Tigers Play Host UL-Monroe in 2004 Home Opener

LSU (2-1) begins a four-game homestand at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday as the second-ranked Tigers play host to Louisiana-Monroe (1-0) in Alex Box Stadium. The Tigers, ranked No. 2 this week by Baseball America magazine, began the 2004 season by winning two of three games last weekend at UCF in Orlando, Fla. LSU captured the first two games by scores of 4-3 (10 innings) and 17-4 before dropping a 10-inning, 6-5 decision in Game 3. UL-Monroe defeated Grambling State, 20-1, last Friday. The Indians' scheduled doubleheader with Mississippi Valley State Saturday was postponed due to inclement weather.

LSU freshman right-hander Michael Bonura (0-0, 9.00 ERA) will make his first career collegiate start Tuesday. Bonura, a product of St. Charles Catholic High School in LaPlace, La., made a relief appearance in the Tigers' 17-4 victory over UCF on Saturday. He worked two innings allowing two earned runs on one hit with two walks and one strikeout. UL-Monroe will counter with sophomore right-hander Matt Green (0-0, 0.00 ERA) who pitched two innings of scoreless relief in the win over Grambling.

The LSU-ULM Series

LSU coach Smoke Laval served as the ULM coach for seven seasons (1994-2000), and he led the Indians to three NCAA Regional appearances and two Southland Conference championships. Brad Holland, Laval's top assistant at ULM, is in his fourth season as the Indians' coach. LSU pitching coach Brady Wiederhold worked as an assistant coach under both Laval and Holland at ULM, and LSU administrative assistant Ted White is a former all-conference catcher for the Indians. White played for both Laval and Holland during his ULM career.

LSU leads the all-time series with ULM, 33-8, including a 9-4 victory over the Indians last season in Baton Rouge. Laval has a 5-0 mark against ULM as LSU's head coach; Holland has a 1-6 mark in his career versus the Tigers.

Tigers Open Season with Series Victory at Central Florida

The UCF series last weekend marked the first time the Tigers opened the season on an opponent's home field since LSU played at UCF in 1985. The series also marked the first time LSU played two extra-inning games in the same weekend since 2001 at Georgia, where the Tigers and the Bulldogs battled in three 11-inning games.

The Game 2 win over UCF marked the return of all-SEC pitcher Lane Mestepey, who earned the win in his first appearance since June, 2002. Mestepey, who sat out last season after undergoing shoulder surgery, worked five innings against UCF, limiting the Knights to one run on five hits with two walks and one strikeout.

Mestepey got plenty of run support in the 17-4 victory, as the Tigers blasted five home runs in the contest. It marked the first time LSU belted five homers in a game since May 26, 2000, when the Tigers hit five HRs in an NCAA Regional victory over Jackson State in Alex Box Stadium.

LSU hit a total of seven homers in the UCF series, each by a different player. First baseman Clay Harris was the most productive LSU hitter over the weekend, as he batted .400 with one double, one homer and five RBI.

Last Weekend

Friday, Feb. 13 - LSU 4, Central Florida 3 (10 innings)

First baseman Clay Harris belted an RBI double in the top of the 10th inning to score designated hitter Nick Stavinoaha with the go-ahead run and second-ranked LSU held on for a 4-3 win over Central Florida at Jay Bergman Field. LSU (1-0) won its season opener for the third straight year.

Stavinoaha delivered a two-out single in the 10th before scoring on Harris' double down the left-field line against UCF reliever Matt Rhodes (0-1). Jason Determann (1-0) retired the side in order in the bottom of the 10th to preserve the victory. Determann worked four innings in relief of starter Justin Meier, limiting the Knights to one run on three hits with one walk and two strikeouts.

LSU grabbed a 1-0 lead in the top of the first inning when center fielder J.C. Holt reached second base on a pair of errors by second baseman Kevin Richmond, advanced on a wild pitch by starter Matt Fox and scored on a passed ball by catcher Drew Butera. The Tigers increased the lead to 2-0 in the fourth on a solo homer by right fielder Jon Zeringue.

