third season (1986) of the Bertman-Laval regime. LSU followed the '86 CWS appearance with Omaha berths in 1987, 1989 and 1990 before the Tigers claimed the school's first baseball national title in 1991. After LSU captured its second NCAA crown in 1993, Laval departed Baton Rouge to become the head coach at Northeast Louisiana (now Louisiana-Monroe).

During his assistant coaching tenure at LSU, Laval -- who worked as the Tigers' primary recruiter - tutored 24 players who would eventually reach the major leagues. Some of the major leaguers with whom Laval worked include all-stars Albert Belle and Paul Byrd, and first-round draft picks Ben McDonald, Rick Greene, Todd Walker and Russ Johnson.

Laval compiled a 241-159 (.603) mark as the head coach at ULM, guiding the Indians to NCAA Regional appearances in 1995, 1999 and 2000.

Laval began his coaching career in 1977 as an assistant at Jacksonville University before moving to Wolfson High School in Jacksonville as a baseball and football coach. He served as a graduate assistant at LSU in 1979 under former Tiger head coach Jack Lamabe before working two years as an assistant at Gulf Coast Community College in Panama City, Fla.

Laval served as an assistant coach at Florida for two seasons (1982-83) before returning to LSU to work under Bertman.

Laval holds a bachelor's degree (1977) from Jacksonville in physical education and a master's degree (1979) from LSU in administration. The McDonald, Pa., native played two seasons at Gulf Coast Community College, where he lettered as a catcher. He completed his playing career at Jacksonville, where he led the ninth-ranked Dolphins in hitting at the 1976 NCAA South Regional.

Laval and his wife, Pam, are the parents of two children, Brandon and Jamie.