UCF answered with a run in the bottom of the fourth on a solo shot by center fielder Clay Timpner, his first homer of the year. The Knights tied the game in the sixth when DH David Mann walked on scored on Richmond's RBI double. LSU regained the lead in the eighth when Stavinoaha launched his first career LSU hit, a solo homer beyond the left-field wall. UCF battled right back to tie the game at 3-3 in the bottom of the eighth on Timpner's RBI single.

Meier pitched the first six innings for LSU, limiting UCF to two runs on four hits with two walks and five strikeouts. Fox worked five innings as the UCF starter, allowing two runs (one earned) on three hits with three walks and four strikeouts.

Saturday, Feb. 14 - LSU 17, Central Florida 4

Second-ranked LSU blasted five home runs to highlight a 19-hit attack as the Tigers defeated Central Florida, 17-4, at Jay Bergman Field. UCF led 1-0 in the first inning Saturday when left fielder Dee Brown delivered an RBI single against LSU starter Lane Mestepey, who was making his first pitching appearance since June, 2002, after undergoing shoulder surgery.

Mestepey shut out UCF for the remainder of his five-inning outing. He scattered five hits, allowing one run with two walks and one strikeout. Meanwhile, LSU's bats came alive Saturday after producing just four runs on seven hits in Friday's 4-3 win over UCF. The Tigers sent nine men to the plate in a five-run fourth inning highlighted by center fielder J.C. Holt's two-run single and a three-run homer - his first of the season - by left fielder Ryan Patterson.

LSU increased the lead to 7-1 in the sixth on a solo homer by shortstop Matt Horwath and an RBI grounder by first baseman Clay Harris. The Tigers scored five more runs in the seventh as Harris sparked the rally with a three-run blast, his first of the year. UCF scored three runs in the seventh against reliever Michael Bonura to narrow the deficit to 12-4, but LSU produced its third five-run inning in the ninth. UCF starter Jaime Douglas (0-1) took the loss, as he was charged with two runs on three hits in 3.1 innings with three walks and two strikeouts.

Sunday, Feb. 15 - Central Florida 6, LSU 5 (10 innings)

UCF overcame two deficits and broke a 5-5 tie on a fielder's choice grounder by left fielder Dee Brown in the bottom of the 10th inning to hand second-ranked LSU its first loss of the season. The contest marked the first time the Tigers had played in two extra-inning affairs in one series since all three games in the 2001 series at Georgia went 11 innings.

Designated hitter David Mann drew a leadoff walk off of LSU reliever Jordan Faircloth and stole second base to spark the game-winning rally. Second baseman Kevin Richmond grounded out to Clay Harris, advancing the speedy Mann to third. Faircloth intentionally walked center fielder Clay Timpner before Brown rolled a ground ball to Clay Harris at first base. Harris fielded the ball, turned and threw it into left field, spoiling a chance at a double play as Mann raced home with the winning run.

Sunday's contest marked the first collegiate start for freshman southpaw Clay Dirks. Dirks, who sat out the 2003 season after undergoing elbow surgery, made a successful debut, hurling 5.2 innings, allowing three earned runs on six hits while adding five strikeouts.

LSU (2-1) jumped out to an early lead for the second consecutive day. Blake Gill collected his first of three hits when he lined a single into right field, scoring J.C. Holt who reached on a fielding error by second baseman Kevin Richmond. The Tigers increased the lead to 3-0 in the fourth inning, when Matt Liuzza doubled off of the left field wall, scoring Clay Harris and Ivan Naccarata.

Dirks held the Golden Knights scoreless until the sixth inning. After retiring the first two batters, UCF cut into the Tigers' lead when Drew Butera laced a two-out double off of the center field batter's eye. Chandler Rose followed with a double, plating Butera for the Knights' first run of the game. Leadoff designated hitter David Mann chased Dirks out of the game, drawing a 3-1 walk.

Nate Bumstead relieved Dirks in the sixth to test his strength after suffering an arm injury in a Feb. 3 intrasquad game. Bumstead walked Kevin Richmond to load the bases. The senior right-hander then got into trouble, balking in Rose and walking Clay Timpner to load the bases again. UCF tied the game on a wild pitch that scored Mann from third.

LSU rallied to score two in the top half of the seventh to take a 5-3 lead, highlighted by Gill's RBI triple that scored Holt. Gill finished the day 3-for-5 with two RBI and a run. Nick Stavinoha closed out LSU's scoring with an RBI single that rolled in between third baseman Drew Butera and shortstop Chandler Rose to score Gill from third. UCF pitcher Tim Bascom (2-0) silenced the Tigers' bats for the final three innings to pick up the win in relief, while Faircloth (0-1) took the loss, allowing one run and two walks in one inning of relief.

SEC Coaches Select LSU to Repeat as League Champion

The LSU Tigers are the favorite to win the Southeastern Conference Baseball Championship, as voted by the league's 12 baseball coaches in the 13th annual preseason SEC poll. The Tigers seek to capture their 14th SEC Championship, having won or shared the title three times in the past eight seasons (1996, 1997 & 2003) and seven times since 1990. LSU won the both the overall SEC Championship and Western Division titles in 2003, while finishing as the SEC Tournament runner-up, falling to Alabama in the championship game. In the overall SEC Champion vote, LSU received 11 of the 12 championship votes in the poll, the most possible by one team. South Carolina received the other vote.

In addition to picking a preseason SEC champion, the league's head coaches voted a predicted order of finish in the SEC Eastern and Western Divisions. In the Eastern Division, South Carolina was the favorite with 63 points. Florida came in second with 58 points and Vanderbilt third with 42 points. LSU was the predicted winner in the Western Division with a total of 66, again collecting the maximum points for a team. Auburn was second with 51, while Ole Miss finished third with 41.

WALLY PONTIFF JR. BASEBALL CLASSIC

LSU and Southeastern Louisiana will meet in the first Wally Pontiff Jr. Baseball Classic on Wednesday, February 25 at 6:30 p.m. at Zephyr Field in Metairie. Tickets for the game are \$15, and all seating is reserved. Tickets are on sale at the Southeastern athletic ticket office (985.549.5466), located at Gate 3 of the University Center. Tickets are also on sale at the Zephyr Field box office (504.734.5155) and at any Ticketmaster locations (800.488.5252).

Pontiff, who was a two-time all-SEC selection at LSU, died unexpectedly on July 24, 2002 at 21. Pontiff started for the Tigers from 2000 through 2002 and was the Most Valuable Player of the 2000 SEC Tournament and helped the Tigers win the 2000 national championship.

Pontiff was also a two-time selection to the SEC Academic Honor Roll and was a member of the 2002 District VI all-academic baseball team with a 3.25 GPA in biological sciences.

The game will mark LSU's first visit to Zephyr Field since winning three games at the park to open the 1998 season. LSU has played at least one game in the park each season since 1998, posting a 9-7 overall mark. Southeastern and LSU also have tentative plans to play in 2005 at Zephyr Field. The Lions and the Tigers will also meet in a three-game series at Alex Box Stadium in Baton Rouge March 12-14.

Patterson, Harris Earn Collegiate Baseball Pre-Season Recognition

LSU outfielder **Ryan Patterson** and first baseman **Clay Harris** were named to the 2004 Collegiate Baseball pre-season all-America team. Patterson, a junior from Rowlett, Texas, was voted to the first team. Harris, a junior from Slidell, La., was a third-team selection.

Patterson earned first-team all-SEC honors last season as the Tigers' primary designated hitter, batting .350 (92-for-263) with 20 doubles, one triple, 16 homers and 51 RBI. He was voted to the NCAA Baton Rouge Regional all-tournament team, and he was named the state's Newcomer of the Year by the Louisiana Sportswriters Association.

Harris, also a 2003 first-team all-SEC selection, tied Patterson for the team lead in home runs with 16. Harris hit .332 (70-for-211) with 16 doubles and 62 RBI, and he was voted second-team all-Louisiana by the LSWA.

Holt, Zeringue Receive Baseball America Pre-Season Accolades

LSU outfielders **Jon Zeringue** and **J.C.Holt** were named to the 2004 Baseball America pre-season all-America team. Zeringue, a junior from Thibodaux, La., was voted to the second team. Holt, a junior from Sieper, La., was a third-team selection.

Zeringue earned second-team all-SEC honors last season as the Tigers' right fielder, batting .339 (77-for-227) with 15 doubles, 13 homers and 45 RBI. He was LSU's leading hitter during the second half of the season (34 games) with a .382 average.

Holt, the 2003 NCAA Baton Rouge Regional Most Outstanding Player, hit .299 last season with 11 doubles, two triples, five homers, 36 RBI, 51 runs and 16 stolen bases. The Tigers' center fielder was also voted in August the MVP of the Cape Cod League, the wooden-bat summer league for the nation's top collegiate players. Holt batted a league-high .388 (52-for-134) in the CCBL with six doubles, one triple, one homer, 19 RBI, 25 runs and 13 steals.

The LSU Injury Report

RHP Nate Bumstead -- LSU's leader in wins (11) and innings pitched (110) in 2003, Bumstead's status for this season was questionable after he injured his shoulder during a pre-season intrasquad game on Feb. 3. An MRI revealed a tear in the labrum of his right shoulder. However, Bumstead conducted a bullpen workout on Feb. 12 during the Tigers' road trip at UCF, and he pitched pain-free with normal velocity. He then pitched in relief in the Feb. 15 game vs. UCF, working 2.2 innings and allowing two runs on four hits with three walks and three strikeouts. Bumstead is scheduled to pitch again at some point during this weekend's series with Jacksonville State.

INF Bryan Harris -- Harris, a transfer from Santa Ana (Calif.) College, was projected to be the Tigers' starter at third base; however, a hernia operation limited his participation during fall practice, and he underwent arthroscopic surgery in January to remove bone chips from his right knee. He stills several weeks away from being able to contribute to the Tigers lineup.

RHP Brandon Nall -- LSU's closer at the beginning of 2003, he pitched in just six games last season before suffering a torn labrum in his shoulder, which required surgery. He could return to the mound at some point this season, depending upon the progress of his rehabilitation.

Aaron Hill's Donation Funds Locker Room Improvements

Smoke Laval received an unexpected Christmas gift in late December when former player Aaron Hill made a cash contribution to the LSU Baseball program. Hill, a first round draft pick of the Toronto Blue Jays in the 2003 amateur draft, signed professionally following his junior season after leading the Tigers to the 2003 College World Series. He was the 2003 SEC Player of the Year and is one of the Blue Jays' top prospects.

"I was stunned," said Laval of the gift. "He calls out of the blue over the holidays and wants to drop by and the next thing you know, he's handing me a check. I was speechless. I mean, it doesn't surprise me because that's A. Hill, that's him, but you never expect such generosity."

Laval said the gift was partially used to upgrade the carpet in the squad room, the locker room, the training room and the umpires' dressing rooms. In addition, it allowed Laval to replace all of the players' stools in the locker room.

"You see, Aaron Hill gets it", Laval said. "He gave us a lot while he was here as a player, but he has acknowledged on his own, without prompting, that he received a lot in return. To my knowledge, no player has ever given back directly to the baseball program like this, especially so soon after finishing his career here. It's the nicest thing that a former player of mine has ever done."

"People need to know what he has done and how much this place and this program have meant to him to make such a gift. And we plan to show him our appreciation and give the fans a chance to thank him properly as well."

Smoke Laval

HEAD COACH • THIRD YEAR

Raymond "Smoke" Laval enhanced his reputation as one of the country's top college baseball coaches, as, in just his second season at the helm of the LSU program, he guided the 2003 Tigers to the Southeastern Conference title -- LSU's first since 1997 -- and a berth in the College World Series.

Laval, the 2003 SEC Coach of the Year, directed LSU to a 45-22-1 overall record and a 20-9-1 conference mark, as the Tigers finished No. 5 in the final Baseball America rankings.

The magnificent '03 campaign augmented the success Laval enjoyed in his inaugural season as LSU's coach, as he led the 2002 Tigers to a 44-22 overall mark, an appearance in the NCAA Super Regional and a No. 11 final national ranking.

Laval, who served seven seasons (1994-2000) as the head coach at the University of Louisiana-Monroe, assumed control of the LSU program from Bertman, who led the Tigers to five NCAA championships and 11 College World Series appearances during an 18-year (1984-2001) tenure. Laval worked as Bertman's top assistant coach for 10 seasons (1984-93), helping lead LSU to its first two NCAA titles in 1991 and 1993. During Laval's 10 years as assistant coach, LSU posted a 483-182-1 record, won five SEC titles, appeared in six College World Series and captured two national championships.

Laval was known at LSU as one of the nation's best recruiters and brightest assistant coaches, as the Tigers reached the College World Series in only the third season (1986) of the Bertman-Laval regime. LSU followed the '86 CWS appearance with Omaha berths in 1987, 1989 and 1990 before the Tigers claimed the school's first baseball national title in 1991. After LSU captured its second NCAA crown in 1993, Laval departed Baton Rouge to become the head coach at Northeast Louisiana (now Louisiana-Monroe).

During his assistant coaching tenure at LSU, Laval -- who worked as the Tigers' primary recruiter - tutored 24 players who would eventually reach the major leagues. Some of the major leaguers with whom Laval worked include all-stars Albert Belle and Paul Byrd, and first-round draft picks Ben McDonald, Rick Greene, Todd Walker and Russ Johnson.

Laval compiled a 241-159 (.603) mark as the head coach at ULM, guiding the Indians to NCAA Regional appearances in 1995, 1999 and 2000.

Laval began his coaching career in 1977 as an assistant at Jacksonville University before moving to Wolfson High School in Jacksonville as a baseball and football coach. He served as a graduate assistant at LSU in 1979 under former Tiger head coach Jack Lamabe before working two years as an assistant at Gulf Coast Community College in Panama City, Fla.

Laval served as an assistant coach at Florida for two seasons (1982-83) before returning to LSU to work under Bertman.

Laval holds a bachelor's degree (1977) from Jacksonville in physical education and a master's degree (1979) from LSU in administration. The McDonald, Pa., native played two seasons at Gulf Coast Community College, where he lettered as a catcher. He completed his playing career at Jacksonville, where he led the ninth-ranked Dolphins in hitting at the 1976 NCAA South Regional.

Laval and his wife, Pam, are the parents of two children, Brandon and Jamie.

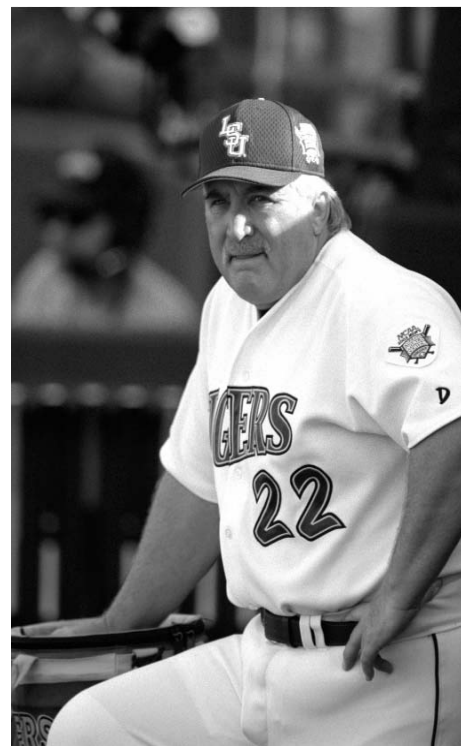
